CANADIAN CITIZENSHIP ACT – BILL C-6

Liberal Minister of Immigration, Citizenship and Refugees, the Honourable John McCallum, tabled Bill C-6, an 'Act to Amend the Citizenship Act and make consequential amendments to another Act.' This Bill, introduced on February 25th, is extremely worrying. I am deeply concerned that the Liberals' first priority when it comes to immigration and public safety legislation is to give back the citizenship, and protect the rights of a committed member of the Toronto 18, Zakaria Amara. He, and future people convicted of terrorism, are clearly the biggest beneficiaries of this Liberal announcement.

Why is it that one's citizenship

can be revoked for fraud but not for committing a terrorist act? This, in my view, is an unacceptable double standard.

Internationally, France's political elite is currently involved in a heated debate over whether to revoke the French citizenship of convicted terrorists with dual nationality, while the U.K. has stripped almost 40 people of British citizenship in the last half-dozen years, including some born in the country.

I believe Canadians deserve to be protected from acts of terror, and dual citizens who commit these barbaric crimes — terrorism, espionage, treason and taking up arms against members of the Canadian Armed Forces —should not enjoy the many privileges and benefits that come with Canadian citizenship.

As I do with all legislation that passes through Parliament, I will examine the bill. However, like you, I am extremely concerned by these changes.



From our two stations in Onoway and Alberta Beach we service the communities of Alberta Beach, Castle Island, Nakamun Park, Onoway, Val Quentin, Silver Sands, South View, Sunset Point & Yellowstone.

We protect these communities with four front-line apparatus, nine back-up units, and a crew of dedicated professionals including eight full-time, twenty-two part-time, eight paid-on-call firefighter / medics, and mutual aid from Sturgeon and Parkland Counties.

We provide full medical co-response, interior and exterior structural firefighting, wildland / urban interface firefighting, initial Hazmat response, and highway rescue services including vehicle extrication. We are excited to announce that our second recruit class is already half-way to graduation and our Alberta Beach station now houses living quarters for our firefighters to reduce response times even further.









Onoway Regional Fire Services has been inundated by calls from concerned residents and insurers requesting information on our coverage areas. PULLING A TOOTH SHOULDN'T COST AN ARM AND A LEG: WILDROSE SUGGESTS DENTAL FEE REFORMS

Most people don't like going to the dentist.

It doesn't matter how kind the hygienist is, or how friendly the dentist. It's uncomfortable to sit there with your mouth wide open, having to grunt responses to polite – and horribly timed – questions.

Nevertheless, Albertans under-

stand how critical these services are to our communities – especially for young families.

However, there is more that can be done to increase competition, improve services and reduce costs throughout Alberta's dental system.

Here in Alberta, families pay more out-of-pocket on dentistry costs than anywhere else in the country, according to Statistics Canada's most recent National Household Survey. In fact, costs have risen dramatically since 1997, when the Alberta Dental Association (now the Alberta Dental Association and College) stopped publishing their fees. Even insurance plans are growing more costly more quickly in Alberta than in other provinces.

Especially in these difficult economic times, when thousands of Albertans are out of work and struggling to make ends meet, Wildrose believes that Albertans don't need more reasons to worry. That's why, in response to the government's review of dental fees, we have put forward a comprehensive strategy to address the strain on Albertans' pocketbooks caused by the most expensive dental care in the country.

Our plan would increase transparency in Alberta's dental system by allowing and encouraging dental offices to post pricing information online. It would also promote consumer choice and a competitive market by relaxing the strict limitations on advertising and promotional offers currently in place in the dental profession.

Now, we understand that the cost of doing business isn't cheap, and that dentists must cover their overheads and make a profit margin. However, unlike almost all business owners in Alberta, our dental professionals are not operating within a transparent and efficient free market.

A strong market economy relies on competition: it unleashes innovation and passes savings from business efficiencies on to consumers. Competition allows for fair prices and fair profits, and provides a natural means of balancing a market quickly and efficiently.

It also removes the need for price controls

The last thing Albertans want is a dental system burdened with more red tape and government regulation. Allowing and encouraging dental offices to make their prices publicly available and allowing dentists to advertise more freely would provide a more effective solution to record dental fees than imposing set fees.

