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ONOWAY LIVEWIRES COMPETE PROVINCIALLY

The Onoway LiveWires have come away with a fourth place finish in a provincial robotics competition.

The OJSH robotics team, the Onoway LiveWires, is composed of seven students – three in grade 12 and four in grade 9. They have been meeting every Monday after school under the mentorship and guidance of CTS/Mechanics teacher Mr. Kyle Van Camp to plan, build and program a competition-level robot. Onoway Junior Senior High School sponsored the LiveWires, believing

that school teams such as this inspire 21st century learning in addition to providing opportunities for students to experience technical and mechanical applications.

The Onoway LiveWires entered a province-wide competition, First Tech Challenge (FTC), to test themselves against some of the province's best teams. FTC is a competition for schools and extra-curricular clubs to meet to test their robots against other school's designs and constructions. The five young men and two young women from OJSH as well as Mr. Van Camp were novices to robot construction, programming and competition. However, they took up the chal-





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

Entanglements

° The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

*Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

-Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.


 -Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.

-Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.

^oEnsure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.

"Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.

WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

FEBRUARY 28, 2017

A Special Meeting of Council will be held on Monday, April 3 at 5:00 p.m. to discuss the 2017 Budget. The Interim 2017 Budget was adopted in December 2016, and the final budget will be presented for Council's consideration at the April 10, 2017 Regular Meeting of Council.

Whitecourt Town Council has adopted its 2017 Strategic Plan. The plan, which is updated annually, outlines Council's current priorities

and identifies where the municipality will focus its resources. The document is available to view on www. whitecourt.ca.

The Community Clean Up Program policy has been amended to include an age restriction for those participating in litter clean up projects. The program, which is advertised annually, provides \$1,000 to community groups who are approved to perform 100 hours of clean up service. The policy now requires all participants to be at least 9 years of age. Further details on the program requirements and the application deadline will be posted

on www.whitecourt.ca and in other advertisements throughout the next month.

Whitecourt has renewed a contract with Global Traffic Group Inc. for automated traffic enforcement. The contract term is for an additional two years, with options for renewal.

Council has denied a request to consider waiving fees for Well-spring Family Resource & Crisis Centre. Wellspring requested that the municipal fees for the construction and placement of a shed at 5116 51 Avenue be waived due to the fact that the organization is a charity. Past practice for charities and other

non-profit groups in Whitecourt has been for those agencies to pay all required permit fees.

Council has proclaimed April 24 to 30, 2017 as Rail Safety Week. The event, which is in its 15th year, raises awareness about rail safety and highlights the ongoing commitment of communities in making Canada's rail network safer. POLICE SHOOTING IN BARRHEAD PROMPTS ASIRT INVESTIGATION

On Feb. 22, 2017, the Director of Law Enforcement assigned the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) to investigate the circumstances surrounding an arrest in which an RCMP member from

the Barrhead detachment fired his service weapon.

At approximately 4:45 a.m. on Feb. 22, the RCMP spotted a vehicle at a residence in Barrhead associated with a 33-year-old male known to have warrants for his arrest. RCMP members approached the residence to investigate.

An incident occurred inside the

residence, resulting in an RCMP officer firing his service pistol. The male was not struck and fled from the home. The RCMP later arrested the man without incident and he remains in custody. He was not injured.

ASIRT will investigate the circumstances that led to the RCMP member discharging his service

weapon. With the investigation underway, there will be no further comment until the case is complete.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

ANIMAL RELATED INCIDENTS

A study reveals significant patterns in the types of animal-related incidents. For example, almost half (46.5 per cent) of horse-related injuries happen to women, age 16 to 59, and are caused primarily by falls when riding. Men, age 16 to 59, are most frequently (68 per cent) injured by cows during the calving season of February to June. Men aged 60 and older are most frequently (57 per cent) killed by bulls in the month of August as the breeding season starts.




FARM SAFETY WEEK

Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operaters and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.

• Faillure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.

Be SAFE – Plan Ahead Assess Risk

Risk concerns the expected value of results of a situation or event. The value of those results may be positive or negative. In the farming industry, the measure of risk can be rated as high, medium or low. Once the risk has been assessed, through your regular safety checks, employers can

determine whether to take immediate action of a hazard or identify those that can be monitored and fixed at a later time. Regular assessment can help with budgeting time and resources for immediate or future repairs.

SIMPLE MAINTENANCE PROJECTS TO KEEP CARS RUNNING SMOOTHLY

One of the ways to keep vehicles running strong for years on end is to adhere to the manufacturer's recommended maintenance schedule. Although there are many factors drivers cannot control, including recalls, weather and road conditions, proper maintenance is something drivers can control, and maintaining a vehicle can be very simple.

Oil Changes

Motor oil lubricates the engine and keeps it in good working order. Old oil becomes more viscous and can lose its efficacy. While changing motor oil is important, motorists should follow the owner's manual or the factory maintenance schedule regarding how often it needs to be changed, as all vehicles are not alike. The old myth that cars and

trucks need oil changes at set intervals has changed as digital check capabilities have evolved.

Car computers can now keep track of more than just mileage. Computers now track starts and stops and trip durations to determine when cars need oil changes.

Coolant Levels

Coolant helps prevent vehicles from overheating and also prevents the water that it mixes with in the radiator from freezing or boiling. Coolant is nearly as important as motor oil in vehicle maintenance. Coolant is typically comprised of a 50/50 mix of distilled water and antifreeze. These two substances work together to maintain a proper ratio of heat energy and prevent eventual breakdown and destruction of the

engine

Coolant is usually changed once per year or at 30,000 miles. This keeps the coolant working properly and will help prevent corrosion and deposits from forming inside the cooling system. Coolant levels might be checked during a full-service oil change appointment.

