Effective at 12 noon May 3rd 2016 Yellowhead County is enacting a Fire Ban for the Yellowhead County Wildfire Zone north of highway 16 and east of Highway 22. The Ban is being enacted due to extremely dry conditions and will remain in effect until there is a significant increase in precipitation.

- All fire permits are cancelled.
- No new permits will be issued
- No campfires are allowed.
- Use of burn barrels and incinerators must cease.

Propane and natural gas appliances and charcoal briquette cooking devices are permitted.

Residents are asked to use extreme caution when working or recreating. Fire hazard is Extreme.

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ALBERTA ANNOUNCES PROVINCEWIDE FIRE BAN AND ADDITIONAL MEASURES TO REDUCE FIRE RISK

Effective immediately, the province is applying a fire ban across Alberta.

All fire permits are suspended and no new fire permits will be issued. All open fires, including campfires and charcoal briquettes, are prohibited.

The use of incendiary targets is also banned. These targets explode when shot with a firearm and have been known to create fires.

In addition, the province is

urging the public to avoid Off Highway Vehicles (OHVs) use as much as possible. If they must be used, remove burnable debris from hot spots. All OHVs in Alberta are required to have a functional muffler and spark arresters.

"Albertans stand with the people of Fort McMurray who have been evacuated and our first responders as they work to protect Albertans and critical infrastructure. The single best thing we all can do to help protect Alberta from wildfires is to ensure we are not creating addi-

tional risk."

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Alberta Announces Provincewide Fire Ban And Additional Measures To Reduce Fire Risk

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Environment and Parks will be deploying additional Conservation Officers to enforce the fire ban in parks and protected areas. This will not affect resources that are being used to fight wildfires.

Portable propane fire pits and gas or propane stoves and barbecues designed for cooking or heating are allowed.

The fire ban applies to Alberta's Forest Protection Area and all counties, municipal districts

and special areas such as provincial parks and recreation areas. The fire ban does not apply to cities, towns, villages or summer villages or federal lands such as national parks.

The fire ban will remain in place until further notice.

When Albertans are out this weekend, they are urged to take additional steps to reduce their impact on potential wildfires on public land:

- Check Alberta Fire Bans before going out, and follow ALL instructions.
- If camping, do not leave cooking stoves or lanterns unattended.
- Avoid OHV use as much as possible.
- Do not throw out lit cigarettes.

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YELLOWHEAD COUNTY SENDS FIREFIGHTERS & SPECIALIZED FIREFIGHTING EQUIPMENT TO FORT MCMURRAY

Responding to the current state of emergency in Fort McMurray, the Office of the Fire Commissioner requested assistance from Alberta Fire Fighting agencies. Yellowhead County has sent a crew of 4 members in Engine 5, a crew of 2 members in an SSV with a fuel pod and the Incident Support Unit.

Crews will be tasked with doing front line structural fire suppression within the city and surrounding area. There may be more resources/personnel required as we look at cycling crews and supporting the operation without compromising coverage and response within our own service area. Yellowhead County has been in contact with neighbouring municipalities and Mutual aid partners to ensure we have adequate co-response if required to support each other at this time given the fire hazard.

(May 4, 2016:Release) – In response to the current state of local emergency in Fort McMurray and a request for assistance from the Office of the Fire Commissioner, Yellowhead County has sent two response vehicles, an Incident Support Unit, and two crews to assist firefighters in Fort McMurray.

"Our crews will be tasked with doing front line structural fire suppression within the city and surrounding area," says Yellowhead County Acting Fire Chief Nolan Jespersen.

There may be more resources and personnel required as we look at cycling crews and supporting the operation without compromising coverage and response within our own service area. Yellowhead County has been in contact with neighbouring municipalities and mutual-aid partners to ensure we have adequate co-response, if required, to support each other at this time given the local fire hazard potential.

The equipment being sent includes specialized equipment that can be used to assist emergency responders in helping to refill and refuel fire-fighting equipment and vehicles right on the front line.

"We have sent a crew of 4 in Engine 5, and a crew of 2 in an SSV with an ISU unit attached after the request from the Office of the Fire Commissioner was sent out for assistance," says Jespersen.

In addition to the Fire Engine sent to be used in structural fires, and most importantly structural fire prevention, the SSV (Support Services Vehicle) and ISU (Incident Support Unit) are also in Fort McMurray. The SSV unit is an emergency response unit that has a detachable fuel pod that can be dropped off in any location and can be used to refuel vehicles. The ISU mobile command centre is a multi-purpose unit that is specially designed to act as an on-location incident airrefilling station for firefighter's air tanks and a rest unit for emergency responders. This unit can be dropped off in more difficult to reach locations and can act as an on-incident command post.

