On April 19, 2016, at approximately 1:30 PM Stony Plain/Spruce Grove/Enoch RCMP responded to a call from the Spruce Grove Walmart. An employee working in the store had received a call from and anonymous male claiming that he had left an explosive device in the store.

The store was evacuated and the area was searched by police. No such device was located. At approximately 3:15 PM the area was reopened to the public.

Police are currently investigat-

WESTJET EMPLOYEE CHARGED IN TRAVEL CREDITS FRAUD

Calgary... A joint investigation between ALERT and West-Jet's Corporate Security has resulted in fraud and theft charges against an airline employee.

ALERT Calgary's Financial

Crime team arrested and charged Terance Gough, 43, on April 19 with fraud and theft over \$5,000. ALERT is an integrated team consisting of Calgary Police Service and RCMP members.

Gough is alleged to have fraudulently issued over a quarter million dollars' worth of West-Jet travel credits between 2012 and 2015. ALERT alleges that

these travel credits were being bought and sold by a third-party, and no WestJet customers were defrauded.

The investigation was referred to ALERT in July 2015 after WestJet conducted an internal investigation on the matter.

Members of the public who suspect drug or gang activity in their community can call local police, or contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). Crime Stoppers is always anonymous.

ALERT was established and is funded by the Alberta Government and is a compilation of the province's most sophisticated law enforcement resources committed to tackling serious and organized crime. Members of Alberta Sheriffs, Calgary Police Service, Edmonton Police Service, Lethbridge Police Service, Medicine Hat Police Service, and RCMP work in ALERT.



SITUATION IN INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES -- EMERGENCY DEBATE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, participated in the emergency debate in the House of Commons the evening of April 12 on the suicide crisis playing out in Attawapiskat First Nation as well as in other communities. The emergency debate allowed parliamentarians to address this crisis and work together to solve

the problem.

During the debate, MP Eglinski stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the problem that we are talking about today has been here for a long time. I go back to my first week as a police officer in early 1968. I do not think I was on the job three days before I had my first suicide, and I have never seen them stop. They need to stop.

We need to work together with our aboriginal communities, and we need to do something now. There is a lot of discussion of what we are going to do with programs, but we need to do something now.

I ask my honourable friend here if he can tell us some of the things that we could do immediately to look at the problem and try to resolve the situation that we are faced with today?"

Attawapiskat's chief and eight councillors declared a state of emergency on Saturday, citing 11 suicide attempts so far in the month of April and 28 recorded attempts in March.

Aboriginal leaders are scheduled to address the Commons Indigenous Affairs Committee on April 14, after Northern Ontario First Nations communities declared a public health emergency earlier this year.

MLA ERIN BABCOCK'S MAIDEN SPEECH TO THE LEGISLATURE, APRIL 5, 2016

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm very proud to rise today and share my thoughts in response to the Speech from the Throne. I'd like to take this moment to acknowledge Alberta's Lieutenant Governor, the Hon. Lois Mitchell, who not only safeguards the constitutional traditions and principles of this House but also engages with Albertans on a continual basis. It is the examples set by strong women of our past and present that lay the groundwork for the change we expect to see in our future.

So let's look to the future, not today, not right now, to our children's and our grandchildren's future. We need an economy that is resilient to energy price swings, captures the full value of our resources, and offers a prosperous future for our children. We are working hard to improve public services, minimize the impact of the current recession on Alberta families, and mend the infrastructure deficit throughout Alberta. I'm very proud of the work that we as a government have accomplished by reinstating the STEP program as well.

I'm privileged to rise today to espouse my riding of Stony Plain, and I'm privileged and humbled to represent what is, I am sure, the most diverse, hard-working, and beautiful constituency in all of Alberta. We are farmers and ranchers, business leaders and entrepreneurs; we are coal miners and teachers. Our riding encompasses everything from Winterburn Road in Edmonton to the Pembina River, the North Saskatchewan in the south to the Yellowhead in the north, except that we scooch down around Spruce Grove.

