WHITECOURT RCMP INVESTIGATE ROBBERY AT PINE PLAZA LIQUOR

Whitecourt RCMP are looking for public assistance to identify additional suspects and a SUV after a staff member was bear sprayed at the Pine Plaza Liquor Store yesterday.

Whitecourt RCMP responded to the robbery report at 9:45 pm on May 6th after three males attempted to steal liquor from the Pine Plaza Liquor Store, located at 3732 Kepler Street in Whitecourt. When the staff member exited the store in an attempt to get a license plate from the suspect's vehicle, she was confronted and sprayed with bear spray. The three suspects stole one bottle of alcohol and fled in a dark colored SUV which was last seen traveling toward Fox Creek.

Two of the suspects, a 27 year old manand 14 year old male youth, were located walking near Fox Creek. Both males were arrested and are currently being

held in custody pending a bail hearing. The third suspect and SUV have not been located.

The victim was transported to the Whitecourt Hospital by ambulance to be decontaminated and has since been released to recuperate.

RAILWAY SAFETY ACT REVIEW



OTTAWA - Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents of a review of the Railway Safety Act, which is being conducted one year ahead of schedule. To carry out this review, the Minister of Transport has appointed a panel, which is tasked with engaging a broad range of stakeholders from across the country.

"Considering some of the ongoing safety issues in our riding of Yellowhead in which CN trains block crossings for unacceptable amounts of time, I am encouraging all residents and stakeholders with a vested interest in rail safety to provide their views to the Review Panel," stated MP Eglinski.

UNHARVESTED CROPS

Mother Nature can be unpredictable. Farmers know that they're at the mercy of favourable weather, no matter the season. If it's seeding time they need moisture. If it's harvest season they need all the sunny days they can get to haul in bumper crops.

While nature's unpredictability is a major factor in producing crops, one thing is predictable: our government will always have our farmers' back when dealing with testy and challenging farming seasons.

Growing up on a farm, I know farmers work hard to bring the best yield of crops every year, but sometimes their best efforts could be subjected to the vagaries of weather and markets. I heard the concerns brought forward by the crop commissions when I spoke with them recently and I commend them for reflect-

ing the views of their members. I value farmers' input on how we can best address this situation through the important work of Agriculture Financial Services Corporation.

I have asked AFSC to streamline its inspection process and its officials have done so because we both recognize that there's a need to respond in a timely manner to inspections.

Boots are on the ground, with 120 folks in the full swing of onfarm inspection. Inspectors are actively working on wildlife and pre-harvest claims.

I also know that AFSC on farm inspection and branch staff will be proactively contacting clients to set up required inspections to ensure we are moving through the process in a timely manner.

I am pleased that AFSC has agreed to reduce the number of required field counts when appraising wildlife damage and potential production on the unharvested acres, and to rely on the inspector's judgement to do more counts when required.

I know that in situations where AFSC has determined a crop is unharvestable (e.g. severely lodged or not marketable) a zero yield will be assessed.

I've been assured by AFSC officials that their staff will process claims on a crop-by-crop basis if there are delays in assessing total production of the different insured unharvested crop types in order to provide cash flow to producers.

Dealing with the unharvested acres is a priority for AFSC and all available adjusting staff are being deployed to the affected areas to move through claims as quickly as possible.

These actions will help producers spend less time worrying about last year's crop, and more time preparing for the growing season.

The success of our farmers and our rural communities is essential to Alberta's success, and through existing programs and services our government is committed to helping farmers make their lives better.

DISABILITY AWARD INCREASE FOR VETERANS

OTTAWA: MP Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to hear that veterans with a Disability Award from Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) will receive an additional, tax-free, lump sum payment. The maximum Disability Award is increasing from \$314,723.89 to \$360,000.

This measure comes into effect on April 1, 2017.

The Disability Award provides injured Canadian Armed Forces members or veterans with a one-time, tax-free payment for the pain and suffering associated with an injury or illness resulting from military service. The Disability Award is paid in recognition of these non-economic effects, of service-related disabilities on the

lives of Canadian Armed Forces members and veterans.

For those who have already received a Disability Award, no application is necessary to receive the additional lump sum payment. Veterans who received a Disability Award and are getting monthly program benefits from Veterans Affairs Canada, as well as those who received a Disability Award payment within the last two years will automatically get a letter explaining the amount of their additional lump sum payment by mid-April.

