

# EVANSBURG STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT COMPLETED FOR THE SEASON

Yellowhead County's street improvement program in Evansburg, regarding the replacement of water and sewer mains, and road and sidewalks, has been completed for the season.

The Hamlet of Evansburg Street Improvement program for 46th and 47th Avenue has been completed for the season. As part of the program, a two-year project warranty period is in effect. During this time, the contractor will be required to monitor and address any issues that arise, including landscaping areas struggling to establish.

In order to encourage the growth of grass, we ask residents to continue to water and maintain grass in their area. By doing this, weed growth will be minimized and bare areas will fill in. The contractor will monitor these areas and provide additional topsoil and grass seed as needed in the coming year.

We thank you for your patience and understanding during this project. Our consultants, WSP, are compiling a list of issues for the contractor to return and address. September has been off to flying start for the staff and students of Grand Trunk High School. We are pleased to report that our enrollment numbers are up about ten students from our spring projections. During these first few weeks, staff has met with their advisory groups reviewing that the focus of the groups is to give students an opportunity to complete any missed assignments, write any quizzes or exams, and stay current with all of their academic responsibilities. The advisory group time is also to help develop positive relationships amongst the students across all grades with a staff member in the building. Students are also enjoying a couple of new option choices at both the senior high and junior high level. Agriculture (aquaponics), forensic science, and sociology are new senior high options while at the junior high level, students have choices such as introductory music, communications technology, management and marketing to name a few.

Volleyball season has started at both the junior and senior high level. The senior girls travelled to Vermilion for a tournament the first weekend back. The girls played in ten matches from Friday night until Saturday night, and came home with a bronze medal in the B division, which is the team's best finish since attending this tournament. The senior boys' team went to Rocky Mountain House the following weekend and played extemely well and managed to come home with a fourth place finish. The junior high girls have started their league schedule and have a couple of tournaments planned for their season.

Evansview School, Evansburg

"Look! I got a ladybug!" "Can I have it?" "No, can I have it?..." This was the scene one Friday as Evansview's kindergarten students took their classroom outside for Forest Friday. Ever since that day, they have been out on the prowl for another ladybug; not to mention ants and grasshoppers, too. Despite all the time they have spent outdoors (which is everyday for anywhere between 90 minutes to almost the whole day), they have yet to find that elusive ladybug. As summer turns into fall, that ladybug hunt will most likely turn into something new and just as exciting!

At the end of September, the Kindergarten and Grade 1 students have their first opportunity to attend the biennial Terry Fox Run. Rather than running through town, multi-age teams of students will work together to run laps around the schoolyard in hopes of creating a high lap-count for our school not to mention continuing Terry Fox's dream of a dollar donation for every person in the country.

To close out September, our school will take the time to remember those children who attended residential schools. As we teach our students to be sensitive to the difficulties of those who have come before us, we will cover our school in orange shirts creatively designed by our the members of our community.

October continues to be an action-packed month starting with a Métis-based cultural program led by Ian Porteous meant to build community within our school. The classes will have a workshop with Mr. Porteous and then come together at the end of the day for a final celebration through storytelling and dance. Our storytelling events do not stop there. The Evansburg Public Library has invited Kathy Jessup to come to our school for a presentation, as well.

As students walk, drive or ride the bus to our school, they have witnessed a different kind of story unfolding before their eyes. Evansburg has the privilege of receiving an Emergency Response Building that houses not just the firefighters but also the EMTs and Peace Officers. Fire Chief, Les Schatz, invited the Evansview students to be the first official visitors to the building as we celebrate Fire Prevention Week.

# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF OCTOBER 23, 2017

This week the House of Commons debated the following:

- Bill C-17 An act to amend the Yukon Environmental and Socio-economic Assessment Act (Third Reading)
- Bill C-24 An Act to amend the Salaries Act and to make a consequential amendment to the Financial Administration Act (Report Stage)
- Bill C-46 An Act to amend the Criminal Code (offences relating to conveyances) and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Third Reading)
- Bill C-49 Transportation Modernization Act (Report Stage)
- Bill C-343 An Act to establish the Office of the Federal Ombudsman for Victims of Criminal Acts and to amend certain Acts (Second Reading)
- Bill C-344 An Act to amend the Department of Public Works and Government Services Act (community benefit) (Second Reading)
- Bill S-211 National Sickle Cell Awareness Day Act (Third Reading)
- Bill S-230 An Act to amend the Criminal Code (drug-impaired driving) (Second Reading)
- Motion No. 17 Ways and Means
- NDP Motion Minister of Finance and Conflict of Interest Act

On Tuesday, I participated in debate on Bill C-46, which amends the provisions of the Criminal Code that deal with offences and procedures relating to alcohol and drug-impaired driving.

On Wednesday, I spoke on Bill C-49, which substantially amends 13 different Acts and has consequential impacts on three modes of transportation: air, rail, and water.

On Thursday, I gave a statement to thank local candidates who put their names forward for our municipal elections, as well as congratulate those who were elected to office. Later that day, I participated in debate on Bill C-17, which will make development of natural resources more difficult in

the Yukon by slowing down the review process.

Also on Thursday during Adjournment Proceedings, I had the opportunity to raise a question I asked last Friday, calling on the federal government to assist Alberta in our fight against the Mountain Pine Beetle infestation.

In the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology (INDU), we continued to hear witnesses for a study on Canada's anti-spam laws. For more information on these meetings, visit the INDU Committee website at www.ourcommons.ca/Commit-

This week, I attended 11 meetings and two events, as well as recorded one message. I will be back in the riding for the weekend to attend an event before heading back to Ottawa as the House will continue to sit. Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.



## SHELTERBELT TREE WORKSHOP ON OFFER IN NITON

If you are planning to plant trees in 2018 and have an aging shelterbelt with pest or disease challenges, you'll appreciate Yellowhead County Agricultural Services' shelterbelt tree establishment and maintenance workshop.

Tara McGinn, Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Coordi-

nator notes: "Residents who have questions about planning a shelter-belt or the upkeep of an existing one will find the workshop invaluable." The workshop will include information about designing a functional shelterbelt for Alberta, caring for and maintaining trees, pruning and common tree insect pests and disease. The use of stem mining weevils for Canada Thistle control will also be included in the evenings' agenda.

The workshop speaker, Toso Bozic, has 20 years' experience in the agroforestry and woodlot management sector, and will delve into the planning, planting, and maintenance aspects of shelterbelt development and upkeep. In addition, those residents looking for alternative methods of controlling Canada Thistle will find Jessica Watson's advice invaluable. Jessica will explain how using biological control agents such as stem mining weevils

can assist with thistle concerns.

The workshop is set for Wednesday, November 22nd from 6 PM to 9 PM at the Niton Community Hall. Snacks will be provided and cost to attend is \$5.00 per person.

# SECOND MALE CHARGED AFTER INCIDENT ON HAMPSHIRE ROAD

A second male has been arrested and charged for alleged involvement in an incident on Hampshire Road on October 5, 2017.

On October 16, 2017 a Hinton RCMP member conducted a traffic stop on Highway 16 in Yellowhead County. An adult male was arrested for outstanding warrants without incident.

Jesse Joseph Levi Leblanc, age 29, of Yellowhead County is facing several charges:

- 1) Forcible confinement
- 2) Aggravated assault
- 3) Assault with a weapon
- 4) Possession of property obtained by crime less than \$5000
- 5) Possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking
- 6) Possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine

Leblanc has been remanded into custody and is due in Edmonton court on October 19, 2017.

As this matter is now before the courts no further information will be provided.

1 male is in custody and an investigation continues on Hampshire Road after a 911 call yesterday afternoon.


