# RCMP Police Service Dogs Work Hard In The Fight Against Fentanyl

"As Alberta's provincial police force, the RCMP plays a vital role in keeping Albertans safe," says Minister Ganley. "Training police service dogs to detect fentanyl will help authorities intercept this drug before it makes it onto our streets, as well as protect police officers and members of the public from dangerous overdoses through accidental



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contact. I applaud the RCMP for this initiative, and Alberta is proud to be the home of its national police dog training program."

The demonstration featured police service dog Eve, a purebred German shepherd, led by her handler, Corporal Dan Block, through a series of challenges. When Eve, recognized the odour, she provided a sit confirmation to signal her discovery to Cpl. Block. For the purpose of this demonstration and for safety precautions a diluted form of fentanyl was used.

In recent years, Canadian law enforcement agencies have reported significant increases in fentanyl related seizures and a high occurrence rate of fatal overdoses. In 2016, Alberta Health Services reported 368 fentanyl-related deaths and 241 in 2017, from January 1 to June 30.

"Fentanyl has had a devastating impact on families and communities across the country and in Alberta," says Deputy Commissioner Shean. "The training given to police service dogs at the National Police Dog Service Training Centre is one of the ways that the RCMP is working to counter the presence of illicit drugs in our communities, ensuring the safety of Albertans and Canadians."

Police service dogs, who have been a valuable asset to the RCMP since 1908, play a critical role in keeping Canadians safe. The canines are trained in a variety of capacities, including: locating lost persons; tracking criminals; searching for narcotics, explosives, illicit alcohol.

The issue of fentanyl and illicit opioids remains a top concern for the RCMP nationally and within the province. To that end, the RCMP will continue to collaborate with domestic and international law enforcement partners to pursue criminal networks fueling this public health epidemic and keep Canadians safe.

## August 29, 2017 FIRST INSTALLMENT OF FEDERAL GAS TAX DELIVERED TO PROVINCE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that the Federal Government has delivered the first of two annual \$109.5 million federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) installments to Alberta.

In total, the province will be provided with over \$219 million this year through the fund. The Federal Government has announced that the funding, which flows through the provincial government to all of its municipalities, is now available to support community infrastructure projects.

"Community infrastructure helps to connect people to jobs and it provides access to better community services, attracts new businesses and creates economic growth," stated MP Eglinski.

GTF funding is allocated to municipalities on a per capita basis. Municipalities can pool, bank and borrow against this funding, providing significant financial flexibility. Unspent capital funds may be carried forward a total of five years.

Based on previous years, GTF funding supports approximately 250 local infrastructure projects across Alberta each year. The allocations in the riding of Yellowhead are as follows:

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# HOW TO PREVENT MOLD **GROWTH IN YOUR HOME**

Mold plays an important role in nature. Mold breaks down dead organic matter, including fallen leaves, and speeds up the decomposition process so nutrients can return to the soil as quickly as possible. But mold inside a home can be a formidable foe, triggering allergic reactions and increasing a person's risk of developing respiratory problems. Mold can even cause damage to a home by attaching itself to wood and breaking down that wood.

Because the consequences of mold growth inside a home can be so dire, it's important that men and women take steps to prevent mold growth in their homes and apartments. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency notes that controlling moisture levels in a home or apartment is the key to controlling mold as well.

Address spills quickly and properly. Many instances of mold infestations can be traced to leaks or spills that were not quickly or properly addressed. The EPA advises that wet or damp materials or areas should be dried within 24 to 48 hours to prevent the growth of mold. Make sure spills are thoroughly cleaned as opposed to a cursory cleanup of only the areas visible to the naked eye. Inspect nearby crevices when spills occur to ensure the area where the spill happened and all surrounding areas vulnerable to mold growth are dry. In addition, fix leaky plumbing fixtures immediately, hiring a professional if necessary.

Inspect the ground surrounding your home. Factors outside a home can sometimes contribute to mold growth within a home. Make sure the ground outside your home slopes away from the foundation. If the ground slopes toward your home, rainwater or runoff from sprinkler systems may direct water into your home, creating conditions favorable to mold growth inside. Gutters and downspouts also should be inspected to ensure they are working optimally. If not, they can contribute to water damage on the roof that can ultimately lead to mold growth.

. Monitor indoor humidity. The EPA advises that homeowners keep indoor humidity below 60 percent relative humidity, which can be measured with humidity meters available at many hardware stores. Homeowners who can keep indoor humidity at levels 30 to 50 percent

below relative humidity might be even more successful at keeping indoor mold growth at bay.

