St. Albert, AB - On Wednesday, September 14, 2016 at approximately 7:15 P.M. St. Albert RCMP received a report of a motor vehicle collision involving a pedestrian. Immediate attendance by the St. Albert RCMP Traffic Unit found that a 63 year old male walking his dog had been struck while attempting to cross Eldorado Drive, just past English Way. The pedestrian was not at the crosswalk. The 59 year old male driver of a black BMW vehicle was traveling westbound on Eldorado Drive when he struck the pedestrian. Road and weather conditions were favorable however the angle of the setting sun



may have been a contributing factor in the collision. It is unknown if the dog was hit, however it ran away when the collision occurred. The pedestrian was taken via ambulance to the Royal Alexander Hospital with non life threatening injuries.



Items that should <u>NEVER</u> be put down the Drain

We rarely think twice about some of the items we put down the drain, we may not realize the gamble we take every time we deposit certain items down the drain. Gamble you ask? Yes the gamble. When we deposit such things as oils, fats & greases, baby wipes/personal wipes and feminine hygiene products just to mention a few. We run the risk of causing possible expensive sewer backups either in our own homes or on the municipal side, in either case these could be prevented by simply not putting them down the drain. In addition to sewer backups there are other troubles that can come of improper disposal of items down the drain, such as excessive wear on pumps, additional costs in cleaning of reservoirs and lagoons and additional man power to deal with backups/ pump failures. Then there are the environmental effects, because everything we put down our drains here in the Tri Village service area ends up at our lagoon which ends up being discharged on an annual basis in accordance with Alberta Environment guidelines. So all the chemicals, detergents, medications, paints and cleaning products that get put down the drain end up back in the environment.

Please help us protect and preserve the environment and our sewer system by not flushing such items as:

-Coffee grounds- these settle out and create a place for other items to catch on and stick to

-Eggshells- again create places for other waste to get hung up on

-Grease, fats & oils (from cooking, uncooked poultry fats, gravies, cheese, shortenings, lard, butter, salad dressings and condiments) - can create "fatbergs" build ups of grease that harden like rocks which reduce flow and cause backups. It is said to account for about 45% of sewer backups.

-Flushable cat litter- clogs drains and is harmful to marine species because the parasites in the feces are not destroyed in the treatment process

-Paper towels, baby wipes, personal wipes, cotton balls and feminine hygiene products- are all made to be absorbent and strong thus reducing the breakdown of them which can cause costly backups

-Condoms- they are not biodegradable and can clog pipes and pumps, fill lagoon cells and have an adverse effect on the environment if ingested by marine life and birds

-Paint, cleaning products, chemicals, detergents and medications- are all disruptive to ecosystems and can create chemical reactions with piping/pumping equipment causing unnecessary wear and tear that usually ends up being costly.

Please dispose of these and similar items responsibly to help us maintain an effective sewer system.





STRENGTHENING WHITECOURT STRENGTHENS CANADA

Mayor Maryann Chichak recently met with other municipal leaders from across Canada this earlier this month, uniting behind a plan to ensure that federal infrastructure investments benefit all communities—including Whitecourt.

As a board member for the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), Mayor Chichak champions local issues and solutions to help shape the national policy agenda of the municipal sector. At its September 13-16 meeting in Oakville, Ontario, the FCM board united behind a plan to ensure that all communities benefit from the \$48 billion Phase 2 federal infrastructure fund.

Municipalities are calling on the federal government to empower local decision-makers to drive forward the most strategic investments in transit and green infrastructure. They are also urging strong action to tackle the housing crisis, and to bolster rural Canada with an enhanced the Small Communities fund.

Municipal leaders acknowl-

edged the vital importance of the federal government's decision to grow its contribution to 50 percent of costs. Sharing their Phase 1 experiences across the country, they agreed that a successful Phase 2 will require an ongoing 50 per cent federal share, with provinces partnering with no less than their traditional one-third share. They also agreed that Phase 2 should streamline investment in green and transit infrastructure as stable, predictable allocations for municipalities.

"There are no one-size-fits-

all solutions, and local governments understand local needs best. With predictable federal transfers, we can plan long-term, pull in local expertise, and move cost-effective projects forward quickly," said Mayor Chichak.

FCM Board members will continue to engage with local MPs and key ministers to advance a strong municipalfederal partnership to deliver the best outcomes for the people of Whitecourt and all Canadians.
