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OLD AGE SECURITY REPORT

The old age security program: should it be revised in order to keep it sustainable? OAS is funded through annual tax revenues whereas CPP is paid through payroll deductions.

The chief actuary's report forecasts spending to hit about \$247 billion by 2060 — five times what it is slated to be this year — due to an impending retirement wave of baby boomer workers and people living longer.

Our previous Conservative government raised the age of

eligibility for OAS to 67 from 65 to save on costs by encouraging people to work longer. The Liberals reversed the decision in their first budget, saying the Tories had made the change without any data to support it.

A February presentation to a group of deputy ministers said "younger generations may be required to pay higher taxes" to cover a shortfall between tax revenues and OAS spending if the retirement age remains at 65, Canadians live longer and there aren't enough new workers to replace the ones who are going to retire.

The actuarial report suggests

that spending as a percentage of the overall economy would rise by 2030 and fall through to 2060 as economic growth and resulting tax revenues offset rising costs.

Costs to the program are also expected to be offset by an expansion to CPP that the chief actuary estimates will mean \$3 billion less in spending on the Guaranteed Income Supplement in 2060 and reduce overall spending on OAS benefits, which are scaled back above \$75,000 in annual income.



2016 LIST FOR LIVESTOCK TAX DEFERRAL PROVISION RELEASED

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local farmers that the final list of designated regions for 2016 under the Livestock Tax Deferral Provision has been released from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.

"Our area – Parkland County in 2015, for example – has experienced local agricultural disasters in recent years. I have seen the results of drought brought on by weather conditions and the financial toll it can take on our farmers," stated MP Eglinski.

The livestock tax deferral provision allows producers in the designated drought regions who are facing feed shortages, to defer a portion of their sale proceeds of breeding livestock to the next year. The cost of replacing the animals in the next year offsets the deferred income, thereby reducing the tax burden associated with the original sale.

Eligible producers can request the tax deferral when filing their 2016 income tax returns, or if they have already filed, submit an adjustment request directly to the Canada Revenue Agency.

"Both past and present members of our Conservative Caucus are farmers and agricultural producers from all parts of Canada. We understand the importance of farmers and the necessity of tax relief programs, such as this, to protect them when droughts hit," concluded MP Eglinski.



Capital Projects Update

Facility Services updated the Board on two current capital projects in the division: the modernization project for Grande Cache Community High School (GCCHS) and Mary Bergeron Elementary, the new K-5 replacement school in Edson.

Grande Cache:

The final work is being completed on the full modernization project at Grande Cache Community High School! Exterior work is mostly completed with the construction area now cleaned up and new sod was installed over the summer months. The project was approved by the Province in January of 2014, and after the last three years of hard work, the community is very pleased with their modernized building which also houses their new community/ school library.

Edson:

Construction work on the new replacement school in Edson has been full steam ahead over the summer months in order to open the doors to students and staff in time for the beginning of the 2017-18 school year. Interior work on the classrooms and administration area is almost complete. The gym and learning commons are scheduled for completion in late September/October and the playground is scheduled to start installation on August 28th. The furniture and equipment from both Evergreen and A.H. Dakin schools are being moved this week. The facility's exterior paneling and stucco work was started last week, and the parking lot and drop off loop is scheduled to be completed before the start of school. The school will be open to the public for registration on Monday, August 28th. A public open house and tour of the new school will be scheduled once the construction is complete, approximately late October.

Other News in Brief

• During the 2016-17 school year, the local RCMP detachment in Edson piloted a School Resource Officer program in Edson schools aimed to bridge the gap between the youth and the RCMP. For the pilot year, the project was fully funded under the Community Policing Agreement, reducing the number of officers serving the community and allocating that officer to the school program. Due to the pilot's success, Staff Sergeant P. King approached members of the community to seek supports to continue the program. The Town of Edson, Grande Yellowhead Public School Division and Living Waters Catholic Schools were invited to collaboratively fund the program moving forward which is approximately \$107,000. The

Board approved a one-time financial contribution of \$30,000 to support the continuation of the program for the upcoming school year.

