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PHASED RE-ENTRY INTO FORT MCMURRAY EXPECTED TO START JUNE 1

A voluntary, phased re-entry for the safe return of Fort McMurray residents will begin June 1 if future wildfire conditions do not delay restoration efforts.

Re-entry should be complete by June 15, to coincide with full restoration of Northern Lights Regional Health Centre.

We will be directing that schools in the area that were closed during the evacuation will not be conducting formal classes until September.

Residents of homes lost to the fire will have the opportunity to inspect their property and collect any surviving items before cleanup begins.

“Many hazards remain in Fort McMurray. We need to address them before it’s safe for residents to return home. We’ve developed a phased and voluntary re-entry plan with the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo that begins with the least damaged areas.”

“I want to thank both the Premier and the Minister for working and consulting with us on a timetable for re-entry. Safety remains paramount before we can return home, but today’s announcement will bring comfort to all evacuees looking to start rebuilding their lives.”

Residents can only return when five key conditions are met:

- Wildfire is no longer an imminent threat
- Critical infrastructure to support essential services is repaired and restored to provide a basic service level.
- Essential services are restored to basic level, including:
 - Emergency Services (Fire, EMS, Police, 911)
 - Open, safe transportation to, and within, the community (includes traffic controls)
 - Access to emergency medical care and patient transport
 - Access to potable water, electricity and gas
 - Access to food, pharmaceuti-

cals, banks and other essentials
- Access to mental health supports

- Hazardous areas are secure
- Local government is re-established

“Safe re-entry is essential to any timing and will not be compromised,” said Mayor Melissa Blake. “It is helpful to have a plan that covers both a high need to respect citizens’ wishes to return with only basic services, as well as an extended range that provides a more comfortable

re-entry timeline.”

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LARGE ITEM PICKUP SCHEDULED FOR WEEK OF MAY 23

Once again, the City of Leduc is helping residents effectively manage large items they want to dispose of by offering the large item pickup, scheduled for the week of May 23-27.

"Spring cleaning often involves disposing of items a family can no longer use," said

Kerra Chomlak, environmental sustainability co-ordinator with the City of Leduc. "This special pickup helps residents dispose of items that are otherwise difficult to transport."

Residents are invited to place a maximum of two large items at the curb with their regular carts on their scheduled collection day.

Items eligible for this special

service include appliances (other than fridges and freezers), water heaters, furniture, doors and lawn mowers. Lawn mowers must have oil and gas removed from them before pick up. Items must be a maximum of 60 inches wide (five feet) and 150 pounds (68 kilograms) to be eligible for pick up.

Fridges and freezers can be taken to the Leduc and District

Regional Waste Management Facility for proper disposal. A fee of \$25 applies. In 2015, Leduc residents disposed of 16 tonnes of material during the large item pickup.

Before returning to the community, residents are advised to:

- Check the status of your property with the Fire Assessment Tool. Updated maps are expected soon.
- Call your insurance company about what it requires from you regarding information about your property and any damage it may have sustained
- Speak with your mortgage holder/lender about mortgage/payment options

Residents with the following medical conditions or situations should not return to the community until the Northern Lights Regional Health Centre is fully operational:

- A chronic or acute medical condition, such as asthma
- Anyone requiring regular primary care, specialist care, laboratory or diagnostic services
- Anyone requiring counselling or mental-health services
- Anyone more than 36 weeks pregnant or with a high-risk pregnancy
- Anyone receiving cancer treatment, dialysis or other specialized medical services
- Anyone requiring home care, home oxygen or home health supports
- Anyone recently discharged from hospital or who has had a transplant

What to expect when you return to the community:

- Most critical infrastructure has been restored, but several services will not be fully restored immediately.
- A number of fires are still burning in the region. If weather conditions change, there is a possibility of smoke in the air. The smoke may not necessarily be cause for alarm.
- Essential contact information will be provided to assist with issues such as utility connections and protective services (i.e. gas, power, water, phone, police, fire, EMS).
- Community Information Centres will open in various locations to provide a variety of services and information, in-

cluding mental-health supports. Locations will be listed online before May 31.

What residents returning home should bring:

- If possible, bring a three- to seven-day supply of food for you and your pets – including drinking water – as a “boil-water” advisory will remain in place. Your fridge/freezer may not be usable so it is advisable to bring non-perishable goods. You may wish to bring a cooler for perishable items.

Some pharmacies and the hospital will be functional at basic levels; however, please fill prescriptions before returning to your community.

- Bring long-sleeved shirts, long pants and rubber boots
- Bring flashlights and batteries
- Bring a camera and/or video camera to document any damage to your property for insurance purposes
- Bring hand soap and/or hand sanitizer (at least 60 per cent alcohol)

Transitional Housing

If your home was destroyed or severely damaged, government is working on a plan to support your housing needs on an interim basis.

- 19,244 structures have been assessed
- 1,921 have been destroyed
- 17,156 are OK to occupy
- 121 are limited to restricted use
- 39 are unsafe to occupy/enter

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MP EGLINSKI ON MEDICAL ASSISTED DYING LEGISLATION

Bill C-14, Medical Assistance in Dying was introduced in Parliament on April 14th.

The legislation states that there should be a choice of medically-assisted death for adults who are suffering intolerably and

for whom death is reasonably foreseeable. Those eligible to seek that help must be mentally competent, 18 or older, have a serious and incurable disease, illness or disability and be in an advanced state of irreversible decline in capability.

