Regamey has been remanded into custody and is scheduled to appear in Stony Plain Provincial court on June 21, 2017.





PASTURE WALK AND TALK - FROM UPLANDS TO LOWLANDS A FIELD DAY WITH COWS AND FISH

Now is a good time for landowners to walk their property and evaluate their management practices. On Wednesday, June 28th Riparian Specialists Norine Ambrose and Jennifer Caudron are bringing their expertise in the assessment and management of that vital green zone of plants that protects our creeks, rivers, and lakes. Cows and Fish works with landowners to foster a better understanding of how improvements in grazing and other management of riparian areas can enhance landscape health and productivity. While this field day has a focus on livestock producers, anyone with an interest in how riparian areas function are welcome to attend.

The day includes a mix of indoor conversation and hands-on



assessment in the field. Learn to identify common riparian plants, tune your eyes to what "health" looks like in a riparian area, see how nest boxes and wildlife friendly fences can enhance habitat, and take home ideas for management strategies that will work on your land. Through Lac Ste. Anne County's ALUS program, agricultural producers may be eligible for funding to implement conservation projects, this field day is an excellent opportunity to start thinking about project potential.

The field day runs from 11am to 4pm. The \$10.00 registration fee includes lunch and everyone takes home a copy of the plant identification book Northern Range Plants. Culvert Replacement - A tender for the replacement of a culvert on Township Road 570, West of Hwy 32 (for a tributary to the McLeod River) was awarded to Prairie Erectors International Inc. for \$334,775.

Municipal Historic Designations Approved – Council approved applications for Municipal Historic Resource Designation for the Matthews United Church in Peers built in 1927 and the Cooper Barn, built in the 1950's. This is a step towards declaring the sites a Municipal Historic Resource under the Historic Resources Act.

Public Golf Course Public Hearing – A Public Hearing for Bylaw 6.17 was held to rezone a property, located south of Hwy 16 near Millers Lake (SE-06-53-19-W5,) from Rural District to Recreational Use District for a proposed public golf course. One letter was received expressing concern over increased traffic, dust, and property taxes, although there was a showing of support for this development during the public hearing.

Subdivision Public Hearing – A Public Hearing was held for Bylaw 07.17 for a property east of Edson (Part of the NW 19-53-

FIVE TOP GOLF TIPS TO HELP BOOST YOUR GAME

(NC) When it comes to golf, it's the little things that can have the biggest impact on your game. Whether it's your first attempt, or 10th season, golf expert Bob Weeks has got you covered at the links this summer with these five tips:

Choose the right clubs: Regardless of your experience or skill level, choosing the right equipment can be the difference between duffing it and striking the ball straight down the fairway. It's important to work with a professional to get the clubs best-suited to your game and then, to have them custom fit. You should be fit for the length, loft, lie angle, shaft flex and even the grip size. If your clubs aren't custom fit, it will be like walking around in shoes that are the wrong size.

Get on the ball: Choose the right kind of golf ball for your game. While golf balls all look the same, it's what's inside that determines if it's right for you. Golf balls fall into two categories: distance or control. Distance balls are generally twopiece balls with a large core and a cover. They are harder and better suited for higher handicappers or beginners. Control balls, usually three- or fourpiece balls, are softer and spin more meaning they will land on the green and stop. More skillful players should use these.

Consider the elements: Weather is always a factor in golf and dealing with it must always be considered. For instance, in cold temperatures, the ball will travel shorter distances, so take more club. The opposite is true for warmer temperatures. If you're playing into the wind, swing easy as that will keep the ball from spinning too much and rising up into the breezes. And downwind, make sure to judge the intensity of the breezes so you can choose the proper club. Your ball will roll further than normal on a downwind shot so take that into account.

Putting and chipping is priority: Lots of players like to boom their drives and will spend a lot of time on the range hitting their drivers. But if you want to improve your scores, you should spend more time working on your putting and chipping. Since most average players miss a lot of greens, the best way to save strokes is by chipping it close and making more putts. Focus more on your short game than your drive and you will improve.

Play the 19th hole: Win or lose, there's no better way to celebrate than hitting the 19th hole. Less is often more in golf and the same applies when considering what to eat and drink after a round. HOW TO HELP KIDS GET INTO GOLF

Golf is a game of skill that can take years, if not decades, to master. Many golfers find their time on the golf course both rewarding and relaxing, even on those days when the fairways seem impossible to find.

Though many players never swing a golf club until they reach adulthood, it's never too early to hit the links. Some of the world's most accomplished golfers, including four-time Masters champion Tiger Woods, began playing as toddlers, and many feel that getting an early start can lead to a more successful game down the road.

Getting kids into golf is a great way for parents to bond with their children while enjoying the great outdoors. Golf can also be used to teach kids humility, sportsmanship and the importance of hard work. Thanks to the often frustrating nature of golf, parents may find it somewhat challenging to instill a love of the game in their youngsters. But there are ways to introduce kids to this wonderful game that kids might just play for the rest of their lives.

• Focus on having fun. Few, if any, golfers at your local golf course on a given weekend could say with certainty that golf has never frustrated them. The challenge of golf may be its most appealing characteristic to older players, but young kids can be easily overwhelmed by the challenges golf presents. By focusing on having fun instead of perfecting techniques, parents can get kids to look forward to their time on the links. The more fun kids have, the more likely they will be to embrace the game and its many challenges. Don't put pressure on youngsters as they develop their games, but encourage them through their struggles and reassure them that you faced the same obstacles when you started playing.

• Hire an instructor with experience teaching children. Instructors with experience teaching children will understand the basics of the game and how learning those basics provides a great foundation for future enjoyment and success on the course. Instructors who have taught kids in the past also know that teaching youngsters the finer points of golf requires patience and encouragement. Ask a fellow parent or an employee at the club where you play to recommend an instructor for your child. And take advantage of any kids' courses your club offers.

• Purchase the correct equipment. Even the best golfers are bound to struggle when using the wrong equipment. While it might be unwise to invest in especially expensive equipment for youngsters likely to grow out of it in a few months' time, deals can be found on used kids' equipment. Used kids' equipment is typically subjected to less wear and tear than used equipment for adults, as kids tend to play less often and fewer holes than adults when they do play. But make sure to find correctly sized equipment that kids feel comfortable using.

• Play some holes. Instructors may teach kids the differences between the types of clubs and how to swing and putt. But golf is most fun when players are out on the links going from hole to hole. Instruction is important, but don't forget to play a few holes with your child each week as well.

Golf is a challenging game, but it's one that can be enjoyed by athletes of all ages.