- Trustees approved the 2017-18 Schedule of Superintendent and Monitoring Reports which outlines when information on the division's various initiatives and results is brought forward for discussion throughout the year.
- As per Policy 19 Staff Recognition, the Board was very pleased to learn that a total of 88 staff will be receiving continuous long service awards at this year's Welcome Back staff events. Celebrated annually throughout the division in the communities of Wildwood, Edson, Hinton, Grande Cache and Jasper, staff service awards are recognized in increments of 5 years congratulations to all this year's recipients!
- Amendments to Policy 21 Professional Growth of Support Staff were approved at today's meeting as per the recommendations brought forward from the C.U.P.E. Professional Growth Committee.

SECOND STAGE OF CONSULTATIONS ON FEDERAL FINANCIAL SECTOR FRAMEWORK

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched the second stage of consultations on proposed changes to the federal financial sector legislative and regulatory framework.

The Department is seeking views on potential policy mea-

sures that aim to safeguard the financial sector, to keep it competitive and innovative, and to modernize its legislative framework. "I have already heard from constituents with concerns about the impact that some of the proposed changes could have on their small businesses," stated MP Eglinski.

Last August, the Department released the first consultation paper on the proposed changes, which laid out the landscape of Canada's financial sector and identified key trends that may influence it moving forward. The second consultation paper, released last week, takes into account the comments and recommendations received from stakeholders through the first stage of consultations, as well as the trends and emerging issues that are reshaping the sector.

Interested individuals or organizations are invited to review the consultation paper and make

TELEVISION SERVICE PROVIDER CODE TAKES EFFECT

OTTAWA: MP Eglinski is pleased to inform residents that, as of September 1, 2017, the Television Service Provider Code will come into effect. The Code was created to help Canadians make informed choices about their television service provider and resolve disputes in a fair and effective manner.

"During last year's Let's Talk TV proceedings, many people expressed their frustrations over television service providers not providing adequate information about service packages and pricing," stated MP Eglinski. "Now, consumers will not only have access to that information, but they will also have access to an effective platform to make complaints about the delivery of service."

Starting in September, television service providers must:

• Provide customers with a Critical Information Summary and a copy of the agreement which includes a list of channels or packages they subscribe to, their monthly charges for services, the commitment period and how to file complaints.

- Clearly set out the duration of promotional offers, the regular price once any discounts end, and any obligations placed on a consumer if they accept the offer, such as a minimum commitment period.
- Provide customers with a timeframe and information on any potential charges regarding service calls for installations and repairs.
- Give thirty days' notice to consumers in the event of a change in price of channels, bundles of

channels or rental equipment.

The Commission for Complaints for Telecom-television Services (CCTS) will administer the Code. Complaints can be filed using an interactive questionnaire at www.ccts-cprst.ca.

"When it comes to television services, Canadians should have flexibility and choice in their programming — programming with reasonably priced services that meet the diverse interests of Canadians and protect Canadian jobs," concluded MP Eglinski.

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

TRANSFORM SPACES INTO COZY RETREATS

Cool weather often drives people to spend more hours indoors than they do during the warmer months. Autumn is a time to winterize gardens, put away lawn furniture and prepare for the holiday season. Autumn also provides the perfect opportunity to begin home interior projects.

COMPOSITE DECKING CAN BE A SMART CHOICE

Decks add character and functionality to a home, increasing outdoor entertaining space and oftentimes improving the resale value of a home. Homeowners have various options when choosing decking materials, but one such option, composite decking, is growing in popularity.

Decks used to primarily be made from pressure-treated lumber. While lumber remains a popular material, more and more homeowners are opting for composite decking products. As anyone who has pressure-washed, stained and sealed wood decks can attest, such spaces require lots of upkeep to look new year after year. Composite decks require much less maintenance, making them highly attractive to homeowners who

would rather spend time using their decks instead of maintaining them.

Composite decking is any type of decking material that is formulated from different recycled materials. The majority of these materials include hard plastic and wood shavings of pulp. Unlike wood, which can fade, crack and rot, composite decking, which has been available for roughly a decade, does not degrade quickly and requires very little upkeep.

Available in a variety of wood colors to match outdoor decor, composite decks also can feature artificial wood grains to make them look similar to wood planks. Although composite decks are not completely impervious to the elements, with some occasional

washing to impede mold growth and new technology that has improved stain-resistance, many of the pitfalls of other materials can be avoided with composite decks.

