NOT GETTING YOUR FIRE PERMIT FOR EXISTING OR NEW BURNS MAY COME AT A COST

Starting March 1, all burning activities in Yellowhead County will require a fire permit, excluding campfires as well as burn barrels in certain locations. Yellowhead County residents are reminded to take extra care while burning this spring as dry conditions and strong winds can fuel fast burning grassfires.

"Fire permits will be required for any new or existing burn in the Yellowhead County Fire

Permit Area," says Yellowhead County Deputy Fire Chief Cory Chegwyn. "And we're reminding everyone to take all the necessary precautions during any type of burn on their property."

If you burn without a permit and accidentally start a wildfire – or even if firefighters are sent to check your burn – you may be held responsible for any firefighting or other costs. Agricultural producers and other businesses, as well as property owners should ensure their fire preparedness plans are in place to quickly respond to potential

wildfire situations.

The Yellowhead County fire permit area covers the area north of Highway 16 and east of Highway 22. Yellowhead County fire permits for this area are free and available through Fire Guardians at either Yellowhead County office. Campground fires and burn barrels within this area, excluding the hamlet of Evansburg, do not require a permit but may be restricted later in the season if fire levels reach a fire ban.

Not Getting your Fire Permit for Existing or New Burns May Come at a Cost

Fire permits for the rest of the county can be obtained by contacting Alberta's Agriculture & Forestry department.

Fire permits lets Yellowhead County know where authorized fires are planned and they help us to notify you if conditions

change. There are a variety of reasons why the fire hazard in your area might go up – and you might not be aware that they're happening. When we have your permit information, we can notify you so you can put out your fire – and avoid starting a bigger one and steer clear of potential charges and monetary costs.

Due to the varying fire permit

requirements for different Fire Protection Zone areas within Yellowhead County, we recommend that residents contact either the Fire Guardians at their local Yellowhead County office or the local Alberta Agriculture and Forestry Department for more information and to obtain a permit.

Tips & Info on new burns and existing winter burns:

- Permits are required for brush piles, transfer sites, and field, grass or stubble burns.

- Fire incidents can be reduced by keeping burns small and by always having firefighting equipment on hand.

- Fires that are not completely extinguished can smolder underground during the winter months and resurface in the spring as a wildfire.

Proposed Bylaw No. 2017-05: New Land Use District: AGI-Agricultural Development District

A new land use district, the "AGI – Agricultural Industry Development District" that accommodates specialized agricultural development in rural Parkland County is proposed to be added to the Land Use Bylaw No. 20-2009. It would allow for more intensive value added agricultural and alternative energy production in rural areas within the County. The proposed district adds the General Industrial/Processing use as permitted within the AGI District where it is not currently permitted in the AGR District when the proposed use:

- supports value added agricultural production;
- provides for generation of alternative energy; or
- provides inputs that directly support the aforementioned sectors, such as biomass.

Any proposed Agricultural Industrial Development must reasonably mitigate impacts to adjacent residences and only be permitted where appropriate.

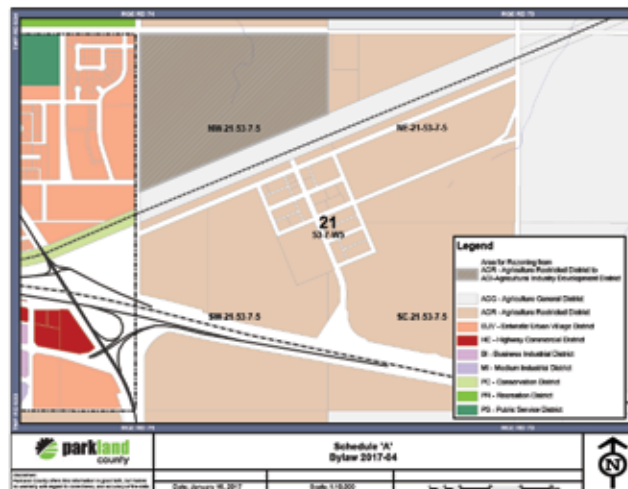
Purpose of Proposed Bylaw No. 2017-03: Entwistle Area Structure Plan Amendments

Amendments to the Entwistle Area Structure Plan Bylaw No. 23-2012 are proposed to introduce more diversity in the types of value added agricultural and agricultural industrial uses to support the Hamlet in the following ways:

- Identifies the need for a range of new value added, agricultural –based industrial and alternative energy-based developments.
- Identifies the CN Railway as an asset and as a catalyst for development.
- Provides accommodation for new agricultural, alternative energy, and agricultural industrial based development in rural and fringe areas.
- Provides direction and clarification for the requirements for Outline Plans, Conceptual Plans and Traffic Impact Assessments to support development proposals.
- Requires compliance with County policies around Dark Sky lighting.
- Provides criteria to ensure the use is appropriate for the location and that nuisances are mitigated by the applicant.

