ENVIRONMENTAL DAMAGES FUND

Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP – Yellowhead

OTTAWA - Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of a call for applications to the new Environmental Damages Fund through Environment and Climate Change Canada. The program is making \$130,741 available in Alberta to support projects that help to restore or enhance the environment, conduct environmental research, and provide public ed-

ucation on environmental issues.

In Alberta, there are two types of funding available. The federal government has made \$20,000 available for projects aimed at preventing pollution and/or protecting the environment.

Additionally, \$110,741 is available for projects which promote the proper management and control of fisheries or fish habitat, and/or the conservation and protection of fish or fish habitat in Alberta. Preference for this funding will be given to projects in the Athabasca water-

shed or adjacent watersheds in Alberta, and in the North Saskatchewan River Watershed.

"I am pleased to see the federal government investing in areas of our riding where environmental damage may have occurred along the North Saskatchewan River Watershed," stated MP Eglinski.

Eligible applicants include: non-governmental organizations; academic institutions; indigenous organizations; and provincial, territorial and municipal governments. The deadline

for projects in Alberta is July 28, 2017. Priority funding will be given to projects that restore the natural environment and conserve wildlife.

"I encourage all those interested in this program, especially those along the North Saskatchewan River, to apply. Let's ensure that our riding of Yellowhead continues to represent the best of Alberta's beauty," concluded MP Eglinski.

Anyone who has ever had the not so distinct pleasure of purchasing Ikea furniture is well acquainted with the pain and anguish endured while "easily" assembling their new Pong, Krikey or Pith purchase. It personally has taken me two days to assemble one dresser, every part being placed in every possible, conceivable position before resembling the picture, that has been helpfully labelled so well in Swedish. Well, this pain has entered a new level when this same

person attempts to assemble a museum exhibit that has made its rounds around Canada. Broken thingees, busted bracketroos and instructions that are written both in French and English that equally, make absolutely no sense. Eventually, with the help of two very forgiving assistants a new exhibit has been assembled at the Tipple Park Museum!

EARLY MORNING DISTURBANCE AT THE EDMONTON INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

On June 30, 2017 at approximately 5:50 a.m. the Edmonton International Airport (EIA) RCMP Detachment was called

for assistance with an individual who was attempting to get past the American pre-boarding screening area.

As airport staff and an RCMP member attempted to restrain the male he assaulted an RCMP

member and a US Customs Officer. When the subject did not comply with demands, an RCMP member on scene deployed the conducted energy weapon (taser) to gain control of the individual. The male was placed under arrest and lodged in cells for processing. No injuries were sustained.

This was an isolated incident with no threat to the public.

ACCIDENTAL BEARSPRAY CONTAMINATION RESULTS IN TERMINAL EVACUATION

Leduc, Alberta - An apparent accident led to the four people being exposed to bearspray and an area of Edmonton International Airport being evacuated on July 8, 2017

At approximately 8:30 pm, Edmonton Airport RCMP were called to a waiting area in the airport for reports of a contaminant in the air. Investigators responded and located a man coming out of a washroom who was suffering the effects of having been exposed to bearspray. After interviewing the man and reviewing security footage, the investigators have determined that the man found a can of bearspray in a liquids disposal receptacle at the check in area. The man, unaware of what the can was, sat in a waiting area and inadvertently released some of the spray onto himself and into the air. The man then went to a washroom to decontaminate himself and was quickly found by officers.

One child and 3 adults were treated for exposure to the bear-spray in addition to the individual that had sprayed himself. Due to the bearspray contaminating the air, a portion of the airport was evacuated, causing some disruption to airport operations.

At this time, investigators do not believe this was a criminal act and charges are not anticipated.

INVESTMENTS IN LOCAL WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of further investments in local water infrastructure.

A new project in Parkland County has been approved under the Government of Canada's Clean Water and Wastewater Fund (CWWF). The federal government is providing over \$6.3 million, while the Capital Region Parkland Water Services Commission will fund the remainder of the nearly \$24 million project.

SEARCH WARRANT **RESULTS IN CDSA ARREST**

On June 29th, 2017 the Stony Plain / Spruce Grove Drug Section executed a search warrant at a residence in the city of Spruce Grove. As a result, police seized 44 grams of cannabis resin, \$1100 in Canadian currency, a small quantity of marihuana, a small quantity of cannabis oil and drug trafficking parapher-

Brennan PAGE of Spruce Grove was arrested and has been charged with possession of cannabis resin for the purpose of trafficking, possession of cannabis oil for the purpose of trafficking, possession of marihuana and possession of property obtained by crime under \$5000. PAGE was released from custody and is scheduled to appear in Stony Plain Provincial Court later this month.