Composite decking fits in with eco-friendly lifestyles. The planks are made from recycled materials that would normally end up in landfills. Products from Trex, a popular composite decking manufacturer, are made from 1.5 million shopping bags and wood mill waste. As composite decks do not rot away and are long-lasting, they will not need to be replaced frequently, which is another eco-friendly benefit.

When comparing composite decking brands, look mainly at the colors, materials used in the composition and the fastening sys-

tems. Many are fastened with regular deck screws, offers This Old House. The newer systems have channels for hidden fastening, and the composite deck tiles snap into place.

Composite decks do have a few drawbacks. They can be expensive Ñ nearly double the initial cost of wood decks. And although they don't rot, composite planks can scratch. Without refinishing, damaged boards will need to be replaced. Harsh chemicals may fade color and damage the composite materials, so caution is needed.

Composite decking remains an in-demand choice for outdoor spaces. Low-maintenance and long-lasting, these decks have quickly become favorites among homeowners.

• Reevaluate your lighting. Lighting a space is more than just flipping on a switch. Finding the right balance of lighting fixtures can instantly transform the feel of a room. Create more warmth and a cozy feel by switching out bulbs from cooler shades to warmer ones \tilde{N} those that give off yellow and pink hues rather than cool blues.

Before you turn the furnace or boiler on, replace the air filter and hire a professional to inspect the unit more thoroughly. These steps will improve the efficiency and life of your furnace and will ensure stable indoor air quality.
- 2. Seal Windows and Doors If not properly sealed, windows and doors can be a major culprit for heat loss. To keep the warm air inside, inspect the weather-stripping around your home's windows and doors for leaks, rot or decay. Repair or replace structural framing, and caulk inside and out, if necessary.
- 3. Insulate well One of the easiest and most effective defenses against heat loss is proper insulation. Prevent cold drafts from entering and the loss of heated air through basement headers, which, when left exposed, can make your furnace work harder. Look for a moisture-resistant product offering high thermal performance, such as Roxul Comfortbatt insulation. This type of mineral wool insulation makes installation simple. All that's needed is a serrated blade or bread knife. Cut the batt to fit the cavity and press into place. The insulation will help improve energy efficiency as soon as it's in place and provide savings over the lifetime of your home. Comfortbatt can also be used to top or replace old attic insulation. Aim for an R-50 or a depth of 16 inches.
- 4. Backyard Care Save your property from potential damage by trimming overgrown trees and shrubs to prevent ice-laden branch-

es from thrashing against electrical wires and your home's exterior. Drain/shut off any exterior faucets and sprinkler systems to prevent freezing. Ensure rain or snow drains away from the house to avoid foundation problems.

5. Roof and Gutters - Inspect your

roof for shingles that are warped, damaged or even missing to prevent a future leak. Use roofing cement and a caulking gun to seal joints where water could penetrate, such as around the chimney, skylights or vent pipes. Make sure that your gutters and downspouts are securely

fastened. Downspouts should extend at least five feet away from the home to prevent flooding.

When it comes to preventative maintenance, a little time and effort can save thousands in energy costs and repair bills over the lifetime of your home.

Each sign is numbered, and anyone needing help on the river (where the signs are posted) can reference the last numerical sign they saw if they need to call 9-1-1 for help. That number will give first responders a better idea of where they are stranded on the river and help to reduce the time for first responders to locate the source of the distress call.





OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of a consultation recently launched by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada for a 600 MHz spectrum auction to support high-quality networks and business opportunities.

The proposed auction would target improved wireless mobile services in both rural communities and urban centers. Low band spectrum, such as the 600 MHz band, is well suited to carrying signals over long distances. It is also less affected by building structures than higher frequency bands, making it ideal for next-generation wireless services in both urban and rural settings.

"As I've said before, there are still many regions, especially those in the rural areas of our Yellowhead riding, that do not have access to services that are comparable to those offered to the vast majority of Canadians in terms of speed, capacity, quality and price," stated MP Eglinski.