Purpose of Proposed Bylaw No. 2017-04: Redistricting of Pt: NW-21-7-5-W5M

The proposed redistricting changes the subject parcel located at NW-21-7-5-W5M from AGR-Agriculture Restricted District to AGI-Agricultural Industrial Development District. This will allow for a "General Industrial" land use on the site for the purpose of developing a wood pellet processing facility.



Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw(s). Written submissions or presentations may be submitted to Planning & Development Services by 4:00 p.m., March 17, 2017 or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation must notify Planning & Development Services by 4:00 p.m., March 23, 2017. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw(s) as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.

REBATES TO HELP ALBERTANS TAP SOLAR RESOURCES

The Alberta government is creating a \$36-million rebate program for solar installation on residential and commercial buildings.

Homeowners, businesses and non-profit organizations will receive rebates for rooftop solar panels that meet the Residential and Commercial Solar Program requirements as early as this summer.

"There's a lot of buzz in Alberta around small-scale solar. This program will make solar power affordable for more Albertans, leading to new panels on 10,000 Alberta rooftops by 2020. Along the way, we will create jobs and local expertise in an emerging industry." - Shannon Phillips, Minister of Environment and Parks and Minister Responsible for the Climate Change Office

Solar uptake has doubled in Alberta since 2015, bolstered by initiatives like the Alberta Municipal Solar Program and the On-Farm Solar PV Program.

Over the next five years, the Residential and Commercial Solar Program will build on these existing programs. By 2019, the new program is expected to:

- support the creation of 900 jobs in Alberta's solar sector
- cut solar installation costs by up to 30 per cent for residences, and up to 25 per cent for businesses and non-profits
- reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the province by about a half million tonnes, the equivalent of taking 100,000 passenger vehicles off the road

To ensure Albertans receive timely access, the government is posting a Request for Proposal to identify a third party to deliver the new program. Details will be defined in coming months, including qualifying systems, installation and eligibility requirements.

"The Energy Efficiency Advisory Panel heard that Albertans wanted this program. The Prairies have the best solar resources in Canada, and there are a lot of potential investment opportunities. This is the first of several programs that will help create jobs and diversify Alberta's en-

ergy economy into clean sources of energy." - David Dodge, Chair, Energy Efficiency Alberta

"Albertans are ready to go solar, with growing demand, a world-class solar resource and an eager and capable solar industry. A sustained government push has been the missing piece for creating local jobs and clean energy in our province." - Rob Harlan, Executive Director, Solar Energy Society of Alberta

Quick facts

- "Solar photovoltaic" is the scientific term for cells that convert sunlight into electricity.

- Non-profits interested in applying must be registered under the Federal Business Corporations Act and be incorporated and in good-standing under the Societies Act of Alberta, the Agriculture Societies Act, Companies Act – Part 9, or the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act.

- On Dec. 21, 2016, the Government of Alberta amended the Micro-generation Regulation to provide more flexible rules for Albertans generating their own electricity. This increased the size limit of a micro-generation system from one megawatt to five megawatts and allows a solar array to serve adjacent sites (especially helpful for operations with more than one building).



FARM SAFETY WEEK

Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operators and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.

• Failure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.





FARM SAFETY TIPS

- Hire right – hire the right person and pay them fairly rather than hire an unqualified person for less money then pay for their liability and errors.
- Get a check-up – make sure every worker is checked up on at least every two hours
- Know the code – the Code of Practices for Farm Safety (PEI) has set the industry standard for agriculture
- Train for safety

Entanglements

° The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

° Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

- Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.
- Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.
- Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.

° Ensure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.

° Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.