On October 5, 2017 at 2:00 p.m.,

Any number of systems can go wrong, and oftentimes the first indication that something has gone awry is an illuminated dashboard signal.

One such signal is the 'check engine' light. Many drivers have little idea what to do when this indicator lights up, and this light can cause some anxiety. According to Consumer Reports, a check engine light turning on does not usually require immediate action. However, it does mean that you should make an appointment to have the vehicle inspected for potential problems.

Check engine lights are part of a car's onboard diagnostics. The light turning on may indicate something minor, such as a loose fuel cap, or something more se-

rious like a misfiring engine. When the light turns on, drivers wondering why may want to see if the answer is related to one of the following issues.

- 1. Loose gas cap: Fuel vapors can leak out and air can get in when the fuel cap isn't secured correctly. This can compromise the fuel system and make the check engine light come on. Take off the cap and then reseal it to see if that alleviates the problem. Cracked caps will need to be replaced.
- 2. Dirty oxygen sensor: A faulty or clogged sensor may not provide the right information about unburned oxygen from the vehicle's exhaust. This sensor monitors how much fuel is burned. Compromised data can cause a

decrease in fuel efficiency. Some do-it-yourselfers can replace an oxygen sensor on their own, but those who can't should have the issue addressed immediately by a professional.

- 3. Too much speed or load: Towing a trailer or another heavy item may put strain on the vehicle and cause the light to come on because of loss of power. Lightening the load and reducing speed can help fix the problem. Always consult with the owner's manual to determine the towing capacity of your vehicle.
- 4. Short or faulty code: Computers aren't always fool-proof, and sometimes an electrical short or another similar problem can cause a light to come on. Bring the vehicle to an automotive sup-

ply store. Such stores typically have diagnostics tools that can be hooked into the car's computer and provide a more detailed understanding of what is triggering the check engine indicator. In many cases, a steady check engine light is not a serious concern. However, when such a light comes on, drivers should try to find out why as soon as possible.

# KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

October 18, 2017

Our Board of Trustees is comprised of Brenda Rosadiuk, Chair, Joan Zaporosky, Vice Chair, Ellen Aust, Shirley Caputo, Ken Fate, Fiona Fowler and Dale Karpluk

• Trustees held their annual organizational meeting prior to the start of today's Public Board

meeting. Incumbent Brenda Rosadiuk was re-elected as board chair for the 2017-18 school year and incumbent Joan Zaporosky was also re-elected to the vice chair position. During the meeting, trustees also re-established their committee assignments for the upcoming year.

• The board approved up to \$6,800 towards assisting expenses for members of the new Superintendent's Youth Council to attend a student engagement ses-

sion in Edmonton Student Voice 2017 with the Public School Boards' Association of Alberta. GYPSD fully supports Alberta Education's belief that student voice plays a critical role in shaping every level of the education system and the educational experience. The Superintendent's Youth Council will allow high school students to build positive working relationships with others across the division, lead by example in their schools, provide

valuable input on education initiatives and participate in leadership opportunities. As part of their fiscal responsibilities as trustees, the board also received a report on the last six years of financial support that has been forwarded to assist various student initiatives and events.

- · A detailed update from transportation services included information on the current student ridership, number of ineligible students currently being transported, waiting lists and ride times. Grande Yellowhead has 2,599 students registered on 53 school bus routes with ineligible riders equalling 9% of the total ridership, or 287 students. This week is School Bus Safety Week and Chair Rosadiuk thanked all GYPSD drivers who work hard to ensure that our students arrive safe to school.
- · A number of facility maintenance projects will have the green light this year including the installation of new LED lighting in some gymnasiums, painting, and partial heating and ventilation upgrades. For the 2017-18 school year, Grande Yellowhead received their annual Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal funding in the amount of \$1.7 million. An amount for the replacement of flooring and roofing plus a contingency fund are also included in the department's expenditure plan for the current year.
- Trustees discussed the possible financial impacts to schools and the possible reduction of learning opportunities as a result of the province's announcement of a 45 credit cap for high schools. The 45 credit cap may impede the ability of boards to generate revenue from summer school, alternative/enhanced learning, and dual credit opportunities to offset operating expenses as schools will not receive any funding over and above the limit. Trustees will be bringing this concern forward for further discussion with other school boards at the provincial level.