The dissenting report by Members of Parliament from the Con-

servative party included recommendations to exclude minors, include stringent safeguards to protect those with underlying medical health challenges; and recognize the risks involved with advanced directives. All of these recommendations were included in Bill C-14.

I will be studying the complex-

ity of this legislation, particularly the protection of vulnerable populations bearing in mind the responses I have received from many of my constituents. I look forward to participating and listening to the debate at second reading.

HOW TO SPOT AN UNHEALTHY TREE

Perhaps because they can live for so many years, trees have a way of falling down homeowners' landscaping priority lists. Trees also tend to be big and strong, so it's no surprise that they often are overlooked in favor of other areas of a lawn and garden that don't seem so strong in the face of Mother Nature.

But trees are susceptible to damage and disease, and homeowners who learn to recognize symptoms of such problems can prevent them from escalating and reduce the risk that the trees will cause damage to their properties. The following are just some of the ways homeowners can determine if their trees are unhealthy. Homeowners who suspect they have a tree that poses a safety risk should contact a professional tree service for an immediate inspection and steer clear of the

tree until an inspection has been performed.

- Check around the base of the tree. The base of a tree may offer some telltale signs that the tree is unhealthy. Soil that is cracked or raised at the base of the tree may be indicative of a tree that has started to uproot. If you recognize any cracking or if the soil is raised, look at the tree to see if it is leaning. If the soil is cracked or raised because it is uprooting, then the tree might have already started to lean in the opposite direction of the cracking or raised soil.

- Examine for fungus. The growth of fungus on the tree trunk or close to it may be a sign that the tree is rotting or decaying. Fungal growth, such as a sudden population of mushrooms, around the base of the tree is another sign of decay. If

the wood behind fungal growth crumbles easily, then homeowners should call a professional tree service, as the fungal problem on the tree has likely already been festering for quite some time.

- Look for cavities on the trunk. Cracks and cavities on a tree may not be an emergency, but especially deep cracks and cavities may be indicative of a structural problem. Multiple cracks and cavities also serve as red flags.

- Look for dead wood. It may sound simple, but dead wood poses a threat to the tree and anyone who happens to spend time in its vicinity. Dead wood snaps easily, and falling dead wood can harm anyone unlucky enough to be beneath the tree when the dead wood snaps. Dead wood branches won't bend in the wind, and such branches

frequently fall off of trees when strong gusts of wind come along. Dead branches either won't have leaves or the leaves will be brown (dead pine branches will have brown needles).

- Weak connections. Unhealthy trees often have weak connections between their branches and their trunks. If branches don't appear to be strongly connected to the tree bark, call a tree service to determine a solution. The tree might not be on its way out, but you may have to take steps to strengthen the connections so branches are not at risk of falling.

Unhealthy trees can pose a significant safety hazard on a property. Homeowners who learn to recognize the signs of unhealthy trees can do something to prevent dying trees from damaging their homes.

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BREAK GROUND WITH THE RIGHT TOOLS

The right tools for the job can be the difference between an interminable landscaping project and one that goes smoothly and efficiently. Aspiring landscapers probably have a few shovels and rakes hanging in their garages and sheds for basic landscaping work. But while such tools are effective for certain projects, when it comes to churning soil for garden beds or digging holes for outdoor structures, additional tools come in handy. It may be well worth a trip to a nearby home center to purchase or rent one of these tools ideal for breaking ground.

A rototiller, sometimes called just a “tiller,” is a powered garden tool designed to loosen soil prior to planting. A rototiller also can help aerate soil during the growing season. Because they reduce the need for manual spade digging or hoeing, tillers can be useful landscaping tools, particularly for homeowners who want to work efficiently.

Rototillers will break through tough soil and any plant roots. They come in a variety of sizes, and it's best to match the tool to the size of the job. Many homeowners can get by with smaller, less powerful models, especially if the tiller is only necessary at the beginning of planting season. Professional landscapers or those with large swatches of property may benefit from larger models.

Auger

Augers, both mechanical and manual, are essentially large drill bits that help move materials from one location to another. Augers are typically used to cut holes in landscapes, and they are good for post-hole drilling, which is part of the process of installing deck footings, fencing posts or other structures. Augers come in a variety of sizes, and homeowners can choose how much power they prefer. Augers can be heavy and cumbersome, and many do-it-yourselfers will find that one-person augers are more than adequate for their projects.

Augers dig deep holes, so it is always smart to have the property surveyed prior to use. This way pipes, gas lines, buried electrical lines, and any other obstructions are clearly

identified prior to drilling.

Cultivator

Cultivators are similar to tillers in that they loosen soil. Cultivators are effective during the growth period of plants, when they can be used to aerate the soil and remove weeds. Cultivators come in hand-held versions and push models, and some are even motorized. Cultivators get close to

plants to remove weeds without disturbing the plant. They also are used to stir in compost or fertilizer.

While many people think cultivators and tillers are the same, that is not the case. The former is less powerful and will mix the soil or stir up the top layer, while the latter can break up moderately hard ground and loosen firm soil.

When using any tools around the garden, wear the proper protection.

This includes devices to protect hearing when power tools are in use as well as gloves and safety goggles. Tillers, augers and cultivators have the potential to toss soil and rocks into the air, so make sure others keep their distance while work is in progress.