Dry wet surfaces immediately. Surfaces can become wet even if a home has no leaky fixtures and no spills have occurred. For example, the surfaces of bathroom walls, ceilings and floors get wet when a home's inhabitants take hot baths or showers. That condensation is natural, but such surfaces are also susceptible to mold growth. Make sure to dry wet surfaces immediately, and keep exhaust fans on or windows open when bathing to decrease the likelihood of mold growth.

Mold growth can be detrimental to human beings and their homes. But many mold infestations are easily prevented.



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# CREATE DRAMA WITH BOLD PAINT COLORS

Painting is one of the easiest and least expensive ways to transform the look of a space. Paint colors can dramatically change the mood and the design of a home. And depending on a homeowner's goals, paint can make a statement or blend into the background.

Many people are now looking to bold colors to make spaces stand out. But choosing a paint color can be challenging. Homeowners looking to update walls and complement decor may want to look at some of the more impactful colors that Pantone indicates will be popular for the 2017 season. Primrose Yellow, Lapis Blue, Flame, Pink Yarrow, and Greenery are some of the more eye-catching selections. Once colors are selected, consider these guidelines for using bolder colors in room designs.

• Decide how big an impact you want to make. Are you looking for color overload or just a small focal point of vivid color? Remember, using bold color doesn't mean every wall must be lathered in that hue. Instead, select one wall to serve as an accent point and use that spot as your bold color display. Otherwise, rely on bold colors to dress up otherwise mundane areas, such as the back wall of a cupboard or moldings and trim.

• Try bold in a small space. Many people are surprised at how well bold colors work in small spaces. Powder rooms can be an ideal spot to experiment with paint colors. Try deep colors that can make the area seem intimate and even exotic. Dark, bold hues can be toned down by different accents, such as neutral colored fixtures and towels.

• Go bold in the kitchen. Incorporate a splash of color in the kitchen without going overboard. Try an appliance or design fixture in a bright shade. Or paint the inside of the cabinets in your favorite color and install glass inserts in the cabinet doors so that everyone gets a peek of the color beyond. A neutral kitchen also can be brightened up with the use of silverware, dishes, pots and pans, and other kitchen items featured in bold hues.

• Stick to boldness on interchangeable items. Those who like to experiment with color may find that they like to switch out the colors now and again. Instead of having to repaint every few months, use decorative items in bright shades to make swapping out color that much easier. For example, replace area rugs, throw pillows and draperies. Paint over terra cotta flower pots when the mood strikes.

• Establish balance. Rely on neutral furniture, rugs, moldings and baseboards if you decide to take bold colors up a notch. This will help create a sense of balance in the room.

Painting is a fun way to experiment with color. Many homeowners are not hesitant to use bold shades of color when they learn the right techniques. And because paint is an inexpensive option for making over a room, homeowners who find they do not like a particular color can easily paint over it with a new color.





# WHAT TO LOOK FOR DURING ROOF INSPECTIONS

Cold weather can be tough on a home, and perhaps no part of a home is more vulnerable to harsh winter weather than its roof.

Fallen snow can equate to several pounds of pressure placed on a residential roof. Roofs do not often collapse under heavy snowfall. But adverse winter weather conditions can compromise roofs in other ways. Water leakage and damage to the roof's interior are just two of the potentially problematic issues that can arise when roofs are battered by cold, blustery weather. That's why many home improvement specialists advise homeowners to conduct roof inspections prior to the start of winter.

Many homeowners can conduct their own cursory roof inspections, but they may not know exactly what to look for. The National Roofing Contractors Association says that there are certain key areas to inspect that may reveal some telltale signs of roof damage.

• Curled, cracked or missing shingles may prove troublesome. Inclement weather can test the strength of even the most durable roofs. Even though many roofs are designed to last up to 30 years, some may need to be replaced early, particularly when they have been exposed to harsh weather over a period of years. Individual shingles can be replaced as spot treatments, but if the damage is widespread, a new roof may be necessary.

• Attic leaks or water elsewhere might signal issues with the roof. Figure out if water inside the home is coming from the roof. Water stains do not always indicate problems with the roofing, but it's better to be safe

#### than sorry.

• Look for protective granules wearing off. If gutters are filled with the sandy granular material that coats roofing shingles, that may be a sign of an aging or damaged roof.

• Inspect flashing. Professional roofers can recognize properly installed flashing, the material that connects the roof to other parts of the house that adjoin the roof, like skylights or a chimneys. Poorly installed flashing can cause leaks. Stains that appear below chimneys or near attic windows may indicate new flashing, and not new shingles, is needed.

• Gutters and downspouts should be in good condition. A roof is the sum of its parts, and that includes downspouts and gutters. If the gutters are clogged or damaged, they cannot direct water away from the house properly. Snow, leaves and other debris needs to be cleared from gutters to help them function at optimal capacity.