There is a rare opportunity here to allow Albertans the ability to make informed decisions and exercise their purchasing power in choosing a dentist. We'd like to see a common-sense solution that brings best practices to the dentistry market – where consumers are empowered, and dentists are free to compete for your dollars.

SUMMER VILLAGE MANAGER

The Summer Village of Nakamun Park is a small, quiet Summer Village on the south side of Nakamun Lake, located approximately 60km northwest of Spruce Grove. The Summer Village has approximately 150 residences with an average full-time population of 65 people.

The Summer Village of Nakamun Park requires a self-directed and mechanically-inclined Summer Village Manager (SVM) for the period of May 1st, 2016 through September 30th, 2016, working Monday – Friday, 8 hour days (weather permitting). Wages will be between \$25.00 and \$35.00 per hour, with a mid-month advance and monthend cheques as preferred method of compensation. The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) is noting an increase in telephone scams where the caller claims to be from the CRA but is not, and is asking Canadians to beware—these calls are fraudulent and could result in identity and financial theft.

Some recent telephone scams involve threatening taxpayers or using aggressive and forceful language to scare them into paying fictitious debt to the CRA. Victims receive a phone call from a person claiming to work for the CRA and saying that taxes are owed. The caller requests immediate payment by credit card or convinces the victims to purchase a prepaid credit card and to call back immediately with the information. The taxpayer is often threatened with court charges, jail or depor-

If you get such a call, hang up and report it to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

These types of communication are not from the CRA. When the CRA calls you, it has established procedures in place to make sure your personal information is protected. If you want to confirm the authenticity of a CRA telephone number, call the CRA by using the numbers on its Telephone numbers page. The number for business-related calls is 1-800-959-5525. The

number for calls about individual concerns is 1-800-959-8281.

To help you identify possible scams, use the following guide-lines:

The CRA:

- never requests prepaid credit
- never asks for information about your passport, health card, or driver's licence;
- never shares your taxpayer information with another person, unless you have provided the appropriate authorization; and
- · never leaves personal infor-

mation on your answering machine or asks you to leave a message containing your personal information on an answering machine.

When in doubt, ask yourself the following:

- Is there a reason that the CRA may be calling? Do I have a tax balance outstanding?
- Is the requester asking for information I would not include with my tax return?
- Is the requester asking for information I know the CRA already has on file for me?
- How did the requester get

my email address or telephone number?

• Am I confident I know who is asking for the information?

ANIMAL RELATED INCIDENTS

A study reveals significant patterns in the types of animal-related incidents. For example, almost half (46.5 per cent) of horse-related injuries happen to women, age 16 to 59, and are caused primarily by falls when riding. Men, age 16 to 59, are most frequently (68 per cent) injured by cows during the calving season of February to June. Men aged 60 and older are most frequently (57 per cent) killed by bulls in the month of August as the breeding season starts.




Keep an eye for safety






Preventing Pinch Points

OThe instant pain followed by a few days of discomfort after catching your finger in a closing door doesn't compare to the destructive force of farm machinery. ITEMS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR AUTOMOTIVE EMERGENCY KIT

Road trips can make for great weekend getaways or even more lengthy vacations for those who can't get enough of the open road. But before embarking on any road trips, motorists should replenish their automotive emergency kits with the following items so they are fully prepared in the event of an accident or an injury.

• First-aid kit: A first-aid kit can treat cuts and abrasions suffered while you are out of the car and even some minor injuries that may result if you are in a car accident. Include essential items like adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, anti-

septic wipes, aspirin, bandages, a cold compress, gauze, and scissors. Visit www.redcross. org for a more extensive list of items to include in your first-aid kit, which should be kept in your car at all times.

• Tools: It's important to include tools in your automotive emergency kit. While a full toolbox might be unnecessary, bring along an adjustable wrench, a flat head and Phillips screwdriver, a pair of pliers, a tire jack and crow bar, an ice scraper, and a flashlight. Extra roadside flares and reflectors also should be packed should you need to pull over and address an automotive problem,

such as a flat tire. Keep a tire pressure gauge in your glove compartment or with your other tools so you can check tire pressure if you feel your car is not operating as smoothly as it normally does.

