# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY SPRING ROAD BAN IN EFFECT FRIDAY MARCH 11

All Yellowhead County gravel roads shall be restricted to 75% legal axle loading starting at 8:00 AM on Friday, March 11, 2015, unless otherwise posted. Unseasonably warm weather has prompted Yellowhead County Infrastructure Services to begin road bans earlier than usual this spring.

All oiled local roads, hamlets and subdivisions will remain at

75% legal axle loading 24 hours per day.

Notice of the road ban will be posted on Yellowhead County's website.

The road bans implemented by Yellowhead County are due to seasonal conditions, specifically the spring thaw. Weight restrictions on all gravel/dirt and oiled roads will be 75 per cent unless specified otherwise. The road ban is aimed to reduce damage to County roads and decrease repairs and repaving to Yellowhead County's 2,227 kilometers of roads.

# TELEPHONE SCAMS

#### Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP – Yellowhead

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) is noting an increase in telephone scams where the caller claims to be from the CRA but is not, and is asking Canadians to beware—these calls are fraudulent and could result in identity and financial theft.

Some recent telephone scams involve threatening taxpayers or using aggressive and forceful language to scare them into paying fictitious debt to the CRA. Victims receive a phone call from a person claiming to work for the CRA and saying that taxes are owed. The caller requests immediate payment by credit card or convinces the victims to purchase a prepaid credit card and to call back immediately with the information. The taxpayer is often threatened with court charges, jail or deportation.

If you get such a call, hang up and report it to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

These types of communication are not from the CRA. When the CRA calls you, it has established procedures in place to make sure your personal information is protected. If you want to confirm the authenticity of a CRA telephone number, call the CRA by using the numbers on its Telephone numbers page. The number for business-related calls is 1-800-959-5525. The number for calls about individual concerns is 1-800-959-8281.

To help you identify possible

scams, use the following guide-lines:

The CRA:

• never requests prepaid credit cards;

• never asks for information about your passport, health card, or driver's licence;

• never shares your taxpayer information with another person, unless you have provided the appropriate authorization; and

• never leaves personal information on your answering machine or asks you to leave a message containing your personal information on an answering machine.

When in doubt, ask yourself the following:

# **ROBBERY SUSPECT ARRESTED**

Rocky Mountain House, Alberta - On March 2, 2016, at approximately 11:30 a.m., Rocky Mountain House RCMP arrested a robbery suspect responsible for a crime spree throughout Central Alberta over the last week.

On February 22nd, 2016, at approximately 10:30 p.m., a Pontiac Grand Am was stolen in Drayton Valley, Alberta. Shortly after the motor vehicle theft, the suspect driving the stolen car was chased out of a rural farm yard by a property owner who caught the thief attempting to steal items in his yard. RCMP immediately responded to the farm and extensively patrolled the area. Police later located the stolen Grand Am in the Buck Creek area; however, the culprit(s) had already fled. The RCMP Police Dog Section responded to the scene to assist in the search of the area but were unable to locate the culprit(s).

On February 23rd, 2016, at approximately 9:40 a.m., an oil lease operator in the Breton area

drove into a site to conduct his daily rounds. When the operator entered the site, he noticed someone had been in the shed on the property. When he exited his truck to check it out, he was attacked by a masked man who pepper sprayed him and stole his GMC pickup truck. The stranded victim, despite his injuries from the attack, was able to locate help who called 911 for assistance. Police immediately responded to the scene but were unable to locate the stolen truck.

mately 11:30 a.m., alert Mounties from Rocky Mountain House detachment located the stolen GMC truck involved in the oil lease site robbery parked in an alleyway with no occupants. Police found fresh footprints in the snow surrounding the stolen truck indicating it had only been recently abandoned. Hoping the thief would return to the truck, officers waited out of sight for the culprit(s) to return to the vehicle. Shortly after doing so, a man approached the stolen truck and tried to run away when he saw police. The culprit was quickly arrested. The subsequent investigation revealed the stolen truck contained weapons used in the robbery, including bear spray and other stolen property.

The accused, Joshua Aaron SCOTT, 32 years of age, a resident of the Drayton Valley and Rocky Mountain House area, has been formally charged with 17 criminal counts, including robbery, using a mask in the commission of an offence, flight from police, possession of stolen property and other serious charges. SCOTT was already out on bail conditions awaiting a future court date as a result of previous criminal charges relating to a search warrant at a residence in Rocky Mountain House. In that case, it is alleged that he was in possession of stolen property linked to recent break and enters in the Rocky Mountain House area.

