Stony Plain, Alberta – On Tuesday July 12, 2016 at approximately 9:20 AM, Stony Plain RCMP were investigating a report of a stolen vehicle. When police located the vehicle, a white Ford F550 flat deck, the suspect vehicle attempted to strike the occupied marked police vehicle as it fled. The Stony Plain RCMP engaged in a pursuit with a Ford F550. A short time later the suspect vehicle was attempting to enter Hwy 16A eastbound at Boundary Road when it collided with a civilian vehicle. The occupants of the civilian vehicle were not injured but their vehicle sustained heavy damage.

The pursuit was terminated by RCMP as the suspect vehicle entered the city of Spruce Grove. The Ford F550 proceeded to drive thru the wooded path system near the Marlborough area, in Spruce Grove before it was located unoccupied by police.

Most of us know that diet and exercise play an important role in keeping us healthy. Did you know that a healthy mouth is also an important part of your overall health? It's a great time to think about the importance of keeping your teeth and gums healthy. Although the mouth is part of the

body, we often think of it as something separate. Mounting evidence tells us otherwise.

Poor oral health is not only associated with potentially significant and lifelong health problems such as diabetes, heart disease and respiratory illness, it has also been linked to pre-term and low-birth-weight babies.

Anyone who has experienced poor oral health can also attest to the negative impact it has on overall quality of life. Mouth pain, missing teeth or oral infections can influence the way a person speaks, eats and socializes, affecting their physical, mental and social well-being. Oral health problems can also be a sign of something more serious, including oral cancer.

The good news? Good oral health is something we can all maintain. Make it a habit to brush teeth at least twice a day (in the morning, and before bedtime), and be sure to visit an oral health professional regularly, for routine cleanings and check-ups.

If you are experiencing signs of oral health concerns, including bleeding gums or irritation or pain in the mouth, don't ignore it. Visit an oral health professional.

To help prevent tooth decay in children at higher risk and in financial need, AHS delivers a preschool fluoride varnish program for eligible children aged 12 to 35 months, and a school-based fluoride varnish and dental sealant program for children in Kindergarten to Grade 2 and Grades 1 and 2, respectively.

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

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ALBERTA SECURITIES COMMISSION EMPOWERS SENIORS TO IDENTIFY AND AVOID INVESTMENT FRAUD

Financial abuse is one of the most frequently reported forms of elder abuse in the province according to the Government of Alberta. With World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (June 15) approaching, the Alberta Securities Commission (ASC) is empowering Alberta's seniors to self-protect against investment fraud by providing straightforward tips. These 10 simple tips will assist seniors to combat investment fraud and help to safeguard their hard-earned money.

Financial fraudsters often target seniors in Alberta for various reasons. Many seniors are trusting individuals and, by virtue of their age, have typically amassed more wealth than other segments of the population, in the form of retirement savings, residential and vacation properties and other assets. In addition, new online technologies are sometimes difficult for seniors to navigate, making them a vulnerable target. Further, because of shame or embarrassment, seniors are not likely to speak up when fraud happens to them.

"Investment fraud costs Albertans millions of dollars annually, and many victims are elderly,"

"We encourage seniors to have open lines of communication with their advisors or the person managing their finances to diminish the chances of investment fraud and help protect their retirement savings and assets. The most important thing to remember is your money belongs to you, and you alone."

In conjunction with the North American Securities Administrators Association (NASAA), the ASC has outlined 10 tips to protect seniors' retirement savings and assets. They include:

1. Don't be a victim of your manners – Con artists will exploit your good manners. It's OK to say "no" to an investment opportunity.

2. Check out strangers touting "strange" deals – Trusting strangers is a mistake anyone can make in their personal finances. Say "no" to any investment professional who presses you to make an immediate decision, giving you no opportunity to check out the salesperson, firm and the investment opportunity itself. Visit Checkfirst. ca to check the registration of the person and organization offering the investment.

3. Always stay in charge of your money – Beware of someone asking to manage or invest your money into something you don't understand or who urges you to leave everything in his or her hands, including power of attorney.

4. Don't judge a book by its cover – Successful con artists can sound and look professional.

5. Watch out for salespeople who prey on your fears – Con artists know that you worry about your future, including having enough money to live the retirement of your dreams, being able to leave a legacy for your family and the possibility of outliving your savings. Scammers will use those fears to convince you to hand over your money.