Fluids: While it's best to check all of your vehicle's fluids before beginning a road trip, it does not hurt to bring

along some extra fluids just in case you start to run low while out on the road. Fluids to pack include motor oil, antifreeze, brake fluid, and windshield washer fluid. Include a funnel with these items so you can

easily pour them in should you be running low. Pack an empty spray bottle as well so you have something to spray washer fluid from if a problem arises with your wiper blades.

Wiper blades: Include an extra set of wiper blades in your automotive emergency kit. Maintaining wiper blades is an oft-overlooked component of vehicle maintenance, so bring



along an extra set of blades should your existing blades succumb to wear and tear while you're on the road.

Miscellaneous items: Some items that may not seem synonymous with road trips can come in handy should you find yourself in an emergency. Pack a blanket so you and your passengers can stay warm should your car break down at night. In addition, pack some energy bars and bottled water so no one gets too hungry or thirsty while waiting for help to arrive. It's also good to keep a pair of work gloves in your car so you can still use your tools or change a tire when the temperatures dip or your hands get sweaty on hot days.

SIMPLE WAYS TO TRIM AUTO INSURANCE COSTS

The cost of owning an automobile extends beyond maintenance and fueling costs. One of the biggest expenses motorists must plan for is auto insurance, the cost of which can vary greatly depending on geography and driver history.

But no matter where drivers live or what their histories are, there are some simple ways for drivers to save money on their monthly insurance premiums.

· Reassess your driving habits. Auto insurance companies consider how many miles drivers drive per year when determining the cost of an insurance policy. Many drivers provide this information when opening a policy, but then never update it when renewing or extending their policies. If you drive less now than you did when you opened your policy, notify your insurance company and you might end up paying less each month, especially if your daily commute is considerably shorter than it used to be.

Check your credit rating. Another way to save money on your auto insurance is to check your credit rating and, if necessary, take steps to improve your credit score. Credit rating is another variable insurance companies use to determine drivers' premiums, and a good credit rat-

ing can save drivers a substantial amount of money on their policies. If your credit rating has improved since you opened your policy, contact your insurance company and you might see the cost of your insurance reduced dramatically. It's also good to periodically view your credit report to determine if there are any errors that are negatively affecting your rating. Such errors may be inflating your auto insurance premiums.

· Hit the books. No matter how many years you have behind the wheel, your auto insurance company may offer you discounts if you periodically take defensive driving courses. Such classes are inexpensive, but they may save you as much as 10 percent on the cost of your auto insurance policy. Young, inexperienced drivers and seniors tend to benefit from defensive driving courses more than other drivers.

· Change your policy. Drivers also can save money by making changes to their policies. Raising your deductible is perhaps the easiest way to save money without affecting your coverage, and such a decision can save you as much as 15 percent depending on how high a deductible you're

willing to pay. Drivers whose cars are older and completely paid off might want to drop their collision insurance, which pays you if your car is damaged or destroyed in an accident. 

NEXT MEETING FOR REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP

Refugee Sponsorship Update Next meeting: Monday, March 14th at the Anglican Church in Onoway at 7:30.

Four delegates were delighted to attend a large gathering put on by Catholic Social Services in Edmonton March 5th. The purpose of the meeting was to bring together many parishes and give them an opportunity to talk about their experiences sponsoring refugees. In roundtable discussions, we discussed what was the most rewarding and most challenging and how the sponsorship process could be improved. Some groups had sponsored as many as 14 families, just since November.

What an opportunity for us! As one of a handful of groups who has not yet received our family, it was an incredible learning opportunity. We connected with a number of other groups who have

offered their support in navigating the process and troubleshooting problems. We learned about lots of challenges we hadn't thought of yet, and got to hear some incredible stories of the suffering refugee families have lived through, and are continuing to deal with, while building new lives in Canada.

As well as the many Edmonton groups, we were delighted to find delegates from Hinton, Thorsby, Stoney Plain, Rocky Mountain House, Villeneuve and Spruce Grove. So inspiring to see the involvement of the rural communities, some even smaller than our own!

One of the most touching stories was of how a local school in one of the Edmonton Parishes took on the challenge of furnishing rooms in home being prepared for the new families. Each grade had a specific project. The students made charts and did the planning. Lots of learning took place, both

in terms of the organization and implementation of the donations and in thinking what it would be like to lose everything and be starting from nothing in a foreign land

The Thorsby representative told a wonderful story of how her local grocer took her aside and gave her the address of a store in Edmonton specializing in Middle Eastern food. He got his niece to accompany her to the shop where they chose foods that would make the family feel at home. So many inspiring stories of how we can make a family welcome.