Any veterans who received a Disability Award more than two years ago and who are not currently receiving monthly program benefits from Veterans Affairs Canada are encouraged to contact the Department immediately to confirm their address and banking information.

To calculate the amount of the one-time lump sum additional payment, the new maximum Disability Award amount that will go into effect on April 1, 2017 will be

adjusted by Consumer Price Index for each year back to 2006 – which is the year the New Veterans Charter was implemented. The amount of the one-time lump sum additional payment will be the difference between this adjusted amount and the Disability Award and/or Death Benefit amount already paid.

If veterans would like to manage their information online and receive communication regarding their Disability Award increase along with other benefits and services, they can register for My VAC Account at www.veterans. gc.ca/myVACaccount. Through this on-line service, veterans will be able to provide information, if required, to expedite the additional lump sum payment. VAC will reimburse eligible veterans for financial advice on how to manage or invest the money.

"Our veterans have served our country valiantly, and I am pleased they will be receiving the services and support they need, and deserve", concluded MP Eglinski.


The review will focus on examining existing provisions and programs under the Act, including their suitability, adequacy, and effectiveness. This is necessary to ensure the Act's core objective of ensuring rail safety for Canadians is met.

A final report from the panel is expected by May 2018.

"Canada is a large country

that relies on investment, openness and trade for its economic success. We need to ensure that people and products can move quickly and safely, while respecting the safety of local residents," concluded MP Eglinski.



Authentic hands-on learning gives NGPS students competitive edge in high demand industries

NGPS students are receiving industry standard training thanks to Dual Credit funding and partnerships. A combination of online, face-to-face and on rig instruction by industry professionals provides students with comprehensive coverage of the oil and gas industry, safety protocols, service rig operations and the duties

Nine NGPS students - four from Mayerthorpe High, two from Hillside High, two from Hillside High, two from Fox Creek, recently made the trip to Bonnyville for a week-long, hands-on training session on Northern Lights School Division's (NLSD) training rig.

NGPS students who are interested in the Dual Credit Service Rig or Oilfield Operator programs can earn from 5 to 14 high school credits and receive a certificate from NLSD certifying that they have completed the industry standard training.

OJSH GRADE 8 "CULTURAL EXCHANGE"

In light of Education Week which was May 1st to 5th, we are taking a

peek into OJSH's youngest students – the Grade eight classes.

What happens when one Grade 8 Social Studies class finishes their Japan "Edo" unit and another grade 8 class finishes their Aztec unit at the

same time? The answer: the classes have a cultural exchange!

Grade 8 Social Studies curriculum explores the concept of intercultural contact and develops historical thinking skills through a study of past societies in different parts of the world. Mrs. Barr-Stierman's Grade 8 class just completed studying the Edo period of Japanese history. Ms. Wallace's grade 8s just finished their unit on the Aztecs. After being challenged at a PD day to create a new type of learning experience for their students, the two OJSH Social Studies/ English teachers decided to combine their classes for a cultural exchange of ideas.

Each class divided up into small groups and intensively researched a cultural or political aspect of what they had been studying. In addition to creating a project to share with their classmates, each student group had to create a five question worksheet for others to fill out as they viewed each project.

The student groups from Ms. Barr-Stierman's class went to each of the approximately 10 student stations of Ms. Wallace's Aztec class. The groups were given about 2 to 3 minutes at each station to hear explanations of the project, to ask questions of the project group and to fill out their worksheets.

Once all the groups had circulated through the projects and filled in their worksheets, "banker" students gave each participant their wages: a coffee bean.

Then, Ms. Wallace's class culturally travelled to Mrs. Barr-Stierman's class to view those projects, ask questions, fill out worksheets and learn about the Edo period of Japan. Once again, each student group was given about 2 – 3 minutes to accomplish this. Once all the groups had circulated through the projects and completed worksheets, they were allowed to use their wages – the coffee bean – to purchase teriyaki beef and rice as well as coloured tortilla com chips and salsa.

The students were engaged in their learning, displayed an in depth knowledge of historical cultures that they had studied and had fun sharing their knowledge with their peers.



VIMY RIDGE

From April 2 to 7, 2017, over 125 youth aged 14-17 from every corner of Canada travelled to Ottawa to take part in a remarkable, once –in-a-life-time opportunity with Encounters with Canada. Although Encounters with Canada runs programs throughout most of the year, this particular session was of particular historical significance as the theme was the Battle of Vimy Ridge.

