ASSIST POLICE TO IDENTIFY A SUSPECT IN SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY NEAR SPRUCE GROVE SCHOOL

2016-663869: On May 30, 2016 at 15:45 PM Stony Plain/Spruce Grove /Enoch RCMP were advised that a student was approached by a suspicious male, while walking home from school. At approximately 3:10 PM the 9 year old student was walking east on Brookwood drive from King Street when the suspect male walking west on Brookwood Drive in Spruce Grove, approached him.

The male asked the student "do you want to come with me"? The student did not recognize the man who did not make eye contact with him and wore a black and orange hoodie up covering his head/face.

- Caucasian
- · Black hair
- 4'8" 5'3" Tall
- Slim built

Although the male continued to try and engage the student in a conversation, the youth ignored the male and proceeded to walk home with out incident.



RCMP MEMBERS PULL MAN FROM HOUSE FIRE

Spruce Grove, Alberta - 40 year old Kenneth Craven has since been charged in relation to offences against an intimate adult partner, which include: two counts of aggravated assault, uttering threats, forcible confinement, assault and failing to comply with a probation

order. These offences occurred between June 10, 2016, and June 18, 2016, in Spruce Grove. Spruce Grove RCMP also executed 5 Warrants for Arrest, where Kenneth Craven was wanted on 3 counts of failing to comply with a probation order and 2 counts of failing to attend court, all out of Edmonton. Kenneth Craven has been remanded into custody with his next court appearance tomor-

Original Realease:

At approximately 1:00 a.m. this morning, Spruce Grove RCMP were dispatched to an assault complaint on Calahoo Road in Spruce Grove. Upon arrival, RCMP members observed smoke billowing from the residence. After countless and unrelenting efforts, two RCMP members gained entry to the trailer, which was at this time fully engulfed in flames. RCMP members located and pulled an adult male from the residence who was treated by awaiting paramedics. The same adult male was also arrested and taken into custody regarding the initial assault investigation. No injuries were sustained during this life saving effort, although four pets perished in the fire. The investigation into the cause of the fire is on-going with the assistance of a Fire Inspector. Charges are pending against the 40 year old Spruce Grove male.

KEY MESSAGES GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING - JUNE 1, 2016

• Deputy Superintendent Murray reported on current instructional times for schools in all zones, as per Board Policy 18 - School Calendar. As per provincial guidelines, grade 1-9 students are to have access to a minimum of 950 hours of instruction per year in each grade and grades 10-12 must have 1000. GYPSD requires schools to increase these hours by an extra 10 hours to assist in academic achievement.

• Trustees received a transportation update for the end of the school year in preparation for the 2016-17 school year route reviews. GYPSD currently transports 2,581 students on 57 bus routes travelling 8,502 kms each day. Registration for bus transportation can be done online as of July 4th for the 2016-17 school year.

• One of the division's main areas of focus continues to be leadership development and succession planning. The Board was pleased to learn about the highlights from this year's Leadership Academy and the nine current participants accepted into the two-year program. The Academy program was developed to increase knowledge in a number of different leadership areas such as personnel management and fiscal accountability for those staff members interested in future management positions with the division.

· Leslee Jodry, Assistant Superintendent-Learning Services, provided a brief overview of the 2016 Accountability Pillar Results for GYPSD which were released on Monday by the Province. A more in-depth analysis will be presented at a future meeting after identifying successes and areas of growth for Grande Yellowhead in each of the six areas surveyed: safe and caring schools; student learning opportunities; student learning achievement; preparation for lifelong learning, world of work, citizenship; parental involvement and continuous improvement. Supt. Gray thanked Asst. Supt. Jodry and the Learning Services team for their work over the last year when noting the significantly improved results for the division.