• Animals and insects can cause damage, too. It's not just poor weather that homeowners need to consider with regard to roof damage. Boring insects and animals may cause problems with roofs as well. A roof inspection may shed light on potential pest problems. Holes or nesting materials may indicate that an animal or animals are using the attic as a shelter from the elements.

Get to the root of issues with your home's roof before they become bigger problems once winter arrives. A thorough inspection can reveal problems that may prove costly if ignored.

August 31 is International Overdose Awareness Day, a global event to raise awareness of overdose and reduce stigma of drug-related death.

In Alberta, opioid related overdoses are occurring at an alarming rate. Fortunately, many overdose deaths are preventable if medical help is given when you first begin to notice any symptoms. Here are the signs of an opioid overdose:

• Their breathing is slow or they may not be breathing at all

- Body is very limp
- You can't wake them up
- Blue lips and nails
- Skin is cold and/or clammy
- Gurgling or snoring sounds
- Choking or throwing up
- Pupils are tiny
- Seizures

If you come across someone or are with someone who may

be overdosing, call 911 and, stay with them until we arrive. They may need your help while the ambulance is on its way. Due to the Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act people who experience or witness an overdose and who call 911 for help will receive some protection under the law.

While you wait for help, keep checking on them. Are they breathing? If not, begin rescue breathing. Are they responding or breathing on their own? If they are still unresponsive and you have naloxone – follow the step by step instructions and administer naloxone. Naloxone can temporarily reverse the symptoms of an opioid overdose.

# AHS WARNS ABOUT CALLER ADVISING BREAST SELF-EXAM

EDMONTON/NORTH – Alberta Health Services (AHS) is warning women in the Edmonton area and northern Alberta to be aware of misleading telephone calls regarding breast cancer screening results.

AHS has received reports eight women in the Edmonton, Barrhead and Athabasca areas have received a phone call from a man claiming to be from a medical imaging facility. The caller relays breast screening exam followup information and advises an immediate breast self-exam must be conducted while on the phone.

Although AHS representatives may call to discuss a mammography appointment, they will never ask a patient to conduct a breast self-exam over the phone.

If you receive a phone call from anyone requesting you complete a breast self-exam while on the phone, please hang up, note the time and any other call details, and immediately contact local police on their non-emergency line.

If you are uncomfortable with calling police directly or are uncertain whether the call is legitimate, you can call AHS' Screening Program Client Support Line at 1-866-727-3926.

AHS has informed law enforcement and encourages anyone who has experienced this issue to please work with their local police or RCMP.

# ANNOUNCED PROPOSED CHANGES TO CANADA'S TAX SYSTEM TARGETS SMALL BUSINESS OWNERS

Starting a small business is not easy and the Liberal government's proposed changes to Canada's tax system is making it harder for small businesses to continue operating. When small businesses are successful they benefit the broader community by growing the economy and creating jobs. Increasing the tax burden on these job-creators will decrease the incentives for individuals to take important risks and rob people of their livelihood.

On July 18th the Trudeau Liberals announced proposed changes to Canada's tax system that target small business owners – farmers, restaurant owners, retail and convenience store owners, as well as important service providers such as accountants and doctors.

Canada already has one of the highest effective tax rates on business investment in the G7. Business owners already pay tax twice: first when their business earns money from sales and then again when they withdraw money from the company for their personal use. Two years ago, when the Liberals took office they increased the tax rate on investment income by over 17%.

The Liberals are hoping to have legislation passed as early as October. If passed, small businesses, farmers and their employees will suffer as a result. This could make it more difficult for Canadians to find a family doctor, increase the costs of local produce at the grocery store, discourage young Canadians from starting their own businesses, and make Canadian businesses uncompetitive. This may result in many small businesses making hard decisions resulting in layoffs, fewer working hours, and reduced health insurance and other employee benefits. It will also make it more expensive, if not impossible, for parents to pass on family businesses or farms to their children due to these proposed tax changes.

Justin Trudeau says a "significant portion" of small businesses serve as a screen for wealthy Canadians who want to avoid paying taxes and that is "unfair." Does he really understand business and the economy go hand-in-hand?

Small business owners do not have job security, employment benefits, employer sponsored pension plans, employment insurance, sick days or vacation days. As a result entrepreneurs rely on their ability to save from their earnings to retire. These proposed changes will also be retroactive without the ability for taxpayers to plan ahead.

Justin Trudeau is out of touch with the plight of farmers, professionals, small business owners and their employees—a demographic that makes up nearly 97% of Canadian businesses and approximately 70% of Canada's workforce.

Our Conservative Party believe taxes should be lower for all Canadians: for businesses, families, and individuals. This is a core part of our Conservative vision of prosperity and opportunity for all Canadians.
