FACTS ON LAC STE. ANNE MEDIATION

For several years now the relationship between Lac Ste. Anne County and the urban municipalities within the County's boundaries has been deteriorating to the point where we believe there are detrimental and negative impacts, including but not limited to, safety and emergency response. This includes over two years of trying to negotiate on fire services itself, and over a year since mediation was first mentioned by Alberta Municipal Affairs.

Our relationship has deteriorated to the point where Alberta Municipal Affairs recognized these municipalities needed some intervention and assistance through mediation. The Minister of Alberta Municipal Affairs has provided \$50,000 in funding to cover the costs of two mediators to work with all 16 municipalities within Lac Ste. Anne County boundaries, including Lac Ste. Anne County.

These two mediators had phone discussions with these municipalities, and then had a meeting with each individual municipality's Council and Administration (the Summer Villages were a combined meeting as opposed to 12 individual meetings). From

these discussions, a meeting was scheduled for Monday, April 4th, 2016 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., whereby a quorum of Council from each municipality and each CAO would be participating to review key protocols and agree to the immediate and long term mediation process going forward.

On Wednesday, March 30th, 2016 our municipalities received an email from one of the mediators advising that they had received notice on Tuesday, March 29, 2016 that Lac Ste. Anne County had passed a motion to postpone their involvement in the mediation process. This postponement was to allow involved parties to sort out issues relating to fire services. As a result, this April 4th, 2016 mediation meeting was cancelled by the mediators. As a matter of process, the tentative meeting dates of April 19th and 20th were also cancelled.

As April 4th, 2016 was a date already in the calendars of elected officials from each municipality, the elected officials of the 15 urban municipalities decided to go forth with a meeting and assess this latest development and the mediation process itself.

At this April 4th, 2016 Special meeting, 11 of the urban municipality Mayors signed, on behalf of their respective municipalities, a letter to the Minister of

Alberta Municipal Affairs stating as follows: "Upon reflecting on discussions held during meetings with selected mediators, and now their March 30th, 2016 email cancelling upcoming meeting dates because of Lac Ste. Anne County's participation postponement, our communities respectfully request a full withdrawal from this mediation process. Our communities' further request that Alberta Municipal Affairs conduct a corporate and governance review of Lac Ste. Anne County, and we suggest the unspent funds from this mediation process could be redirected to this corporate and governance review".

It is important to note that it was in fact Lac Ste. Anne County who initially pulled out of mediation, and while their words were "postponed" this "postponement" resulted in the cancelling of 3 scheduled mediation meetings. Given Lac Ste. Anne County's reason for postponement, the reality is that their postponement was indefinite - if not a complete withdrawal – as one of the core issues for many municipalities is the topic of fire services.

Would Lac Ste. Anne County come back to the mediation table, perhaps, who is to know?

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WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Whitecourt Town Council approved the 2016 final budget at last night's Regular Meeting of Council. For details on the budget please refer to the press release dated April 11, 2016 that can be found on the Town's website www.whitecourt.ca.

Town Council received an overview of 2016 assessment figures last night by the municipal assessor.

- The valuation date to determine the assessment for a property is July 1, 2015.
- Assessment values for single family homes have decreased approximately 1.1%, and the aver-

age house value in Whitecourt is \$366,000.

• Assessment values for commercial properties have increased approximately 3.2%.

Property owners will receive a combined assessment and tax notice in mid-May.

Whitecourt is pleased to announce that it has been awarded two grants under the Alberta Community Partnership (ACP) Program. The Town will receive \$700,000 from the Province to fund the Athabasca Flats East Services Project, and the Water System Upgrading Project – Second River Crossing.

Council has awarded Community

Clean Up Program funds to nine local non-profit groups, sports and community organizations for cleaning up roadsides, playgrounds, and sports fields. The program provides each group with \$1,000 for 100 hours of clean up undertaken. The following groups have been approved for funding:

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

Would we as a group of 16 municipalities and 2 mediators book another round of 3 meetings, just to have Lac Ste. Anne County back out at the 11th hour again, perhaps? Would Lac Ste. Anne County have shown up at future mediation meetings, perhaps? Can we still have mediation meetings, perhaps? If all 16 municipalities are willing to participate.

Interesting thing about this mediation process: there is nothing binding motions or recorded minutes at any of these mediation meetings. The mediators do not take notes or minutes, there is no report that goes back to the Minister, and as a result there is no assurance for transparency or clear directives to emerge from this process.

