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
LOCAL MALE CHARGED WITH POSSESSION FOR THE PURPOSE OF TRAFFICKING

Through the Feeder Association Loan Guarantee Program (FALGP), the association supports producer-run co-operatives in obtaining competitive financing for members to buy, feed and sell livestock – both cattle and sheep – for profit.

The sector is thriving and demand

is exceeding the overall provincial loan guarantee cap of \$55 million.

That's why our government is making a move to support our province's cattle feeders, and it is why we announced on Sept. 14 an increase to the overall provincial loan guarantee to \$100 million from \$55 million.

WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

The Town of Whitecourt will be investigating the possibility of changing its municipal status. At the current population, Whitecourt could apply to the Province to be a city; however, the municipality will be weighing benefits and disadvantages, including financial implications, prior to proceeding with the application.

Whitecourt will be submitting a number of emergent resolutions to the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) at the upcoming convention in October. AUMA acts as an advocate for urban municipalities across Alberta to the provincial and federal governments. Whitecourt will be asking AUMA to advocate to the provincial and federal governments in regards to the following topics:

- Support for the Northern Gateway Pipeline Project;
- Opposition to the proposed crude tanker ban proposed for BC's coastline;
- · Support for further research

in regards to the Caribou Range Management Plan.

Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak will be putting her name forward for a seat on the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) Board of Directors. Election to the Board will be held at the AUMA convention in October. If Mayor Chichak wins a seat on the Board of Directors, she will also put her name forth to sit on the Executive Committee. Mayor Chichak has served as Vice President Towns on the Executive Committee since 2015, and as the representative for Towns West on the Board of Directors since 2014.

Whitecourt Town Council has approved a request to proceed with the imposition of a local improvement tax to pay for river erosion measures along the Athabasca River bank adjacent to the Millar Western Forest Products' property. The total cost of the project, estimated at \$2.42 million, will be collected from the property owner through the local improvement tax over the next

25 years.

The Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce and Eagle River Casino, in partnership with Whitecourt Woodlands Tourism, will be promoting the creation of a destination management fund to the local accommodation sector. A Destination Management Fund (DMF) provides dollars for tourism marketing at a municipal level that could assist with building the community's reputation as a tourist destination. The

group is hosting an information session on September 13 to promote the initiative.

Whitecourt Woodlands Tourism recently rebranded and launched its new website and social media pages last week. Follow the group on Facebook or Instagram to get current information on events and activities around town, and check out the new website at www.whitecourtwoodlandstourism.com.

MLA TREVOR HORNE ON THE MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE

Prior to being elected as MLA for the wonderful constituency of Spruce Grove-St. Albert, I spent many years working in the service industry—making minimum wage. The wage I was paid barely kept up with the costs of school, let alone living expenses, even if I worked full time. I know the struggles many families in my community are facing as they try to make ends meet on less than \$15 per hour.

Across the province, 300,000 Albertans work for minimum wage. I hear the argument that many of these people are teenagers who are trying to earn money to buy video games and new clothes. However, the truth is that 56 per cent of Albertans earning less than \$15 per hour are over the age of 25. These are people who are trying pay for food, transportation, rent and child care. Even if we go back to the original argument that low-wage workers are teens and college students, so what? Just because they're young doesn't mean they don't have financial obligations. And it certainly doesn't mean they don't deserve a decent wage.

Another argument I hear about raising the minimum wage is that it's irresponsible to do it during this economic downturn. However, no one has ever been able to explain to me how keeping nearly 10 per cent of Alberta's population at below poverty wages is responsible.

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Our government consulted with business owners in order to roll out the minimum wage increase in a balanced way. The phased-in approach of a series of increases gives employers maximum certainty and predictability. Certainty and predictability are also the reasons why our government passed all three annual increases at once, rather than make a decision year to year. Now business owners

know exactly what the increase will be and when it will take effect. Businesses do benefit from a minimum wage increase. More money in workers' pockets, means more money for them to spend locally; after all, one business' employee is another's customer. Additional benefits include increased employee productivity and job satisfaction, as well as decreased turnover and training costs. Employers spend

tens of thousands of dollars each year to replace workers who leave.

I know Albertans are hardworking people. And everyone in this province who works full time shouldn't have to visit a food bank or choose between a roof over their head or electricity. Moving Albertans closer to living wage will give them economic security and allow them to live with dignity.



SUSTAINABLE FLOORING OPTIONS ABOUND

· Make the main entryway more inviting. Creating a more inviting entryway won't be as simple as cleaning up the yard, but it can help create a strong first impression without breaking the bank.



To begin, remove plants and furniture from the front porch or area surrounding the doorway, as such items can create a cluttered feel. If the front door is old, replace it. Custom doors may be expensive, but they might add the wow factor buyers are looking for. HOW TO PREPARE A HOME FOR ELDERLY RESIDENTS

Upon reaching retirement age, new retirees may face decisions regarding their living arrangements. Some seniors may opt to stay put, while others may want to downsize their homes to save money and relieve themselves of the burdens of maintaining larger homes.

Take steps to make bathrooms safer. The National Institute on Aging says that more than one in three seniors over age 65 fall each year, and 80 percent of those falls take place in the bathroom. Slippery tile floors can make it difficult for seniors to navigate bathrooms safely, and bathtubs and shower stalls present additional challenges. Install

grab bars on bathroom walls and next to toilets to provide support. In addition, consider installing a shower chair or bench and removable shower nozzle in the shower or tub so seniors can sit down while they bathe and rinse without having to stand up on slippery surfaces. Make sure any mats around bathtubs and sinks are nonskid to reduce the risk of falls even further.

· Install an extra phone line or two. While kids and adults between the ages of 18 and 50 may never use the landlines in their homes, many seniors still rely on traditional telephones as their primary means of communicating with the outside world. Install extra landlines in your home, including in seniors' bedrooms, so they can more readily access the phone should they fall and need to call for emergency help. Phones in seniors' bedrooms may also provide some additional privacy

to seniors who don't want to carry on phone conversations in busy areas of the home, such as the kitchen or living room. Such lines may also reduce feelings of isolation.

· Prioritize accessibility when storing items. When storing groceries, books, magazines, or other items seniors are likely to use, choose locations that are accessible to seniors. Avoid storing items on the top shelf of pantries, bookcases or entertainment centers, as seniors with limited mobility may not be able to reach them.

Many seniors move in with their adult children to make their golden years safer and more enjoyable and manageable. Such a change in living arrangements may necessitate some changes on the part of homeowners so they can ensure their homes are safe for seniors.