# MP EGLINSKI PUSHES FOR ACTION ON PINE BEETLE

OTTAWA: On October 20th, in the House of Commons, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, again asked the Liberal government what their

plan was to stop the Mountain Pine Beetle from spreading.

"Mr. Speaker, Alberta is getting eaten alive. Jasper Park is turning brown due to the pine beetle infestation. Now they are fed up with Parks Canada and are moving into the foothills region, from 40,000 trees last year to over 500,000 this year. Our previous Conservative government gave \$8 million to fight this.

What is the Minister of Natural Resources going to do to stop the pine beetle from attacking

our forests?"

MP Eglinski will continue to press the federal government to stop the spread of the mountain pine beetle.

## FUNDS FOR CLASSROOM IMPROVEMENT

Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is pleased to have received approval for their Classroom Improvement Funding (CIF) proposal as part of the province's central agreement reached with the Alberta Teachers' Association in May of 2017. School boards and teachers have until December 15, 2017 to submit their proposals for the fund and all the money must be spent by the end of the 2017-18 school

year. GYPSD submitted their proposal after their CIF committee, comprised of management, trustee and teacher representatives, collaborated to develop the parameters around the \$594,000 grant which is the division's share of the province's \$75 million classroom improvement fund.

As a member of the division's CIF Committee, Chief Deputy Superintendent Ewen Murray believes that the approved proposal will greatly support teacher efficacy when dealing with challenges in their classroom. "Our project centers around pro-

fessional development (PD) as the committee felt that providing augmented PD, along with maker spaces and sensory room materials and resources, will have the greatest impact in our schools, and for our students."

The committee formally met to review the grant proposal and process on June 22, 2017, and developed a survey to assess teachers' wants and needs that was sent to division principals in August. Murray continued. "Three clear areas of focus came from the survey: new or augmented professional development opportunities in local

communities; maker space/digital library resources and new equipment/ tools to support self-regulation strategies in sensory rooms."

Almost 80% of the funds, approx.\$475,000, will go towards new materials or non-capital equipment for individual schools, with the balance for in-house teacher professional development initiatives.

The province will be paying the CIF grant funding in equal monthly installments beginning October 2017 and ending August 2018.

## MP EGLINSKI SPEAKS ON SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

OTTAWA: On October 18th, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, took part in debate on Bill C-57, An Act to amend the Federal Sustainable Development Act.

The Federal Sustainable Development Act provides a legal framework for developing and implementing a Federal Sustainable Development Strategy (FSDS) that makes government environmental, economic and social decision-making more accountable to Parliament. Bill C-57 proposes to expand the number of departments and agencies accountable to the Act from 26 to more than 90, as well as require those departments and agencies to prepare implementation strategies and report on their progress.

MP Eglinski was critical of the Liberal Government's ability to implement sustainable policies.

"In a recent report . . . tabled by the Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development, the minister and her government were given failing grades in applying a cabinet directive," stated MP Eglinski. "The commissioner concluded that the directive has not been applied to almost 80% of the proposals, which is a clear failure by the Liberals."

MP Eglinski also pointed towards a recent government-sanctioned hunt in Jasper National Park, the lack of progress on pipelines, the proposed tax changes, and the massive debt incurred by the Liberals as proof that the current federal government is unable to make long-term and sustainable decisions for Canadians.

"Sustainable development is important to the future of Canada and our grandchildren. Not only should environmental factors be considered, but social and economic pillars should be considered. . . Going forward, I hope the government will honestly consider sustainable development throughout its departments when drafting new proposals," concluded MP Eglinski.
