## ALBERTA ON THE LINE: LOCAL GROUP URGES ALBERTANS TO STOP THE FORT MCMURRAY WEST 500-KV TRANSMISSION PROJECT

ALBERTA BEACH, AB. – (Feb. 2, 2016) – Residents of Lac Ste. Anne County and the village of Alberta Beach can expect an unsightly change to their charming rural scenery by June 2019. Alberta PowerLine (an ATCO company) and AltaLink are scheduled to build a portion of the Fort McMurray West 500-kV Transmission Project through the Lac Ste. Anne countryside, unless residents can convince the Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC) to change their proposed route.

AUC will be hosting a public hearing for any individuals or corporations opposed or directly affected by this project. The participation deadline is February 12, 2016.

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## ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES IN SUSTAINABLE BEEF

Studies strongly indicate that consumers believe they have the right to know how their food is raised, and are ready to reward, or punish, a company/industry depending on its commitment to social and/or environmental causes.

In response to its customers' demands for sustainably raised beef, McDonald's Restaurants has introduced the McDonald's Verified Sustainable Beef Canadian Pilot Project (VSB Pilot), a program to help Canadian Cattlemen make continuous improvements in the environmental, social, and economic performance of their operations, and to sell more Canadian beef through increased consumer trust and confidence.

Since there is no universal definition of sustainable beef, Mc-Donald's collaborated with World Wildlife Federation (WWF), Cargill, JBS, and others to develop the Global Roundtable for Sustainable Beef (GRSB) and establish guiding principles and best practices for sustainable beef.

Now they are working with The Canadian Roundtable for Sustainable Beef, and numerous Canadian beef cattle experts and associations to run a pilot project to demonstrate and verify the sustainability of our Canadian beef supply, through transparent collaboration, communication and celebration of the great work done throughout the beef supply chain in Canada.

On Thursday, February 11, from 10 am to 3 pm at the Carvel Hall, the West-Central Forage Association is hosting Economic Opportunities in Sustainable Beef. This is the second workshop in the "Sustaining Agriculture Workshop Series" held in partnership with Parkland and Lac Ste. Anne Counties. This is an opportunity to learn more about the VSB Pilot Program, and see if you are interested in being a part of it. Representatives of the VSB Pilot, as well as local producers who have signed on, will explain the pilot and answer any questions.

Representatives from Alberta's Environmental Farm Plan (EFP), Alternative Land Use Systems (ALUS), and Growing Forward 2 (GF2) will also be on hand to talk about current opportunities and financial compensation programs to foster sustainability in agriculture, and how these programs can help producers meet some of the requirements for the McDonald's VSB Program.



Written submissions, such as reports or graphs are accepted until April 1, 2016. Alberta on the Line Opposition Group encourages all Albertans to get informed and get involved in stopping this large-scale infrastructure project.

The Fort McMurray West Transmission Project includes the construction of approximately 500 kilometres of new single-circuit 500-kilovolt (kV) transmission line between Wabamun and Fort McMurray with large transmission towers every 350-400 meters along the route. Many of the towers are guyed 'V' structures between 110-170 feet tall and 100 feet wide.

One specific area of the route will affect the farmland between Range Road 32 and 33, and farms and acreages along Highway 633 near Alberta Beach. The closest transmission tower will be approximately 740 metres from residences.

This proposed location for the transmission lines disrupts Alberta Beach and Lac Ste. Anne's municipal development plan. Other concerns involve the health risks that link electromagnetic field (EMFs) exposure to a variety of cancers, such as leukemia, environmental impacts, decreased property values and visual pollution.

The Alberta Electric System Operator (AESO) claims, "The demand for power in the Fort McMurray area is expected to double in 10 years and this project would help to support the Oil Sands' growth." However, with the current slump in oil prices and the ability for some Oil Sands' projects to create up to ten times more electricity than required for oil extraction and refining, the true intention of this Trans-

In 2009, the Alberta government passed Bill 50, the Electric Statues Amendment Act, which declared the construction of five major transmission projects, including the Fort McMurray West project, as "critical infrastructure" for Alberta, at the taxpayers' expense. Critics of Bill 50 state, "The power lines are only deemed necessary in order to move the excess power generated in Fort McMurray to the U.S. markets."