"Now that the majority of the residents in Fort McMurray have been evacuated to safer locations, the priority will be the continued effort to put out the wildfires and help prevent structural fires that are these people's homes and assist the crews already battling the fire," says Yellowhead County Mayor Gerald Soroka. "These crews must be exhausted and we are there to support them as best we can."

Although Yellowhead County firefighters do cross-training with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry (AAF)'s wildfire crews from the Edson Forest Area and have to deal with several Wildland fire situations and grass fires, Yellowhead County's fire department area of expertise is structural fires

"I'm confident our firefighters can switch between different types of firefighting, and any other type of emergency assistance that is needed," ensures Jespersen. "And that they'll be able to help out wherever necessary."

Yellowhead County will now need to start looking at longer term planning for continued assistance in this situation as crews continue to fight the fires. This needs to be balanced with any home support that may be needed for any local incidents.

"There may be more resources and personnel required as we look at cycling our crews and supporting the operation without compromising coverage and response within our own service area," says Jespersen. "Given local conditions, we have been in contact with our neighbouring municipalities and mutual aid partners to ensure we have adequate co-response to support each other locally if required."

The Yellowhead County Fire Department will be ensuring that they have adequate staffing within their own response region and increase strategic staffing of stations based on fire risk each day to balance out any continued support for Fort McMurray as it is needed.



As Albertans and fortunate residents of the Yellowhead riding, I challenge each and every one of you to open your hearts and assist our northerly neighbours of the Fort McMurray region. WEED INSPECTIONS TO BEGIN IN COUNTY

Weed inspections will be taking place across Yellowhead County throughout the summer months of 2016 and County weed inspectors will be out in full force documenting various invasive plants on both county and private lands.

At any point during this summer you may see a white Yellowhead County vehicle near your property and an inspector wearing a high visibility vest performing weed inspections,

so please be considerate of their safety.

While the provincial Weed Control Act grants an inspector right of entry onto private land during reasonable hours (The Weed Control Act, Part 3, and Section 12), the Agricultural Services Department of Yellowhead County believes that a courtesy should be extended to land owners to inform them of what is taking place on their property. The County continues to promote its Door Knocking program to make contact with land owners before a weed in-

spection takes place. Property owners are give the approximate date and time of when an inspection will take place and the weed inspectors can address any questions or concerns the landowner may have at that time.

If land owners are not home during the time of the Door Knocking program they will find an informational placard on their door or gate letting them know that an inspector was there. After the initial inspection, the results of the inspection(s) and corresponding weed information sheets will then be mailed out to

the land owners within a couple weeks of the inspection(s) taking place.

PROVINCE RESTRICTS OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE RECREATIONAL USE

A temporary province wide restriction on off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreational use on public lands and provincial parks is another tool the province will use to help prevent the spread of wildfires.

This action comes in response to the request of the Alberta Off-Highway Vehicle Association and follows the government's province wide fire ban and ban on incendiary targets on all provincial Crown lands issued May 5.

"Our fire crews are working around the clock to battle wildfires in Fort McMurray and around the province. All Albertans can do their part to help ensure firefighters can focus their resources on the areas of greatest need."

"We do not take this step lightly; however, we must reduce the potential for more wildfires throughout the province. Quite simply, OHV recreational use under our current conditions has the very real potential to contribute to an already catastrophic wildfire season."

"We support the government's decision to temporarily restrict OHV recreational use. As responsible OHV users in this province we want to do our part to prevent wildfires and to reduce the burden on firefighters and emergency personnel."

Brent Hodgson, President Alberta Off-Highway Vehicle Association

The OHV restriction will be in place until further notice. It applies to recreational use on public lands, including designated OHV trails, only. It will not apply to agriculture, public safety or commercial/industrial users who operate OHVs for farming, enforcement or business purposes. The OHV restriction does not apply to the use of an OHV by Indigenous peoples when exercising a right recognized and affirmed under Part II of the Constitution Act, 1982 or a right under section 12 of the Natural Resources Transfer Agreement.

Wildfire management staff, along with enforcement personnel, including Conservation Officers and Fish and Wildlife Officers, will enforce the temporary OHV recreational restriction immediately. OHVs include all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), four-wheel vehicles, motorcycles and related two-wheel vehicles and amphibious machines.

