

TELEVISION SERVICE PROVIDER CODE TAKES EFFECT

OTTAWA: MP Eglinski is pleased to inform residents that, as of September 1, 2017, the Television Service Provider Code will come into effect. The Code was created to help Canadians make informed choices about their television service provider and resolve disputes in a fair and effective manner.

"During last year's Let's Talk TV proceedings, many people expressed their frustrations over television service providers not providing adequate information about service packages and pricing," stated MP Eglinski. "Now, consumers will not only have access to that information, but they will also have access to an effective platform to make complaints about the delivery of service."

Starting in September, television service providers must:

• Provide customers with a Critical Information Summary and a copy of the agreement which includes a list of channels or packages they subscribe to, their monthly charges for services, the commitment period and how to file complaints.

- Clearly set out the duration of promotional offers, the regular price once any discounts end, and any obligations placed on a consumer if they accept the offer, such as a minimum commitment period.
- Provide customers with a timeframe and information on any potential charges regarding service calls for installations and repairs.
- Give thirty days' notice to consumers in the event of a change in price of channels, bundles of chan-

nels or rental equipment.

The Commission for Complaints for Telecom-television Services (CCTS) will administer the Code. Complaints can be filed using an interactive questionnaire at www.ccts-cprst ca.

"When it comes to television services, Canadians should have flexibility and choice in their programming – programming with reasonably priced services that meet the diverse interests of Canadians and protect Canadian jobs," concluded MP Eglinski.

OLD AGE SECURITY REPORT

The old age security program: should it be revised in order to keep it sustainable? OAS is funded through annual tax revenues whereas CPP is paid through payroll deductions.

The chief actuary's report forecasts spending to hit about \$247 billion by 2060 — five times what it is slated to be this year — due to an impending re-

tirement wave of baby boomer workers and people living longer.

Our previous Conservative government raised the age of eligibility for OAS to 67 from 65 to save on costs by encouraging people to work longer. The Liberals reversed the decision in their first budget, saying the Tories had made the change without any data to support it.

A February presentation to a group of deputy ministers said "younger

generations may be required to pay higher taxes" to cover a shortfall between tax revenues and OAS spending if the retirement age remains at 65, Canadians live longer and there aren't enough new workers to replace the ones who are going to retire.

The actuarial report suggests that spending as a percentage of the overall economy would rise by 2030 and fall through to 2060 as economic growth and resulting tax revenues offset rising

costs.

Costs to the program are also expected to be offset by an expansion to CPP that the chief actuary estimates will mean \$3 billion less in spending on the Guaranteed Income Supplement in 2060 and reduce overall spending on OAS benefits, which are scaled back above \$75,000 in annual income.





Since 2011, my wife Judy and I live on an acreage at Lessard Land-



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CHANGES COMING TO IMPAIRED DRIVING LAWS

The Government of Alberta will look at implementing changes to impaired driving legislation to save lives and reduce injuries.

Recently, the Alberta Court of Appeal ruled that part of Alberta's current impaired driving sanctions are unconstitutional. Specifically, the ruling stated that suspending licences until a matter is resolved in court infringes on an individual's Charter rights.

The Government of Alberta is not appealing the court's decision in R. v Sahaluk and will be exploring other legislative models and strategies across Canada.

"Impaired driving is a crime that claims nearly twice as many lives each year in Canada as all forms of homicide combined. The court is allowing the current sanctions to remain in place until May 2018, which means police officers are still able to suspend licences in impaired driving situations.

The Government of Alberta plans to have ongoing conversations with key stakeholders before bringing any new impaired driving legislation forward.

- In 2012, the Government of Alberta amended the Traffic Safety Act so that drivers with a blood alcohol concentration over 0.08 or those who refuse to provide a breath sample would have their driver's licence suspended until the criminal charge is resolved.
- In 2011, there were 78 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2012, there were 78 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2013, there were 80 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2014, there were 68 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.



All that's needed is a serrated blade or bread knife. Cut the batt to fit the cavity and press into place. Aim for an R-50 or a depth of 16 inches.

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

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NEW GRAIN TESTING PROGRAM AVAILABLE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local farmers of an alternative service delivery program from the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) for grain testing.

The REGAL (Recognition of Export Grain Analysis by Au-

thorized Laboratories) program will provide exporters the option of having their grain shipments to certain countries tested for phytosanitary purposes by authorized private laboratories.

The new program will initially be focused primarily on grain exports to India and China because these countries represent the highest export volumes from Canada. Strong oversight mech-

anisms will provide assurance to importing countries that Canada remains committed to the highest standards for grain exports.

The CFIA will remain solely responsible for issuing phytosanitary certificates for export shipments of grain.

"Canadian grain is in demand and trusted around the world. This new testing program will provide farmers with more options to ensure the integrity, health and safety of our food system," conclude MP Eglinski.