6. Don't make a tragedy worse with rash financial decisions – The death or hospitalization of a spouse has many sad consequences – financial fraud shouldn't be one of them.

7. Monitor your investments and ask tough questions – Keep an eye on the progress of your investments. This is prudent even if you're not concerned about fraud.

8. Look out for difficulties retrieving your principal or cashing out profits – If the individual has assured you that you can withdraw your money at any time, but stalls when you want to pull out your principal or profits, you may have uncovered someone who has cheated you.

9. Don't let embarrassment or fear keep you from reporting investment fraud or abuse – Scam artists know that you might be hesitant to report you have been victimized by fraud.

10. Beware of "recovery room" scams – Faced with a loss of funds, some seniors who have been victimized once will go along with another scheme in which the scam artists promise to make good on the original funds lost, and possibly even generate new returns beyond those originally promised.

In addition to being aware of the tips on how seniors can protect themselves against investment fraud, Albertans are also encouraged to educate themselves on the ways that seniors are often approached:

• Affinity fraud: A fraudulent opportunity is introduced by a family member, friend or a member of a community organization (such as a church or a curling club) and exploits the trust built in these types of relationships.

• Online ads: Pop-up ads will appear on various websites that seniors may visit, such as lottery and investing sites and social media sites such as Facebook. These ads are designed to lure viewers in, with promises of "easy money" and "high return, low risk" investments. Clicking on the ad will lead to the fraudster's website, which contains more misleading information on the investment opportunity.

• Cold calls: Persistent sales people use aggressive sales tactics over the phone to pitch genuine-sounding investment opportunities.

• Investment seminars: Seniors are lured into an educational seminar, which often includes a free lunch or coffee. The seminars are usually sales pitches for "exciting" and "lucrative" investment opportunities. The elderly often feel obligated and pressured to invest because they have accepted the lunch or coffee.

The parents of a toddler who drowned in a pond in The Lakes neighbourhood of Morinville, on July 25, 2015, now face a criminal charge in relation to the death of their two and half year old daughter. The child was not under adult supervision at the time of her drowning.

Trevor MacDonald, aged 42 and Robin MacDonald, aged 36, both of Morinville, have been jointly charged with one count of Failing to Provide the Necessaries of Life (Sec. 215(2) of the Criminal Code) in relation to their daughter's death. They are scheduled to appear in Morinville Provincial Court on Thursday, August 4, 2016.

Given that this matter is now before the courts, the RCMP cannot provide further comment on this investigation.

Sec. 63(3)(h) Minimum Side Yard Setback page 42

The minimum side yard setback of 1 meter (3 feet) has been removed and the following applies: Any structure located closer than 8 feet (2.4 meters) from the property line will be required to comply with the High Intensity Residential Fire Regulations (HIRF). Contact Superior Safety Codes to discuss how this may affect your development.

Accessory Building

means a building which is normally subordinate to, and the use of which is incidental to that of, a principal building and which includes such buildings as a garage, storage shed and guesthouse. This structure can be up to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ storeys in height with a maximum height of 22'. This height cannot exceed the height of the principal residence. If a garage is $1\frac{1}{2}$ story's in height it can include sleeping accommodation over the garage, and shall not include cooking facilities or a kitchen. The maximum height of 22' and the height of the principal residence shall be measured from grade to the peak of the roof.

FEDERAL, PROVINCIAL AND MUNICIPAL FUNDING TO CONTROL EROSION ALONG ATHABASCA RIVER

The governments of Canada and Alberta and the Town of Whitecourt are committed to making smart investments in public infrastructure that protect Canadians and mitigate the potential damage from natural events like erosion and flooding, to build the safe communities we want for our children, grand-children and great-grandchildren.

The Honourable Amarjeet Sohi, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities, and Her Worship Maryann Chichak, Mayor of Whitecourt, today announced funding to control erosion along the south bank of the Athabasca River in the Town of Whitecourt.

