


Did you know?

SOLVING HOMELESSNESS – HAVE YOUR SAY

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of an online engagement process that has been launched by the Advisory Committee on Homelessness to gather feedback and ideas from Canadians on how to prevent and re-

duce homelessness in Canada.

"Homelessness is a nationwide issue and our riding of Yellowhead is no exception. Therefore, I want to encourage residents to share their views and ideas," stated MP Eglinski.

All Canadians are invited to participate through the online survey and by sharing their stories before the end of August 2017. The Advi-

sory Committee will consider the feedback and ideas from the engagement process and will provide the Minister of Families, Children and Social Development with options for the redesign of the Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS).

MOUNTAIN PINE BEETLE NEEDS TO BE ERADICATED BEFORE IT IS TOO LATE

I have, on numerous occasions, brought forward in Parliament the devastation happening in Jasper National Park by the mountain pine beetle infestation. From the west along Mount Robinson to the east park gates, the park has been overtaken by this endemic. The dead trees are a tremendous fuel load for possible fires, not only risking the safety of visitors and residential/commercial property, but also the livelihood of wildlife found in Jasper National Park.

As the Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, I am aware of the devastation caused by the mountain pine beetle in Alberta. I have toured Jasper Park from entrance to entrance, and brought my concerns to the attention of officials at all levels -- from local park officials up to Minister McKenna's office in Ottawa. I have been told they have a plan.

After reading Multi-species Action Plan for Jasper National Park of Canada (Proposed), published by Parks Canada to protect seven species identified as threatened or endangered under the Species at Risk

Act (SARA), I dare to ask, what will happen to Whitebark Pine trees and the Woodland Caribou and other wildlife and foliage if the pine beetle infestation is not dealt with?

The Minister of the Environment and Climate Change, the Honourable Catherine McKenna is responsible under Section 47 of SARA for species found in Jasper Park. The above-mentioned proposed report states "...the Species at Risk Act (SARA) prohibitions protecting individuals and residences apply automatically when a species is listed, and all critical habitat in national parks and national historic sites

must be legally protected within 180 days of being identified." It goes on to say: "These documents provide guidance for the recovery of individual species, including strategy direction, recovery objectives, critical habitat, and threats."

The mountain pine beetle is a threat. It is a threat to the survival of the Whitebark Pine trees, the caribou and all wildlife in Jasper Park.

NEW DAIRY INVESTMENT PROGRAMS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local farmers of two new investment programs aimed at dairy producers and processors.

The programs will help the sector increase productivity and competitiveness and prepare for the implementation of the Canada–European

Union Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA), which was negotiated by the previous Conservative Government and will establish greater access for European cheeses into Canada.

The first is a five-year, \$250 million Dairy Farm Investment Program to help Canadian cow's milk producers improve productivity through upgrades to their equipment. All producers of cow's milk – irrespective of the size of their operations – are welcome to apply. This program will cover up to 50% of approved project costs, up to a maximum of \$250,000. Applications will be accepted as of August 22.

The second is a four-year, \$100 million Dairy Processing Investment Fund that will provide funding to help the Canadian dairy processing sector make investments to improve productivity and prepare for increased competition in the domestic market as a result of CETA. Not-for-profit organizations involved in the dairy sector

can also apply. Applications are now being accepted.

"Local farmers are key contributors to and important members of our communities. I encourage all eligible producers to take advantage of this investment opportunity," concluded MP Eglinski.

LEDUC FIRE SERVICES WOULD LIKE TO HEAR FROM ITS CUSTOMERS

Leduc Fire Services is putting out a call to any individuals, and their family members, who have received emergency medical services from the local department in the past year.

"We know medical emergencies can be stressful for our customers, so we've developed a means for our patients and their families to let us know of their experience," says Deputy Fire Chief Shane Christensen. "The input we receive will then be used to help improve our emergency medical services here at Leduc Fire."

The Emergency Medical Services survey lists a handful of questions ranging from overall service satisfaction and customer care to cleanliness of the ambulance.

BREAK & ENTER RESULTS IN ARREST AND CHARGES

Leduc, Alberta - On July 29th, 2017 at approximately 1:51 AM, Leduc and Edmonton International Airport RCMP responded to a complaint of a Break and Enter in progress at the Gate Gourmet building, located on 36th Street at the Edmonton International Airport. RCMP were able to locate the suspect and entered into an investigation which resulted in the arrest of one male and 27 Cartons of Cigarettes were recovered.

Mostapha Hodeib, of Edmonton, was arrested and charged with Break Enter and Theft. Hodeib was released to appear in Leduc Court on September 20th, 2017.

"As we are an integrated emergency service, assistance can be delivered via fire rescue vehicle or by ambulance so that's important to remember," says Christensen.

Survey results will not only be used to help enhance emergency service delivery, but will also be used as part of fire service's requirement with Accreditation Canada – a voluntary national program to help improve quality, reduce risk and strengthen accountability within the emer-

gency medical profession.