OJSH Grade 12 student Celine Sewepagaham was in Ottawa at Encounters for Canada for this special week. "The Vimy: Canada's Coming of Age" week was an in-depth look at Canada's participation in the First World War, with seminars and debates on the Canadian Corps, the capture of Vimy Ridge, Canada's 100 Days, the conscription crisis and the home front, Canada's new identity following the First World War and the legacy of Vimy.

Celine attended many ceremonies to commemorate Vimy Ridge: at the National War Cemetery, the Mayor of Ottawa's commemorative ceremony, and a noteworthy one with Governor-General David Johnston at Rideau Hall. WATER QUALITY MONITORING ON STURGEON RIVER

TRAINING PROVIDED FOR VOLUNTEERS TO COLLECT DATA

The CreekWatch program is coming to Lac Ste. Anne County, and volunteers are invited to participate. CreekWatch is a progressive province-wide program that connects communities with the citizen science relevant to their local natural areas. Volunteers work as part of a team to research and answer the question "How healthy are our creeks?"

Since 2014, the CreekWatch Program has worked with corporate and

community volunteers to collect water quality data and improve habitat. These activities contribute in meaningful ways to the understanding and management of urban natural areas.

CreekWatch engages volunteers in authentic science. Volunteers collect weekly data at specified walk-in sites along Alberta's waterways. Each volunteer team has the use of a portable water quality lab for collecting data on dissolved oxygen, phosphates, nitrates, chloride, pH, temperature and turbidity. CreekWatch provides the leadership, science instruction and equipment for a safe and quality

experience. Data comparisons help highlight urban impact upon our local waters throughout the open water season March-October.

CreekWatch publishes an annual report card that grades Alberta waters in a comparison of their scoring for each water quality test. The accumulated thousands of data points – combined with hundreds of volunteer hours – truly amounts to something wonderful thanks to each person's incremental contribution!

In a bid to attract new volunteers, CreekWatch is hosting a training event scheduled for Friday evening, June 9, 2017.

"This is a great opportunity for adults and their children to work together on a project," shared Reed Froklage, Citizen Science Coordinator for the RiverWatch Institute of Alberta. HOW TO GRAFT A FAVORITE PLANT

Plants can be propagated in various ways, including grafting. Grafting involves slicing off a piece from one plant and connecting it to another to create a new plant. Grafting can be an interesting hobby, and even novice gardeners can become skilled at grafting.

Grafting is actually botanical surgery. The grafted parts eventually grow together to form a single grafted plant, which will produce leaves, a stem, flowers or fruit on top known as a scion. The bottom part of the graft is known as the rootstock.

Production of grafted plants requires time, and grafting involves more than just propagating plants from seeds or cuttings. But the benefits of grafting include the propensity for grafted plants to flower or bear fruit more quickly than traditional plants. Grafting also can help a plant thrive, by selecting a root system adapted to a particular climate. Grafting is particularly advantageous when one wants to produce a plant that is an exact duplicate of the parent plant. Planting from seeds can produce inconsistent results.

If grafting seems like something you want to try, consider the following tips.

- Seek help from experienced grafters. Many grafters work at nurseries or in the research field. If they're too busy to work with you, you can likely find a video online that can show you the proper techniques.
- Invest in a quality, sharp knife. According to horticulture expert and teacher Dr. Malcolm Manners, grafting requires very sharp cuts. The knife needs to be razor sharp for it to be effective. Dull knives and cuts can sabotage your grafting efforts.
- Do test cuts first. Before you decide to work on a plant, select a trial stem to prac-

tice on. This can give you a better feel for making smooth, precise cuts.

• Purchase high-quality rootstock plants. The rootstock plant is the plant that provides a root system and base. Rootstock is bred to have certain qualities, whether it's to put more plant energy into producing flowers or

fruit or to be more durable.

- Choose compatible plants. Not every scion can be grafted on every rootstock. You likely will need a related species or genus for success. Speak with a horticulturist if you need assistance.
- Work quickly so that grafts do not dry out. As you

become more experienced, this will be easier to do.

Grafting is a technique that can produce true plants and may help generate new but similar species. Plant lovers may want to give it a try and see if grafting is for them.

SMART WATERING CONSERVES WATER AND SAVES MONEY

Summer heat can be harmful in various ways. People and pets can quickly succumb to the summer sun, which can cause sunburn, heat exhaustion and heat stroke when people and their animals spend too much time outdoors without adequate protection.