Stony Plain is one of the very few original ridings with the original name, formed in 1905. The boundaries may have changed, but the location hasn't. The town of Stony Plain, historically known as Dog Rump Creek, is the town of the painted past due to our nearly 40 murals painted in various locations throughout the town.

Another one of the great attractions in the town of Stony Plain is the Multicultural Heritage Centre, which is housed in the town's first school. One of the biggest draws at the multicultural centre is Homesteader's Kitchen, where you can get artisan breads, homemade soups,

and an endless selection of homemade pie. As a new draw for the Stony Plain region Ryan Smyth, the former player for the Edmonton Oilers, is now playing for the Stony Plain Eagles triple-A senior men's team.

The Multicultural Heritage Centre is just off Main Street. On Main Street there are boutique shops of every description, from village fashions to Phina's, from Blue Diamond Jewellers to Bing's restaurant. Across from my constituency office is Pet Foods Etc., and I'm kitty-corner to the co-op.

Recent census data shows that the town of Stony Plain has 16,127 residents and Parkland county has 30,568 residents, a growing and vibrant community rich with culture and history. I'm advocating for infrastructure enhancements such as roads, vibrant businesses, local health resources, local agriculture, and our local schools.

Rural tourism is a strong industry west of Edmonton. In one day you can have a picnic at the Devonian gardens, run through the corn maze, catch a fish for dinner at Jackfish Lake, and sleep under the stars at Wabamun. It is a true destination located just around the corner.

The Stony Plain constituency is on the traditional territory of Treaty 6. There are two indigenous bands that also call Stony Plain home, the Enoch Cree First Nation and Paul First Nation, and I am proud of the ongoing work with these nations. As a result of what our government has heard from most of Alberta's indigenous governments, we will repeal Bill 22 and will engage indigenous communities on the consultation they as nations would like to see to support the capacity of First Nation and Métis peoples. This government will also consult indigenous people on a new indigenous people sacred ceremonial objects repatriation act that would facilitate the return of sacred objects to the nations to whom they belong.

These are tough economic times, especially for my constituency of Stony Plain. However, the residents in my constituency are resilient, innovative, and hard-working, and there is no doubt in my mind that we will get through this together. Taking care of the people around us

while encouraging industry to grow are goals we need to work towards as a community, a government, and a province. To move forward in a careful, considered way while encouraging growth in consultation with those affected is of the highest importance. There will be a measured approach for the spring session at the Legislature. We have laid the economic framework, and now it is time to tweak some of the smaller pieces so we can continue to play the role of a shock absorber for the economy and encourage diversification and job creation while in this downturn.

We're also investing \$34 billion in infrastructure to build the roads, schools, and other vital facilities that Albertans need, which will help keep our tradespeople and our professionals at work. Investing in infrastructure, public health, and education have been priorities during this downturn. We have one of the youngest, strongest workforces in Canada, and maintaining that workforce is part of what will help get us through these rough times. Our greatest resource is our people, the way we care about and care for one another. Our government will continue to act with focus and determination to engage the citizens of Alberta in skills training, retraining, and expanding access to the workforce for people facing unemployment. We will ensure access to venture capital. Updated credit union legislation and, of course, Bill 1, Promoting Job Creation and Diversification Act, will help entrepreneurs and businesses in my riding to create new jobs and growth.

The opposition members have obviously been listening to our economic development minister's speeches, and they were paying attention to our announcements in our throne speech, as proven by the approximately six points of their 12-point job action plan that our government has obviously already mentioned. I'm excited to be able to share and discuss with my constituents in Stony Plain details about our expansion of access to workforce and skills training and retraining for the unemployed. This is a commitment for the present and the future, the future of Albertans in our econ-

We are extremely proud in Stony

Plain to supply 40 per cent of the energy for all of Alberta. In the region there is Keephills, Sundance, and some work across the river at Genesee. Many more people support our energy by working at the Highvale mine in pits 03 through 09. The hard work of our men and women ensure that people's lights stay on across our province. Over 1,300 people in the riding of Stony Plain help produce that power and will continue to do so for the next 14 years. New legislation will give force and effect to key elements of Alberta's climate leadership plan such as phasing out harmful emissions from coal-powered generation by 2030 to protect our health and our environment.

