FOURTEEN ARRESTED IN OPERATION ICE REIGN

Edmonton... Operation ICE Reign, an ALERT investigation focusing on child sexual exploitation offenders, has resulted in the arrest of 14 suspects from across northern Alberta.

Between June-October 2016, ALERT's Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) unit charged 14 suspects with 33 offences related to online child sexual exploitation. ICE is an integrated unit comprised of Edmonton Police Service and RCMP members.

Operation ICE Reign was launched in response to a noted increase in child sexual exploitation offences. In the past six years the ICE unit has experienced a 75% increase in the number of new child sexual exploitation cases it investigates. ICE investigates offences involving child pornography, any computer-related child sexual abuse, child luring over the Internet, voyeurism involving victims under the age of 18, and child sex trade/tourism.

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CARFENTANIL DETECTED IN TWO DEATHS IN ALBERTA

Alberta's Chief Medical Officer of Health is alerting the public, as well as health and law-enforcement officials, that the illicit opioid carfentanil has been confirmed by the Chief Medical Examiner in two recent deaths.

"Albertans need to know that the drug carfentanil has made its way into our province and that it is an extremely dangerous and deadly opioid. The smallest trace of carfentanil can be lethal and Albertans should be aware of the life-threatening dangers in using this drug." - Dr. Karen Grimsrud, Chief Medical Officer of Health


Earlier this week, the Chief Medical Examiner notified the Chief Medical Officer of Health that carfentanil was detected in the deaths of two men in their 30s. One of the deaths occurred in the Edmonton area, the other in Calgary. Until very recently, toxicology tests could not confirm the existence of carfentanil in human blood due to the very low level of the drug being deadly.

"To my knowledge, there are very few laboratories in North America that are able to measure carfentanil in human blood. Alberta's Office of the Chief Medical Examiner is believed to be the first toxicology laboratory in Canada to positively identify carfentanil in human blood. The discovery of this dangerous drug is concerning to us, and we will continue to work closely with our health partners, as part of sharing information and raising awareness of opioids." - Dr. Eliz-

"We are already in the eye of a deadly storm in fighting the horrific impacts of fentanyl in our communities. We are now even more challenged by the arrival of carfentanil on our streets. The primary role of the Alberta RCMP is to stop the flow of these substances and the criminal activities that support them. We will work together with our partners to weather this storm." - Deputy Commissioner Marianne Ryan, Commanding Officer, RCMP in Alberta

Carfentanil is an opioid drug licensed for use with large animals, but not for humans. Carfentanil is 100 times more toxic than fentanyl. An amount as small as a grain of sand could be lethal.

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INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM BEGINS MONDAY, OCTOBER 24, 2016

Starting Monday (October 24), Albertans will have the opportunity to protect themselves and others against influenza through Alberta's annual influenza immunization program.

Offering influenza immunization, free of charge, to all Albertans six months of age and older, Alberta's program will make vaccine available at hundreds of Alberta Health Services (AHS) public influenza immunization clinics – as well as some pharmacists and physician offices – around the province.

"We are already seeing cases of influenza in Alberta," says Dr. Kathryn Koliaska, Medical Officer of Health in North Zone. "You may be healthy now, but without immunization everyone is at risk. Prevention is your only protection."

Immunization is the most effective means of protecting against the strains of influenza virus circulating this season. Because those strains change from season to season, Albertans are reminded that they cannot rely on having been immunized in years past.

"Last season, influenza immunization cut Albertans' risk for influenza in half. That's great, but last year's immunization won't protect you this season. You need this season's immunization to be protected," says Dr. Koliaska.

In six months alone last season, more than 1,600 Albertans were hospitalized with influenza and 62 Albertans died. Influenza causes more emergency department visits than heart attacks


and strokes, and hospitalizes more children than poisonings.

"Influenza does not discriminate," reminds Dr. Koliaska.
"Though some Albertans are at greater risk of severe complications, no one is immune to its potentially severe impact. Please don't take that risk.

"For yourself, and your loved ones, get immunized."

"Operation ICE Reign resulted in the seizure of thousands of photos and videos of children being abused and each one of those image represents a real-word victim. As a society we have a collective responsibility to protect children and shield them from sexual exploitation," said ALERT Insp. Dave Dubnyk.

ALERT is also hoping to use Operation ICE Reign to raise awareness about the pervasiveness of child sexual exploitation and has partnered with the Canadian Centre for Child Protection.

"While the internet did not create this problem, it has created unprecedented opportunities for offenders to access, possess and distribute child sexual abuse material-as well as actively participate in the market of child sexual abuse. Today's announcement not only underscores how significant a problem this is, but also challenges the misconceptions about who and what type of individuals participate in these crimes against children," said Lianna McDonald, Executive Director, Canadian Centre for Child Protection.

The arrests took place between June and October. All of the accused are all men and range in age from 26 to 61 years old.

None of the accused were deemed to work in professions of trust and/or authority. There is no definitive link between the suspects other than the offences allegedly committed.

Operation ICE Reign investigators utilized information from

a variety of agencies and partners during the investigation, including RCMP's National Child Exploitation Coordination Centre, Cybertip, Canada Border Services Agency, Interpol, Royal Newfoundland Constabulary, Tennessee Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, and numerous RCMP detachments

Anyone with information about this investigation, or any child exploitation offence is encouraged to contact local police or cybertip.ca.

ALERT was established and is funded by the Alberta Government and is a compilation of the province's most sophisticated law enforcement resources committed to tackling serious and organized crime. Members of Alberta Sheriffs, Calgary Police Service, Edmonton Police Service, Lethbridge Police Service, Medicine Hat Police Service, and RCMP work in ALERT.





Leduc Enforcement Services' monthly campaign for October focuses on raising community awareness on:

Recreation vehicles (RVs)

Recreational vehicles are a common sight around Leduc during the summer months; however there are certain restrictions that come into effect between Oct. 16, 2016 and April 30, 2017. This cycle applies to each fall/winter season in respect to the city's residential areas.

During this time, recreational vehicles must be removed from the front driveway in a residential location and stored off site, or on a pad which has been approved by the city to the rear of the property for such a purpose.

The rules for parking recreational vehicles on the roadway don't change during this time, as trailers must not be left on the roadway unattached from a vehicles and can't be present for over 72 hours at a time.

A recreational vehicle includes, but is not limited to:

- · Boat trailers
- Motorhomes
- Fifth wheel trailer

• Tent trailers

This doesn't include recreational vehicles used solely for the purpose of winter activities.


ans, especially those that are school aged.