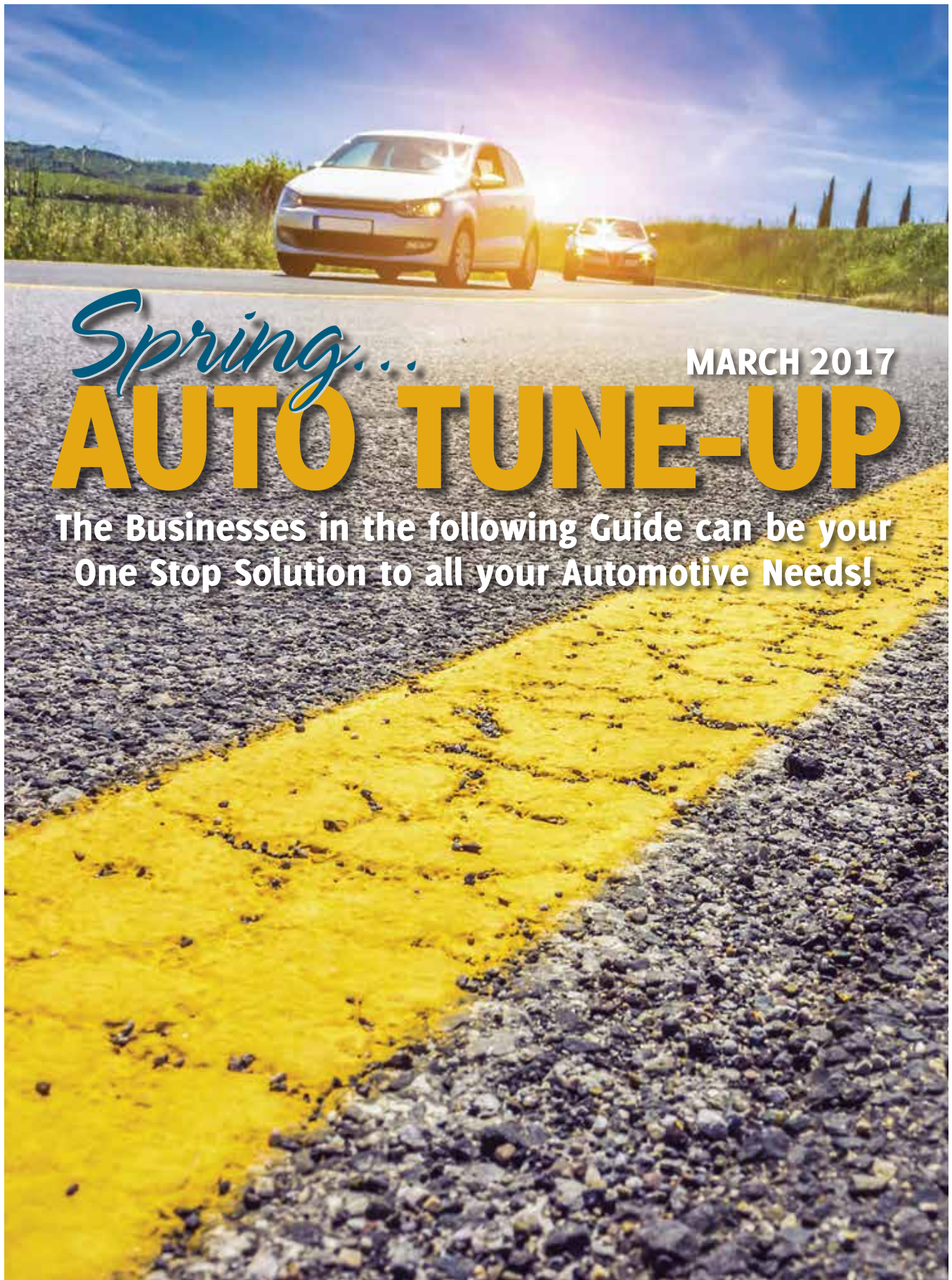

SIMPLE MAINTENANCE PROJECTS TO KEEP CARS RUNNING SMOOTHLY

One of the ways to keep vehicles running strong for years on end is to adhere to the manufacturer's recommended maintenance schedule. Although there are many factors drivers cannot control, including recalls, weather and road conditions, proper maintenance is something drivers can control, and maintaining a vehicle can be very simple.

Oil Changes

Motor oil lubricates the engine and keeps it in good working order. Old oil becomes more viscous and can lose its efficacy. While changing motor oil is important, motorists should follow the owner's manual or the factory maintenance schedule regarding how often it needs to be changed, as all vehicles are not alike. The old myth that cars and

trucks need oil changes at set intervals has changed as digital check capabilities have evolved.

Car computers can now keep track of more than just mileage. Computers now track starts and stops and trip durations to determine when cars need oil changes.

Coolant Levels

Coolant helps prevent vehicles from overheating and also prevents the water that it mixes with in the radiator from freezing or boiling. Coolant is nearly as important as motor oil in vehicle maintenance. Coolant is typically comprised of a 50/50 mix of distilled water and antifreeze. These two substances work together to maintain a proper ratio of heat energy and prevent eventual breakdown and destruction of the

engine.

Coolant is usually changed once per year or at 30,000 miles. This keeps the coolant working properly and will help prevent corrosion and deposits from forming inside the cooling system. Coolant levels might be checked during a full-service oil change appointment.