A modern royalty system will promote innovation and efficiency and provide full transparency and public accountability on the calculation of our royalties. Alberta is an economic leader, buoyed by our energy sector, and we know that right now we need leadership to ensure that we get our product to tidewater. The continued engagement on pipelines is proof that our government is fighting hard for Alberta, its interests and its economy, and we will not back down.

A fair number of Stony Plain residents are employed in the oil and gas sector, the sector that has seen some of the most drastic fluctuations of all industries in this past year, and I understand the stress that puts on our communities. To that end, our government is vigorously urging the federal government to take account of the current economic shock affecting the resource industry and reconsider employment insurance rules that exclude too many Albertans from those much-needed benefits, those of us still around Edmonton.

The new child benefit plan will help 380,000 children living in low-income households. The plan to create new jobs and opportunities while building on traditional economic strengths is what our province needs right now. My constituents have told me that, as I'm sure others have around the province. There are too many low-income households in Alberta. Many of those households are single-parent families.

beautiful children spent much of their lives in one of those households. We have lived in government-funded housing and other low-income situations. When my children and I moved to the capital region, it was so I could pursue educational opportunities. As a single parent I returned to school, and one of my greatest accomplishments was earning my licensed practical nurse diploma. Though it was difficult, I taught my daughter that pursuing an education is always worth the hard work, and I taught my son what a strong woman looks like. Since my partner, Will, has come into our lives, he has continued to encourage me to always strive for my goals, and he has supported my work as a nurse and as a legislator.

As a nurse and a caregiver the most important part of my job was service and advocacy, to serve those who couldn't always perform the activities of daily life that healthy people take for granted and to advocate for those without a voice to those who needed to hear the message. I spent a number of years working diligently with vulnerable populations. My first role was working with individuals with developmental disabilities. It is where I found my passion for health care. There were many challenges for both my clients and myself, and one of the biggest challenges was the high staff turnover. It can take an individual who lives in care a minimum of six months to come to trust a new caregiver that comes into their lives due to the high turnover in that profession. When there is no trust between caregivers and clients, it makes many situations more dangerous and more difficult for both. Everything from personal care to outings is more stressful for the individuals and the caregivers. Unfortunately, if a client doesn't have capacity to emotionally handle stress, the person may, understandably, lash out at caregivers.

Sometimes due to these stresses an individual may lose their housing supports. If a person loses their housing, the chances of other supports falling to the wayside are very high. People in this situation often run out of money, which leads

to a person with no income on our streets. When the physical health of a person on the streets is compromised and, with luck, that person ends up in a hospital, the individual must stay in an acute-care bed until supports are found for that person. This leads to many people staying in acute-care beds for much longer than is needed, and as we all know, acute-care beds are not the appropriate place for long-term care. This is why we are investing in health and housing.

As an acute-care nurse I specialized in patients with acute stroke and acute geriatric patients. This involves many aspects of care, from total care to rehabilitation, from palliative care to dementia care. All care is essential, and every situation is unique. There's an old saying in nursing: they may not remember your name, but they'll always remember how you made them feel.

There are many parallels between nursing and serving as an elected representative. Both professions are about serving people and advocating for them. When a constituent contacts my office in Stony Plain, many times that person is at the end of their rope. Whether it's an agency they are having difficulty contacting or not knowing what resources are available in our community, it is my job and the job of my staff to advocate for each and every constituent who contacts us. We advocate in many ways, from directing a constit-

uent towards a resource to connecting the constituent to the services and supports in our community to bringing forth their concerns to the relevant ministries.