The consultation is looking to hear from interested Canadians, as well as telecommunication service providers and consumer groups. RCMP POLICE SERVICE DOGS WORK HARD IN THE FIGHT AGAINST FENTANYL

Edmonton, Alta. - On August 22, 2017, Kathleen Ganley, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General and Deputy Commissioner Todd Shean, Commanding Officer of the Alberta RCMP, in collaboration with the National Police Dog Service Training Centre hosted a special RCMP police dog services demonstration in Innisfail, Alberta. The demonstration focused on police dogs trained to detect fentanyl.

"As Alberta's provincial police force, the RCMP plays a vital role in keeping Albertans safe," says Minister Ganley. "Training police service dogs to detect fentanyl will help authorities intercept this drug before it makes it onto our streets, as well as protect police officers and members of the public from dangerous overdoses through accidental contact. I applaud the RCMP for this initiative, and Alberta is proud to be the home of its national police dog training program."

The demonstration featured police service dog Eve, a purebred German shepherd, led by her handler, Corporal Dan Block, through a series of challenges. When Eve, recognized the odour, she provided a sit confirmation to signal her discovery to Cpl. Block. For the purpose of this demonstration and for safety precautions a diluted form of fentanyl was used.

In recent years, Canadian law enforcement agencies have reported significant increases in fentanyl related seizures and a high occurrence rate of fatal overdoses. In 2016, Alberta Health Services reported 368 fentanyl-related deaths and 241 in 2017, from January 1 to June 30.

"Fentanyl has had a devastating impact on families and communities across the country and in Alberta," says Deputy Commissioner Shean. "The training given to police service dogs at the National Police Dog Service Training Centre is one of the ways that the RCMP is working to counter the presence of illicit drugs in our communities, ensuring the safety


of Albertans and Canadians."

Police service dogs, who have been a valuable asset to the RCMP since 1908, play a critical role in keeping Canadians safe. The canines are trained in a variety of capacities, including: locating lost persons; tracking criminals; searching for narcotics, explosives, illicit alcohol.

The issue of fentanyl and illicit opioids remains a top concern for the RCMP nationally and within the province. To that end, the RCMP will continue to collaborate with domestic and international law enforcement partners to pursue criminal networks fueling this public health epidemic and keep Canadians safe.







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

ROCKY MOUNTAIN HOUSE RCMP LAY ROBBERY AND FIREARMS CHARGES

Rocky Mountain House, Alberta – RCMP have laid several charges against three different males following a lengthy incident which started with a firearms disturbance at a residence, followed by a pursuit, a robbery then another pursuit. On August 20, 2017, several

On August 20, 2017, several males brandished firearms at a res-

idence on the Sunchild First Nation, threatened the occupants, then left in a vehicle. Rocky Mountain House RCMP members responded from the Sunchild Nation and located the suspect vehicle. The vehicle fled from police, who pursued the vehicle north of the Sunchild Nation. The suspect vehicle rammed a police vehicle during the pursuit, and after fleeing the scene, the suspects attempted to steal a vehicle in

the area, but were unsuccessful. A short while later, the suspects rolled their vehicle into the ditch and departed unharmed.

An uninvolved vehicle with a female driver stopped to render assistance to the suspects, and was then assaulted by them, and her vehicle stolen. RCMP members located her stolen vehicle on the O'Chiese First Nation, managed to disable it, then arrested three male occupants without incident.

RCMP members and the suspects were uninjured during this event. The female driver attended the hospital to receive treatment for her injuries. Other assisting RCMP Units involved with this incident were the Edson Integrated Traffic Unit, Drayton Valley RCMP, and Evansburg RCMP.

Taylor Bremner, 24, and Dallas Bremner, 25, have been charged with multiple offences under the Criminal Code, including: Break and Enter, Assault with a Weapon, Assault, Uttering Threats, Flight, Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle, and Robbery.

Cruz Bigchild, 21, has also been charged with numerous offences, including: Robbery, Possession of a Controlled Substance, Breach of Probation, Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle, and Impaired Operation of a Motor Vehicle.

The three males face, in total, 31 Criminal Code Charges.

Taylor Bremner, Dallas Bremner, and Cruz Bigchild will appear in Rocky Mountain House Provincial Court on September 13, 2017.





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