In 2014, AltaLink was sold to U.S. billionaire Warren Buffet's Berkshire Hathaway Inc. The condition of this controversial sale was to keep all profits within Canada for five years. The Fort McMurray West 500-kV Transmission Project will be up and running by 2019, the same year AltaLink's profits can start going to the United States.

"It's sad that we have to live with the powerlines in our backyards while the United States reap the benefits. This is why we, as Albertans, have to collectively say 'NO' to this project," says Maritta Renz, cofounder of Alberta on the Line Opposition Group.

The Spruce Grove Gun Club was recently the site of a competition that raised a record \$10,000 in support of a very worthwhile cause. Over 60 competitors, members of the Wild Rose Action Shooters, traveled from throughout Alberta and Saskatchewan to participate in the day-long three-gun match. The result was a significant donation to Valour Place, the Edmonton support home for the families of present and past military and law enforcement personnel.

Often compared to Ronald McDonald House, but in this case for military and law enforcement families, Valour Place is the first of its kind in Canada. "Because our services are provided free of charge, it is only through the generosity of donors such as the sport shooters of the Wild Rose Action Shooters and the Spruce Grove Gun Club that we are we able to sustain our facility," said St. Onge.





Children are smart and they are learning all the time. You are the best person to show them how to make good decisions. The thought of your children using drugs may scare you, but your children will hear you better if you talk calmly.

Take time to learn the facts about different drugs and gambling. Tell your children the facts without sounding scared and without scaring them. You can show your children that they can trust the information you give them.

Things to Remember

• You start teaching children about drugs sooner than you think.

You have been teaching your children from the time they were very small. You have done this by telling them not to touch anything in the medicine cabinet, not letting them have adult drinks like coffee and beer, and telling them to stay away from cigarettes. Start talks with your children by asking what they understand about drugs and alcohol, if they are concerned about anyone's use, or if they have been asked to use.

• A drug is a substance that's taken to change the way the body and mind work.

A drug can do a lot of good, or it can be harmful. If you take the right amount of medicine, you can get better. By taking too much, you can get very sick. Talk about this with your children. You can also talk about different kinds of drugs like



medicine, legal drugs, and illegal drugs.

• Talk about gambling in a way that your children understand.

It's good to use real-life examples. Ask your children if they've ever made a bet with anyone about doing something that is hard or unsafe. An example might be betting a chocolate bar that someone couldn't walk along the top of a fence. Explain that this is a type of gambling. In this example, if the person takes the bet and walks on the fence, he or she is at risk of getting hurt. The person betting may lose the chocolate bar. Both people are risking something they value, whether they know it or not. ples.

## WEEK OF JANUARY 25, 2016 -PARLIAMENT RETURNS

Although the 42nd Parliament began in December, we only sat in Parliament for a brief week and a half, before the Christmas break. January 25th, was our first full session since the fall election.

The first week of Parliament covered a variety of issues from the Official Opposition calling on the Prime Minister to commit to speaking with President Obama about the expiration of the Canada-US Softwood Lumber Agreement, to a motion calling on the Government to recognize the importance of the energy sector to the Canadian economy.

The announcement to lift sanctions against Iran was disturbing given the country's continued support for terrorism as a state policy, as are the new mechanisms in the pipeline review process that will likely create delays and not change support level.

The Special Joint Commons Committee on physician-assisted dying re-convened, and is holding a series of public consultations to hear from experts and stakeholders with the goal of reporting back with legislative suggestions by February 26th.

A Private Member's Bill was introduced in the House by Liberal MP Maurice Belanger, calling for changing a line in our National Anthem from 'in all thy sons command' to 'in all of us com-

#### mand'.

As the week came to a close, the Government announced that it is considering whether to cancel Friday sittings of Parliament in order for members to be able to spend more time in their ridings.