Rocky Mountain House RCMP will continue to aggressively target individuals involved in illegal activities and will use every possible tool and agency available. The RCMP wishes to remind those that are involved in criminal activity that any assets used to commit crime will be seized as offence related property.

Edson, AB - On March 4th 2016 at approximately 10:20 am, members of the Edson RCMP Detachment were dispatched to an apartment in response to a report of a deceased teenaged youth having been located in a residence. Edmonton Major Crime Unit have been called to assist Edson Detachment. Edson GIS and Edson Forensic Identification Section are assisting.

Police have determined this to be a homicide. An autopsy is to be conducted by the Office of the Medical Examiner in Edmonton early next week. Twenty one year old Tyrell James PER-RON was arrested last night and was charged today with first degree murder. Additional charges include indignity to a human remain and possession of a prohibited firearm.

Tyrell is scheduled to appear

on March 15 2016, at 10:00 a.m. at Edson Provincial Court

Community Feedback on Draft LGBTQ+ Policy

Grande Yellowhead's Board of Trustees discussed the feedback received from school community members on the proposed new policy for the division, Policy 24 - Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Gender Expression. The draft was proposed by a committee consisting of staff and administration who collaboratively developed the draft that supported the division's recognition and understanding of the additional resources that may be needed in respecting those with diverse sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions.

As per the divisional guidelines for the development of all new policies, the Board requested feedback by February 26th on the draft for discussion at today's meeting. In response to some of the concerns noted, the division also released a Frequently Asked Questions document on the 26th. Community feedback included: why the need for a stand alone policy vs an amendment to existing documents; definitions in the Appendix A-Glossary of Terms; clarity on use of washrooms/changerooms at school facilities, and requests to use more inclusive language in the Policy. Approval of the Policy including any adopted changes to the draft is scheduled for the Public Board Meeting on March 16th, 2016 to meet the Province's deadline of March 31st.

## March 8, 2016 PULLING A TOOTH SHOULDN'T COST AN ARM AND A LEG: WILDROSE SUGGESTS DENTAL FEE REFORMS

Most people don't like going to the dentist. It doesn't matter how kind the hygienist is, or how friendly the dentist. It's uncomfortable to sit there with your mouth wide open, having to grunt responses to polite – and horribly timed – questions.

Nevertheless, Albertans understand how critical these services are to our communities – especially for young families.

However, there is more that can be done to increase competition, improve services and reduce costs throughout Alberta's dental system.

Here in Alberta, families pay more out-of-pocket on dentistry costs than anywhere else in the country, according to Statistics Canada's most recent National Household Survey. In fact, costs have risen dramatically since 1997, when the Alberta Dental Association (now the Alberta Dental Association and College) stopped publishing their fees. Even insurance plans are growing more costly more quickly in Alberta than in other provinces.

Especially in these difficult economic times, when thousands of Albertans are out of work and struggling to make ends meet, Wildrose believes that Albertans don't need more reasons to worry. That's why, in response to the government's review of dental fees, we have put forward a comprehensive strategy to address the strain on Albertans' pocketbooks caused by the most expensive dental care in the country.

Our plan would increase transparency in Alberta's dental system by allowing and encouraging dental offices to post pricing information online. It would also promote consumer choice and a competitive market by relaxing the strict limitations on advertising and promotional offers currently in place in the dental profession.

Now, we understand that the cost of doing business isn't cheap, and that dentists must cover their overheads and make a profit margin. However, unlike almost all business owners in Alberta, our dental professionals are not operating within a transparent and efficient free market.

A strong market economy relies on competition: it unleashes innovation and passes savings from business efficiencies on to consumers. Competition allows for fair prices and fair profits, and provides a natural means of balancing a market quickly and efficiently. It also removes the need for price controls.

The last thing Albertans want is a dental system burdened with more red tape and government regulation. Allowing and encouraging dental offices to make their prices publicly available and allowing dentists to advertise more freely would provide a more effective solution to record dental fees than imposing set fees.

There is a rare opportunity here to

allow Albertans the ability to make informed decisions and exercise their purchasing power in choosing a dentist. We'd like to see a common-sense solution that brings best practices to the dentistry market – where consumers are empowered, and dentists are free to compete for your dollars.