Check Battery Contacts

Many modern car batteries do not require a lot of maintenance. However, one problem that may occur is a buildup of minerals or corrosion from leaking battery fluid on the contacts. In such instances, use a battery cleaning brush to clean the contacts and then replace the cables.

Tire Maintenance

Properly inflated, balanced and rotated tires make for a smooth,

safe ride. Check that tires are wearing evenly and that the vehicle is not pulling to one side. A lack of tread on tires requires they be replaced. Because tires can be expensive, many drivers put off routine tire maintenance. But this can be a costly mistake. Tires that are worn or not properly inflated can cause skidding, problems braking and accidents. Blowouts also may occur, putting drivers, their passengers and fellow motorists in danger. It's best to be proactive with regard to tire maintenance.

Maintaining a vehicle in adherence to manufacturer guidelines can prolong the life of the car, improve its safety and increase its trade-in or resale value.

FUEL EFFICIENT CARS, TRUCKS AND SUVs

Automobiles impact the environment in various ways. According to National Geographic, cars consume a lot of energy even before they make long road trips, with perhaps 80 to 90 percent of their environmental impact stemming from fuel consumption and emissions. These factors can increase air pollution levels and create greenhouse gases that contribute to climate change.

With this in mind, eco-friendly motorists are increasingly purchasing vehicles with smaller carbon footprints. These include makes and models that have stricter emissions control and vehicles that are more fuel-efficient. Hybrid or electric cars can often drive further before fueling or recharging than less efficient models.

When shopping for new or preowned vehicles, individuals can research cars and trucks that have earned high marks for fuel economy. Various organizations, including the U.S. Department of Energy, Consumer Reports and Kelly Blue Book, routinely rank vehicles based on gas mileage figures and emissions ratings. In 2016, Consumer Reports looked past U.S. Environmental Protection Agency figures and the claims offered by manufacturers with regard to vehicles noted for their fuel efficiency. Consumer Reports measured precise fuel-flow with a device spliced directly into the fuel line. Testing occurred on both a public

highway at 65 mph, as well in a simulated urban/suburban track. Consumer Reports has identified these vehicles as their top picks for energy consumption.

- **Mitsubishi Mirage:** In the subcompact division, this vehicle features a fuel economy of 37 mpg. With its very low sticker price, it can be a smart choice for eco- and budget-conscious buyers.

- **Volkswagen Jetta Hybrid:** This car marries both a battery-powered electric motor and a traditional seven-speed manual transmission. The hybrid earns an overall 37 mpg rating. It's a little bigger than many compact sedans, creating a very comfortable ride.

- **Ford Fusion Hybrid:** With an upscale look, the Ford Fusion Hybrid boasts an overall 39 mpg

and comfortable seats to go with a quiet cabin.

- **Lexus NX 300h and RX 450h:** Lexus earns top marks for fuel economy for both its compact and midsize SUVs. Both deliver an overall mpg of 29.

When ranking their picks for vehicles with high fuel economy, FuelEconomy.gov, the official U.S. government resource for fuel economy information, lists the Hyundai Ioniq Electric, BMW 13 BEV and Tesla Model S AWD- 60D as the most efficient cars. Those who prefer a truck or SUV will find the Chevrolet Colorado 2WD, Chrysler Pacifica Plug-In Hybrid and the Nissan Rogue Hybrid FWD as top contenders.

Fuel-efficient cars and trucks continue to pave the way for more eco-friendly living.

The type of safety eye protection you should wear depends on the hazards in your workplace. If you are working near hazardous radiation (welding, lasers, or fibre optics) you must use special-purpose safety glasses, goggles, face shields, or helmets designed for that task.

Farm Safety Tips

When farming please follow these precautions in order to keep yourself, your family and your workers safe:

- Decrease your risk of being crushed by using lockout procedures before beginning any maintenance or repair work. Lockout means to physically neutralize all energies in a piece of equipment. Machines, devices or power transmission lines can be de-energized by applying blocks to all parts under tension or pressure, bleeding the hydraulic pressure from the lines or by releasing pressure from a coil or spring.
- Provide a safe, fenced play area for all children and supervise closely. The working area of the farm is not a playground any more than a construction site or other industrial area would be a play area. Review the safety rules on your farm with your family often. Fence off all manure, retaining ponds and dugouts, and lock buildings containing hazardous goods.







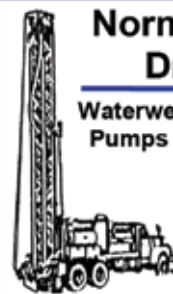