The families that have been received so far came from widely ranging backgrounds. Some had two professional parents with children in private English schools, some had spent the last 15 years in a refugee camp in Lebanon and didn't know a word of English. All had lost everything they ever had. All are starting a

new life in Canada, with nothing.

For me, the most moving moment came after reflecting on the huge amount of suffering there is in the world. 60 000 000 refugees, terrorism and civil wars, how can we know where to start? Then the speaker spoke of Mother Teresa who said you start with the one right in front of you. It doesn't matter who we help. It matters that we help.

The next meeting will be Monday, March 14th at the Anglican Church in Onoway at 7:30. Everyone is welcome. We will share more about the meeting we attending and hope to hear from a nearby community that has sponsored a family before. The last hour will be a chance to meet with your committee group if you want to join one. Kathleen Arnold.

Dear Editor,

We live in one of the most beautiful landscapes in the world. We all want to keep it this way for our children and grandchildren, but we need to look outside our community to see what's happening in the world.

- China's population wear masks outside – due to smog not the avian flu
- China is steadily reducing imports of our coal
- A Canadian sold jars of fresh air to China
- Holes in the Ozone have been self-correcting because governments listened to experts and removed lead from fuel
- UV index now on global weather reports
- · California reports on smog daily
- Red Deer utility bills tell residents what to do when there is an air quality alert
- Extreme weather is increasing at an alarming rate globally
- The US declares a state of emergency regularly
- If temperatures change 4 degrees lower we are entering the next ice

age

• If temperatures change 2 degrees higher entire communities will be under water

Climate change isn't coming – it's here.

A household producing 1 pound of garbage per person per week means Alberta produces 3,645,257 pounds; Canada 47,388,341 pounds; and Globally 9,288,114,836 pounds. That's roughly how much garbage is generated – in ONE week.

Garbage leaches chemicals not found in nature into the ground that NEVER completely degrade.

Where does it all go?

We bury it in the ground - the same dirt that we plant our crops in, get our drinking water from and eventually build communities on top of.

We put it on barges and send it out into the oceans of the world. If it makes it to land, the Third World dig through it for salvage.

Insecticides and herbicides don't degrade so the air we breathe, food we eat and water we drink are full of it. When weeds and pests become resistant we make it stronger.

What is the result of these manmade chemicals? Multiple Sclerosis, cancer and Alzheimer's are more and more common. Whose family has not been touched by one or more of these?

China isn't buying our coal and the federal government has mandated closures. Retrofits of existing coal fire plants are possible, have been done successfully on a commercial scale, and plants continue to employ their workers. Coal mine closure plans are coupled with transitional job training plans.

At the Paris world conference on climate change, a global plan was put in place to make sure developing countries will be included and developed countries will ensure this happens. We import a wide range of products used in the production of goods. In this supply chain, we can choose to purchase sustainably and environmentally produced products. The Rainforest Alliance is a global non-profit organization that certifies Third World and developing countries products for export.

We import solar panels from China, a main component of solar panels is sand, and we have potential sand from oil sand extraction so we could manufacture our own solar panels. Our government subsidizes Oil and Gas production. Support their efforts to transition those funds toward alternative energy production. Germany leads solar generation on the planet, yet Alberta has more annual hours of sun than Germany. Edson has 2,067 annual hours of sun compared to Berlin's 1,625. In 1975 a 150 watt system cost \$20,000 and in 2015 a 250 watt system costs \$300. There are grants in Alberta for farmers to install solar. With severe weather phenomenon increasing, food production is increasingly important. Solar grants for micro-generation require connecting into the existing grid with unlimited potential for expansion with this initial infrastructure in place.

Where will those who lose jobs find new jobs? Federal money is being put into infrastructure (construction), health care and education with many supporting positions also created. Transitional job training being offered by the government, take advantage.

You don't know what you don't know. Trust the experts; the government that we have overwhelmingly voted into office with the capacity to do what is necessary to benefit us all.



Entanglements

The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

"Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

- -Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.
- -Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.
 - -Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.

Ensure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.

°Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.


