



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October 3, 2017 BLUE-GREEN ALGAE (CYANOBACTERIA) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR DEVIL'S (MATCHAYAW) LAKE

ONOWAY – A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Devil's (Matchayaw) Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Devil's (Matchayaw) Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae (cyanobacteria). An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is naturally occurring, and often become visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), or who ingest water containing blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Devil's (Matchayaw) Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Devil's (Matchayaw) Lake in which the

blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Blue-green Algae (Cyanobacteria) Advisory is in place.

If you suspect a problem related to blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), or if you require further information on health concerns and blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), please call Health Link at 811. Additional information is also available online, at www.ahs.ca/bga.


There was a two day fun pool tournament held on September 23rd/24th but unfortunately I have not received any information on the winners.

FELLOW VOTERS: This Municipal Election Make Sure You Are Informed

Did You Know:

- If there was a fire or another emergency literally on the wrong-side of the road (for example 47 Ave in Onoway or 46A Ave / Rail Grade Road in Alberta Beach) the closest fire-department <u>WILL</u> <u>NOT</u> be automatically dispatched and if the closest department did respond to the emergency, they'd likely face legal action from Lac Ste. Anne County.
- During a meeting with representatives of the towns and villages Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Chief Randy Schroeder was said to have stated "Just because you dial 911, don't expect a fire truck to show up every time - we are a volunteer service."
- As per the Alberta Highway Development Protection Act, all provincial highways are under the jurisdiction, care, and control of the Alberta Government.
- In a question and answer session at the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association, the Minster of Transportation confirmed "Where the rubber meets the pavement on a provincial highway, the province has jurisdiction."
- When there is an emergency call out to a provincial highway, the municipality is not stuck with the cost. Fire and Rescue rates are pre-set by the Alberta Government and the bills are paid by Alberta Transportation.
- Representatives of Alberta Transportation have stated that they do not care who responds to a highway emergency - so long as the job gets done.
- Last year on highway #37, North West Fire came upon a two-vehicle collision with entrapment, flammable fluids down, and no traffic control. At the request of an Alberta Sheriff and the urging of the Town of Onoway Deputy Mayor, North West Fire rendered aid.
- As a result of rendering aid on that motor vehicle collision. North West received accolades and thank you's from occupants of <u>both</u> vehicles.
- Also as a result of rendering aid on highway #37, Lac Ste. Anne County Sued North West Fire for no apparent reason.
- During negotiations mediated by the Province of Alberta, Lac Ste. Anne County freely admitted that their service levels range greatly from day-to-day due to fluctuating labour resources.
- As part of the mediated discussions; Alberta Fire Commissioner Spence Sample specifically addressed Lac Ste. Anne County emergency response concerns due to low membership and actively advocated for automatic aid (dispatch both fire services so that help is not delayed for people in need) throughout areas of southern Lac Ste Anne (not just highways).
- Last fall a mutual aid (not automatic aid) agreement was entered between Lac Ste Anne County and the Town of Onoway.
- Since the Mutual Aid Agreement came into effect Lac Ste Anne County has never requested mutual aid on a provincial highway.
- Since the Mutual Aid Agreement came into effect Lac Ste. Anne County still refuses to drop the lawsuit against North West Fire for helping people on highway #37.

It's time Lac Ste Anne County stopped playing politics with people's lives. It's time Lac Ste Anne County stopped wasting administration's time and taxpayers' money fighting a turf-war over egos. Instead Lac Ste Anne should focus on ensuring the best care for <u>anyone</u> and <u>everyone</u> when it's needed.

Ask your candidate: Will he or she put an end to this craziness? Will he or she support automatic aid between Fire departments? Will he or she demand professional respectful behavior from County Managers and Fire Officers? If the answer is yes, have them write it down and hold them to it.