The \$50,000 in funding is to cover the mediator's costs only. There is no coverage for hall rental or municipal representative expenses to participate, these costs are borne by each municipality. At the initial meetings it was noted by the mediators that this process could take several months, so obviously that would come with a fairly significant cost to each municipality to participate. While costs for all services must be a consideration of every municipality, we believe we all recognize the urgency and severity of our regional crisis. Unfortunately, the costs to participate in this mediation process when there is no guarantee that the Lac Ste. Anne County will even participate, or that a binding or measurable outcome will result, become inhibitive and are a factor we had to consider.

Also of note, the participating municipalities were advised by the mediators that key municipal representatives from Lac Ste. Anne County may not be participating in the process.

On April 12 the Mayors of the municipalities participated in a conference call with the Minis-

ter of Alberta Municipal Affairs whereby we heard that there is a public safety issue and a critical need for consensus on fire services for the region and that as municipalities we must reach an interim understanding of fire services. The Minister is appointing an Assistant Deputy Minister and the Fire Commissioner to work with us and participate in upcoming meetings which are anticipated to commence within the next 10 days.

While the fire situation is urgent, there are many more issues

between Lac Ste. Anne County and its urban neighbors that are detrimental to all our communities including but not limited to: policing, emergency management/disaster services, Family & Community Support Service, recreation, library, physician recruitment, economic development, and Inter Municipal Development Plan. Lac Ste. Anne County ratepayers themselves have concerns with their Council and Administration as they have collected and submitted several petitions in the past year

or so. It is all of these factors and considerations combined that lead the 11 Mayors to sign this letter requesting a corporate and governance review of Lac Ste. Anne County.





EXTERIOR PAINTING POINTERS

A fresh coat of paint on a home's exterior can give a property a vibrant new look. Whether you decide to go with a bold new color or repaint a house in an existing color, new paint can add some life to the exterior of your home.

Monitor weather reports. It's not just the temperature at night after you paint that should be monitored. Sherwin-Williams advises that the temperature should be in the suggested range and above the dew point for at

least 48 hours after application so the paint film can form properly. So applying a fresh coat of paint on a beautiful autumn Saturday is not ideal if Sunday figures to bring the first hints of winter.

Don't skimp on quality. Some paints are cost more than others, and homeowners working on a budget may be tempted to choose the least expensive option available. While price and quality are two different things, it's important that homeowners avoid choosing a paint solely because it is the least expensive option. Research paints before buying a particular one, emphasizing quality over cost. Today's paints last longer than the paints of yesteryear, so you likely won't need to paint your home's exterior again for a long time. A budget-friendly yet low-quality paint will not only make your home less appealing, but you will likely need to paint again sooner than you will if you go with a higher quality paint.

Don't paint to cover up a problem. Rotting wood or siding is unsightly, and some homeowners think paint can cover up such a problem. But paint will not stick to rotten wood and siding, and the problem will still be noticeable after you paint. A fresh coat of paint is not the solution to rotten wood or siding. Consult a professional contractor if your home is experiencing such a problem.

A fresh coat of paint on your home's exterior can be a great way to improve your home's curb appeal. But it's important homeowners follow some of the same rules the pros adhere to when painting the exteriors of their homes.

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TACKLE HOME MAINTENANCE PROJECTS TO SAVE MONEY

(MS) - Much like the upkeep on your car, tackling home maintenance on a regular basis will prevent problems from developing and save you from larger repair costs down the road. Some projects should be left to the professionals, but there are plenty of weekend jobs that any homeowner can easily handle, like these:

Inspect your roof and make minor repairs. Winter can be especially hard on a roof. Look for ice, hail or water damage. Replace any cracked or missing shingles and clear any debris.

properly to prevent overworking your furnace and air conditioner.



Select a durable material

Siding comes in all types of materials - from wood to plastic to fiber cement - but vinyl is among the most popular due to cost and availability. Research how well particular brands of siding stand up to conditions and which are the least likely to crack, warp or discolor. Find this information from online reviews or through consumer advocacy groups. Also remember, vinyl and other synthetic materials have improved and can now mimic the look of many other materials for a fraction of the

Calculate how much you need

with contractors, estimate how much you will need for your house. Consumer Reports suggests multiplying the height times the width of each rectangular section of your house in feet, going by what you can measure from the ground, to determine their areas. Multiply the approximate height and width of gables and other triangular surfaces and divide each total by two. Then add all the totals. To allow for waste, don't subtract for doors, windows or other areas that won't be covered. Finally, divide the total square footage by 100 to estimate how many squares of siding you will need. A square represents 100 square feet. Knowing how much

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GROUPS REQUEST PROVINCE OF ALBERTA TO CONDUCT CORPORATE AND GOVERNANCE REVIEW OF LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY

Long simmering resentments with the municipality of Lac Ste. Anne County came to a head on April 4 when an official request for the Province of Alberta to conduct Corporate and Governance Review.