We are disappointed that to date, the NDP government has rejected many of these constructive recommendations that would improve the lives of and health care choices for Albertans. If

## Submitted by Parkland County

2015 was an eventful year for stewardship in Parkland County. With the inception of the Green Acreages program and the expansion of the Alternative Land Use Services program (ALUS), two forms of stewardship funding are now available for County residents.

The Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) program is an Environment Services & Community Sustainability-delivered initiative in its fourth year of existence. Through the program, money is available for local producers and agricultural landowners to implement projects on agricultural land that benefit their farm and the environment.

Since its initial pilot began in 2012, the program has expanded by accessing over \$1 million in external grant funding and by hiring an ALUS Coordinator to administer the program. In 2015, the ALUS program experienced a year of many developments including its first annual tour of local participating farms

and the tripling of program participation by local producers.

The number of projects implemented across the County is also on the rise, with numbers increasing three-fold over 2015. These upsurges mean a total of 284.7 acres of marginal agricultural land is now being managed to enhance the production of ecosystem services; a huge development from previous years.

The Green Acreages program was initiated to provide stewardship assistance to acreage ownerswho were ineligible for the agricultural ALUS program. Through this program, money and project planning support is available for acreage owners who want to better manage their property to boost environmental outcomes.

Since its launch at Acreage Days

last April, the Green Acreages program has been in high demand. New strategies in 2016 will help the program evolve into a more accessible and simple format including the removal of the Green Acreage Guide completion as a requirement for funding, and the development of an inclusive eligible project list to inspire new ideas from residents. These changes and detailed information on various project types will be presented at the Green Acreage Workshop Series scheduled to run in April 2016. Stay Tuned!

# HOW TO PROTECT YOUR CAR'S RESALE VALUE

Few drivers start thinking about resale value when driving a new car off of the dealership lot for the first time. Still enamored with that new car smell, drivers can be excused for not thinking of resale value as they put the pedal to the metal and speed off in their brand new ride.

But it's never too early to start protecting a vehicle's resale value, especially if you hope to recoup as much of your vehicle investment as possible when the time comes to sell your car or trade it in for a newer model. The following are some ways motorists can protect the resale value of their vehicles from the moment the dealer tosses them the keys.

• Keep all maintenance records. New cars typically do not require much maintenance. • Keep a clean interior. New car owners typically maintain some strict rules with regard to food and beverages in their vehicles. After all, no one wants their brand new car to succumb to stains or spills. But the longer drivers have a car the more lax they tend to become with regard to allowing food and drinks into their cars, and that can ultimately hurt the resale value of the vehicle. Maintain a clean interior whether you just bought the car or have driven it for a few years. Much like an impressive exterior leaves a lasting impression, a clean interior that has not succumb to coffee stains or muddy boots is more likely to impress buyers than a car with an interior that has seen better, cleaner days.

• Drive defensively. It's not just what you do to a car but how you drive the car that can affect its resale value. Driving defensively reduces your risk of accident, and an accident-free preowned vehicle is a top priority for potential buyers. But driving defensively also reduces wear and tear on your vehicle, as over time constant stop-and-go, aggressive driving takes its toll on vehicle engines and other components.

· Periodically examine the vehicle history report. Today's preowned car buyers know to ask for a vehicle history report before buying a car. If your vehicle history report contains any suspicious or inaccurate information, you may be forced to sell the car for less than it's worth or delay selling until you can have any issues corrected. That won't necessarily happen overnight, but you can avoid dealing with a host of issues all at once by periodically examining the vehicle history report. Any discrepancies on the report can be brought to the attention of your insurance company, who can then work with you to correct the issues and restore your vehicle's reputation.

Resale value may not be foremost on the minds of new car owners, but the earlier buyers begin to factor resale value into their car-care routines, the more they will benefit down the road.







# **ITEMS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR AUTOMOTIVE EMERGENCY KIT**

Road trips can make for great weekend getaways or even more lengthy vacations for those who can't get enough of the open road. But before embarking on any road trips, motorists should replenish their automotive emergency kits with the following items so they are fully prepared in the event of an accident or an injury.