- Photo identification issued by a Canadian government or agency, whether federal, provincial or local;
- Bank/credit card statement or personal cheque;
- Correspondence issued by a school, college or university;
- Government cheque or cheque stub;
- Income/property tax assessment notice;
- Insurance policy or coverage card;
- Letter from a public curator, public guardian or public trustee;
- Pension Plan statement of benefits, contributions or participation;
- Residential lease or mortgage statement;
- Statement of government benefits: e.g. Employment insurance, old-age security, social assistance, disability support, or child tax benefit;
- Utility bill: e.g. Telephone, public utilities commission, television, electricity, gas or water;
- Vehicle ownership, registration or insurance certificate; or
- A letter or form (attestation) confirming that the person lives at the stated address. The letter can be signed by any of the following:
 - authorized representative of a commercial property management company;
 - authorized representative of a correctional institution;
 - authorized representative of a First Nations band or reserve;
 - authorized representative of a post-secondary institution;
 - authorized representative of a facility that provides services to the homeless; or
 - authorized representative of a supportive living facility or treatment centre.

make sure everyone knows what to do in the event of a blaze by developing a home safety fire escape plan. If your home is not equipped with smoke detectors and a fire extinguisher, be sure to do so during Fire Prevention Week. These devices will help save lives in the event of a fire emergency.

Q: Is gasoline a safe way to start a fire in a charcoal grill? A: No. Instead, use plenty of charcoal, lighter fluid and a long-necked lighter to light the grill.

Q: Should you use a fire extinguisher to put out a grease fire on the stove? A: Never. Get everyone outside and immediately call the fire department.

Q: Most home fires start in which room of the house? A: The kitchen. In fact, 3 in 10 reported home fires begin in the kitchen.

Q: What is the number one cause of home fires? A: Cooking fires. Most cooking fires start with the ignition of common household items in the kitchen.

Q: Where should you install smoke alarms in your home? A: Install alarms on every floor of your home, and outside each bedroom.

Q: What should you do if you're trapped by fire? A: If your exits are blocked, stay in the room with the door closed. Signal for help by waving a cloth at the window. If there is a telephone in the room, call the fire department and give your location.

WHAT ARE THE COUNCILLORS RESPONSIBILITIES

DUTIES OF A COUNCILLOR

Why is it important, as a Ratepayer, to fully understand the Duties of Councillors?

In order to fully understand what the "Duties Of The Councilors" are, one must refer to Alberta Municipal Government Act as the Act (MGA) which is the legislative framework in which all municipalities and municipal entities across the Province of Alberta operate.

As per the Alberta Municipal Government Act the "Duties Of Councillors" Sec 153 of the MGA states:

Councillors have the following duties:

(a) to consider the welfare and interests of the municipality as a whole and to bring to council's attention anything that would promote the welfare or interests of the municipality;

This is important because according to the MGA, municipalities have 3 purposes. That's it. Three. No more, no less. They're pretty simple, too.

Municipalities exist to:

"provide good government",
 "provide services, facilities, or other things", and

3. "develop and maintain safe and viable communities".

You might ask yourself what the other 499 pages of the MGA are all about. Let's just say that three seemingly simple purposes can lead to a lot of technical stuff. The same applies to the "Duties Of Councillors".

(b) to participate generally in developing and evaluating the policies and programs of the municipality;

This is important because Council must represent the wishes and requirements of the Ratepayers. Councils are elected to set Policy and Direction. No one member of Council has the authority to make decisions, nor act individually. All decisions that are required to be made by Council MUST be made by the Majority and must be done by Resolution or Bylaw.

Bylaws and Resolutions can only be passed at a Regular Meeting of Council, or a Special Meeting of Council. This should ensure that the Policies and Programs of the Municipality are Implemented Fairly with the Best Interests of the Ratepayers in mind.

The "Evaluation" of the Policies and Programs really boils down to Performance Management.

Performance measures should be used to report on the outputs and outcomes of each program and should be related to the mission, goals, and objectives of the municipality.

Performance management and performance measures can help municipalities develop a continuous system of improvement. Consistent performance measures can help reveal when a program or service is not being delivered properly or effectively, which can result in insufficient services to the Ratepayers. It is important for LSAC to be receptive to introducing performance measures to become more focused on outputs and outcomes of a program. Furthermore, performance measurements can also result in positive behavioral change. LSAC should embrace the concept of continuous improvement and be willing to be measured (benchmarked) against outcomes. Establishing a receptive climate for performance measurement is as important as the measurements themselves.

Performance measurements can be integrated to the strategic planning process and budget, which can then help assess accomplishments on a County-wide basis. When used in the long-term planning and goal setting process and linked to LSAC's mission, goals, and objectives, meaningful performance measurements can help identify financial and program results. Performance measures can also help evaluate past resource decisions and facilitate qualitative improvements in future decisions regarding resource allocation and service delivery.