Over 11 acres of land were lost to erosion along this stretch of the Athabasca River between 2006 and 2014, through both the ongoing wearing away of the river bank and during recent flooding events. Erosion control infrastructure will be constructed and repaired as part of this project to direct the river current away from the south bank. This will prevent further encroachment of the river and protect public and private property along the developed bank, including trails and parkland, decommissioned municipal sewer lagoons, and the Millar Western Pulp Mill, which employs hundreds of local residents.

The Government of Canada will contribute up to \$1,839,888 toward this project through the Provincial-Territorial Infrastructure Component – National and Regional Projects, with the Province of Alberta, the Town of



Whitecourt and private partners covering the remainder of the estimated \$6 million project.

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ALBERTA PARKS MAKES BOOKING CAMPSITES EASIER WITH MOBILE ACCESS

In response to user demand, many campsites in Alberta's provincial park campgrounds can now be booked on personal devices through Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca (RAP).

People can use RAP while on the go, making it easy to change a campsite

booking, extend a stay or reserve their next camping trip.

And there's more. The RAP website has undergone a complete revamp, including an updated campsite vacancy calendar.

"Albertans love to use our provincial parks and with the new improvements to the RAP website, it will be much easier to get outside and explore Alberta's great outdoors."

The system boasts many new features, including a responsive design to make it more user-friendly and interactive from both personal mobile devices and desktop computers. Enhancements will give campers more access to information for trip planning



(deep linking, event and program information) and sharing of information via social media. It also features a more intuitive search function (users can search campsites by map, nearest community or campground).

Bookings as of May 12 of this year are six per cent higher than in 2015, with more than 55,000 reservations processed.

To book a campsite, group camping area or comfort camping unit through a mobile device, just go to the Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca website, search and book a spot.

Alberta Parks encourages wildfire evacuees of Fort McMurray to access free camping options through its contact centre by calling 1-877-537-2757 and not the RAP mobile feature.

Campers are reminded that fire bans and restrictions remain in place for areas of the province. People camping this weekend should check ahead to beta.AlbertaFirebans.ca or AlbertaParks.ca to check on the status of fire bans and restrictions, including off-highway vehicle restrictions, to avoid fines.

Anyone experiencing an issue with the mobile access booking function can get technical assistance at Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca or phone the Alberta Parks Contact Centre at 1-877-537-2757.

The RAP system, introduced in 2009, has processed almost 800,000 camping reservations since inception and boasts more than 433,000 account holders. Last year alone the system processed more than 151,000 camping reservations.



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FIRST QUARTER PERMIT STATS CONSISTENT WITH ECONOMY

The Town of Stony Plain permit statistics for the first quarter of 2016 are consistent with the slowdown in the regional economy. The Town posted a total of 19 housing starts, with an estimated value of \$6.5 million, and 1 commercial permit valued at \$525.000.

"We are forty per cent of where we were last year," says Paul Hanlan, General Manager of Planning & Infrastructure. "However, these results were expected and seem to be the trend regionally." While Hanlan expected permit statistics to reflect the regional slowdown, he did not anticipate housing starts to be as high as they were over the past three to four years.

"Nineteen new housing starts means that nineteen families have committed to the Town of Stony Plain," says Hanlan. "These new housing starts were likely not speculative, but contracted new home construction, which confirms that Stony Plain is still growing as a community."

PROVINCE FUNDS SUPPORTIVE HOUSING IN CALGARY

Submitted by Government of Alberta

The Alberta government is investing \$4 million for permanent supportive housing for Albertans with disabilities.

Construction is expected to begin this summer on the site of Accessible Housing's Fourth Dimension Group Home. Once complete, the new building will offer 45 units of barrier-free accessible housing with 24-hour, on-site supports for individuals with disabilities or limited mobility, many of whom are currently in hospitals or otherwise in need of supportive housing.

"Every Albertan deserves to live with dignity and opportunities to thrive at home and in their communities. Our government's housing investment ensures that Albertans with disabilities have a safe and supportive place to call home."

"Through significant capital investments in building more affordable housing and renewing existing housing, our government is creating safe places for Albertans to call home and jobs in the construction sector." Lori Sigurdson, Minister of Seniors and Housing

"When facing a diagnosis or injury, Calgarians who need supportive living environments as adults face an incredibly narrow range of options. This investment expands Accessible Housing's capacity to serve individuals in an appropriate and flexible setting."