• Mrs. Jodry and Nancy Freedman, Supervisor- Learning Services, presented the five outcomes and strategies for the 2016-19 3 Year Education Plan for the division. Each year, GYPSD reviews information regarding the school division to determine the focus areas for the three year education plan. Data review includes provincial accountability results, provincial achievement test and diploma exam results, accountability surveys, division surveys, symposium and institute information, student voice including Tell Them From Me surveys and Youth Symposium conversations, Thoughtexchange information, and various assessments including Early Year Evaluations, Aimsweb and Testonline progress monitoring of student achievement. Strategies to support student learning are considered through discussion with various stakeholders (Board, students, teachers, administrators, parents).

• The 2016-17 Budget with a planned deficit of \$1.8 million was approved by the Board. The deficit budget will be covered through the Board's reinvestment of \$640,000 from undesignated reserves, and from school and department operating reserves.

• Sandy Axmann, Supervisor-Learning Services, presented information on the Truth and Reconciliation Report and the UN Declaration of Rights for Indigenous Peoples. Mrs. Axmann discussed on the specific calls to action that affect education strategies and programs put into place to improve the lives of Indigenous students.

· Grande Yellowhead was proud to co-host the fifth Annual FNMI Teacher Camp at the Palisades Education Stewardship Centre in Jasper from April 20-22, 2016. Partnering with the Palisades Centre and the Edmonton Regional Learning Consortium, 50 participants from ten school divisions and representatives from Alberta Education took part in the three day workshop/camp that focused on the Cree language and cultural protocols for smudging, songs and teachings. Participants thoroughly enjoyed the rich story-telling, teamwork, friendship dances and traditional walks led by two dynamic presenters from Maskwacis Cultural College, Elder Jerry Saddleback Sr. and his wife Jo-Ann. Both are also the Spiritual and Cultural Advisors to Dr. Willie Little Child who worked with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

• Amendments to Policy 5 - Role of Board Chair, Policy 8 - Committees of the Board and Policy 9 - Board Representatives, were approved.



DEADLINE EXTENDED ON CONSULTATION WITH CANADIANS ON TRANS-PACIFIC PARTNERSHIP (TPP)

The House of Commons Standing Committee on International Trade extended the deadline for Canadians to participate in a public consultation on the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) to June 30th, 2016.

The Committee will conduct a study of the TPP with the primary objective of assessing the extent to which the agreement, once implemented, would be in the best interest of Canadians. The Committee has invited individuals and organizations to provide written submissions that express their views. A final report from the study will be presented in the House of Commons.

The TPP is a significant and important free trade agreement that involves 12 countries and 800 million consumers for Canadian exporters. With one in every 5 Canadian jobs directly linked to trade, Canada stands to benefit from this agreement. Those wishing to provide a written submission must do so before 11:59pm, June 30th, 2016. PARLIAMENT UPDATE

Week of June 13, 2016

This week in Parliament, we covered topics including organ donation, marijuana, life sentences, and the constitutional right for Canadians to trade with Canadians (internal trade). The following was debated:

 Bill C-13 – An Act to amend the Food and Drugs Act, the Hazardous Products Act, the Radiation Emitting Devices Act, the Canadian Environmental Protection Act, 1999, the Pest Control Products Act and the Canada Consumer Product Safety Act and to make related amendments to another Act (Second Reading).

• Bill C-6 – An Act to amend the Citizenship Act and to make consequential amendments to another Act (Third Reading).

• Bill C-2 – An Act to amend the Income Tax Act (Third Reading).

• Opposition Motion (NDP) —Decriminalization of Marijuana Possession.

• Opposition Motion (CPC) —Internal Trade ("Free the Beer").

• Conservative MP Pat Kelly's Motion No. 43 — Taxpayer Bill of Rights.

• Bill C-223 – An Act to establish the Canadian Organ Donor Registry and to coordinate and promote organ donation throughout Canada (Second Reading).

• Bill C-221 – Safe and Regulated Sports Betting Act (Second Reading).

• Bill C-229 – Life Means Life Act (Second Reading). I had the opportunity to speak on this bill. You can find my comments at: www.parl.gc. ca (under "debates").

