

The HPV vaccine - one of Alberta's routine childhood immunizations- is recommended for all boys and girls in Grade 5, so as to safely and effectively protect them against developing human papillomavirus infection in the future.

Human papillomavirus is very common, and will affect more than seven out of 10 people in their lifetime. As the cause of almost 100 per cent of cervical cancer cases, 90 per cent of anal cancer cases, 50 per cent of penile cancer cases, and 35 per cent of oral cavity cancer cases, the consequences of HPV can be very serious. We understand that decisions about immunizing your children can be complex. This is why Alberta Health Services has developed the HPV Decision Aid Tool: to help you, as a parent, understand how the HPV Vaccine can support your child's future wellness, and decide whether you feel it is right for your child, today.

MARGARET JEAN EPOCH EARNS ALUMNI HONOUR AWARD

The University of Alberta Alumni Association is pleased to announce Ms. Margaret Jean Epoch will receive an Alumni Honour Award for her leadership as a teacher to lead Niton Central School, Niton Junction, Alberta to become the first Canadian elementary school to receive international accreditation with United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Associated School Project Network (ASPnet), on Thursday, Sept. 22, at the annual Alumni Awards ceremony.

The Alumni Honour Award recognizes the significant contributions made over a number of years by University of Alberta alumni to their profession, their community, to society at large, or to the University of Alberta.

The phrase "make the world a better place" is used repeatedly when people talk about Margaret Jean Epoch, '77 BPE, '97 BEd, '02 MEd. As a teacher and archivist at a small K-9 school in Niton Junction, Alta., Epoch makes a big difference in the world. Her list of projects, volunteer activities and awards is lengthy. One of her proudest accomplishments is helping make Niton Central School the first Canadian elementary school to be accepted as a member of the Associated Schools Project Network by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The school proudly flies the United Nations flag. Her local volunteer work with students, staff and community members includes Habitat for Humanity, the Terry Fox Run, Aboriginal Achievement Awards, Wigs for Kids, the local food bank and many more programs. Epoch also volunteers with victim services and helped fundraise for the school's naturalization park. She started a fundraiser to help

rebuild a school in India after the 2004 tsunami, and her students sent letters of support to victims after the 9/11 attacks and the shooting of four RCMP officers in Mayerthorpe, Alta.



The motivational speaker was Kirk Schornstein, a member with the Canadian Para Alpine World Cup Ski Team, a dynamic young man from Spruce Grove.

Kirk's message was informative, inspiring, and for some of us, unforgettable. He told us about the levels of Alpine skiing: competitors who could stand on both or one leg, competitors who did not have the use of either leg and skied with some form of apparatus, and blind competitors who skied with a seeing guide. His presentation was peppered with video clips that informed and amused. His positive personality radiated on stage and while mingling with the members later. He placed his skies and helmets and suits on display. Basically overlooking his disabled right arm he shared some of his beliefs that allowed him to be an Olympic competitor.

Like all Olympians he has a rigorous training schedule and is often away from home to access suitable training facilities. So we are so very lucky that this busy, energetic young man who will be home in Spruce Grove for a short time, will come to Wildwood to speak at our TOPS Open House on Thursday, October 6.

It is my hope that people in Wildwood and surrounding area will mark that date on their calendar. We understand that Kirk will be at Wildwood School earlier in the afternoon of the same day. Kirk's message was very powerful and could be applied to an Olympian and to ordinary people with less lofty goals. Please make an effort to attend.





FIVE TOP GOLF TIPS TO HELP BOOST YOUR GAME

(NC) When it comes to golf, it's the little things that can have the biggest impact on your game. Whether it's your first attempt, or 10th season, golf expert Bob Weeks has got you covered at the links this summer with these five tips:

Choose the right clubs: Regardless of your experience or skill level, choosing the right equipment can be the difference between duffing it and striking the ball straight down the fairway. It's important to work with a professional to get the clubs best-suited to your game and then, to have them custom fit. You should be fit for the length, loft, lie angle, shaft flex and even the grip size. If your clubs aren't custom fit, it will be like walking around in shoes that are the wrong size.

Get on the ball: Choose the right kind of golf ball for your game. While golf balls all look the same, it's what's inside that determines if it's right for you. Golf balls fall into two categories: distance or control. Distance balls are generally twopiece balls with a large core and a cover. They are harder and better suited for higher handicappers or beginners. Control balls, usually three- or four-piece balls, are softer and spin more meaning they will land on the green and stop. More skillful players should use these.

Consider the elements: Weather is always a factor in golf and dealing with it must always be considered. For instance, in cold temperatures, the ball will travel shorter distances, so take more club. The opposite is true for warmer temperatures. If you're playing into the wind, swing easy as that will keep the ball from spinning too much and rising up into the breezes. And downwind, make sure to judge the intensity of the breezes so you can choose the proper club. Your ball will roll further than normal on a downwind shot so take that into account.

