TIPPLE PARK MUSEUM GRAND OPENING

The hard work put in by community members of the Evansburg area and Yellowhead County staff for the construction of the new Tipple Park Museum have paid off and the new facility is finished and open to the public. The Tipple Park Museum will be a central location where the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society can showcase their local history and welcome visitors and tourists to the area, as well as provide a spot for community group meetings and other community events.

- Budget and Cost:
- o Funding was provided by Yellowhead County in the

amount of \$2,370,253 for the planning, design, and construction of the new building and lot, as well as contributions made by the Provincial Government through a CFEP grant for interior furniture and window coverings and through fundraising done by the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society.

- Features:
- o Museum areas for artifact display, museum storage; and archival storage,
- o A workshop for museum staff to repair objects and to prepare exhibits for display,
- o A tourist information area,
- o A multi-purpose room, reception area, office, kitchen, washrooms, and meeting room.

Ltd. was retained by Yellowhead County to provide consulting services to prepare a building concept plan for a museum/park amenities building in Evansburg. These were then reviewed with Yellowhead County and the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society, with revisions being made to reflect that input.

- The building was designed by Barr Ryder Architects and Interior Designers, with construction of the building completed by Theirman Construction Ltd.; both of Edmonton, Alberta.
- The location and orientation of the new facility essentially mirrors that of the old Station House.

Thanks to public support of The War Amps Key Tag Service, I have attended regional CHAMP Seminars where Champs and their parents learn about the latest in artificial limbs, teasing and bullying and how to parent an amputee child. I have been a Junior Counsellor at the seminars, acting as a role model and giving advice to the younger Champs. The seminars let child amputees know they aren't alone and that the sky is the limit.

I am also a multisport athlete, and donations to the Key Tag Service have allowed me to be fitted with recreational limbs and devices to participate in sports and stay active. If it wasn't for The War Amps, I would not be able to do any of the things I do.

2016 marks the 70th anniversary of The War Amps Key Tag Service and to date, more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys have been returned to their owners.

Although it is a free service, donations made provide young amputees with financial assistance for artificial limbs and allow us to go to regional seminars.

Thank you to everyone who has supported The War Amps Key Tag Service, which has helped Canadian amputees like me for the past 70 years.

Dear Editor,

Recently our government announced Alberta's Climate Leadership Plan. Based on the advice of the energy industry, scientists and Albertans from every walk of life, the plan will strengthen our economy, protect our health and make Alberta a leader on responsible energy. The plan will move Alberta away from coal emissions and towards cleaner power, reduce pollution by pricing it, limit oil sands emissions, make Alberta a leader in energy efficiency, and cut high-polluting methane emissions.

As the Premier promised, the carbon price will be revenue neutral. Every single dollar collected will be invested right here in Alberta. We will invest to create jobs building new green infrastructure, build renewable energy projects, or to make homes and businesses more energy efficient to help Albertans cut their energy bills. We will also create an adjustment fund that will help families make ends meet, and support small businesses, indigenous communities, and people working in affected communities as we move away from coal.

We recognize families in our community make their living in coal mines

or coal-fired electricity plants. We also understand there has been increasing pressure on our livelihoods, as the health effects of coal emissions become more widely known and as coalfired operations close in Alberta and beyond our borders. The federal government has already set an end date for all coal plants in our province. In fact 12 of the 18 remaining Alberta coal plants are scheduled to close under the federal regulation prior to the 2030 target in the provincial government's plan. In our community, we have eight plants schedules for closure according to the federal government's rules:

Sundance 1 at the end of 2025; Sundance 2 at the end of 2019; Sundance 3 at the end of 2026; Sundance 4 at the end of 2027: Sundance 5 at the end of 2028 and Sundance 6 at the end of 2029; Keephills 1 and 2 at the end of

That means Alberta's Climate Leadership Plan will result in four units in our community—Genesee 1,2, and 3, and Keephills 3-having to either find a technological solution in the next 15 years to eliminate their emissions or face closure in 2030. It may be that some of the plan's elements will see some closures in advance of the existing federal end date.

FEBRUARY 16, 2016: WEEK IN PARLIAMENT UPDATE

This week's debate in Parliament largely centered on the Liberal Government's decision to recall our CF-18 fighter jets and refocus Canada's role in the fight against ISIS, as well as revisited the Bills on transparency of labour unions.

On Tuesday, Bill C-4 was debated at second reading. This Government Bill will repeal Bill C-377 and Bill C-525, which requires labour organizations to file a public information return with the Canada Revenue Agency on an annual basis. Should Bill C-4 pass, organizations such as labour unions will no longer be required to disclose their financial information to the public.

In the House on Wednesday and Friday, debate concentrated on Canada's contribution to the effort to combat ISIL. This week, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau officially grounded our CF-18 fighter jets, and decided to expand the 'advise and assist mission' of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) in Iraq and increase humanitarian aid in the region. This change of commitment was made before Parliament was able to vote on the matter.