This is not a step to be taken lightly and we have posted the statement requesting the review below.

"Mayor Kate Patrick, Mayor Jim Benedict, Mayor Dale Krasnow, and Mayor Bernie Poulin Alberta Beach, Town of Mayerthorpe, Town of Onoway, Summer Village of Castle Island, Summer Village of Nakamun Park, Summer Village of Silver Sands, Summer Village of South View, Summer Village of Sunset Point, Summer Village of Val Quentin, Summer Village of West Cove, and Summer Village of Yellowstone have requested an audience with Minister Larivee, Minister of Municipal Affairs to discuss matters of great importance and having detrimental impacts on these communities.

These communities have respectfully requested that Minister Larivee conduct a corporate and governance review of Lac Ste. Anne County.

Jim Benedict, Mayor Alberta Beach, Kate Patrick, Mayor Town of Mayerthorpe, Dale Krasnow, Town of Onoway and Bernie Poulin Mayor S.V. of Silver Sands (S.V.'s Representative)."

We have a further statement from the above named group:

"The municipalities have requested Minister Larivee, Alberta Municipal Affairs to conduct a corporate and governance review as a result of concerns with Lac Ste. Anne County having an impact within our communities. It is anticipated that the specific municipal concerns will be raised during the review process. Upon completion of a corporate and governance review a report is usually published. A report of this nature will generally provide a number of recommendations. At this point in time, the signatory

communities will not be addressing specific concerns in public; however, we will address these concerns during the review process."

Representing a citizens group we received the following statement too: Myself (Christine Yeoman), along with Alice Szybunka are officially titled representatives of the Petitioners in the County of Lac Ste. Anne. We have petitioned our council and administration three times in the past three years that I am aware of. Our council and the administration have lost the confidence of the ratepayers of the county. Quite simply stated, they don't listen to the electorate forcing us to go to extreme measures the likes of petitioning the Minister of Municipal Affairs under 254 of the Municipal Government Act. Our proposed budget for 2016 is comprised of allocations of loans and MSI (Municipal Sustainability Initiatives) non guaranteed funding. Our governing body is out of step with what the ratepayers want and need, which is primarily fiscal responsibility in these economic times. As a group, we have attempted to have discussions on behalf of the ratepayers of the county and it has all fallen on deaf ears. They are not interested in what we have

to say. In fact, the Reeve (Mayor as he refers to himself) stated in the Barrhead Leader that none of the council ran and were elected thinking they were going to run again. We are headed into some very real, very large deficits and we are not, "open for business" commercially as we have one of the highest mill rates in the province. Not very welcoming!"

We approached Lac Ste. Anne Count y and received the following statement from County Mayor Bill Hegy: "On Monday, April 4, 2016, representatives from 11 communities

within Lac Ste. Anne County submitted a letter to the Alberta's Minister of Municipal Affairs requesting a withdrawal of the mediation process between Lac Ste. Anne County and these communities. Additionally, this group has requested that a governance review of Lac Ste. Anne be initiated.

While disappointed in the inability of this group to work toward achieving measured, mediated consensus on a number of matters vital to ratepayers, the County has no concerns with the group's proposal that a governance review be performed. Further, the County would support the governance review of all sixteen municipalities within the region.

It is not realistic to expect the consistent alignment of goals between groups with different needs and priorities. However, Staff, Management and Council are responsible, first and foremost, for stewarding Lac Ste. Anne County in alignment with ratepayer endorsed objectives. We wish to continue to fulfill these responsibilities without undue pressure or interference from other municipalities.

Council is confident that the governance and administration of Lac Ste. Anne County is in line with the requirements of the Municipal Government Act. Should a government review be deemed appropriate by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, the County will cooperate fully throughout the process. Information will be shared on this matter via the County website Isac.ca, and via facebook.com/lac-steanne."

While it has not been mentioned specifically in any of the statement s it is highly likely that one but certainly not all of the major issues causing this dispute is the building of the new County administration building in Sangudo at a cost of around eight million dollars; a borrowing bylaw had to be passed to finance the project.



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
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