The new building will be operated by Accessible Housing, a Calgary-based, not-for-profit organization supporting individuals with limited mobility. Construction is expected to be complete by fall 2017.

The \$4-million investment supplements a \$9.3-million philanthropic contribution from the RESOLVE campaign, a Calgary fundraising collaboration of nine agencies to support the building of affordable and supported rental housing for the homeless and other vulnerable Albertans. The provincial investment is part of \$1.1 billion in funding for housing in the 2015-18 Capital Plan.

Overall, women are about twice as likely as men to be diagnosed with a mental illness. Part of the reason for this is that men only make about two thirds as many doctor visits as women do. And when men do see a doctor, they are often reluctant to talk about what's really bothering them, especially if it has anything to do with feelings or mood.

Plus, most men don't realize that some of the physical things like chronic pain and digestive problems could actually be caused by a mental health concern such as depression, anxiety, or stress.

And then there are men who know (or who at least strongly suspect) that they have a problem, but they suffer in silence, afraid to admit that they need help. Afraid others will find out their secret and they'll be perceived as weak or wimpy, or that they'll lose their job.

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SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

OTTAWA: The Throne Speech delivered on December 4th to Parliament by Governor General David Johnston on behalf of the Liberal government, in my view, raised many questions about the eventual cost to Canadian taxpayers. 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STONY PLAIN/SPRUCE GROVE/ENOCH RCMP INVESTIGATE ARMED ROBBERY

Early this morning shortly after 6:00 a.m., the Shell Station on Highway 16 near Range Road 44 was robbed. The suspects were armed with a pellet rifle and with bear spray. Cash and other items were stolen and the suspects have fled in a newer black truck with a lift kit.

A crime spree began early this morning. It started with a break-in at a cabin in Moonlight Bay. A residence had a picture window, and door windows smashed and several items were left strewn on the front lawn of the residence. It is believed that a high powered pellet rifle was taken during that break in. No one was home at the time.

Then, at 5:17 a.m. RCMP received a report of break in to vehicles at a different residence in Moonlight Bay in Wabamun. Male suspects were seen rifling through the homeowner's vehicles and when the homeowner confronted the suspects, he was sprayed with bear spray. The suspects then fled. The homeowner did not sustain injuries.

Shortly after, at 6:06 a.m., the RCMP were dispatched to an armed robbery that just occurred at the Shell. Two male suspects entered the Shell, one armed with a pellet rifle. The employees and one customer were directed to lay on the floor while the suspects took several items from the store. Before fleeing the store, bear spray was sprayed at the individuals on the floor. None of the people in the store sustained injuries as a result of this incident.

The truck is believed to have fled westbound after leaving the Shell.

The RCMP is actively investigating these incidents with the assistance of the Forensic Identification Section and the Serious Crimes Unit.

BEWARE OF RENTAL SCAM

St. Albert RCMP is warning potential renters in St. Albert to be aware of some ads for places to live. The rental scam is a common one involving rental properties. Rental scams vary but here are two of the more common scenarios:

A fraudster has somehow obtained access to a property or place. They pose as a landlord / property manager and show the victim the property. They then request an immediate down payment to secure the property and inform the victim they can move in at a later date. On the move-in date, the victim arrives only to discover it wasn't actually a rental and there have been other victims as well.

A fraudster poses as a landlord and says they are out of the country and require a deposit on the rental. Once the money is paid, usually through a money transfer, the new tenant discovers there isn't actually a rental.

As a renter, there are some precautionary steps you can take to protect yourself from falling victim to scams such as this. First and foremost, apply common sense.

Tips

• Ensure a proper tenancy agreement is drafted and signed by both parties. This agreement should include names and addresses for the landlord.

• Ask the landlord to show picture identification as proof he / she is the person named in the document. While it is not a requirement that they produce identification, the renter should be suspicious if they refuse.

• As a renter, you might consider asking to see previous utility bills for the residence to confirm identity of the landlord.

• Check rental rates in the same area. Often fraudsters will try to entice their victims with low prices to elicit multiple victims.

• Avoid wiring money ie Western Union. There's never a good reason to wire money to pay a security deposit, application fee, first month's rent, or vacation rental fee.

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



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