Performance measurements and performance results should be disclosed to the public. This can act as a helpful guide for Ratepayers to understand how LSAC measures performance, thus becoming more Transparent and Accountable.

(c) to participate in council meetings and council committee meetings and meetings of other bodies to which they are appointed by the council;

This is important because that is their Job and the reason they were Elected!

(d) to obtain information about the operation or administration of the municipality from the chief administrative officer or a person designated by the chief administrative officer;

This is "EXTREMELY" important to understand because the Council members are responsible for ensuring that all municipal policies and procedures are fair and fairly applied by staff. Fairness starts at the top and the only employee of LSAC is Our County Manager (CAO) Mike Primeau. So what does this mean? LSAC Administration as per the LSAC Web Site consists of over 43 Employee's. That is over 43 Employees under the direct supervision and control of the 1(ONE) and ONLY Employee of LSAC, our County Manager, who in turn is under the direct supervision and control of our Elected LSAC Councillors.

The questions that arise are who ensures that the Ratepayers are fairly represented and what procedures are in place to ensure Administration addresses the Ratepayers concerns?

We as the Ratepayers, have no say in who is doing a good job and who may not be doing a good job! In fact we the Ratepayers were declined by the County Manager to review the Performance Reviews of the Administrative Employees that Run our County. That also includes the Performance Review of our only Direct Employee Mike Primeau the County Manager. Not only were we denied to review his Performance Review we were also denied to review his Employment Contract in which our County Councillors just recently extended!

If our Councillors do not ask the right questions and rely solely on the recommendations of the County Manager then we do not have a democracy, we have a dictatorship funded by our tax dollars!

The responsibility folks lies wholly with our elected officials (Our Councillors) to ensure that LSAC Administration is in Fact doing a good Job of running our County.

It is OUR RESPONSIBILITY (the Ratepayers) to ensure our Elected Officials,(the Councilors) are doing their "Job" which is to "Represent the Public" and to consider the well-being and interests of the Municipality!

(e) to keep in confidence matters discussed in private at a council or council committee meeting until discussed at a meeting held in public;

This is important because when discussions and decision making are removed from the public arena, it tends to result in the promotion of private interests and the corruption of proper administration. This does not require any intent to do wrong. Often discussions are held in private because more detailed information can be exchanged and participants can be more candid. People have a natural reluctance to discuss their personal or commercial interests or to criticize others in public. However, private meetings can lead to confusion about the duties of the elected Councillors.

The appearance that decisions are made 'behind closed doors' may also lead to a loss of confidence in council processes and decisions.

The Municipal Government Act requires council and special committees of council to conduct meetings in public, with only limited exceptions. These exceptions include decisions on legal and commercial-in-confidence matters, and personnel or other matters that would contravene privacy provisions if discussed in public.

Consistent with the legislative intention of the MGA, Councillors should, to the extent practicable, conduct council business in public.

(f) to perform any other duty or function imposed on Councillors by this or any other enactment or by the council.

This is important because it just is!

So in closing of this topic please keep this in mind when you attend the forms to choose your LSAC Councillor.

Every time a Municipal Council makes a decision, some person or group of people is affected by that decision. Someone may disagree with the decision, and complain about it.

Ratepayers have the right to expect that their Council and Administration will act in a Fair, Open and Transparent Manner.

Fairness that can be expected from your Councillor consist of ...

• An EXPECTATION on the part of people affected by the Councillors decisions. Trust and respect got the Councillor Elected. Implicit in that trust is the Expectation that they will be fair in their deliberations and decisions.

• An OBLIGATION created by law. What is needed to meet that obligation will depend on the circumstances, but the obligation to be fair relates to both a decision itself and the process by which it was made.

• The STANDARD municipal decision makers set for themselves and their municipalities.

• A GOOD BUSINESS PRACTICE that can help to maintain public confidence, to avoid or reduce conflict, and to protect Council when decisions are challenged.

In addition to all of the above, it is also a SKILL that requires combining some procedural knowledge with COMMON SENSE. It is a skill that can be learnt, improved and perfected with regular practice, and can be passed onto others.

MAKE LIGHTS SPARKLE

As days get shorter and natural light is less abundant, interior lighting becomes ever more important. Chandeliers, pendant lamps, recessed lighting, and tableside lamps are most effective when they are clean. HGTV experts say dirty lights can give off up to 20 percent less light than clean ones. Dirty fixtures also waste energy.