The water commission will now be able to begin work on a multi-phase system twinning project. The first phase will involve the construction of approximately four kilometers of new waterline from the EPCOR Utilities supply point to Acheson Industrial Park. This project will help meet the increased water demands of the Capital Region Parkland Water Services Commission as well as the West Inter-Lake District Water Commission and the Paul First Nation and Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation.

In addition to this project, federal funding through CWWF has been announced for the following communities in Yellowhead:

- Brazeau County Project name: New Sewage Trunk Line - Federal funding: \$165,000 -Municipal funding: \$165,000
- Clearwater County Project name: Lift Station Rehabilitation - Federal funding: \$290,000

- Municipal funding: \$290,000
- Mayerthorpe Project name: Water Treatment Plant Improvement Project - Federal funding: \$634,000 - Municipal funding:

NEW REGIONAL ON-RESERVE WATER LINE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of an investment for a new regional on-reserve water line and water infrastructure.

The investment, which is made in partnership with all three lev-

els of government, will connect the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation to the West Inter Lake District regional water supply system, as well as construct a potable water supply line, pumphouse, and treated water reservoir. The federal government plans to invest approximately \$10 million to support the completion of the project, which is part of a commitment of \$1.8 billion over five years for water and wastewater.

The Alberta government is investing \$7.15 million to complete the Alexis Nakota Sioux water tie-in project connecting the regional water system to the reserve. This project is part of Alberta's \$100 million commitment over four years to ensure Alberta First Nations have ac-

cess to clean and safe drinking water.

"Everyone should have access to safe running water. I am proud to see investments being made to support one of our local Indigenous communities, promoting the health and wellbeing of the community," concluded MP Eglinski.

LIBERALS FAIL ON SOFTWOOD LUMBER

Submitted by Jim Eglinski. MP – Yellowhead On April 25th, the U.S. Department of Commerce imposed

countervailing duties as high as 24% on Canadian softwood


lumber imports.

During the last dispute, over 15,000 jobs were lost and the Canadian forestry industry had to pay \$5.4 billion in duties. It was our previous Conservative government that negotiated an agreement to end that dispute within three months of coming into office in 2006, as well as negotiated the 2012 extension of the deal through to October 2016.

In Alberta, the forest industry employs over 19,000 people, the majority of which are in our riding of Yellowhead, and in Canada, 370,000 jobs are directly or indirectly tied to the forestry sector. It is upsetting to me that, even with all those jobs at stake, negotiating a new softwood lumber agreement has never been a priority for this Liberal government.

Last Fall, I asked the government what action they were taking to ensure stability and predictability for Canadian forestry workers with the response that they will "defend our Canadian workers." They have known since November that the United States was planning to launch trade action against Canada. Yet, instead of proactively defending hardworking Canadians, the Liberals failed to negotiate a new Softwood Lumber Agreement and are putting almost 400,000 jobs across the country

The Liberal government is failing to create jobs and grow the economy, and have now failed forestry workers and their families, jeopardizing their livelihoods.



RAILWAY SAFETY ACT REVIEW

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents of a review of the Railway Safety Act, which is being conducted one year ahead of schedule.

To carry out this review, the Minister of Transport has appointed a panel, which is tasked with engaging a broad range of stakeholders from across the country.

"Considering some of the ongoing safety issues in our riding of Yellowhead in which CN trains block crossings for unacceptable amounts of time, I am encouraging all residents and stakeholders with a vested interest in rail safety to provide their views to the Review Panel," stated MP Eglinski.

The review will focus on examining existing provisions and programs under the Act, including their suitability, adequacy, and effectiveness. This is necessary to ensure the Act's core objective of ensuring rail safety for Canadians is met.

A final report from the panel is expected by May 2018.

"Canada is a large country that relies on investment, openness and

trade for its economic success. We need to ensure that people and products can move quickly and safely, while respecting the safety of local residents," concluded MP Eglinski.

CONSULTATION BROADBAND INTERNET

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) is conducting a public consultation on a new fund to bring broadband internet access to Canadians living in underserved areas in the country.