Landscapes are also vulnerable to summer heat, which can quickly spoil the most lush lawns and robust gardens. Effective watering can help lawns and gardens withstand summer heat, but improper watering can deprive landscapes of the water they need to survive. Homeowners concerned about their lawns and gardens surviving the summer can take the following approach to conserve water, save money and maintain their landscapes.

· Start early. Homeowners may

feel that the hottest times of the day are when lawns and gardens will be most in need of water, so that's the best time to set sprinklers or grab the hose and get to work. But in many areas, watering between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., when summer temperatures tend to peak, can be both wasteful and ineffective. That's because watering between those hours will cause much of the water to quickly evaporate, robbing lawns and gardens of the water they need to withstand the heat. Homeowners who water when water is most likely to evaporate may feel they need to water more, and that only wastes

It's best to consult a local landscaping professional in your area to determine the best time to water each day, but in many regions the best time to water is between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m., when temperatures are generally lower, the sun is not at its peak and winds are not as strong.

· Place sprinklers correctly. If you do not have an in-ground irrigation system and don't intend to install one, you will likely use lawn sprinklers to water the lawn. When placing these sprinklers, turn them on and then document their trajectory before moving on to the next area. You want to make sure the water from the sprinklers is not landing on sidewalks, patios or streets, especially if your community typically institutes drought restrictions that limit how much you can water. In such instances, you'll need to make the best use of the water you're allowed to use, so make sure none of it is watering the driveway.

· Let well-fed lawns go dormant during drought. Lengthy droughts tend to be accompanied by water restrictions, and such restrictions can frustrate homeowners who don't want to see all of the hard work they've put in to this point go to waste. But grass that has thus far been well cared for can withstand drought and still recover when rains once again fall and temperatures cool come autumn. If you plan to let the lawn go dormant, keep kids, pets and visitors off the grass, as dormant lawns are highly susceptible to damage.

Summer is an enjoyable time of year, but lawn and garden enthusiasts may be concerned for their properties when summer heat sets in. A few simple strategies can help lawns make it through the season unscathed.

BREAK GROUND WITH THE RIGHT TOOLS

The right tools for the job can be the difference between an interminable landscaping project and one that goes smoothly and efficiently. Aspiring landscapers probably have a few shovels and rakes hanging in their garages and sheds for basic landscaping work. But while such tools are effective for certain projects, when it comes to churning soil for garden beds or digging holes for outdoor structures, additional tools come in handy. It may be well worth a trip to a nearby home center to purchase or rent one of these tools ideal for breaking ground.

Rototiller

A rototiller, sometimes called just a "tiller," is a powered garden tool designed to loosen soil prior to planting. A rototiller also can help aerate soil during the growing season. Because they reduce the need for manual spade digging or hoeing, tillers can be useful landscaping tools, particularly for homeowners who want to work efficiently.

Rototillers will break through tough soil and any plant roots. They come in a variety of sizes, and it's best to match the tool to the size of the job. Many homeowners can get by with smaller, less powerful models, especially if the tiller is only necessary at the beginning of planting season. Professional landscapers or those with large swatches of property may benefit from larger models.

Auger

Augers, both mechanical and manual, are essentially large drill bits that help move materials from one location to another. Augers are typically used to cut holes in landscapes, and they are good for post-hole drilling, which is part of the process of installing deck footings, fencing posts or other structures. Augers come in a variety of sizes, and homeowners can choose how much power they prefer. Augers can be heavy and cumbersome, and many do-ityourselfers will find that one-person augers are more than adequate for their projects.

Augers dig deep holes, so it is always smart to have the property surveyed prior to use. This way pipes, gas lines, buried electrical lines, and any other obstructions are clearly identified prior to drilling.

Cultivator

Cultivators are similar to tillers in that they loosen soil. Cultivators are effective during the growth period of plants, when they can be used to aerate the soil and remove weeds. Cultivators come in handheld versions and push models, and some are even motorized. Cultivators get close to plants to remove weeds without disturbing the plant. They also are used to stir in compost or fertilizer.

While many people think cultivators and tillers are the same, that is not the case. The former is less powerful and will mix the soil or stir up the top layer, while the latter can break up moderately hard ground and loosen firm soil.

When using any tools around the garden, wear the proper protection. This includes devices to protect hearing when power tools are in use as well as gloves and safety goggles. Tillers, augers and cultivators have the potential to toss soil and rocks into the air, so make sure others keep their distance while work is in progress.