We also value the role that local government plays in supporting our interactions with local residents. I am heartened by the opportunity this government will provide by inviting the public and municipal governments to comment on a modern Municipal Government Act. The tri-municipal region, which encompasses the town of Stony Plain, the city of Spruce Grove, and Parkland County, is well known for their strong co-operative projects and initiatives. It should be a model for every municipality in Alberta. Having a strong region makes for resilient communities, which makes for sustainable living. There are many ventures in

our tri-municipal region such as the Tri-Municipal Leisure Centre, the Meridian Foundation, the heritage pavilion, the EMS facility, and the soon-to-be new RCMP detachment, to which two if not all three of these partners contributed. The tri-municipal region works because a small community can do something good, but a strong region pulling together can do many great things.

I'm proud to be a voice for Stony Plain and Parkland county residents and families in the Alberta Legislature, promoting solutions that will make Albertans' lives easier and more prosperous. This agenda is large and ambitious, but I support this initiative to create a better, more prosperous, more diversified, and more caring Alberta.



REGISTER TO BE AN ORGAN AND TISSUE DONOR

April 17 – 23 was National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week in Canada. With more than 600 Albertans waiting for an organ transplant, and many more waiting for tissues, increasing the number of Albertans registered as donors is an important part of improving health outcomes.

Individuals can register their consent to donate at ultimate-giftalberta.ca, and also have the opportunity to register when renewing or applying for a driver's licence or identification card. Since the registry launched in April 2014, more than 230,000 Albertans have registered their consent to donate.

Talking to your family and friends about your wish to do-

nate is also important, so they can support your choice when the time comes.

Facts About Organ and Tissue Donation

HOW TO TALK TO YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT DRUGS AND GAMBLING

Submitted by Alberta Health Services – Addiction and Mental Health

Children are smart and they are learning all the time. You are the best person to show them how to make good decisions. The thought of your children using drugs may scare you, but your children will hear you better if you talk calmly.

Take time to learn the facts about different drugs and gambling. Tell your children the facts without sounding scared and without scaring them. You can show your children that they can trust the information you give them.

Things to Remember

• You start teaching children about drugs sooner than you think.

You have been teaching your children from the time they were very small. You have done this by telling them not to touch anything in the medicine cabinet, not letting them have adult drinks like coffee and beer, and telling them to stay away from cigarettes. Start talks with your children by asking what they understand about drugs and alcohol, if they are concerned about anyone's use, or if they have been asked to use.

• A drug is a substance that's taken to change the way the body and mind work.

A drug can do a lot of good, or it can be harmful. If you take the right amount of medicine, you can get better. By taking too much, you can get very sick. Talk about this with your children. You can also talk about different kinds of drugs like medicine, legal drugs, and illegal drugs.



• Talk about gambling in a way that your children understand

It's good to use real-life examples. Ask your children if they've ever made a bet with anyone about doing something that is hard or unsafe. An example might be betting a chocolate bar that someone couldn't walk along the top of a fence. Explain that this is a type of gambling. In this example, if the person takes the bet and walks on the fence.

he or she is at risk of getting hurt. The person betting may lose the chocolate bar. Both people are risking something they value, whether they know it or not.

Children gamble for fun and don't usually think of it as gambling. They usually call it betting or daring. If you use these types of words, it will be easier for them to understand what gambling is.

• Try to think of good examples.

Have you seen a movie or read a book with someone in it who has a drug or gambling problem? Do your children have any examples to share? Talk about the people in the book or movie. Talk about their lives and the decisions they make. You can use this time to give your children good information. Keeping your children informed is the best way to help them make good decisions.



EXTERIOR PAINTING POINTERS

A fresh coat of paint on a home's exterior can give a property a vibrant new look. Whether you decide to go with a bold new color or repaint a house in an existing color, new paint can add some life to the exterior of

vour home.

