## RE: STRUCTURE FIRE, SUMMER VILLAGE OF SILVER SANDS

Yesterday at 1142 AM Onoway Regional Fire Services - Canada's first Hybrid Fire Service was dispatched to a structure fire on Hazel Avenue in the Summer Village of Silver Sands. The first units were rolling to scene within 1-minute. Upon arrival the first Onoway Regional Fire Engine crew noted flames were visible protruding from the roof and windows of the structure. Luckily the family residing in the home had safely evacuated with no injuries. Due to the fast action of the of fire crews, the fire was quickly knocked down. Unfortunately, the home was severely damaged due to the intensity of the fire.

Onoway Regional Fire Services and North West Fire Rescue would like to say thank you to all services that attended this fire for doing such a great job. These include: Parkland Fire, Alexander Fire Department, Lac Ste Anne County Fire Services, Alberta Health Services, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Fortis, and Clearwater water haulers.

During the initial response, Onoway Regional Fire Services deployed 4-units and 13-members, with additional resources deployed from the above-mentioned fire services. The exact origin and cause of the fire is currently under investigation by the Office of the Fire Commissioner.

### **SECOND STAGE OF CONSULTATIONS ON FEDERAL FINANCIAL SECTOR** FRAMEWORK

#### Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP - Yellowhead

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched the second stage of consultations on proposed changes to the federal financial sector legislative and regulatory framework.

The Department is seeking views on potential policy mea-

sures that aim to safeguard the financial sector, to keep it competitive and innovative, and to modernize its legislative framework. "I have already heard from constituents with concerns about the impact that some of the proposed changes could have on their small businesses," stated MP Eglinski.

Last August, the Department released the first consultation paper on the proposed changes, which laid out the landscape of Canada's financial sector and identified key trends that may influence it moving forward. The second consultation paper, released last week, takes into account the comments and recommendations received from stakeholders through the first stage of consultations, as well as the trends and emerging issues that are reshaping the sector.

Interested individuals or organizations are invited to review the consultation paper and make submissions to the Department of Finance by September 29, 2017. The paper, as well as information on submissions, can be found on the Department's website at: http://www.fin.gc.ca/ activty/consult/pssge-psefc-eng. asp.

"I encourage everyone who will be impacted by the changes to participate in the consultation to ensure their concerns are made known to the Department," concluded MP Eglinski.

Act (drinking water guidelines) (Second Reading)

On Monday, I participated in debate on Bill C-21, which builds on an agreement between former Prime Minister Stephen Harper and former President Barack Obama to strengthen the security and economic competitiveness in both countries.

On Tuesday, I participated in debate on Bill S-2, which includes amendments that would give the Minister of Transport the power to order companies to issue recall notices and make manufacturers and importers repair recalled vehicles at no cost to consumer.

On Thursday, I participated in debate on Bill C-47, which would officially bring Canada into line with the UN Arms Trade Treaty. To read my comments on any of the above bills, visit the corresponding day's Hansard on the House Publications page at www.ourcommons. ca/en.

As announced earlier this week, I have been named as a member of the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology (INDU). 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## SIMPLIFY PAVING STONE INSTALLATION

Paving stones can add beauty to walkways, driveways and backyard patios, providing that eye-catching finishing touch to a property while enhancing its curb appeal.

Even though the installation of pavers can be a labor-intensive process, with the right tools and tips, this can be a do-it-yourself project for homeowners with renovation experience. Consider these tricks and how-to tips courtesy of The Home Depot, DIY Network and Unilock.

Get your supplies

To begin a paver project, homeowners will need to stock up on some supplies they may not already have at home. Marking paint, mason line, wooden stakes, leveling sand, paver base, and more will be required. A manual tamper can be used. However, for larger areas, it can be worth the cost to rent a plate compactor.

Measure the area

The number of bags of sand, paver base and paving stones needed for the project depends on the size of the area. For example, according to the Home Depot, for 60 square feet, homeowners will need about 30 12 x 12-inch paver stones, 40 bags of paver base and 12 bags of paver leveling sand.

