FIRE PREVENTION WEEK: PLAN TWO WAYS OUT

Fire Prevention Week 2017 reminds Albertans to practice a home escape plan with a second way out of rooms and their home.

While a door is the most obvious evacuation route from a room, home or apartment, this year's Fire Prevention Week theme, "Every second counts: Plan two ways out" urges Albertans to think carefully about having another way out.

Practice your fire escape plan • draw a map of your home, including all doors and windows • find two ways out of every room

· make sure doors and windows are not blocked

· choose an outside meeting place

• push the test button to sound the smoke alarm (test smoke alarm monthly)

• practice your fire drill with everyone in the home

• get outside to your meeting place

"Families that have a home fire escape plan and practice it are much more likely to get out of their homes safely. I've made it a priority in my home to have a plan in place to protect my family, and I think it's important for all Albertans to do the same. Knowing what to do and where to go, especially if your doors are blocked, can save lives." -Shaye Anderson, Minister of Municipal Affairs

"A fire escape plan needs to be practical and easy for your family to follow. This also means having a complete plan for safely using an alternate escape such as a window. If you have questions about using a second escape route when making your plan, contact your local fire department for advice." - Kevan Jess, Acting Alberta Fire Commissioner



"During an emergency, there is no time to stop and think about an escape route. Edmonton Fire Rescue Services encourages everyone to prepare an escape plan and practice the escape plan in order to spare valuable seconds in a real emergency. It is especially important to determine a meeting place close by that everyone is familiar with and is easy to remember so that every family member can be accounted for in the event you are separated." - Ken Block, Fire Chief, Edmonton Fire Rescue Services

During Fire Prevention Week, kindergarten to Grade 6 students from across Alberta complete the "Fire Safety Starts With You" activity book, which teaches early elementary students important



life-saving steps they can take to protect themselves, their families and their homes from fire. The Government of Alberta's Office of the Fire Commissioner and ATCO distributed more than 270,000 activity books across the province this year.

"Fires can be deadly and devastating. That's why we're pleased to work with fire departments across Alberta, participate in Alberta Fire Prevention Week and support the Fire Prevention Week Children's Program. Fire prevention should be a part of our everyday lives. Let's keep everyone safe by making sure there are two ways out of every room in our house in case of fire, smoke or carbon monoxide alarm. Quick facts

• Fire Prevention Week 2017 runs from Oct. 8 to 14, which marks the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire in 1871.

• In 2016, there were 4,324 fires in Alberta resulting in 29 deaths and 166 injuries.

• Cooking fires, fires caused by smokers' materials and fires involving electrical wiring in the home accounted for 68 per cent of all home fires from 2007 to 2016. Other common fire causes include arson and deliberately set fires, heating equipment and appliances.

• Properly maintained smoke alarms provide reliable, early notification allowing your family to escape and call the fire department.

• From 2012 to 2016, the smoke alarm did not activate due to power failure (no battery, dead battery or disconnection from home wiring) in 27 per cent of the fires where a smoke alarm was present.

On July 18, the Minister of Finance released a white paper outlining the government's plan to tax private corporations. Since that tax plan was released, my office has been receiving emails and phone calls from small-business owners, nurses, farmers, insurance brokers, and accountants - all deeply concerned about the proposed changes. And they should be. For decades, tax planning measures for private corporations have been recognized as legitimate by the government,

and for good reason. They help mitigate personal risk assumed when starting a small business.

The fact is that business owners must risk their own capital, often securing borrowed funds against personal assets, such as the family home. They do not have many benefits that are often available to employees, such as pension plans and extended health coverage. Business owners often establish pension plans and benefit packages for their own employees, at their own expense. They pay into CPP as both the owner and the employee, while also contributing the employer's

share of CPP and EI for their other employees. These Canadians put in endless hours of hard work and take on a lot of risk to make sure their businesses are running smoothly and their employees are paid.

Most local business owners are middle class Canadians - the people who put their time, effort, and sweat into paying the bills and paying their employees before they pay themselves. They're not big multinational corporations. Now the government is targeting them with a massive tax hike, threatening jobs and the communities that are sustained by our local businesses. To

YELLOWHEAD COUNTY **COUPLE'S LOTTERY WIN AIN'T** JUST CHICKEN FEED

Alberta's biggest-ever lottery prize has landed in Yellowhead County. Brett McCoy and Robin Walker won \$60 million on the September 22 LOTTO MAX draw.

Walker and McCoy officially received their prize on October 4, 2017 at a cheque presentation in St. Albert.

The couple said they were together when they bought the winning ticket from McLeod Trading Post in the hamlet of Peers. McCoy laughed when he remembered cashing in another lottery ticket at the same time they bought the winning ticket for September 22.

"I won \$100, and I was pretty excited," he said. "I remember thinking that I never win anything."

The couple stopped back in at McLeod Trading Post the afternoon of September 23 - the day after the big draw. This time, Walker went in to buy a couple of items while McCoy waited outside.

"I ran into the store to buy chicken feed and some treats for my kids," said Walker. "I grabbed all our lottery tickets out of the glove compartment."

"A whole bunch of numbers came up on the screen when I scanned the ticket. I thought, 'That can't be right.' So, I scanned the ticket again - then I ran outside and told Brett we won \$60,000."

"The store clerk came after me and said, 'Robin - count the zeroes.""

In fact, McCoy and Walker's ticket was the only one sold across Canada to match all seven LOTTO MAX winning numbers drawn on September 22. They won the entire \$60 million jackpot that evening, setting a new record for the biggest lottery prize ever won in Alberta.

The winning LOTTO MAX numbers on September 22 were 2, 10, 37, 38, 43 and 47. McCoy and Walker's ticket was an \$11

quick pick, with six selections and the add-on game EXTRA entered.

As you'd expect, the couple are feeling overwhelmed as they consider the magnitude of the win.

"It's surreal," Walker said.

"I was pretty excited when I thought it was \$60,000," McCoy added. "That would have taken

With \$60 million to consider, the couple said they don't plan to make any big decisions right awav.

"We'll get a few things we need, but we're going to sit tight for now," Walker said. "There's so much to think about."