Meetings for the Environment and Sustainable Development Committee, of which I am ViceChair, are held twice a week. During our meetings, we have discussed our respective interests ranging from clean water, climate change, biodiversity, pollution, and environment assessment/enforcement.

There are a number of issues that are facing our country today and I will continue to work hard to make sure that the government of Canada focuses on issues that matter.

UNITED STATES MOVING TO REPEAL COUNTRY OF ORIGIN LABELLING

EDSON: I am pleased to see that the United States appears ready to repeal the problematic provisions related to Country of Origin Labelling (COOL). These are protectionist provisions that have cost Canadian producers hundreds of millions

of dollars. I expect the government to retaliate if the legislation is delayed, does not pass a vote in Congress, or is vetoed by the President of the United States.

Recently, Congressional leaders in the United States have drafted legislation that responds to demands from Canada and Mexico that COOL be repealed in the United States. This leg-

islation is also in response to demands from the World Trade Organization (WTO) which has ruled against the U.S. four times stating that COOL discriminates against Canadian imports such as cattle and hogs. Repealing the COOL in the United States was very actively pursued by the Conservative Government.

December 18th was the earliest

date that the legislation may be voted on in the Senate and the House of Representatives. The legislation is part of a massive 2,000 page omnibus spending bill. Following votes in the Senate and in Congress the bill must then be signed by the President of the United States to become enacted

FIRST NATIONS STUDENTS TO BENEFIT FROM NEW EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP

Students from five First Nations in northern Alberta will benefit from an agreement between the Government of Alberta and the Kee Tas Kee Now Tribal Council.

This agreement is the first of its kind in Alberta.

The Kee Tas Kee Now agreement outlines the framework for establishing a First Nations education authority. It enhances supports and strengthens the capacity to provide education to these students in order to increase attendance and high school completion. Students will continue to receive education in a culturally-relevant environment in their community, while benefitting from improved educational supports similar to those of other students in Alberta such as curriculum development and technology.

This expands current programs that incorporate traditional skills such as hunting and fishing, by enhancing elements of literacy and numeracy, science and how to be stewards of the environment. The agreement was developed with input from Alberta Education, Indigenous Relations and Kee Tas Kee Now education partners.

"Our government is committed to working collaboratively with our First Nations, Métis and Inuit education partners and with the federal government to strengthen First Nations education in Alberta. We want to ensure First Nations students have the instructional supports they need, while receiving an education that reflects their rich culture and perspectives."

GRANDE YELLOWHEAD PUBLIC SCHOOL DIVISION BOARD NEWS

First Draft Reading LGBTO+ Policy

Grande Yellowhead's Board of Trustees discussed the first draft of a proposed new policy for the division, Policy 24 - Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Gender Expression. The draft was proposed by a committee consisting of staff and administration who collaboratively developed the draft that supported

the division's recognition and understanding of the additional resources that may be needed in respecting those with diverse sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions.

As per the divisional guidelines for the development of all new policies, the Board will be following a four step process which includes seeking feedback from various stakeholder groups before its implementation. A copy of the draft policy is available for

viewing on the division's website at www.gypsd.ca and feedback can be emailed to board@gypsd. ca. Feedback on the new policy will be collected until February 26th for discussion at the next Public Board Meeting on March 2nd on suggested amendments to the draft policy.

On January 13th, the Province released a set of guidelines respecting students and staff with diverse sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions, to assist school divisions in adopting some of the best practices noted in the guidelines. The Province has asked that school divisions adopt new policies and/or procedures that reflect the guidelines by March 31st, 2016.

OTHER News in Brief

- Administrative Procedure AP 180 - Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy, was updated to include new forms that will greatly assist in processing FOIPP requests in a consistent and expedient manner.
- · Budgeting principles for the upcoming 2016-17 school year were approved. Trustees emphasized the importance of achieving the balance between prioritizing education needs within available financial resources.
- · Gail Prokopchuk, Director of Transportation Services, provided a summary report to the Board on current transportation funding and rider statistics for the current school year. GYPSD transports students over 2,620 square miles in which the division operates 57 bus routes.

Capital Projects Update:

GCCHS Modernization Trustees were pleased to hear that the capital project is moving forward as expected. The first phase of the project has been completed with the addition of six modular classrooms, and the next phase has begun which includes work on the wood shop, home economics, beauty culture and science lab classrooms.

Edson Replacement School - The Project Design Planning Committee met on January 21st to complete the design of the new school that determined the layout of classrooms, administration areas, library and gymnasium. Over the next several weeks, the architect will be finalizing drawings and schematics for the facility before submitting them to the Province for approval. Upon approval by Alberta Infrastructure, the project will be ready for tender.

Continued The new facility is also orientated to provide access to the washrooms from Tipple Park. The design of the proposed new facility was developed in accordance with the Evansburg Streetscape that is part of Yellowhead County's Hamlet of Evansburg Area Structure Plan.