Spray or mark the area where the paving stones will be laid. Measure carefully so you can order exactly how many stones you will need. Have the materials delivered to reduce heavy lifting and trips to the store. Be sure to have all utility lines marked prior to excavation to avoid damage. Prepare the base carefully

One of the most important aspects of paver installation involves preparing the base. If you cut corners in this process, the finished results can be sloppy, weeds can grow through and/or stones may loosen.

It's essential to grade the area away from the house. That means that the highest point of the patio or walkway should be closest to the house and then the incline gradually flattens out as it moves away from the home. This allows proper water runoff. Mark the height on the stakes and adjust the mason line. Remember to slope the area away from your home with a drop-off of about one inch for every 8 feet.

The base of many DIY applica-

tions should be between four and six inches deep. Work incrementally, raking and tamping until the base is firm. Lightly wetting the material can help it solidify.

Sand helps inhibit weed growth and anchor the pavers together. Plastic lining will not be practical.

Installation

Use edge restraints and a string line to keep the design straight. Do not hammer the pavers together. Paver sand will need to be swept over and settled between the stones to help set them in place.

It helps to read tutorials and watch videos on paving stone installation prior to beginning the project. With practice, the installation will go more smoothly.



## PREPARING YOUR FIREPLACE OR STOVE FOR THE SEASON

Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves not only can be beautiful focal points within a home, but they also provide an additional source of heat and can be used to keep rooms or entire homes comfortable without the need for additional and potentially costly



heating sources.

Just like more modern home heating systems, stoves and fireplaces need to be maintained, and that maintenance includes readying them before winter when they are used more heavily. Ensuring a fireplace or stove is in good working order helps to guarantee efficiency of use and safety during the winter months.

Open-flame heating sources carry with them certain risks. The National Fire Protection Association states that, between 2009-2013, American fire departments responded to 56,000 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. The NFPA notes that the leading factor contributing to home-heating fires is a failure to keep things clean, principally from solid-fueled heating equipment. The following are a handful of ways to stay safe as you get ready for another cozy season around the fire.

• Start with the chimney. Begin by having your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected. Creosote can build up inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable and becomes more difficult and expensive to clean the longer it builds up inside your flue lining. In addition, animals may have created nest inside of the chimney since the last time the fireplace was

used. A professional chimney sweep should be hired in this situation. He or she will be able to effectively clean the chimney in a manner that is the least messy and disruptive to residents.

• Install or check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Operational alarms are essential to preventing injury or death resulting from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation. Such detectors are inexpensive safeguards that should be installed on every floor of the house. Batteries should be replaced every six months, and the alarms themselves should be changed every five to 10 years.

• Inspect the chimney from outdoors as well. Inspect the mortar around any bricks in the chimney and surrounding areas for cracks. If left unaddressed, these can cause dangerous fires. If there are serious cracks, a professional may need to make repairs or the chimney may need to be replaced. You also can have the chimney capped with a screen to keep animals and debris from entering.

• Inspect the damper. A damper is a valve or plate that stops or regulates the flow of air inside a chimney. It should be checked prior to the first use of a stove or fireplace so homeowners can be certain it opens and closes smoothly.

• Clear out flammable items. Move flammable items away from the front of a fireplace or stove. Be sure curtains or other home furnishings are far enough away that they will not catch fire from any errant sparks or flames.

• Order wood now. Be sure there is plenty of wood for the season. Ask a wood supplier to estimate just how much will be needed, and double-check that the wood will arrive in time for the start of the season.

By preparing for fireplace and wood stove use now, homeowners can ensure their winters are comfortable and safe.







## CORRAL ENTRYWAY CLUTTER

The entryway to a home is the first thing guests experience when coming inside. It also can be the first place residents drop their belongings after long days at school or work. As a result, entryways can quickly be consumed by clutter. Taming such messes takes a mixture of ingenuity and planning.

Homeowners hoping to clear their entryways of clutter must first decide what they want to get out of the space. Will it simply be a decorative spot with photos and other home decor on display? Or is functionality the primary goal?