Summer has long been considered the ideal season to paint home exteriors, but advancements in technology have made it easier to paint home exteriors later in the year. Ac-

So applying a fresh coat of paint on a beautiful autumn Saturday is not ideal if Sunday figures to bring the first hints of winter

· Don't skimp on quality. Some paints are cost more than others, and homeowners working on a budget may be tempted to choose the least expensive option available. Select a durable material

Siding comes in all types of materials - from wood to plastic to fiber cement - but vinyl is among the most popular due to cost and availability. Research how well particular brands of siding stand up to conditions and which are the least likely to crack, warp or discolor. Find this information from online reviews or through consumer advocacy groups. Also remember, vinyl and other synthetic materials have improved and can now mimic the look of many other materials for a fraction of the

Calculate how much you need Before you price out siding

with contractors, estimate how much you will need for your house. Consumer Reports suggests multiplying the height times the width of each rectangular section of your house in feet, going by what you can measure from the ground, to determine their areas. Multiply the approximate height and width of gables and other triangular surfaces and divide each total by two. Then add all the totals. To allow for waste, don't subtract for doors, windows or other areas that won't be covered. Finally, divide the total square footage by 100 to estimate how many squares of siding you will need. A square represents 100 square feet. Knowing how much you need can save you money.

Education Week "Learning Together" & Mental Health Awareness Week - May 2nd to 6th

The Board of Trustees approved the tender of \$237,435 from Cobra Corporate Management Inc., subject to Ministerial approval, for a renovation project planned for Grand Trunk High School in Evansburg. The interior renovation project will include a new library entrance and public washroom, new student gathering area, new staff washroom and lounge, new student washroom and associated mechanical and electrical work. The majority of work is scheduled to be completed during the summer of 2016.

Trustees also received updates on two major captial projects: the modernization of Grande Cache Community High School (GCCHS) and the new replacement elementary school in Edson. The modernization project is on target for completion for the start of the 2017-18 school year. The final drawings for the Edson Replacement School are expected to be completed by the end of the week and then will be forwarded to Alberta Infrastructure for final approval.

OTHER News in Brief

- Financial support in the amount of \$1,000 was approved after a request from the Skills Alberta Planning Committee for support of the 2016 North West Regional Skills Canada Competition to be held on April 21st & 22nd. Students from Grande Cache Community High School annually attend this competition.
- The Board offered their sincere appreciation to Western Financial Group's Edson Branch Manager Jean Sashuk who was on hand to present a cheque in the amount of \$5,000 to the division in support of new playground equipment for the

new elementary school in Edson. Monies were raised by local branch staff from their 2015 Support the Cause fundraising event held last May with additional funds from the Western Communities Foundation.

- Trustees approved the 2016-17 School Year Calendar as well as a tentative schedule for the 2018-19 year. The 2017-18 calendar was approved in principle in April of 2015.
- 77 staff will be recognized for their continuous long service from 5 to 40 years with Grande Yellowhead during the division's 2016 Welcome Back events scheduled for August 30th, 31st and September 1st.
- GYPSD has four high schools participating in the current High School Redesign Provincial project which has shown to significantly improve learning and teaching practices across the division as schools move forward with various Inspiring Education initiatives.
- Teachers from Edson, Hinton and Grande Cache schools have agreed to participate in Student

Learning Assessment, Achievement and Diploma Field tests that are scheduled for April 2016-June 2016. Field participation in these provincially administered assessments is highly valuable as it is vital to the development of fair, valid and reliable provincial examinations for the benefit of students.

- A schedule of events to celebrate Education Week was provided to trustees for each GYPSD school and will be posted on the division's site for future reference.
- On April 14th, the Province announced the provincial budget which noted that funding grants would remain unchanged for the upcoming school year although it is anticipated that Infrastructure and Maintenance Renewal funding may increase by up to 58%. The division is evaluating the impact on the cost of operations with the Carbon Levy. The Province's projected revenues to the division are also based on significantly higher than anticipated enrolment projections.
