CO-OP MOVES ON \$100K FOR FORT MAC

Co-op is making an immediate \$100,000 donation to the Canadian Red Cross to support disaster assistance in Fort McMurray, Alta.

This donation is part of the \$1 million commitment by Federated Co-operatives Limited (FCL) and more than 200 independent retail Co-ops to support emergency relief efforts across Western Canada.

“Co-op made a long-term commitment to the Canadian Red Cross so that we could lend a hand to our neighbours when disaster struck,” said FCL CEO Scott Banda. “While this amount is normally used to match local Co-op donations, we are releasing the full amount now due to the urgent need in northern Alberta.”

The initial five-year commitment in 2013 included \$100,000 per year to pre-position goods across Western Canada to re-

spond quickly to local crises and another \$100,000 per year to match local retail Co-ops’ donations. This is in addition to the donations and collections from local Co-ops across Western Canada.

With the Red Cross scaling up operations, prepositioning amounts will be used in part to support registration, reunify families and provide accommodations, food, water and basic supplies.

The local co-operative effort Today’s donation does not include the efforts by FCL, retail Co-ops and their customers on the front line. FCL is working to deliver more products to serve evacuees while retailers are finding ways to support evacuees in the communities that need the most assistance.

Near Fort McMurray, the local Co-op in Plamondon, Alta., is now operating 24 hours to serve the rush of evacuees while employees and community volunteers are working to keep supplies on shelves. Meanwhile, St. Paul Co-

op has deployed its Co-op Community Connector – a trailer that can prepare food for large groups at public events – to Lac La Biche, Alta., to serve meals to evacuees. In British Columbia, Vanderhoof Co-op has provided fuel and supplies to volunteers who are driving to affected communities to deliver emergency supplies.

Co-op’s donation to the Red Cross was used to assist wildfire relief efforts in northern Saskatchewan last year, as well as flood relief efforts in southern Alberta, southeastern Saskatchewan and southwestern Manitoba in 2013 and 2014.

On Friday, April 22, I attended the Woodlands County Volunteer Appre-

ciation Dinner. I had the pleasure of speaking to two grade nine classes at Holy Redeemer High School on Monday. Following this, I met with members of the RCMP.

I stopped in to say hello to residents in Jasper on Tuesday, and met with two more classes in Grande Cache on Wednesday. Also in Grande Cache, I met with numerous local organizations and later attended the town

council meeting.

I spent Thursday in Rocky Mountain House for the grand opening of my new satellite office, as promised during the election campaign. PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF MAY 9, 2016

Last weekend, after attending an event in Wildwood, I had the pleasure of taking the Honourable Lois E. Mitchel, Lieutenant-Governor of Alberta, and Oneil Carlier, Alberta's Minister of Agriculture and Forestry, on a tour of the Coal Creek Forestry Fire Base. While there, we had the opportunity to meet and talk to fire attack crews.

On Sunday, I flew back to Ottawa. The following was debated this week:

• Bill C-7 – An Act to amend the Public Service Labour Relations Act,

- Bill C-15 – Budget Implementation Act, 2016, No. 1
- Bill C-237 – Candidate Gender Equity Act

- Bill C-231 – Fight Against Food Waste Act
 - Bill C-241 – An Act to amend the Excise Tax Act (school authorities)
 - Opposition Motion by the Conservative Party to support the Trans-Pacific Partnership
 - Opposition Motion by the Conservative Party to protect the freedom of conscience of medical and nurse practitioners in regards to physician-assisted dying
- I presented a petition calling on Parliament to pass legislation that would recognize preborn children as separate victims when they are

injured or killed during an offence against their mothers.

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WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Whitecourt will be issuing a request for proposals to recruit a prime consultant to develop concept plans for a new municipal centre. The consultant will be asked to provide concept plans for a building with a town office and library, as well as a facility with a town office, library and arts & culture centre. The need for a new town office has been under discussion for several years, and has been identified in the 20 year capital plan and

Whitecourt's Strategic Plan as a priority. The existing town office is reaching capacity, and as our community and service levels grow, there is an increasing need for a more sufficient space. The concept plans are for planning purposes, and will assist Council on making decisions in regards to budget, project timelines, and components. The concept plan will also assist with future grant applications to both the federal and provincial governments for when Council chooses to proceed with the construction of a

new building.

Whitecourt Town Council has awarded Terry's Classic Construction, a local construction company, the contract to design and construct a public transit shop. The shop, which will be an addition the existing public works shop, will house bus fleet for Whitecourt Transit and is funded in part by Alberta's GreenTRIP grant program. The project is scheduled for completion in October 2016.