Once that decision has been made, take inventory of which items, such as shoes, keys, umbrellas or coats, need to be in the area, which don't (i.e., old mail). To make things more organized, rearrange the former while removing the latter.

Next it is time to assess storage needs and what's already available. User-friendly storage items may need to be purchased to make the room as functional as possible. The following ideas also can help bring order to the space.

• Create a command center. Create a central location where items are neat, orderly and within reach. Use a bulletin board, dry-erase calendar or something that can house schedules and important notices. Hooks can hold keys, chargers and more.

• Keep it covered. Covered bins can serve as a seating area and also a place to store shoes, hats and scarves. • Create cabinet space. Store items in cabinets so they are organized but out of sight. This way belongings are not just left on an entryway table.

• Create another drop zone. If the entryway is too small to serve its purpose, outfit another room or area that also can do the job. This can be a laundry room or mudroom area. Install shelves, a bench, cabinets and hooks. Just be sure this space is close enough to the entryway to make it useful.

• Go vertical. An easy way to keep things neater is to remove items from the floor and embrace vertical storage. Shoe racks, hooks for purses and a cabinet for coats may do the trick.

Clutter can accumulate in entryways. But some simple adjustments can quickly revamp the space to make it neater and much more functional.



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## FALL LAWN CARE TIPS

Spring and summer may be the seasons most often associated with landscaping and lawn care, but tending to lawns and gardens is a year-round job. If lawn and garden responsibilities dip considerably in winter, then fall is the last significant chance before the new year that homeowners will have to address the landscaping around their homes.

Fall lawn care differs from spring and summer lawn care, even if the warm temperatures of summer linger into autumn. Homeowners who want their lawns to thrive year-round can take advantage of the welcoming weather of fall to address any existing or potential issues.

• Keep mowing, but adjust how you mow. It's important that homeowners continue to mow their lawns so long as grass is growing. But as fall transitions into winter, lower the blades so the grass is cut shorter while remaining mindful that no blade of grass should ever be trimmed by more than one-third. Lowering the blades will allow more sunlight to reach the grass in the months ahead.

Remove leaves as they fall. Much like apple-picking and foliage, raking leaves is synonymous with fall. Some homeowners may wait to pick up a rake until all of the trees on their properties are bare. However, allowing fallen leaves to sit on the ground for extended periods of time can have an adverse effect on grass. Leaves left to sit on the lawn may ultimately suffocate the grass by forming an impenetrable wall that deprives the lawn of sunlight and oxygen. The result is dead grass and possibly even fungal disease. Leaves may not need to be raked every day, but homeowners should periodically rake and remove leaves from their grass, even if there are plenty left to fall still hanging on the trees.

• Repair bald spots. Summer exacts a toll on lawns in various ways, and even homeowners with green thumbs may end up with a lawn filled with bald spots come September. Autumn is a great time to repair these bald spots. Lawn repair mixes like Scotts" PatchMaster contain mulch, seed and fertilizer to repair bald spots, which can begin to recover in as little as seven days. Before applying such products, remove dead grass and loosen the top few inches of soil. Follow any additional manufacturer instructions as well. • Aerate the turf. Aerating reduces soil compacting, facilitating the delivery of fertilizer and water to a lawn's roots. While many homeowners, and particularly those who take pride in tending to their own lawns, can successfully aerate their own turf, it's best to first have soil tested so you know which amendments to add after the ground has been aerated. Gardening centers and home improvement stores sell soil testing kits that measure the pH of soil, but homeowners who want to test for nutrients or heavy metals in their soil may need to send their samples to a lab for further testing.

Fall lawn care provides a great reason to spend some time in the yard before the arrival of winter.





## **4 SIMPLE WAYS TO WINTERIZE YOUR HOME**

Trimming hanging branches and removing debris from their yards is one simple way homeowners can prepare their properties for winter.

As winter approaches, homeowners know they must do certain things to ready their homes for the coming months. Wrapping up the grill and closing the pool are no-brainers, but homeowners also must prioritize winterizing their homes to ensure homes withstand the winter.