There are a number of issues that are facing our country today and I will continue to work hard to make sure that the government of Canada focuses on issues that matter.

Some brides believe sugar cubes tucked into their wedding gloves leads to a sweet union.

Hindu tradition states that rain on a wedding day is good luck. Rain is believed to be a symbol of fortune and abundance, especially after times of drought. What's more, rain can foretell a strong marriage. That's because a wet knot is more difficult to untie.

Ancient Romans were so concerned with ensuring good luck that they actually studied pig entrails to determine the luckiest time to marry. If they consulted with the English, they might determine that a wedding shouldn't take place on a Saturday, which is unlucky. English tradition states Wednesday is the best day to get married.

· In Holland, well-wishers would

plant pine trees outside of newlyweds' homes as a symbol of fertility and luck.

• Grooms may want to give a coin to the first person they see on the way to their weddings. This is another symbol of good luck.

Some couples plan to marry during a full moon, because that can symbolize good luck and good fortune.

• On a couple's wedding day, tears from a bride or a child during the ceremony is considered lucky. English folklore suggests that brides who discover spiders in their gowns are in for some good luck.

• The Chinese believe that lighting fireworks at their wedding ceremonies chases away evil spirits. A red umbrella also might be held over a Chinese bride to keep bad spirits at bay.

• Many grooms do not see their brides in their wedding gowns before their wedding ceremonies, feeling it is bad luck if they do. Many brides also do not wear their complete wedding outfits prior to their big day.





## Wedding Rings Are Symbolic Gestures Of Commitment

Couples adhere to many traditions on their wedding days, including the exchange of wedding rings. Wedding rings symbolize the union of two people and their pledge to remain faithful to each other.

No one is exactly sure just when the tradition of exchanging wedding rings originated, but some say it can be traced back to ancient Egypt, when the oldest recorded exchange of wedding rings was made. Reeds growing along the Nile were twisted and braided into rings and given during betrothal ceremonies. The round ring symbolized eternity, and the hole within the center meant a gateway to things unknown. Since reeds were not very durable, soon ivory, leather and bone were used to create wedding rings.


As new lands were explored and territories expanded, traditions from one culture were adopted and modified by other cultures. The same is true with wedding rings. According to the Diamond Source, wedding rings were adopted by Romans and incorporated into Western wedding ceremonies. Romans' rings were highly decorated, and some historians believe wedding rings were given to represent ownership over brides instead of symbolizing love. These rings were made of iron and called "Anulus Pronubus," or "betrothal ring."

Rings have been simplified since those days and ultimately made of many materials. Throughout history, wedding rings were worn on various fingers and even both hands, whereas many married people in Western cultures now wear their wedding rings on the left hand and on the fourth finger. Romans once believed that this finger contained a vein, called the "Vena Amoris," that ran directly to the heart. Though that is not true, the tradition has prevailed.

Other legends say that, when blessing a Christian marriage, priests would bind the marriage by saying, "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit," simultaneously touching the ring to the recipient's thumb, index finger and middle finger, before slipping it on the fourth finger while saying, "Amen." Another theory on ring placement is that wedding rings are worn on the ring finger because that finger isn't used as much as the rest of the hand, ensuring delicate ring materials won't be damaged.

Ross Simmons Jewelry states that gold is still the most popular metal choice for wedding rings, but couples are opting for some other metals that are more durable. Platinum is popular not only because it is long-wearing, but it also tends to be the most expensive. It's also a dense metal and can feel heavy in hand. Tungsten carbide is another durable metal that has grown in popularity in recent years. These rings cannot be cut and resoldered, which means it's important to size the rings correctly the first time. Titanium is both lightweight and durable, and it's popular because it is hypo-allergenic, making it practical for those with allergies to other metals.

Wedding rings continue to serve as symbols of a couple's vows and union. Much like the marriage itself, they are designed to last the test of time.

New- Did You Know?