The House voted to pass Bill C-210, An Act to amend the National Anthem Act (gender). It has now been sent to the Senate where it will undergo further deliberation.

Bill C-14 (medical assistance in dying) was approved by the Senate and received Royal Assent on June 17, 2016.

Bill C-7, dealing with the RCMP and possible unionization, is still in the Senate, awaiting approval.

This week in the Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainable Development, we continued a review of The Canadian Environmental Protection Act, 1999, and studied the Federal Sustainable Development Act. For more information on committee meetings, visit: www.parl.gc. ca/Committees/en/ENVI

Throughout the week, I attended 13 meetings and three events. As the House has adjourned until the fall, my summer updates on my time in the riding will be sent on a monthly basis.

Week of June 6, 2016

This week in Parliament, we largely debated the budget. We also covered topics including charitable donations, impaired driving, ISIS, and the national anthem.

The following was debated:

• Bill C-15 – Budget Implementation Act, 2016, No. 1 (Report Stage and Third Reading).

• Motion No. 40 – Abandoned Vessels (First Debate).

• Bill C-239 –Fairness in Charitable Gifts Act (Second Reading).

• Bill C-233 – National Strategy for Alzheimer's disease and Other Dementias Act (Second Reading).

• Bill C-226 – Impaired Driving Act (Second Debate).

• Conservative Motion – calling on the House to strongly condemn atrocities committed by ISIS and declare that these crimes constitute genocide.

• Bill C-210 – An Act to amend the National Anthem Act (Third Read-

ing)

I had the opportunity to participate in the debate of MP Ted Falk's Private Member's Bill (C-239). This bill was a great initiative that would have allowed registered charities to provide donors with the same generous donation receipts that politicians can issue. However, I am extremely disappointed that the majority of Liberal and New Democrat Members voted to keep their preferential tax treatment of political donations. With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjust-

able driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different





HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR DAY ON THE COURSE

(NC) Most great golf games are filled with sun, competition and camaraderie, but you can enhance the experience with a few tips that have less to do with your swing, and a lot to do with your 18-hole enjoyment:

Dress for success: The right golf apparel can be as important as the clubs you carry. Check the weather in advance to make sure you'll be as comfortable as possible during play. Determine if you're dressing to impress or to elevate your game. Light, non-restrictive clothing will allow you to swing freely and keep you comfortable and cool in the heat, or warm if the temperature drops. If you're a guest, always check out the dress code at the club you'll be visiting to ensure you comply with the rules.

Choose your company carefully: Your playing partners can have a lot to do with how you play and how you socialize on the golf course. If you're out with friends, you can relax and enjoy the day knowing what to expect. But if it's a game with your boss or clients, always make sure to test the waters. Will they play by the rules or is it just a relaxed day? Are your clients there to play golf or do business? Understanding the landscape on the first tee will alleviate any awkward moments later on.

Create friendly competition: Sure, there's already a scorecard, but you can add more competitive fun to your game by creating a little friendly rivalry. For example, try a little Bingo Bango Bongo - a points based game that awards a total score based on three kinds of achievement: Bingo – first person on the green gets a point; Bango – the player whose ball is closest to the pin when all balls are on the green gets a point, Bongo –the player who is first to hole out gets a point. Add up the points and the person with the highest total for the round wins.

Walk it off : Make a small 'healthy' tweak to your game by walking vs. taking a cart. When you choose to walk rather than drive 18 holes, you'll cover approximately six kilometres and burn around 1,500 - 2,000 calories. Golfers that ride carts will burn only about 1,100 - 1,300 calories.

Say cheers and enjoy: The 19th hole remains one of the best holes on the course. Cap off a great day by enjoying a light meal or a light beer such as Molson Canadian 67, which is brewed to 67 calories per 341ml bottle and 3% ABV. This crisp, refreshing beer can be paired nicely with a protein boost of chicken or fish.

shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have an entirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. Engineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into the air. Adjustable drivers can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory.

According to data from golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put adjustments into their own hands, it is still adviseable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.






