RCMP INVESTIGATE ARMED ROBBERY

UPDATE #1

Arrest Warrant Issued

Calmar, Alberta - On October 15, 2017 at approximately 6:00 p.m., an armed robbery occurred at the Calmar Esso and the adjacent Liquor store. The RCMP investigation has lead to an Alberta wide arrest warrant being issued for 34 year old Nelson Saulteaux, of the Paul Band First Nation.

Nelson Saulteaux has been charged with 17 criminal offences, including Robbery with a

Firearm, assault with a weapon, and possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose.

RCMP are actively looking for Nelson Saulteaux. Police are concerned that Saulteaux may be armed and therefore is considered dangerous.

"We want to be very clear to the public about Mr. Saulteaux if you believe you know where he is, do not approach him directly", states Cst. Mark Bovaird of the Leduc RCMP's General Investigation Section.

Extensive efforts have been made to locate the white 2006 Ford cube van; however, the suspect vehicle has yet to be located.

Mr. Ki Yun Jo has been identified as the victim in this incident. The 54 year old was the owner/operator of the service station. Investigators and family are reaching out to the public for information which may help identify suspects or locate the suspect vehicle.

Update 2

Thorsby, Alberta - Investigators are releasing a photograph of a suspect vehicle believed to have been involved in a fatal hit and run in Thorsbyearlier today.

The suspect vehicle is described as being a medium sized white commercial vehicle cube van with unique decaling on the side. The vehicle is believed to have been stolen.

Update 1

Thorsby, Alberta - The Next of Kin of the victim have been no-

tified and more information may now be shared.

At 3:45 p.m., a medium sized commercial vehicle failed to pay for it's gas at the Fas Gas service station in Thorsby. As the vehicle drove away an employee of the gas station attempted to stop or gain the attention of the driver. The employee was subsequently struck by the vehicle and the vehicle fled the scene.

The 54 year old victim succumbed to his injuries on scene.

AHS INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM BEGINS OCTOBER 23

NORTH ZONE – Starting Monday (Oct. 23), Albertans have the opportunity to protect themselves and others against influenza through Alberta's annual influenza immunization program.

Offering influenza immunization, free of charge, to all Albertans six months of age and older, the vaccine will be available at hundreds of Alberta Health Services (AHS) public influenza immunization clinics, as well as at many pharmacists and physician offices around the province.

"We have seen cases and outbreaks of influenza already," says Dr. Albert de Villiers, AHS Medical Officer of Health, North Zone. "You may be healthy now but, without immunization, everyone is at risk. Prevention is your only protection."

Immunization is the most effective means of protecting against the strains of influenza virus circulating each season. Because those strains change from season to season, Albertans are reminded they cannot rely on

having been immunized in years past.

"Last season, influenza immunization cut Albertans' risk for influenza by just more than 40 per cent. That's great, but last year's immunization won't protect you this season. You need this season's immunization to be protected this season."

Over a six-month period last season, more than 1,600 Albertans were hospitalized and 64 Albertans died with influenza. Influenza causes more emergency department visits than heart attacks and strokes, not to mention significant downtime from work and leisure activities.

"Influenza does not discriminate," says Dr. de Villiers. "Though some Albertans are at greater risk of severe complications, no one is naturally immune to influenza. Please don't take the risk. Influenza can be one less thing we battle this winter. For yourself, and your loved ones, get immunized."

THORSBY/BRETON RCMP SOLVE ARMED ROBBERY / PURSUIT

Breton, Alberta – Two suspects are in custody following an early morning crime spree on October 6, 2017. At 8:15 a.m., Thorsby/ Breton RCMP received a call of a gas and dash involving a school bus. It was immediately determined that the suspect school bus had been stolen on October 4 from the area of Rimbey.

Following this incident, Thorsby/Breton RCMP received a call that a man was robbed after he stopped to assist the stationary school bus on Highway 22. A suspect male carrying a knife stole the man's Dodge picker truck. The suspect subsequently entered a gas station and allegedly stole cigarettes before fleeing the scene.

RCMP from the Thorsby/Bretton and Rock Mountain House Detachments converged on the scene and located the stolen Dodge truck on Highway 22. The suspect vehicle failed to stop for the police but was soon disabled using a tire deflation device.

When the suspect's vehicle was disabled he attempted to gain entry into another civilian vehicle. In the process of attempting to steal the civilian's car, the civilian driver suffered a stab wound. RCMP members were able to intervene and took the male suspect into custody. A female associate of the suspect was also arrested in the stolen Dodge truck.

Both adult suspects are currently in custody in Rocky Mountain House RCMP detachment.

"We appreciate the assistance of several members of the public who provided us timely information and allowed us to successfully do our job."



SIMPLE MAINTENANCE TIPS TO KEEP YOUR RIDE RUNNING STRONG

Motor vehicles are sizable investments that, for many people, trail only homes and educations in terms of the biggest expenses they will ever have. So it's in drivers' best interests to take every step possible to protect their investments and keep their vehicles running smoothly as long as possible. While knowledgeable mechanics can be invaluable resources, drivers can take several minor, simple steps to keep their cars running smoothly for years to come.

· Perform weekly visual inspections. Few drivers take the time to look at their vehicles once those vehicles lose their new car luster. But visual inspections can help drivers find problems that, though minor, may impact their vehicles' performance. For example, a routine

examination of vehicle tires can indicate if those tires are properly inflated. Poorly inflated tires can decrease fuel efficiency and affect the overall safety of a vehicle. If tires appear flat, check their pressure and inflate them to the levels listed in your owner's manual.