Discolored water can result from routine operation, environmental factors, and household factors and is not unique to Mayerthorpe. The Town's water treatment facility operators, Alberta Environment and the Aspen Regional Health Authority each have responsibility to ensure safe drinking water in Mayerthorpe.

Climatic events, such as rain or drought have the largest impact on groundwater quality. Groundwater can contain a high amount of naturally occurring elements like manganese and iron. Most of these elements are removed during treatment processes; however, can build up in the water distributions mains over time.

It is recommended that you do not use discolored water for drinking, preparing food and beverages, or laundry. This is recommended because discolored water does not taste, smell or look pleasant and may stain clothes.

Although ingesting large quantities of iron and manganese can be harmful, the concentrations identified in Mayerthorpe's drinking water would not

The Town's water treatment operators regularly sample and test water, then analyze their data to know how effectively the treatment and distribution processes are working to provide safe drinking water. Physical parameters, such as turbidity, pH and color are monitored.

What is Mayerthorpe doing to improve the overall water quality?

• Mayerthorpe has secured funding to drill and put into production a new water well.

• Public works inspected the water reservoirs to remove any buildup or sediment in 2015.

• Cast iron water mains are expected to be replaced by 2017 which will allow for increased water pressure, reduction in iron deposits, and reduction in water main breaks.

#### Submitted by the Government of Alberta on behalf of the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team

On December 26, 2014, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed by the Director of Law Enforcement to investigate the circumstances surrounding an officer-involved shooting in Whitecourt, Alberta.

On the same date at approximately 10 p.m., an RCMP officer observed a white pickup truck containing two individuals, a male driver and a female passenger, eastbound on Hwy 43 approaching 51 Avenue. The officer initiated a traffic stop, requested backup and proceeded to park behind the pickup truck noting a 60-90 centimetre metal narrow steel bar extending out from the rear trailer hitch. Two additional officers arrived on scene, one of the officers parked his marked police vehicle in front of the truck. The driver displayed signs of impairment and failed to produce a drivers' licence, registration or insurance. The officer noted damage to the ignition with several wires exposed. While one of the officers spoke with the driver, the remaining two officers stood at the rear of the truck, in the small gap between the truck and one of the police vehicles, to examine the steel bar sticking out from the trailer hitch. As they did so, the driver shifted the truck into reverse. The officer dealing with the driver pulled out his police service weapon and warned the driver he would shoot. The driver proceeded quickly in reverse forcing the two officers who were still standing behind the pickup truck to scramble, one moving left and the other moving right, in order to avoid being crushed between the truck and the police vehicle.

While the truck was moving backward, the officer who had been in conversation with the driver fired his police service weapon. The officer from behind the vehicle who moved left also drew his police service weapon and fired. At that time, it was not clear whether the third officer had been struck as he was not visible. The truck had reversed hard into the marked police vehicle behind it, driving the steel bar into the engine compartment and then drove forward ramming the police vehicle in front of it. The truck swerved out onto the roadway, swung wildly out of control and stopped on the other side of the roadway facing the officers, causing

the officers to take cover. After a brief hesitation, the truck fled the scene. It was subsequently located in a residential area and the driver and passenger were apprehended without further incident. One of the shots fired struck the driver in the left forearm causing an open fracture that required surgery. A second round penetrated the driver's side rear door and struck the female passenger on the left side of her torso through her clothing but did not penetrate her body leaving a relatively minor contact/impact injury. Subsequent investigation confirmed that both the driver and passenger were under the influence of methamphetamine and that the truck was stolen. Additionally, drugs were recovered from inside the truck.

ASIRT Executive Director Susan D. Hughson, Q.C., received the completed investigation and after a careful review of the evidence has confirmed that there are no reasonable grounds to believe either of the officers committed any criminal offences. The driver's actions placed two police officers at immediate risk of death or grievous bodily harm and the subject officers were entitled to use reasonable, in this case potentially lethal, force to protect against death or grievous bodily harm. The officers ceased firing within seconds, once the third officer was determined to be safe and unharmed. Both officers' actions were reasonable and lawful in all the circumstances.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently, and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.