Putting and chipping is priority: Lots of players like to boom their drives and will spend a lot of time on the range hitting their drivers. But if you want to improve your scores, you should spend more time working on your putting and chipping. Since most average players miss a lot of greens, the best way to save strokes is by chipping it close and making more putts. Focus more on your short game than your drive and you will improve.

Play the 19th hole: Win or lose, there's no better way to celebrate than hitting the 19th hole. Less is often more in golf and the same applies when considering what to eat and drink after a round. Molson Canadian 67 for example is specially brewed with 67 calories and an ABV of 3% per 341ml, offering a light, refreshing alternative for active players.

DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a stretch in the side of your back.

4. Hold for 15 seconds and repeat twice for each side.

Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds.

3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder

4. Hold for 15 seconds.

and arm.

5. Reverse hand positions and repeat.

IS EVANSBURG SAFE?

We all believe our town in safe. We feel comfortable sending our children off to school, going to the local store and pedalling their bicycles through town unencumbered with parents. Our children are able to visit local parks alone without feeling threatened. Our sign declares, "Clean Air, Fresh Water and Friendly People." Truer words have never been spoken. Evansburg is one of the friendliest towns I've ever been to. Our hometown is fantastic! Our town is safe for our children but is it safe from our children? Do we monitor and check up on them when they are venturing around town? Do we ask them where they have been, who with and why? Have we become numb to what are children are up to when we are not around? Have we as a town become so complacent with our friendly vibe that we have forgotten to instill in our children a sense of pride and ownership in their town?

Unfortunately, Tipple Park and the museum have been inundated with vandalism in the last month. Graffiti has been painted on artifacts, bottles have been smashed in the gazebo, locks have been tampered with, doors to our log house and A-frame have been damaged and windows have been broken. Lastly, a vandal has thrown a rock and broken a window and smashed the wooden door in our caboose.

Why are these things so important to the museum and our community? They all have a story to tell and it is important to know where we have come from to truly appreciate where we are going. The log house was built in 1911 by Steve and Helena Mazeppa. The Mazeppa family were one of the first pioneers to settle in our area. The house was built by hand with pine logs and sealed with chinking. Chinking was made of local clay, straw and prairie grass. The family lived in the house for three generations. The house was generously donated to the historical society in 1986. It was moved to its present site in 1994 to Tipple Park. The caboose came from the CN Railway. Railways quit using cabooses because the work rules no longer stated that each train was in need of a five man work crew. The caboose was used to house the engineer, brakeman and crew.

Some people thought the caboose was a dangerous car as it would often fling around (think of playing crack the whip). Some of us and remember waving madly at the man riding in the caboose. The caboose eventually became a fatality of budget cuts and that is why we now have one gracing our park.

Tipple Park Museum has recently had to invest in safety glass cover for the log house door and we are taking bids on repairing the window of the caboose. If there are any fine woodworkers and/or glassworkers in the area that would be able to restore our caboose door, we need your help! Volunteers are desperately needed before winter sets in. We do have a workshop that is available for this purpose.

The museum is a not-for-profit venture and most of our work is done through volunteers and donations. Caring volunteers and community members have built Tipple Park and Tipple Park Museum for the benefit of all ages to enjoy and learn about how our community developed into the great place that it is. Yellowhead County is building a skate park for our youth to enjoy for decades to come; the museum applauds the county for their forward thinking. Our children need something worthwhile to do. Boredom is the enemy. Please bring your children and teens out to the museum, enjoy the green space and the gazebo. This space was built for you. We want to show the community what we do here and how all members could possibly benefit from becoming involved in our programs.

It is too easy to blanket all our youth with the cliché', "Kid's these days!" We do not blame the kids; we blame boredom, lack of supervision, and stagnant adults. We are a community, it is our responsibility to rear our youth up to a higher standard. Edson Replacement School - Naming Our New School!

Names for the new school will be forwarded to a School Naming Committee with members including school representatives, local trustees, administration and school council representatives who will forward three names in order of preference to the Board for their consideration. The selection of the final name will be approved by the Board at the Public Board Meeting on December 14th, 2016. More information on how to submit a name will be available by September 26th and the deadline for name submissions is Monday, October 31st.

"We are looking forward to engaging with the Edson community on selecting a name for our new elementary school and hope that the Naming Committee receives a large number of submissions for them to review," commented Vice-Chair and local Edson Trustee Joan Zaporosky. "This is a wonderful opportunity for community members to have an active role in recognizing local history with others in nominating a name for a facility that future generations will enjoy."

Other News in Brief

· The Learning Services department developed and implemented an Inclusive Education strategic plan focused on the Collaborative Response Model during the 2015-16 school year. They will be continuing to refine the plan as well as the roles and responsibilities of the School Link Team to ensure that GYPSD students receive the supports and resources they require to be successful in their learning. • A total of 762 field trips taken by GYPSD students across the division in 2015-16 included a wide range of activities from taking part in athletic team travels to experiential learning adventures. Hinton Trustee Shirley Caputo offered a sincere appreciation on behalf of the Board to all school councils and community members who continuously provide significant assistance, including volunteer work and financial help, in ensuring students are able to participate in these valuable and enjoyable opportunities.

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