- The museum will be operated by the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society and will feature temporary displays, with both seasonal and travelling exhibits.
- The archive room will be available by appointment for members of the public to complete historical research with the society's help and resources.
- All rooms associated with the museum (e.g. archive, display room, storage room and work room) feature humidity controlled climates to assist in the proper storage of artifacts.
- The multi-purpose area, kitchen and meeting room will be available for event rentals and will be the future home of the Evansburg Farmers' Market.

BACKGROUND

- Pembina Lobstick Historical Society was registered as a society in 1970.
- In the mid 1990's a railway station and a caboose were added to the Historical Society's collection of heritage buildings at the present Evansburg location. The railway station was used as the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society's museum, main reception, administration and tourism center.
- Tipple Park Museum has provided hands-on field trips for students from Edson, Niton Junction, Wildwood, Evansburg, Entwistle, and Tomahawk over the years.
- The museum is historically open to the public four days a week during July and August. The Historical Society hires a student to operate the museum during this time.
- In 2009, the railway station was appraised by the County and had been found to be structurally unsound.
- Yellowhead County and the Historical Society looked at the cost to renovate the old railway station compared to the cost to construct a

new building.

- It was determined that renovations and upgrading would require a significant amount of money to bring the building up to code, while a new building would provide needed resources and amenities not available in the community at that time
- The old museum was demolished, allowing for the development of this project and construction began in the latter part of 2014.
- The Historical Society has seen an increase in interest in the last

several years, with a doubling of memberships since the group's active involvement with planning and operations in the 2010 Centennial Celebrations in Evansburg.

• The Historical Society became a recognized AMA (Alberta Museum Association) museum in 2012.

The new facility will serve to enhance the community and provide a space to be utilized by the many residents and community groups in the hamlet and surrounding areas for years to come.

Vary the time



RESPONSIBILITIES OF BRIDAL PARTY MEMBERS

Being asked to join a bridal party is both an honor and a responsibility. When asked to take on such significant and meaningful roles, men and women may recognize the honor but be unsure of what their responsibilities are as couples move forward with their wedding plans.

Bridal party roles can vary depending on certain circumstances, but many couples still want their bridesmaids and groomsmen to perform many of the more traditional tasks associated with their roles. The following are some of the tasks bridesmaids and groomsmen can expect to perform in the months leading up to the wedding and during the wedding itself.

· Maid of Honor: The maid of honor serves as the bride-to-be's right-hand woman as she plans her wedding and gets ready on her big day. Maids of honor typically go gown shopping with the bride and may even choose or offer suggestions about the color and style of the bridesmaids' dresses. Once a dress style and color has been chosen, the maid of honor will make sure everyone is fitted on time.

A maid of honor will also plan the bridal shower, sending invitations and arranging for lodging for out-of-town guests if necessary. Many brides want the details of their bridal showers to be a surprise, and maids of honor should honor those sentiments when possible. A maid of honor also plans the bachelorette party, though many brides do not mind being involved in the planning of such parties.

The maid of honor may be asked to help address save-the-date cards and envelopes as well.

Come the day of the wedding, the maid of honor will ensure the bride's day is as stress-free as possible, helping to address any last-minute issues that may arise. Maids of honor may be asked to serve as the legal witness to the wedding and sign the wedding license before the reception. At the reception, the maid of honor will toast the bride.

Best man: The best man is the maid of honor's counterpart, helping to plan the bachelor party and toasting the groom at the reception. The best man also tends to hold the rings during the wedding ceremony, and during the day of the wedding, he will coordinate the groomsmen to make sure everyone is ready to go on time. The best man may arrange transportation for the groom and groomsmen on the day of the wedding and may also return the groom and groomsmen's attire the following day if the newlyweds are departing on their honeymoons.

· Bridesmaids/Groomsmen: The bridesmaids and groomsmen serve similar functions, acting as sources of support as couples plan their weddings. Bridesmaids and groomsmen help to plan the bachelorette and bachelor parties and may also be asked their opinions as couples make decisions regarding their weddings. Bridesmaids and groomsmen must be prepared to take pictures once couples have officially tied the knot. They also must help the brides and grooms with any issues that may arise in the hours before couples become husband and wife.

· Flower girl/Ring bearer: Flower girls and ring bearers are often young relatives of the couple, whether they are a young brother or sister or a niece or nephew. The responsibilities of the flower girl and ring bearer are typically lim-

ited to the ceremony, during which they will walk down the aisle, either together or individually, before the father of the bride escorts his daughter to the altar or stage.

Father of the bride: The father of the bride walks his daughter down the aisle during the ceremony, and, along with his wife, may pay for the wedding, though many couples now finance their own nuptials. The father of the bride will dance with his daughter during the reception, and some fathers may even share a special toast for the newlyweds during the reception, though such a toast is not traditionally required.

Bridal parties play a big role on couples' wedding days, and those roles are both an honor and a responsibility.