Stantec Consulting Ltd. has been hired to complete the pre-

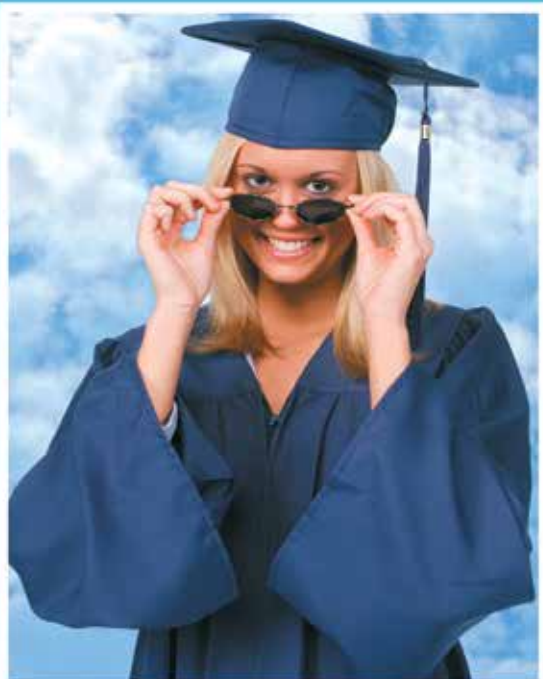
liminary/detailed engineering and provide construction/post construction services for the Water System Upgrade project. The project, funded in part by the Building Canada Small Communities Fund, includes upgrades to the local utility system (such as a second utility river crossing to service west Whitecourt, and a dedicated trunk main feed to the hilltop reservoir) to enhance service within the community.

Tickets are on sale now at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre for the Whitecourt Children's Festival. The festival, scheduled for May 26 and 27, is geared towards children 12 and under and will feature a number of performances, educational workshops, and other activities. Tickets are only \$12 and are valid for the entire festival. For more information visit www.whitecourt.ca.

We like to say thank you to everyone for your support. But due to the devastating fire in Fort McMurray and the ongoing fundraising efforts, we think it is best to put this fundraising evening for the Iraqi Christian family on hold for now. We still like to point out that the 'Lac Ste Anne Refugee Partners' are still in need of financial support. It is a very dedicated local

group that is in the process of helping a persecuted Iraqi Christian family, as they move here. Like other refugees they are displaced due to war and terrorism. But their lives continue to be in danger, even in refugee camps, including Europe. Returning to their home is not an option for these people, as they would be facing torture and death even once the war is over. So while we think it is very important not to forget about our own people in crisis, like homelessness and women fleeing domestic violence, Fort McMurray evacuees, it is clear to us that a lot of these people have no chance of survival. Unless a country, like Canada, gives them the opportunity to start

over and rebuild a peaceful future. All of us go back to ancestors that at some point had to leave their home country and started over as immigrants in Canada, it is part of our heritage. Giving a family with young children the opportunity to resettle here, may enrich our community once they learn the language, pay taxes here and volunteer as so many of us do today. And we like to add that with them coming in through private sponsorship, they have been screened by our government with fingerprints, iris checks, criminal record checks and are health screened to keep us safe. This is why we like to support this LSA refugee project and hope you will as well. You