Check Battery Contacts

Many modern car batteries do not require a lot of maintenance. However, one problem that may occur is a buildup of minerals or corrosion from leaking battery fluid on the contacts. In such instances, use a battery cleaning brush to clean the contacts and then replace the cables.

Tire Maintenance

Properly inflated, balanced and rotated tires make for a smooth,

safe ride. Check that tires are wearing evenly and that the vehicle is not pulling to one side. A lack of tread on tires requires they be replaced. Because tires can be expensive, many drivers put off routine tire maintenance. But this can be a costly mistake. Tires that are worn or not properly inflated can cause skidding, problems braking and accidents. Blowouts also may occur, putting drivers, their passengers and fellow motorists in danger. It's best to be proactive with regard to tire maintenance.

Maintaining a vehicle in adherence to manufacturer guidelines can prolong the life of the car, improve its safety and increase its trade-in or resale value.







Auto TUNE-UP

FUEL EFFICIENT CARS, TRUCKS AND SUVS

Automobiles impact the environment in various ways. According to National Geographic, cars consume a lot of energy even before they make long road trips, with perhaps 80 to 90 percent of their environmental impact stemming from fuel consumption and emissions. These factors can increase air pollution levels and create greenhouse gases that contribute to climate change.

With this in mind, eco-friendly motorists are increasingly purchasing vehicles with smaller carbon footprints. These include makes and models that have stricter emissions control and vehicles that are more fuel-efficient. Hybrid or electric cars can often drive further before fueling or recharging than less efficient models.

When shopping for new or preowned vehicles, individuals can research cars and trucks that have earned high marks for fuel economy. Various organizations, including the U.S. Department of Energy, Consumer Reports and Kelly Blue Book, routinely rank vehicles based on gas mileage figures and emissions ratings. Eco-friendly cars are beneficial for the environment, and such cars also help drivers' bottom lines.

In 2016, Consumer Reports looked past U.S. Environmental Protection Agency figures and the claims offered by manufacturers with regard to vehicles noted for their fuel efficiency. Consumer Reports measured precise fuel-flow with a device spliced directly into the fuel line. Testing occurred on both a public

highway at 65 mph, as well in a simulated urban/suburban track. Consumer Reports has identified these vehicles as their top picks for energy consumption.


- Mitsubishi Mirage: In the subcompact division, this vehicle features a fuel economy of 37 mpg. With its very low sticker price, it can be a smart choice for eco- and budget-conscious buyers.
- Volkswagen Jetta Hybrid: This car marries both a battery-powered electric motor and a traditional seven-speed manual transmission. The hybrid earns an overall 37 mpg rating. It's a little bigger than many compact sedans, creating a very comfortable ride.
- Ford Fusion Hybrid: With an upscale look, the Ford Fusion Hybrid boasts an overall 39 mpg

and comfortable seats to go with a quiet cabin.

• Lexus NX 300h and RX 450h: Lexus earns top marks for fuel economy for both its compact and midsized SUVs. Both deliver an overall mpg of 29.

When ranking their picks for vehicles with high fuel economy, FuelEconomy.gov, the official U.S. government resource for fuel economy information, lists the Hyundai Ioniq Electric, BMW 13 BEV and Tesla Model S AWD- 60D as the most efficient cars. Those who prefer a truck or SUV will find the Chevrolet Colorado 2WD, Chrysler Pacifica Plug-In Hybrid and the Nissan Rogue Hybrid FWD as top contenders.

Fuel-efficient cars and trucks continue to pave the way for more eco-friendly living.

REBATES TO HELP ALBERTANS TAP SOLAR RESOURCES

The Alberta government is creating a \$36-million rebate program for solar installation on residential and commercial buildings.

Homeowners, businesses and non-profit organizations will receive rebates for rooftop solar panels that meet the Residential and Commercial Solar Program requirements as early as this summer.

"There's a lot of buzz in Alberta around small-scale solar. This program will make solar power affordable for more Albertans, leading to new panels on 10,000 Alberta rooftops by 2020. Along the way, we will create jobs and local expertise in an emerging industry." - Shannon Phillips, Minister of Environment and Parks and Minister Responsible for the Climate Change Office

Solar uptake has doubled in Alberta since 2015, bolstered by initiatives like the Alberta Municipal Solar Program and the On-Farm Solar PV Program.

Over the next five years, the Residential and Commercial Solar Program will build on these existing programs. By 2019, the new program is expected to:

- support the creation of 900 jobs in Alberta's solar sector
- cut solar installation costs by up to 30 per cent for residences, and up to 25 per cent for businesses and non-profits
- reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the province by about a half million tonnes, the equivalent of taking 100,000 passenger vehicles off the road

To ensure Albertans receive timely access, the government is posting a Request for Proposal to identify a third party to deliver the new program. Details will be defined in coming months, including qualifying systems, installation and eligibility requirements.

"The Energy Efficiency Advisory Panel heard that Albertans wanted this program. The Prairies have the best solar resources in Canada, and there are a lot of potential investment opportunities. This is the first of several programs that will help create jobs and diversify Alberta's en-



- "Solar photovoltaic" is the scientific term for cells that convert sunlight into electricity.
- Non-profits interested in applying must be registered under the Federal Business Corporations Act and be incorporated and in good-standing under the Societies Act of Alberta, the Agriculture Societies Act, Companies Act Part 9, or the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act.
- On Dec. 21, 2016, the Government of Alberta amended the Micro-generation Regulation to provide more flexible rules for Albertans generating their own electricity. This increased the size limit of a micro-generation system from one megawatt to five megawatts and allows a solar array to serve adjacent sites (especially helpful for operations with more than one building).