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GASTROINTESTINAL ILLNESS AMONG FORT MCMURRAY EVACUEES

Alberta Health Services (AHS) is responding to an increase in patients who are experiencing symptoms consistent with viral gastroenteritis at the evacuation/reception centre at Northlands.

This is not unexpected, given the large numbers of people who are using and living at that site, after being displaced from their homes by the wildfire burning near Fort McMurray.

AHS, in partnership with the City of Edmonton, has enacted

a plan to manage the increased numbers of ill people, and to help prevent further spread of the illness.

Environmental Public Health staff, as well as Infection Prevention and Control staff, are onsite at Northlands. Medical staff, including EMS crews and Nurse Practitioners, are also at the centre to help care for those with gastrointestinal symptoms.

Symptomatic individuals are being offered housing in a separate area of Expo Hall, which will help limit spread to evacuees who are well. Washroom and shower facilities are being cleaned, and AHS has increased access to hand sanitizer at the site.

The evacuation/reception centre at Northlands remains safe for anyone still at the site, and for new arrivals to Edmonton.

To reduce the risk of spread, we urge people to:

o Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and warm water before and after using the washroom; before and after eating or preparing food; after changing diapers.

o If people are planning on visiting family or loved ones at the

Northlands site and are feeling ill, we ask them to please not visit until they are well.

Individuals experiencing symptoms can also call Health Link at 811 to speak to a registered nurse.

What's more, a miniature golf course is more than just golf, with creative courses and other fun activities, so kids won't feel overwhelmed with golf.

When kids move on from preschool to elementary school, some might want to tag along with Mom or Dad to the driving range. You should try to avoid overwhelming kids with too much instruction or information. Instead, keep things as simple as possible, teaching them the basic swing and encouraging them no matter how quickly they adapt.

As kids enter middle school and approach high school, those who are enjoying the game of golf can take advantage of the driving range if they haven't already begun to. A driving range typically has markers that indicate the distance of a regular hole, regardless of which tee you will play from on an actual golf course. Kids can aim for holes at shorter distances to learn how far their drives are going. You can then adjust the lessons you teach your children based on how far youngsters can drive the ball.

As a child gets closer to high school, you might want to buy the child his or her own set of clubs. Look for inexpensive clubs (oftentimes, thrift stores or other secondhand retailers have clubs for sale) because growing children will eventually grow out of their first set of clubs. When your child

finds a set of clubs that suits him or her, teach the proper way to swing and consider signing up your son or daughter for lessons. Those first few lessons can prove invaluable, turning a pastime into a passion kids will carry with them throughout their lives.

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

HOW TO SPOT AN UNHEALTHY TREE

Perhaps because they can live for so many years, trees have a way of falling down homeowners' landscaping priority lists. Trees also tend to be big and strong, so it's no surprise that they often are overlooked in favor or other areas of a lawn and garden that don't seem so strong in the face of Mother Nature.

But trees are susceptible to damage and disease, and homeowners who learn to recognize symptoms of such problems can prevent them from escalating and reduce the risk that the trees will cause damage to their properties. The following are just some of the ways homeowners can determine if their trees are unhealthy. Homeowners who suspect they have a tree that poses a safety risk should contact a professional tree service for an immediate inspection and

steer clear of the tree until an inspection has been performed.

- Check around the base of the tree. The base of a tree may offer some telltale signs that the tree is unhealthy. Soil that is cracked or raised at the base of the tree may be indicative of a tree that has started to uproot. If you recognize any cracking or if the soil is raised, look at the tree to see if it is leaning. If the soil is cracked or raised because it is uprooting, then the tree might have already started to lean in the opposite direction of the cracking or raised soil.
- Examine for fungus. The growth of fungus on the tree trunk or close to it may be a sign that the tree is rotting or decaying. Fungal growth, such as a sudden population of mushrooms, around the base of the tree is another sign

of decay. If the wood behind fungal growth crumbles easily, then homeowners should call a professional tree service, as the fungal problem on the tree has likely already been festering for quite some time.

- Look for cavities on the trunk. Cracks and cavities on a tree may not be an emergency, but especially deep cracks and cavities may be indicative of a structural problem. Multiple cracks and cavities also serve as red flags.
- Look for dead wood. It may sound simple, but dead wood poses a threat to the tree and anyone who happens to spend time in its vicinity. Dead wood snaps easily, and falling dead wood can harm anyone unlucky enough to be beneath the tree when the dead wood snaps. Dead wood branches won't bend in the wind, and such

branches frequently fall off of trees when strong gusts of wind come along. Dead branches either won't have leaves or the leaves will be brown (dead pine branches will have brown needles).