Winterizing tasks range from small to big, but each can protect a home and its inhabitants and some can even save homeowners a substantial amount of money. The following are four simple ways to winterize your home.

Use caulk or weather strips to plug these leaks, and enjoy your warmer home and lower energy bills as winter weather gets colder and colder.

2. Inspect your chimney

If your home has a chimney, chances are you have not used it since last winter. During that time, the chimney has likely accumulated some dirt and grime, and may even have served as home to some uninvited critters. As the season for fireside chats approaches, have your chimney serviced by a professional so it's ready for use and you are not greeted by some unwanted guests upon lighting your first fire. 3. Clear the yard

Autumn days, particularly late autumn days, can be gusty, and strong winds can cause branches to fall off trees. Branches big and small can cause damage to cars, siding and roofs, and smaller branches can get clogged in gutters, potentially causing gutters to back up and leading to leaky roofs that damage a home's interior. ## EXTERIOR PAINTING POINTERS

So applying a fresh coat of paint on a beautiful autumn Saturday is not ideal if Sunday figures to bring the first hints of winter.

· Don't skimp on quality. Some paints are cost more than others, and homeowners working on a budget may be tempted to choose the least expensive option available. While price and quality are two different things, it's important that homeowners avoid choosing a paint solely because it is the least expensive option. Research paints before buying a particular one, emphasizing quality over cost. Today's paints last longer than the paints of yesteryear, so you likely won't need to paint your home's exterior again for a long time. A budget-friendly yet low-quality paint will not only make your home less appealing, but you will likely need to paint again sooner than you will if you go with a higher quality paint.

• Don't paint to cover up a problem. Rotting wood or siding is unsightly, and some homeowners think paint can cover up such a problem. But paint will not stick to rotten wood and siding, and the problem will still be noticeable after you paint. A fresh coat of paint is not the solution to rotten wood or siding. Consult a professional contractor if your home is experiencing such a problem.

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## STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED AT OJSH

NGPS arranged for a variety of one or two-week 'boot camps' that were held in Whitecourt over the summer. The boot camps focussed on a variety of trades. The camps were open to students in Grade 9 to 12 from anywhere in the division.

OJSH student Jacob Tracy, who is in Grade 12 this year, attended one such boot camp in July. Jacob attended the two-week construction camp. Jacob said the instructors gave a comprehensive introduction into the trade and attendees learned basics such as framing, roofing, window installations and how to construct a floor properly.

Jacob said that the course was quite interesting and it definitely piqued his interest in entering the trades after graduation. He also said that he can recommend the boot camps for interested students as the camps give participants a better understanding of what the trades are actually about.

OJSH also offers other career opportunities for students to take advantage of throughout the school year.

One program for students interested in the trades is RAP. The Registered Apprenticeship Program is set up to allow students to be both full-time students and registered apprentices, dividing their time between an approved work site and their high school studies. The time a RAP student

The RAP apprenticeship ends when the RAP apprentice finishes high school. The RAP apprentice is then automatically registered as a regular apprentice and the credit earned while in the RAP program is applied to his or her apprenticeship through the Alberta apprenticeship program.

Last school year, OJSH had five students graduate with their RAP apprenticeship in welding, heavy duty mechanic technician, and cooking. For more information, please contact Ms. Shawna Swerda at 780-967-5518 (Outreach).

Another opportunity that many students find valuable is the Green Certificate agricultural training program. The Green Certificate program uses an apprenticeship style of delivery in which students learn by being in the barn, field or corral. Students are paired with knowledgeable trainers.

The Green Certificate is an approved complimentary program of study available to all Alberta high schools. Becoming a competent farm production technician (completing a Level I Green Certificate) requires taking three courses and upon completion, receiving 16 credits.

The Program provides trainees with opportunities to enter a variety of agriculture-related, structured learning pathways as a part of their senior high school program, and to earn a credential leading to a career in agribusiness.

The Green Certificate Program currently consists of eight specializations: cow calf beef production, dairy production, feedlot beef production, field crop production, irrigated field crop production, sheep production, swine production, beekeeper production, equine production, and greenhouse production.