"For us, public participation in this survey is essential to help us identify where and how we can improve our service to this community and the Edmonton Metro Region," says Christensen.

Leduc's eligible voters in the upcoming municipal election will have a few options in how they cast their ballot this fall. Returning Officer Sandra Davis says this municipal election will offer new and updated methods for voters, such as electronic vote tabulators and mail-in ballot.

"Participating in Leduc's municipal election is an opportunity for citizens to shape the direction of this community for today and for future generations," says Davis. "The new efficiencies we're introducing are designed to assist voters."

Voter eligibility

- Must be a Canadian citizen
- Must be 18 and older
- Must be a resident of Alberta for six months before the election

and a resident of the City of Leduc on Election Day

Voting methods

• Special ballot (mail-in) is available to eligible voters unable to attend a voting station during Advanced Vote (Oct 12 and 14) or on Election Day (Oct. 16) for one of the following reasons: physically incapacitated, absent from the City of Leduc or an election worker/official. All Special Ballots will be issued after Nomination Day and

must be received by the Returning Officer before 7 p.m., Oct. 16, 2017

- Institutional voting stations will be set up at five city locations: Salem Manor, Extendicare Leduc, Leduc Hospital, Planeview Manor, and Lifestyle Options.
- Advanced vote will take place Oct. 12, 2017, noon – 8 p.m. at the Leduc Civic Centre, and Oct. 14, 2017 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. at the Leduc Recreation Centre.
- Election Day is Oct. 16, 2017 and with seven voting stations assigned to neighbourhoods. Visit Leduc.ca/election for the map.

FUNDING TO PROTECT LOCAL BATS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS) Canada has been approved to receive \$30,000 towards a project to protect local bats. The funding is being delivered through the Habitat Stewardship Program Species at Risk Stream, which is administered by Environment

and Climate Change Canada.

The project will locate critical and important bat habitats to address the threat of a fungal disease called White Nose Syndrome in two species listed as Endangered on the Species at Risk Act – the Little Brown Myotis and the Northern Myotis.

White Nose Syndrome propagates in cool, humid conditions, and grows on bats while they hibernate in caves. It induces them to come out of hibernation, groom, and fly more than they

would naturally in the winter, expending the valuable energy that they need to survive and causing massive die-offs.

The project will take place across Alberta where the bats have been documented, including two national parks. WCS will engage the local caving community to locate bat habitats and refine a database of potential hibernation habitats to serve as the foundation for an action plan to address White Nose Syndrome

"Though we rarely see them, bats play important roles in our local ecosystem, eating insects and pollinating plants. I am pleased to see investments being made towards the protection of our local wildlife populations," concluded MP Eglinski.

HEALTH ADVISORY - BLUE-GREEN ALGAE (CYANOBACTERIA) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR PIGEON LAKE

EDMONTON - A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in Pigeon Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

- Avoid all contact with blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.
- Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where bluegreen algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.
- Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.
- Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Pigeon Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae (cyanobacteria). An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is naturally occurring, and often become visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), or who ingest water containing blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea.

Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Pigeon Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Pigeon

Lake in which the blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Blue-green Algae (Cyanobacteria) Advisory is in place.

U OF A PARTNERSHIP DRIVES TRAFFIC SAFETY FORWARD IN CITY OF LEDUC

Building on recent successes due to enhanced traffic safety, the City of Leduc is partnering with the University of Alberta, Urban Traffic Safety Research, to conduct a study and implementation plan for the community.

"We're taking a strategic approach with traffic safety to reduce collisions and increase safety for our residents, visitors and emergency service personnel alike," says Leduc Mayor Greg Krischke. "Statistics show that our efforts to improve traffic safety are working. Results from this study will hopefully guide future policy-makers that will assist this organization in reaching our traffic safety goals."

Leduc's traffic safety rating in the annual Allstate Safe Driving Study* jumped from 68 on the list in 2015 to 11 in 2016; ranking Leduc as the third safest municipality in the Edmonton Metro Region.

"We are extremely pleased to be rated in the top three safest communities, and we know statistically this can

be attributed to the overall successes we've witnessed within the Municipal Integrated Traffic Unit (MITU)," says Mayor Krischke. "Since 2015, we've seen a steady decline of both injury and fatal collisions, as well as other traffic occurrences; and this U of A study will enable the MITU to continue with their mandate to improve road safety."

Within the City of Leduc boundary includes a 6 km stretch of Highway 2, which is known to be one of the busiest highways in Alberta.

"Highway 2, when responding to an emergency, is probably one of the most dangerous locations for our personnel," says Leduc Fire Chief George Clancy. "The safety of our first responders is paramount. We need to explore other proactive measures to keep motorist safe, as well as each member of our crews."

The city is also looking at other enhancements to its traffic safety plan that include public education with a distracted driving conference this fall, and awareness campaigns with local schools similar to the Safety Star Video contest.