Broadband internet access service is necessary for Canadians to fully participate in the digital economy and empowers them as citizens, creators and consumers. "While most are well-served, many Canadians, including those in the rural areas of our Yellowhead riding, do not have access to broadband internet access services that are comparable to those offered to the vast majority of Canadians in terms of speed, capacity, quality and price," stated MP Eglinski.

Last December, the CRTC issued an important decision following the Let's Talk Broadband proceeding during which more than 50,000 Canadians provided their views on the telecommunications services they need to participate in the digital economy. In this decision, the CRTC announced that broadband internet access service is now considered a basic telecommunications service for all Canadians. New ambitious targets were set and a new funding mechanism was announced.

Today, the CRTC published a Notice of Consultation to examine the eligibility and assessment criteria to be used in the assessment of funding applications as well as the governance structure of the new funding regime. GOLFER'S GUIDE

DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

- 1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.
- 2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.
- 3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a

stretch in the side of your back.

- 4. Hold for 15 seconds and repeat twice for each side.
 - Shoulder stretch
- 1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.
- 2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds.
- 3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder and arm.
- 4. Hold for 15 seconds.
- 5. Reverse hand positions and repeat.

FIVE TOP GOLF TIPS TO HELP BOOST YOUR GAME

(NC) When it comes to golf, it's the little things that can have the biggest impact on your game. Whether it's your first attempt, or 10th season, golf expert Bob Weeks has got you covered at the links this summer with these five tips:

Choose the right clubs: Regardless of your experience or skill level, choosing the right equipment can be the difference between duffing it and striking the ball straight down the fairway. It's important to work with a professional to get the clubs best-suited to your game and then, to have them custom fit. You should be fit for the length, loft, lie angle, shaft flex and even the grip size. If your clubs aren't custom fit, it will be like walking around in shoes that are the wrong size.

Get on the ball: Choose the right kind of golf ball for your game. While golf balls all look the same, it's what's inside that determines if it's right for you. Golf balls fall into two categories: distance or control. Distance balls are generally two-piece balls with a large core and a cover. They are harder and better suited for higher handicappers or beginners. Control balls, usually three- or four-piece balls, are softer and spin more meaning they will land on the green and stop. More skillful players should use these.

Consider the elements: Weather is always a factor in golf and dealing with it must always be considered. For instance, in cold temperatures, the ball will travel shorter distances, so take more club. The opposite is true for warmer temperatures. If you're playing into the wind, swing easy as that will keep the ball from spinning too much and rising up into the breezes. And downwind, make sure to judge the intensity of

the breezes so you can choose the proper club. Your ball will roll further than normal on a downwind shot so take that into account.

Putting and chipping is priority: Lots of players like to boom their drives and will spend a lot of time on the range hitting their drivers. But if you want to improve your scores, you should spend more time working on your putting and chipping. Since most average players miss a lot of greens, the best way to save strokes is by chipping it close and making more putts. Focus more on your short game than your drive and you will improve.

Play the 19th hole: Win or lose, there's no better way to celebrate than hitting the 19th hole. Less is often more in golf and the same applies when considering what to eat and drink after a round. PROTECTING WOODLAND CARIBOU

Caribou in west-central Alberta. The Aseniwuche Winewak Nation, located near the Town of Grande Cache, has been granted \$102,590 by Environment and Climate Change Canada through the Aboriginal Fund for Species at Risk Program.

"Having worked with CPAWS in the past regarding the Woodland Caribou, I am excited to see important work being done to protect our local populations," stated MP Eglinski. "This project will aim to engage the people of the Aseniwuche Winewak Nation of Canada in the preservation and recovery of the Woodland Caribou in and around our riding of Yellowhead."

This current project targets two Species at Risk Act-listed species of Woodland Caribou namely the Boreal population (Threatened), which is an Aboriginal Fund for Species at Risk regional priority species, and the Southern Mountain population (Threatened). Proposed project activities include local community engagement in species at risk monitoring and management activities by skill-specific training for Aseniwuche Winewak Nation members to conduct data collection and activity monitoring during key migration periods.

"Community engagement and local monitoring is an important step in protecting the habitat of species at risk and the preservation of biodiversity within our forests. Together, we can achieve great things and protect the abundance and variety of life that is part of our country's natural heritage," concluded MP Eglinski.




