## COUNTY DECLARES STATE OF AGRICULTURAL DISASTER

Sangudo, Alberta, Thursday November 3, 2016 – During the November 2nd Lac Ste. Anne County Development meeting, Council brought forward an addition to the agenda, and unanimously voted to declare a State of Agricultural Disaster due to the weather conditions hampering harvest efforts in the region this fall.

Alberta Crop Report as of October 25th, has reported that approximately 75% of unharvested regional cereal crops remain standing. Additionally, 84% of the unharvested spring wheat, 64% of the unharvested barley and 79% of the unharvested oats are classified as standing.

"Due to the inclement weather over the harvest season, we understand farmers' profit margins are at extreme risk. We hope to raise awareness to the federal and provincial governments to get programs in place to address the seriousness of this matter by declaring a State of Agricultural Disaster," stated Lac Ste. Anne County Agricultural Services Board Chairman Ross Bohnet.

The County will notify the provincial and federal governments of its declaration of Agricultural Disaster with the goal of drawing attention to our concerns of regional farmers, and of underscoring the pressing need for a disaster recovery program.

"We wanted to offer students a quality program with a variety of options which is challenging to do on our own given the need for multiple teachers to teach different courses, explains Darwell Principal Lorna Vardy. "We attended a PD session where we heard about a similar program that had great results with students and we began to talk as a group of principals about how we might be able to pool our resources in order to provide students with these opportunities."

Career & Technology Foundations, or CTF, helps students build their understanding of the world around them as they identify and apply career and life skills.

Students develop communication, collaboration, critical thinking, time management and problem-solving skills through hands-on learning experiences. CTF supports the development of literacy, numeracy and competencies which can be developed through student-focused learning opportunities.

CTF also provides a foundation for students to transition into Career and Technology Studies (CTS) in Grades 10 through 12.

But the benefits were twofold. Students from the four schools will transition into Grade 8 at Onoway Jr/Sr High School together next year, and as a result of this opportunity, they won't be strangers.

"Giving students the chance to meet their future OJSH peers, and make new friends with shared interests, is the additional goal of this learning opportunity. The students will come together for another week in January and again in May. There are plans for a dance at the end of the 3rd term," shared Principal Vardy. Teachers presented options for the courses based on their own interests and talents and in alignment with CTF curriculum outcomes. Students then selected their options based on preference:

• It is Rocket Science - the science and construction of working rockets

• Robotics - designing, building and programming robots

• The Artist in Me - artistic expression and technique through a variety of mediums

• Healthy Living - exploring health and wellness, fitness and nutrition

• World of Wonders - exploring the natural wonders of the world and travel

• Cupcake Wars - baking and experimenting

Teachers and principals from all four schools worked together to make the program possible with teachers planning courses they've never taught before, creating their curriculum, ensuring its connection to learning competencies and teaching students they've never met before at a school they are not familiar with. Each principal committed to spending time at Grasmere School over the week to help manage the influx of students and share in the showcase. A collaboration Principal Vardy says was well worth it given the engagement of students.

The showcase marked the end of the week for students with parents, family and friends filling the gym to take in their students' work! Another piece of the learning outcomes with students explaining their work and sharing their experience! This week in Parliament, with the release of the 2016 Fall Economic Statement, we largely focused on the Liberal Government's budget and deficit. We also covered topics including poverty, the ethics around Liberal ministers' "cash-for-access" fundraising events, and aquaculture in British Columbia.



# SHARING A LASTING LEGACY

November 2016 – People often can't help but smile when they see six-year-old Kamryn Bond lay a wreath with her friend, Shannon Krasowski, 40, at their local Remembrance Day ceremony. Although an unlikely pair, they are both amputees and are part of a legacy that goes back nearly 100 years.

Kamryn is a member, and Shannon a graduate, of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program. It was war amputee veterans who created The War Amps in 1918, its Key Tag Service in 1946, and later, the CHAMP Program. Since 1975, thousands of child amputees across Canada have received financial assistance for their artificial limbs through CHAMP and attended regional seminars where they learn about growing up as an amputee.

When Kamryn was 11 months old, both of her legs, right hand, and several fingers on her left hand, were amputated due to a respiratory illness. Shannon's left leg was amputated when she was 13 years old due to bone cancer.

They met three years ago at their local Remembrance Day ceremony. That year, Kamryn watched Shannon lay a wreath on behalf of The War Amps Operation Legacy, but ever since, it has been a tradition they share.

While growing up as a Champ, Shannon met many war amputee veterans and heard their firsthand accounts of the devastation of war. "They passed this legacy to us younger amputees and now it's our turn to share their stories, so that we never forget their sacrifices," she says.

Although Kamryn is still quite young, her mom, Dale, says it is important for her daughter to lay a wreath on Remembrance Day. "It builds the foundation for her to understand how much our war veterans gave up for our freedom."

Dale adds, "We will always be appreciative of the work of the war amputee veterans and the message they have left for young amputees like Kamryn to carry into the future. It is for this reason that she lays a wreath every year in their honour, and will do so for many years to come."



# FARM EFFICIENCY

Submitted by Oneil Carlier, MLA Whitecourt-Ste. Anne, Minister of Agriculture and Forestry

Like all sectors of the economy, agriculture has a role to play in reducing greenhouse gas emissions and a vested interest in reducing the impacts of climate change.

If left unchecked, climate change will undoubtedly have long-term consequences for the length of the growing season, moisture conditions, the prevalence of extreme weather events and the availability of water.

We know Alberta farmers care about the environment and they have been leaders in making sure their operations are efficient. Many producers are already taking steps to not only to reduce their emissions but also to lower their energy bills.

Our government is here to support them.

We are investing \$10 million



from the Climate Change and Emissions Management Fund that will enhance already successful programs that encourage producers and agriculture-based businesses to adopt new technologies and practices.

This additional \$10 million, means a total of \$15.8 million for these programs over the next two years – almost tripling the funding. We are building on the grant programs currently offered through our Growing Forward 2 suite of programs programs that are in high demand with over 700 applicants a year and consistently oversubscribed.

While Alberta's agriculture community has made some progress over the years to enhance environmental stewardship and adopt new innovative new practices we know that there is still a lot of work to do.

Every two years, Agriculture and Forestry conducts a survey that tracks the adoption of environmentally sustainable practices by the agriculture sector. While adoption rates were relatively high in areas related to water quality, habitat conservation, and grazing management they were lowest in the adoption of practices related to energy use and climate change at just 16 per cent.

We know that the cost of adopting new technology which can be between \$50,000 - \$150,000 per operation is one of the factors impeding change.

We also know that specific sectors within the agriculture economy greenhouse producers, hog operations, irrigated farms, chicken and egg producers are more intensive users of natural gas and electricity. That is why investing in these programs for farmers, offers an excellent opportunity to reduce the impact of the carbon levy on their operations as well as reduce their environmental footprint.

We will continue to work with stakeholders to develop efficiency programs and allow the industry to seize new economic opportunities in a carbon constrained future.