· Look for fluid leaks. Another telltale and easily identifiable sign that a vehicle needs some maintenance is the sight of fluids beneath the car. If you notice puddles or stains beneath where you normally park your car, your vehicle may be leaking fluids. Note the color and consistency of the fluid and then call your mechanic to determine which fluid is leaking and how to fix the problem.

· Stick to manufacturer-recommended maintenance schedules.

Whether your vehicle is brand new or has some tread on its tire, consult the owner's manual for manufacturer recommendations with regard to changing fluids and replacing filters. Many recent models can now be driven roughly 5,000 miles before they need an oil change, but check your owner's manual for the guidelines established by your vehicle's manufacturer, and adhere to that schedule religiously. If you drive an older car, recognize that the vehicle may benefit from more frequent oil changes and tuneups.

In addition, read the manual for additional guidelines, such as how often to replace the air filter, headlight, turn signal and brake lamps, windshield wipers, and other vehicle parts that can wear down over time.

· Look under the hood as well. While many drivers feel that the area beneath their vehicles' hoods is best left to the professionals, you can still lift up the hood every so often to see if there are any glaring problems that demand attention. Inspect rubber belts for signs of wear and tear, and know that such belts may need to be replaced every 50,000 miles or even more frequently depending on your driving habits. Lifting the hood is also necessary when checking fluid levels, which you should check periodically and before and after any long trips.

Drivers who notice or suspect damage when performing simple vehicle maintenance should bring these concerns to the attention of their mechanics as soon as possible.







Auto TUNE-UP

ITEMS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR AUTOMOTIVE EMERGENCY KIT

Road trips can make for great weekend getaways or even more lengthy vacations for those who can't get enough of the open road. But before embarking on any road trips, motorists should replenish their automotive emergency kits with the following items so they are fully prepared in the event of an accident or an injury.

• First-aid kit: A first-aid kit can treat cuts and abrasions suffered while you are out of the car and even some minor injuries that may result if you are in a car accident. Include essential items like adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, antiseptic wipes, aspirin, bandages, a cold compress, gauze, and scissors. Visit www.redcross.org for a

more extensive list of items to include in your first-aid kit, which should be kept in your car at all times.

Tools: It's important to include tools in your automotive emergency kit. While a full toolbox might be unnecessary, bring along an adjustable wrench, a flat head and Phillips screwdriver, a pair of pliers, a tire jack and crow bar, an ice scraper, and a flashlight. Extra roadside flares and reflectors also should be packed should you need to pull over and address an automotive problem, such as a flat tire. Keep a tire pressure gauge in your glove compartment or with your other tools so you can check tire pressure if you feel your car is not operating as smoothly as it

normally does.

- Fluids: While it's best to check all of your vehicle's fluids before beginning a road trip, it does not hurt to bring along some extra fluids just in case you start to run low while out on the road. Fluids to pack include motor oil, antifreeze, brake fluid, and windshield washer fluid. Include a funnel with these items so you can easily pour them in should you be running low. Pack an empty spray bottle as well so you have something to spray washer fluid from if a problem arises with your wiper blades.
- Wiper blades: Include an extra set of wiper blades in your automotive emergency kit. Maintaining wiper blades is an oft-overlooked component of

vehicle maintenance, so bring along an extra set of blades should your existing blades succumb to wear and tear while you're on the road.

Miscellaneous items: Some items that may not seem synonymous with road trips can come in handy should you find yourself in an emergency. Pack a blanket so you and your passengers can stay warm should your car break down at night. In addition, pack some energy bars and bottled water so no one gets too hungry or thirsty while waiting for help to arrive. It's also good to keep a pair of work gloves in your car so you can still use your tools or change a tire when the temperatures dip or your hands get sweaty on hot days.





TWO CHARGED WITH FAILING TO PROVIDE NECESSARIES OF LIFE

Update #1:

The RCMP wish to clarify that the charge of failing to provide the necessaries of life, laid jointly against Brenda Rabbit and Clyde Rabbit, was in relation to the circumstances and conditions in which four-year-old Serenity Rabbit lived while under their care.

After a thorough investigation,

it was determined that the specific injury which caused Serenity's death was not criminal in nature.

ORIGINAL RELEASE:

RCMP charge two with failing to provide necessaries of life

Wetaskiwin, Alberta – RCMP confirm that two adults have been charged jointly with one count of failing to provide the necessaries of life in relation to the circumstances and conditions in which four-year-old Serenity Rabbit** lived while under their care as her

guardians. The Maskwacis child died in an Edmonton hospital on September 27, 2014 after having been admitted with a head injury.

The police investigation into this matter was a complex and difficult one which had progressed to the point where its findings were presented to the Alberta Crown Prosecution Service for review. Based upon the review by the Crown it was recommended that Brenda Rabbit (56)** and Clyde Rabbit (55)** be charged jointly

with one count of failing to provide the necessaries of life as per section 215(2)(a) of the Criminal Code. They are scheduled to appear in Wetaskiwin Provincial Court on Thursday, November 9, 2017 at 9:30 a.m.

Given that this matter is now before the courts, additional details will not be provided by the RCMP at this time. Any new arising information will be disseminated by way of an updated media release.