First-aid kit: A first-aid . kit can treat cuts and abrasions suffered while you are out of the car and even some minor injuries that may result if you are in a car accident. Include essential items

like adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, antiseptic wipes, aspirin, bandages, a cold compress, gauze, and scissors. Visit www. redcross.org for a more extensive list of items to include in your first-aid kit, which should be kept in your car at all times.

Tools: It's important to include tools in your automotive emergency kit. While a full toolbox might be unnecessary, bring along an adjustable wrench, a flat head and Phillips screwdriver, a pair of pliers, a tire jack and crow bar, an ice scraper, and a flashlight. Extra roadside flares and reflectors also should be packed should you need to pull over and address an automotive problem, such as a flat tire. Keep a tire pressure gauge in your glove compartment or with your other tools so you can check tire pressure if you feel your car is not operating as smoothly as it normally does.

Fluids: While it's best to check all of your vehicle's fluids before beginning a road trip, it does not hurt to bring along some extra fluids just in case you



start to run low while out on the road. Fluids to pack include motor oil, antifreeze, brake fluid, and windshield washer fluid. Include a funnel with these items so you can easily pour them in should you be running low. Pack an empty spray bottle as well so you have something to spray washer fluid from if a problem arises with your wiper blades.

Wiper blades: Include an extra set of wiper blades in your automotive emergency kit. Maintaining wiper blades is an oft-overlooked component of vehicle maintenance, so bring along an extra set of blades should your existing blades succumb to wear and tear while you're on the road.

Miscellaneous items: Some items that may not seem synonymous with road trips can come in handy should you find yourself in an emergency. Pack a blanket so you and your passengers can stay warm should your car break down at night. In addition, pack some energy bars and bottled water so no one gets too hungry or thirsty while waiting for help to arrive. It's also good to keep a pair of work gloves in your car so you can still use your tools or change a tire when the temperatures dip or your hands get sweaty on hot days.

A household producing 1 pound of garbage per person per week means Alberta produces 3,645,257 pounds; Canada 47,388,341 pounds; and Globally 9,288,114,836 pounds. That's roughly how much garbage is generated – in ONE week.

Garbage leaches chemicals not found in nature into the ground that NEVER completely degrade.

Where does it all go?

We bury it in the ground - the same dirt that we plant our crops in, get our drinking water from and eventually build communities on top of.

We put it on barges and send it out into the oceans of the world. If it makes it to land, the Third World dig through it for salvage.

Insecticides and herbicides don't degrade so the air we breathe, food we eat and water we drink are full of it. When weeds and pests become resistant we make it stronger.

What is the result of these manmade chemicals? Multiple Sclerosis, cancer and Alzheimer's are more and more common. Whose family has not been touched by one or more of these?

China isn't buying our coal and the federal government has mandated closures. Retrofits of existing coal fire plants are possible, have been done successfully on a commercial scale, and plants continue to employ their workers. Coal mine closure plans are coupled with transitional job training plans.

At the Paris world conference on climate change, a global plan was put in place to make sure developing countries will be included and developed countries will ensure this happens. We import a wide range of products used in the production of goods. In this supply chain, we can choose to purchase sustainably and environmentally produced products. The Rainforest Alliance is a global non-profit organization that certifies Third World and developing countries products for export.

We import solar panels from China, a main component of solar panels is sand, and we have potential sand from oil sand extraction so we could manufacture our own solar panels. Our government subsidizes Oil and Gas production. Support their efforts to transition those funds toward alternative energy production. Germany leads solar generation on the planet, yet Alberta has more annual hours of sun than Germany. Edson has 2,067 annual hours of sun compared to Berlin's 1,625. In 1975 a 150 watt system cost \$20,000 and in 2015 a 250 watt system costs \$300. There are grants in Alberta for farmers to install solar. With severe weather phenomenon increasing, food production is increasingly important. Solar grants for micro-generation require connecting into the existing grid with unlimited potential for expansion with this initial infrastructure in place.

Where will those who lose jobs find new jobs? Federal money is being put into infrastructure (construction), health care and education with many supporting positions also created. Transitional job training being offered by the government, take advantage.

You don't know what you don't know. Trust the experts; the government that we have overwhelmingly voted into office with the capacity to do what is necessary to benefit us all.

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## My Equipment, My Life: Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Hand and Arm Protection:

Aside from the head, hands and arms are the most exposed part of the body and can fall victim to an endless list of injuries. There are three main categories of injuries:
