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MP EGLINSKI VOICES CONCERN OVER DRUG-IMPAIRED DRIVING

OTTAWA: On October 24th, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, took part in debate on Bill C-46, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (offences relating to conveyances) and to make consequential amendments to other Acts.

In recognition that marijuana is slated to be legalized by July 2018, Bill C-46 amends the provisions of the Criminal Code that deal with offences and procedures relating to alcohol and drug-impaired driving. Currently at Report Stage, the proposed legislation introduces new and higher mandatory fines and maximum penalties for impaired driving crimes, and it authorizes mandatory roadside screening.

"Science gives us the ability to calculate the effects of alcohol," stated MP Eglinski in the House of Commons. "I could sit down with any person in this room, and if he or she told me what he or she had to drink I could probably break it down and tell him or her what the [breathalyser] reading would be."

While law enforcement can detect alcohol in impaired driving, detecting drugs can be much more difficult. Drawing on his 35 years of experience as an RCMP officer, MP Eglinski expressed concern for the lack of scientifically proven instruments that allow officers to detect marijuana in blood levels.

Wondering what to do with all those items from your fall cleaning? We continue our fundraising efforts



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MP Eglinski Voices Concern Over Drug-Impaired Driving

"We are looking at that and testing it right now. . . I do not believe we have enough scientific evidence out there. However, [the Liberals] will be going ahead with this law to make marijuana legal," he said.

MP Eglinski also criticized the lack of substantial penalties to deter impaired drivers and keep them off the road. Bill C-46 does not increase penalties for the most serious impaired driving offence, namely, impaired driving causing death. The Conservative Party previously put forward an amendment when the bill was at Justice Committee to provide for a five-year mandatory sentence for impaired driving causing death. Individuals convicted of this very

serious offence, in some cases, are currently walking free with nothing more than a \$1,500 fine. The Liberals voted against the amendment.

"The legislation in Bill C-46 has some good intentions, and I do not disagree with it, but it needs to be reviewed with more scrutiny. It needs to be looked at. We need to get rid of a lot of the ambiguous parts that are written in there because it is going to tie up police officers on the road and make it very difficult for us to enforce impaired driving, especially with respect to drugs," concluded MP Eglinski.

Wildwood School, Wildwood



INDICATORS IT'S TIME TO CHANGE AIR FILTERS

Vehicle maintenance can protect drivers' investments and help their automobiles run efficiently. One area drivers should pay particular attention to is their vehicles' air filters. When operating at optimal capacity, an air filter improves fuel efficiency while ensuring vehicles accelerate

smoothly without taxing the engine. But when air filters are clogged, fuel efficiency is reduced and emissions are increased, a 1-2 punch that costs motorists money and hurts the planet at the same time. Drivers can check their owners' manuals to determine the recommended intervals

to replace air filters, but the following are a handful of indicators that suggest it's time to change them.

• Gas mileage: Unless you just purchased your vehicle, you likely know how many miles you can drive on a full tank of gas. If that gas mileage is suddenly slipping and you find yourself visiting the filling station more frequently, then it might be time to replace your air filter.

• Engine light: Drivers may be alerted to engine issues when the "Check engine" lights up on the vehicle's dashboard. This light may come on to indicate a problem with the air filter, as clogged air filters reduce air flow to the engine, resulting in an imbalanced air-fuel mixture that adversely affects the engine.

• Starting and idling problems: Vehicles sometimes don't start up as smoothly as they once did, and drivers may also notice vehicles are not idling smoothly. These symptoms may indicate misfiring spark plugs that are being polluted (and made less effective) by a dirty air filter that is reducing the flow of air to the engine.

• Acceleration difficulties: Automobiles that are operating at peak capacity accelerate quickly. But dirty, worn out air filters adversely affect acceleration. Drivers who notice that their cars are struggling to accelerate when stoplights turn green or on highways may need to replace their vehicles' air filters.

• Dirty air filter: Perhaps the biggest indicator that an air filter needs to be replaced is the filter itself. If you cannot find the air filter on your own, consult your vehicle owner's manual to determine where it is. Once you find the air filter, examine it in broad daylight. Clean air filters are white, so if the filter has darkened, it may need to be replaced.

STAY SAFE WHEN DRIVING IN WET WEATHER

Drivers must modify their driving habits when weather compromises their visibility and makes road conditions unsafe. Rain can fall any time of year, but tends to be most problematic in spring.

According to the Federal Highway Administration, wet roadways, and rain in particular, are the main cause of weather-related vehicle crashes. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration notes that, between 2004 and 2013, rain caused 573,784 crashes.

To drive safely in the rain and avoid accidents, drivers should follow certain precautions.

- · Maintain windshield wipers. Inspect and, if necessary change windshield wipers regularly to ensure they are working optimally. Always test wipers before driving in rainy weather.
- · Turn on lights with wipers. Reduced visibility is a major contributor to wet-weather accidents. Drivers'

views may be hampered by falling precipitation and glare from wet roadways. Cloudy conditions and fog also compromise visibility. When using windshield wipers, turn on your headlights as well. This makes your vehicle more visible to other motorists and improves your own ability to see the road and pedestrians.

- · Recognize changing road conditions. Roadways accumulate oil and engine fluids that can float in rainwater, creating slippery road surfaces. This is usually a problem during the first few hours of a rainstorm or in areas that receive little precipitation and then are subjected to downpours. These fluids make rain-soaked roads even more slippery. Slow down, leave more room between vehicles and try driving in the tracks left by vehicles ahead.
- · Reduce speed. The automotive group AAA says hydroplaning, when the tires rise up on a film of water, can occur with as little as 1/12 inch of wa-

ter on the road. The group goes on to say that tires have to displace a gallon of water per second to keep the rubber meeting the road. Drivers should reduce their speeds to correspond to the amount of water on the roadway. New tires can still lose some contact with the roadway, even at a speed as low as 35 mph. Therefore, reducing speed and avoiding hard braking and turning sharply can help keep the rubber of the tire meeting the road.

Rely on the defogger. Use the car's windshield defroster/defogger to improve visibility. Turn it on early and keep it on until the rain has stopped and visibility has improved.

Recover from a skid. Skids can be frightening, but when skidding, resist any temptation to slam on the breaks. Instead, continue to look and drive in the direction you want to go and slowly ease up on the accelerator.

· Skip the cruise control. It's important to maintain control over the vehicle in rainy conditions, so avoid using cruise control.

· Maintain tires. Proper inflation and tire tread levels can improve traction. AAA recommends checking tread depth by inserting a quarter upside down into the tire groove. If you can see above Washington's head, start shopping for new tires. Check tire pressure on all tires at least once a month. Get an accurate reading when tires are cold and adjust air pressure accordingly.

· Avoid other distractions. Distracted driving can be hazardous during good road conditions and even more dangerous when visibility and other factors are compromised. Switch phones and other devices off so you can fully focus on the road and other drivers.

Rainy weather can contribute to poor driving conditions. Drivers should make changes to speed and other factors to make wet weather driving as safe as possible.