• Weak connections. Unhealthy trees often have weak connections between their branches and their trunks. If branches don't appear to be strongly connected to the tree bark, call a tree service to determine a solution. The tree might not be on its way out, but you may have to take steps to strengthen the connections so branches are not at risk of falling.

Unhealthy trees can pose a significant safety hazard on a property. Homeowners who learn to recognize the signs of unhealthy trees can do something to prevent dying trees from damaging their homes.

SMART WATERING CONSERVES WATER AND SAVES MONEY

Summer heat can be harmful in various ways. People and pets can quickly succumb to the summer sun, which can cause sunburn, heat exhaustion and heat stroke when people and their animals spend too much time outdoors without adequate protection.

Landscapes are also vulnerable to summer heat, which can quickly spoil the most lush lawns and robust gardens. Effective watering can help lawns and gardens withstand summer heat, but improper watering can deprive landscapes of the water they need to survive. Homeowners concerned about their lawns and gardens surviving the summer can take the following approach to conserve water, save money and maintain their landscapes.

Start early. Homeowners may

feel that the hottest times of the day are when lawns and gardens will be most in need of water, so that's the best time to set sprinklers or grab the hose and get to work. But in many areas, watering between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., when summer temperatures tend to peak, can be both wasteful and ineffective. That's because watering between those hours will cause much of the water to quickly evaporate, robbing lawns and gardens of the water they need to withstand the heat. Homeowners who water when water is most likely to evaporate may feel they need to water more, and that only wastes water.

It's best to consult a local landscaping professional in your area to determine the best time to water each day, but in many regions the best time to water is between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m., when temperatures are generally lower, the sun is not at its peak and winds are not as strong.

· Place sprinklers correctly. If you do not have an in-ground irrigation system and don't intend to install one, you will likely use lawn sprinklers to water the lawn. When placing these sprinklers, turn them on and then document their trajectory before moving on to the next area. You want to make sure the water from the sprinklers is not landing on sidewalks, patios or streets, especially if your community typically institutes drought restrictions that limit how much you can water. In such instances, you'll need to make the best use of the water you're allowed to use, so make sure none of it is watering the driveway.

· Let well-fed lawns go dormant during drought. Lengthy droughts tend to be accompanied by water restrictions, and such restrictions can frustrate homeowners who don't want to see all of the hard work they've put in to this point go to waste. But grass that has thus far been well cared for can withstand drought and still recover when rains once again fall and temperatures cool come autumn. If you plan to let the lawn go dormant, keep kids, pets and visitors off the grass, as dormant lawns are highly susceptible to damage.

Summer is an enjoyable time of year, but lawn and garden enthusiasts may be concerned for their properties when summer heat sets in. A few simple strategies can help lawns make it through the season unscathed.

WILDFIRES IN FORT MCMURRAY

OTTAWA: Wednesday evening, May 3, before speaking on Bill C-14, 'Medical Assistance in Dying,' Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead

stated the following in the House:

"Mr. Speaker, just before I begin my speech, I would like to say to the people of Fort McMurray tonight that my heart and thoughts go to them. They are fleeing their community tonight. Eighty thousand people have to evacuate. They

are fighting for their lives tonight. We are thinking of them."

Our office has heard that the fire has torn through a number of residential areas. Due to the location of the fire Highway 63 has been closed. Residents of Fort McMurray have been advised

to head north to take refuge at the work camps belonging to the various oil sands developers.

"I call on the Federal Government to provide any resources they can to help fight the fire and assist with relief efforts," concluded MP Eglinski.

Week of May 2, 2016 - This week in Parliament, we continued the debate on physician-assisted dying, amending the national anthem, and the implementation of the 2016-2017 Budget.

The following was debated:

- Conservative MP Cathay Wagantall 's PMB – Bill C-225(Cassie and Molly's Law)
- Bill C-14 An Act to amend the Criminal Code and to make related amendments to other Acts (medical assistance in dying). I took part in the debate on Tuesday evening. - Bill C-247 An Act to amend the Criminal Code (passive detection device)
- Bill C-233 National Strategy for Alzheimer's Disease and Other Dementias Act

- Bill C-15 Budget Implementation Act, 2016, No. 1.
- Bill C-210 An Act to amend the National Anthem Act (gender)

We also experienced a rare display of unity within the House of Commons as Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Opposition Leader Rona Ambrose offered support and prayers for the displaced residents of Fort McMurray. My thoughts are with all those affected by the wildfire.



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
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
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