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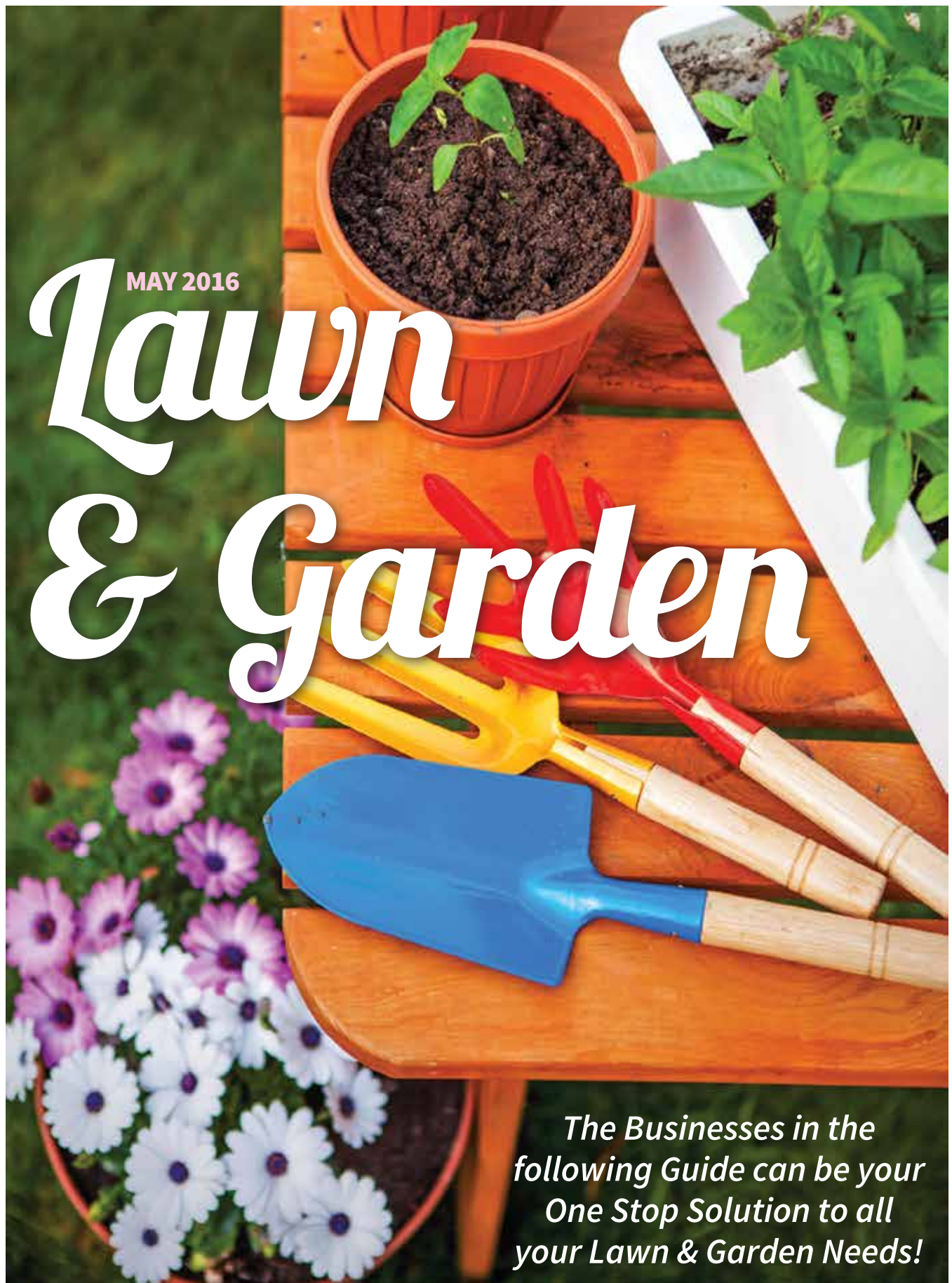

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WHY HONEYBEES NEED PROTECTION

Honeybees flitting from flower to flower is one of the first signs that warm weather has arrived. Honeybees are a welcome presence in the garden, pollinating plants and contributing to local honey supplies.

Despite their importance in the ecosystem, honeybees are in grave danger. In 2014, U.S. President Barack Obama created a task force comprised of various agencies to address the growing issue of rapidly diminishing honeybees and other pollinating insects. This initiative was a response to reports from American beekeepers indicating hive deaths have been on the rise, gravely affecting the honeybee population. Honeybees pollinate many fruit trees, nut plants and vegetables, playing a crucial role for many nations' food industries.

In addition to government involvement and honeybee conservation methods designed by environmental agencies, there are many things that regular citizens and homeowners can do to protect honeybees this summer. The Environmental Protection Agency and the Pesticide Action Network offer these tips.

- Use caution when applying any pesticides to home gardens. Be especially cautious when applying pesticides when bees are likely to be flying. If you must apply pesticides, do so only after dusk.

- Stagger your planting throughout the growing season. Rather than planting everything at once, stagger planting for flowers and other plants that have blooms. This gives bees plenty of pollen sources throughout early summer and into fall.

- Provide clean sources of water. A small garden feature or a rainwater collection is enough to provide bees with a drink when needed.

- Honeybees and other bees require some sort of shelter.

Dead trees and plants provide adequate shelter, so don't be so tempted to pull out all of the undergrowth in the name of aesthetics.

- Plant a garden that will attract bees. Resources for planting a bee-friendly garden can be found by visiting <http://www.panna.org/sites/default/files/>

- If you come across a hive, leave it alone. It's best not to disturb a hive and honeybee colony. If bees are located where they can become a nuisance, contact a local bee expert to see if the hive can be moved.

- Think about becoming a bee-

keeper yourself. There are many different resources available to help you get started.

Bees are being threatened at an alarming rate. Educating yourself about what to do to protect honeybees can help to restore the valuable honeybee population.