Lighting fixtures that are within reach are easy to tackle, but what about those fixtures that hang or have multiple crystals, globes or bulbs? These tips can cut down on the time needed to give lights a thorough cleaning.

· Stock up on the right cleaning supplies. Microfiber dusting cloths are smart choices because they can help trap grime and tend to be machine-washable and reusable. Extendable static-charged dusters are another handy item to have around, particularly for fixtures that are hard to reach.

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· Dust regularly. Dusting regularly can prevent the buildup of grime that's difficult to wash off. Try to dust light fixtures weekly or biweekly. The more frequent the fixtures are dusted, the less time each cleaning session will take. Soft cloths can remove the dust from most bulbs and exterior surfaces. Lamp shades may need more attention. Use a lamb's-wool duster to attract dirt so it doesn't leave a residue on the lampshade.

• Deep-clean at table level. Deep-cleaning at table level is more manageable. Remove any glass accents and set them out on a cushioned surface so they do not break. Soft cloths dampened with a vinegar solution should remove most of the dirt on chandelier crystals and the globes or outer glass coverings of other types of fixtures. Take a photo of the lighting fixture prior to cleaning so you'll know how to replace removed parts correctly once

everything is clean and dry.

If you cannot remove a fixture for cleaning, use a sturdy stool, a spray bottle with your cleaning mixture and a soft cloth to wipe away the dirt. Remember to place something absorbent beneath the light to catch any drips. Do not spray liquids directly onto light bulbs; otherwise, you can damage the bulb and the electrical components.

It's best to exercise caution when cleaning lighting fixtures. Turn off the light itself and shut off the circuit breaker to avoid the risk of shock or burns from hot bulbs.





HOW TO IMPROVE INDOOR AIR QUALITY IN WINTER

Plants can improve indoor air quality by helping to remove harmful irritants from the air.

Homes tend to be stuffier in autumn and winter. As temperatures outside dip, windows are closed and air quality inside homes can suffer.

Poor indoor air quality can not only be uncomfortable, causing residents to experience headaches, dry eyes and nasal congestion, but also can be unhealthy. According to the American Lung Association, poor indoor air quality can cause or contribute to the development of infections, lung cancer and chronic lung diseases, such as asthma.

Though it's not feasible or healthy to open windows when temperatures outside dip to near



or below freezing, there are steps everyone can take to improve the indoor air quality in their homes.

· Add to your décor with plants. Plants provide both aesthetic and practical appeal to a home's interior. Houseplants can clean and purify the air in a home, helping to remove formaldehyde, benzene and other toxins that can make indoor air unhealthy to breathe. Benzene is an irritant that can cause dizziness, headache, nausea, and blurred vision, among other side effects. Formaldehyde, which is often found in homes thanks to its widespread use in a range of products, can cause watery eyes, nausea and wheezing.

• Watch what you are lighting up. Many homeowners know that smoking indoors drastically reduc-

es indoor air quality, putting even nonsmokers at heightened risk of developing various respiratory ailments. Homeowners concerned about the indoor air quality in their homes should ban smoking inside, no matter how low temperatures dip outside. In addition, homeowners with wood-burning stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent maintaining these features, as they can release harmful soot and smoke if they are not taken care of. Some people may also be allergic to incense and scented candles, so keep a watchful eye on residents and guests whenever you light candles or sticks of incense. If any symptoms of allergies appear, avoid lighting any more candles or incense, waiting until you can open the windows if you want to light any again.

· Purchase an air purifier. Air pu-

rifiers are beneficial year-round, helping to remove allergens and particles from a home. High-efficiency particulate air filters, known as HEPA filters, are extremely effective at removing airborne particulates from the air inside your home.

• Pay attention to pets. Like their owners, pets tend to spend more time indoors during the winter. That means more fur and pet dander, the skin flakes in an animal's fur or hair that can trigger allergic reactions, is likely in your home during the winter than in the summer. To combat this, bathe your pets regularly in the winter, making sure to wash the animal's bedding in hot water on a weekly basis as well.

• Open the windows when possible. Winter does not typically provide many opportunities to open the windows, but you might get a few chances to let some fresh air in through the windows during winter. Make the most of these opportunities, and when possible crack the windows when you're cleaning so dust and other particles that kick up have a path outside of your home.

Clean interior air should be a year-round priority, but homeowners may have to go the extra mile to keep their homes' interior air clean when winter arrives.



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


