JANUARY 12, 2016

The business plan for the proposed arts & culture centre has been drafted. Duncan Webb, President of Webb Management which was contracted to complete the study, presented findings and highlights at a Special Council Meeting attended by both Whitecourt and Woodlands County Councils. The presentation outlined operational systems, facility features and funding models, and, once completed, the plan will be used to guide further decisions regarding the proposed facility. Development of an arts & culture facility has been discussed locally for over 10 years. Multiple initiatives have been completed over the years to gain feedback and comments from the public; most recently a series of information sessions hosted in 2015 by the Town and County and an online survey. Both Whitecourt and Woodlands County Councils will be discussing the presentation at an upcoming Joint Liaison Committee Meeting to determine next steps.

Whitecourt Town Council will host an information open house on Wednesday, February 17. Residents and community stakeholders are invited to attend the event to learn about the 2016 budget, and provide comments. All comments received will be compiled for Council's consideration prior to adoption of the final 2016 Budget. The open house is scheduled for:



Lac Ste. Anne Foundation's Chief Administrative Officer provided a review of the Foundation's 2016 budget to Whitecourt Town Council. A portion of property taxes is directed to operate local seniors housing facilities, and the rate is set by the Lac Ste. Anne Foundation. The Foundation's CAO reported that the seniors requisition mill rate will remain at 0.2060 for the 2016 tax year.

The Youth Advisory Committee has requested that Council provide \$100,000 in funding for expansion of the Whitecourt Skate Park. The Committee would like to move forward with a second phase at the Park to include a "bowl" with different types of ledges and banks for park users to sharpen their skills. The total cost of the Park expansion is budgeted at \$250,000. The Committee plans to initiate fundraising efforts to assist with capital costs, and Council has deferred the request to 2016 final budget deliberations.





LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING UPDATES

MEETING JANUARY 14, 2016 WEED SPRAY EQUIPMENT APPROVED

During the regular council meeting held January 14, 2016, County Council approved the purchase of \$75,000 of new equipment for the Roadside Vegetation Control Program. This program is used to control brush and noxious weeds along more than 2,000 kilometers of roads within the County. As part of this program property owners within the County may request Fence Line Herbicide Application, a program that is offered free by the Lac Ste. Anne County Agricultural Service Board. DARWELL LIBRARY EX-PANSION GRANT & LOAN IN PLACE County Council has given full support to the Darwell Public Library facility expansion. Lac Ste. Anne County has provided a \$25,000 grant and a \$25,000 interest free loan to the Library for its planned 2016 expansion. The expansion is planned to the current library building to give them more space for community programs. for families, arguing rich families like his didn't need taxpayers' help. He even promised to give his annual UCCB payments of about \$3,400 for his three children to charity.

We have now learned that Canadian taxpayers are paying the wages of two nannies hired to care for Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's three children. In fact, the day Trudeau and his cabinet were sworn in, November 4th, one of his "first

official acts" was to approve the hiring of two nannies. Each nanny will be paid \$15 to \$20 an hour during the day and \$11 to \$13 an hour for night shifts. That's 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Leading up to the Oct 19th general election, Mr. Trudeau vowed to scrap the Conservative UCCB and replace it with a means-tested program his party has since named the Canada Child Benefit.

My questions is this: Why is he having taxpayers pay for his nannies? He said he was rich. He said he didn't need the money. Prime Minister Trudeau, why are Canadians footing the bill for your children's nannies after you hammered our Conservative Party when we were government for handing out benefits, such as a new universal childcare benefit, to wealthy families, including your own?

During our Christmas event at the Greenland Garden Center I found out about the tradition of hanging a pickle on the Christmas tree. The origin of why this started is unknown, so I challenged you readers to give me some reason for this strange practice. Here are some responses:

My theory as to why the dill pickle was hung in the Christmas tree was that it was an early form of air freshener in the pioneer American Midwest. Christmas guests were expected and a house-proud but impoverished settler's wife, anxious to overcome odors of dampness or hanging baby diapers, settled on nestling some dill pickles into the tree. The vinegary, dill aroma somewhat overpowered the other smells. (Donna)

The dill pickle in the Christmas tree may have originated in the late 1890's US when small newsletters and small rural newspapers were looking for material. An early version of "Hints by Heloise" may have included the advice to sharpen the Christmas aromas by hanging the pickle. (Donna)

I am here to share with you the actual beginning of this tradition, and don't worry I'm not gherkin your chain. It was December 24, 1928 and István Bethlen, the Prime Minister of Hungary, was putting up the last dec-

orations for his annual Christmas eve party. The holly was hung, the tree was decorated, and finger foods were being set out on the dining room table. István wife, Countess Margit Bethlen de Bethlen was overseeing everything. She was rushing around so much directing the servants, she hardly had time to appreciate the decorations. Finally, she took a moment and stepped back to admire everything; unfortunately she bumped the tree. Now there was no electric Christmas lights back then, the tree was lit with candles. So when one of them fell down and caught a branch on fire, pandemonium erupted. Countess Margit screamed, slapped the branch with her dress, which put out the fire in the tree; but lit her gown in the process. Then she really freaked out running around in circles shrieking like a mad woman as all her servants were yelling, "Stop Drop and Roll!" Finally, István came rushing into the room, took one look at the situation, and tackled his wife to the floor. The servants could finally douse her with water and everything was fine, or so they thought. As Margit ran up to towel off, change, and redo her make-up István noticed that there was one burnt branch on the tree. And that's when the first guest arrived. "What am I going to do?" he asked. "You!" István said as he turned

to his closest servant, "I'm really in a pickle, take care of this. I've got to run off and greet the guests." Unfortunately, the closest servant was hard of hearing and only caught parts of the conversation. You can guess what happened, she covered up the black spot with a large pickle from a food tray and the Bethlen's didn't realize what happened until the guests started inquiring about the pungent dill smell over by the Christmas tree. Their pride stopped them from admitting it was a mistake so Margit took credit for the idea, and being the prominent couple of the time, everyone followed suit. A tradition was born. (Colin)