BREAK GROUND WITH THE RIGHT TOOLS

The right tools for the job can be the difference between an interminable landscaping project and one that goes smoothly and efficiently. Aspiring landscapers probably have a few shovels and rakes hanging in their garages and sheds for basic landscaping work. But while such tools are effective for certain projects, when it comes to churning soil for garden beds or digging holes for outdoor structures, additional tools come in handy. It may be well worth a trip to a nearby home center to purchase or rent one of these tools ideal for breaking ground.

Rototiller

A rototiller, sometimes called just a “tiller,” is a powered garden tool designed to loosen soil prior to planting. A rototiller also can help aerate soil during the growing season. Because they reduce the need for manual spade

digging or hoeing, tillers can be useful landscaping tools, particularly for homeowners who want to work efficiently.

Rototillers will break through tough soil and any plant roots. They come in a variety of sizes, and it’s best to match the tool to the size of the job. Many homeowners can get by with smaller, less powerful models, especially if the tiller is only necessary at the beginning of planting season. Professional landscapers or those with large swatches of property may benefit from larger models.

Auger

Augers, both mechanical and manual, are essentially large drill bits that help move materials from one location to another. Augers are typically used to cut holes in landscapes, and they are good for post-hole drilling, which is part of the process of installing

deck footings, fencing posts or other structures. Augers come in a variety of sizes, and homeowners can choose how much power they prefer. Augers can be heavy and cumbersome, and many do-it-yourselfers will find that one-person augers are more than adequate for their projects.

Augers dig deep holes, so it is always smart to have the property surveyed prior to use. This way pipes, gas lines, buried electrical lines, and any other obstructions are clearly identified prior to drilling.

Cultivator

Cultivators are similar to tillers in that they loosen soil. Cultivators are effective during the growth period of plants, when they can be used to aerate the soil and remove weeds. Cultivators come in hand-held versions and push models, and some are even

motorized. Cultivators get close to plants to remove weeds without disturbing the plant. They also are used to stir in compost or fertilizer.

While many people think cultivators and tillers are the same, that is not the case. The former is less powerful and will mix the soil or stir up the top layer, while the latter can break up moderately hard ground and loosen firm soil.

When using any tools around the garden, wear the proper protection. This includes devices to protect hearing when power tools are in use as well as gloves and safety goggles. Tillers, augers and cultivators have the potential to toss soil and rocks into the air, so make sure others keep their distance while work is in progress.

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MAINTAINING BIRD FEEDERS AND BIRD BATHS ESSENTIAL TO AVIAN HEALTH

Bird watching is a pastime enjoyed by people of all ages. While many people trek into the woods to see their favorite birds, homeowners can take steps to entice these fascinating and feathered friends right to their backyards.

Homeowners who want to attract birds to their properties can do so by providing the birds food, shelter and places to wash up or cool off. Installing a bird feeder and a bird bath in your yard is one way to attract a bevy of winged creatures that can provide hours of enjoyment.

Establishing a bird-friendly environment may seem as simple as hanging a feeder on a pole or tree and erecting a bird bath nearby. But a certain level of maintenance is needed to keep birds healthy and happy.

According to the experts at the Bird Watcher's Digest, recent research indicates feeders can sometimes be a source of disease for the birds visiting them. The Audubon Society echoes that warning, saying that bird feeders and baths can serve as transmission stations for diseases such as aspergillosis, avian pox and salmonellosis. Recently, scientists noted that the spread of trichomonad protozoan parasites is on the rise, especially among mourning dove and band-tailed pigeon populations.

Such warnings are not meant to

deter budding birding hobbyists. Organizations like the Audubon Society hope that such warnings send the message that disinfection and maintenance is necessary to maintain sanitary environments for birds. Doing so is relatively easy and well worth the time for birding enthusiasts.

• The Humane Society of the United States advises cleaning hanging feeders once every two weeks or more often if they're heavily used. Ground-feeding designs should be cleaned every two days. Feeders can be immersed in a very-diluted solution of bleach to water (nine parts water to one part bleach). Let soak for a few minutes, and then scrub the feeder with a stiff brush or scouring pad before rinsing. Allow the feeder to dry completely before refilling it with seed.

• Bird baths should be emptied of water each day. Brush or wipe the bath clean, then rinse and refill with fresh water. Do not leave standing water overnight; otherwise bird baths can easily become a breeding ground for mosquitoes and other parasites.

• Frequently collect discarded seed hulls and clean bird droppings from beneath feeders. If the area around the feeder has become especially soiled, relocate the feeder elsewhere and clean its initial location.

• Follow proper instructions

with regard to seed and other bird food. For example, reduce the amount of suet offered in hot weather. Heat can cause suet to spoil, and sticky suet can become stuck in birds' feathers and make it hard for them to keep clean.

• Try to provide more than one feeder and bird bath to prevent overcrowding. Crowding can contribute to the spread of disease.

• Do not situate feeders and bird baths under perches where they can be soiled by droppings.

• If you notice birds look sick or are not acting strangely, halt feeding and bathing to prevent healthy birds from becoming ill. Wait a week before resuming feeding and notify wildlife officials if you find dead or sick birds

around your property.

• Locate feeders and baths at least 30 feet away from windows so birds do not get confused by reflections and collide with the glass.

• Store seed in a dry container with a tight-fitting lid to prevent mold from forming and moisture from getting in.

Creating a thriving habitat for bird watching is easier than one might think. But once birds begin visiting a yard, homeowners must diligently maintain clean feeders and bird baths to ensure the birds stay as healthy as possible. 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ST. ALBERT MAN CHARGED WITH 83 COUNTS OF FRAUD OVER \$5,000

An investigation undertaken by the RCMP's Serious and Organized Crime Unit in Edmonton has culminated in 80 criminal charges of fraud over \$5,000 and 3 criminal

charges of theft over \$5,000 against a 45-year-old St. Albert man.

Wade Closson operated a company called Optam Holdings Inc. in the years between 2008 and 2013 in which the main concern was offering second mortgages to investors. Police began their investiga-

tion in 2013 after receiving reports from investors that there may be discrepancies in the past operation and eventual bankruptcy of Optam Holdings Inc.

Closson was charged on April 1, 2016 with 80 counts of Fraud over \$5,000 and 3 counts of Theft over

\$5,000 and is scheduled to appear in provincial court in Edmonton, Alberta on May 13, 2016.

The RCMP is not able to provide any additional details or comments given that this matter is now before the courts.

GASTROINTESTINAL ILLNESS AMONG FORT MCMURRAY EVACUEES

Alberta Health Services (AHS) is responding to an increase in patients who are experiencing symptoms consistent with viral gastroenteritis at the evacuation/reception centre at Northlands.

This is not unexpected, given the large numbers of people who are using and living at that site, after being displaced from their homes by the wildfire burning near Fort McMurray.

AHS, in partnership with the City

of Edmonton, has enacted a plan to manage the increased numbers of ill people, and to help prevent further spread of the illness.

Environmental Public Health staff, as well as Infection Prevention and Control staff, are onsite at Northlands. Medical staff, including EMS crews and Nurse Practitioners, are also at the centre to help care for those with gastrointestinal symptoms.

Symptomatic individuals are being offered housing in a separate area of Expo Hall, which will help limit spread to evacuees who are well.

Washroom and shower facilities are being cleaned, and AHS has increased access to hand sanitizer at the site.

The evacuation/reception centre at Northlands remains safe for anyone still at the site, and for new arrivals to Edmonton.

To reduce the risk of spread, we urge people to:

- o Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and warm water before and after using the washroom; before and after eating or preparing food; after changing diapers.
- o If people are planning on visiting

family or loved ones at the Northlands site and are feeling ill, we ask them to please not visit until they are well.

Individuals experiencing symptoms can also call Health Link at 811 to speak to a registered nurse.

SANGUDO HORTICULTURAL NEWS

Mike Desmarais put on a really good presentation for the club on turf grass. Here are a few tidbits that I learned. The best way to water grass is to soak it and let it dry out, before watering again, to promote a deep root system. Keeping your grass cut to one and a half inches regularly will cause you to have a lush lawn. In order to kill quack grass the grass must be cut shorter than

one inch, however you should never mow more than one third of the plant at a time. A lot of times problems with your grass may be caused by mowing with dull mower blades. The dull blade shreds the plant and this can stunt it, and create more edges through which diseases can enter. Mike also talked about liquid versus granular fertilizers, herbicides, and how to figure out the square footage of your lawn area. He told us about the benefits of aeration and how to fix

some lawn problems. We even got some information on making our own liquid fertilizer.

May 23 the horticultural club has the Sundial Park and Sangu-do spring clean-up. This is a way to spruce up Sangudo with the spirit of community connection.

May 28 the Club will be having its annual plant sale a little later this year and in a different location. The club will have a table at the Sangudo Community Garage Sale on May 28th at the Community Hall (4924-

50str) from 10am to 3pm. There will be a diverse selection of both perennials and annuals. It's that perfect chance to try a different type of tomato or a herb you may not have encountered before. Some of the flowers for sale will be blooming, so you'll be able to picture them in your own landscape.
