RENAMING OF BOUNDARY ROAD TO VETERANS BOULEVARD

Town Council authorized the renaming of Boundary Road, between Highway 16A and Highway 628, to Veterans Boulevard at Monday night's regular Council meeting. Council also gave Administration the direction to undertake necessary steps to complete the legal name change as well as appropriate signage and design with an intended implementation of November 2017.

Town Manager Tom Goulden says, "Numerous communities


within Alberta and Canada have chosen this manner of honoring and acknowledging those who have served with the Canadian Forces in the past."

This roadway is currently being expanded through a significant capital project. The resulting roadway will be a modern design; complete with pedestrian corridors, developed medians and other environmental improvements.

Mayor Ŵilliam Choy says, "The Legion continues to show great commitment in honouring those who serve our country. Communities are brought together by people who create connections and renaming Boundary Road to Veterans Boulevard would just be another way for the Town to show its support and gratitude to the Legion and Veterans."

Goulden also says, "The Town would seek to create physical acknowledgements and appropriate memorials along the roadway, green-space and trail system in the area. This could possibly take the form of benches in the area, tree plantings and cairns. Further discussion and partnerships with the Legion would be important to any planning."

In a letter to the Town, Gordon Morrison, President of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 256 of Stony Plain says, "The Legion is grateful and humbled by the Towns thoughtful acknowledgement of Veterans and their sacrifice and will be a willing partner in making this a true tribute to our Veterans, and those that have sacrificed all to ensure that we are able to live in a free and democratic society, together we have an opportunity to make something meaningful and lasting."

MP EGLINSKI ON NATIONAL SECURITY

OTTAWA: On November 20th, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, took part in debate on Bill C-59, An Act Respecting National Security Matters. The 150 page bill makes several dramatic changes to Canada's national security agencies, including the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS) and the Communications Security Establishment (CSE).

Among other things, Bill C-59 would replace the Security Intelligence Review Committee and the commissioner of the CSE with a new review agency and intelligence commissioner. It would also limit the ability of government departments to share data among themselves to protect national security, remove the offence of advocating and promoting terrorist offences, and make it more difficult for authorities to obtain a peace bond for individuals suspected of supporting terrorism.

"In the last year, horrendous attacks in the United States,

Europe, and our own country, have shown that no country is immune from the risks associated with terrorism and radicalization," stated MP Eglinski in the House of Commons. "Now is not the time to relax the laws that protect our national security."

PRIVATE DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

Parkland County has a program that provides funding to physically challenged residents for snow removal from their private driveways.

Criteria:

- Person applying must be the owner or renter of the residence where the driveway is being plowed, and it must be their primary residence.
- Residence must be located within Parkland County.
- Person must be physically challenged either by age or infirmity and must provide a Doctor's certificate or note verifying that they are physically unable to remove snow from their driveway.
- All persons 18 years or older living in the residence must be physically challenged.

Residents can apply by submitting a letter stating their name, address and phone number along with the required Doctor's Certificate to:

Applications will be reviewed and residents contacted regarding their application. If approved, the resident will be responsible for hiring a private contractor to remove the snow. Residents then submit proof of work completed, via paid invoice, to the County for reimbursement. The current maximum reimbursement per approved resident per year is \$300. KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

November 15, 2017

• Trustees approved the final draft of the Combined 2017-2020 Three Year Education Plan/2016-2017 Annual Education Review Report. The draft was presented for preliminary approval pending the addition of audited financial information. The final document will be available on the division's website by November 30th.

• An overview of the projected budget for the 2017-18 school year noted a smaller deficit than originally planned thanks in part to a significantly higher than anticipated (over 16%) student enrolment in kindergarten programs throughout the division, and overall decreased expenditures.

• Citing socio-economic factors and the resulting departure of many families from GYPSD communities especially in the Edson, Hinton and Grande Cache areas, last year's graduation rates were slightly lower than the provincial averages. However, our FNMI students' graduation rates continue to be significantly higher than the province: from 14.4% higher for completion of high school within 3 years up to 19% higher for five years.

• Learning Services provided a detailed report on the 259 Grade 9 students who participated in the 'Take Our Kids to Work Day' on November 1st. Parent comments included "I wish we had this when I was in Grade 9"; students noted ""I now have a better idea of what I would do if I got this job", and businesses were pleased to see "our local students taking interest in local businesses and careers". Looks like another successful venture into the world of work for GYPSD students!

• Trustees Fate, Karpluk, and Zaporosky will be working with Superintendent Lewis to develop an agenda for next year's board planning seminar. The board has an annual planning seminar for the purpose of studying policy, building effective teams, generative governance, and other identified topics of need.

November 1, 2017

• Facility Services provided their regular update to the board on the current capital project in the division: the new replacement school in Edson, Mary Bergeron Elementary. The gymnasium has been completed and was turned over to an excited school to use the week of October 23rd. Last minute finishing work continues in the learning commons with painting, flooring and millwork over the next couple of weeks. The old A.H. Dakin School has been demolished, and the removal and cleanup of the site to prepare for the new bus lane continues dependent on weather conditions.

• The board approved Trustees Caputo, Rosadiuk and Zaporosky to attend the National School Boards' Association annual conference in San Antonio, Texas on April 7-9, 2018. Chair Rosadiuk noted "This conference is an excellent professional development for trustees to learn more about global news in regards to public education, and receive information about new resources and tools to help move our division forward."

To date, WINN has invested over \$97 million in 85 projects.

Under the current Liberal Gov-

Repayable contributions cover up to 50% of total eligible costs for each project, to a maximum of \$3.5 million per project. As long as the recipient is in good standing, interest will not be charged.

MP Eglinski noted the increased threat of extremist travellers, those who have left Canada to join terrorist groups abroad.

"As ISIS continues to lose ground in Syria and Iraq, supporters of this militant group and other terrorist organizations have returned to their home countries, Canada included, with almost 60 of them now returned," he said. As of October, it was reported that at least 5,600 extremist travellers had returned to 33 countries world-wide. Canada's figure of 60 is considered to be a conservative estimate, which may be as high as 180.

After his speech, MP Eglinski was asked if he could quantify the cost of surveillance on the extremist travellers who have returned to Canada. Calling on his past experience as an RCMP officer, he responded that the cost of keeping track of 180 individuals would be astronomical for the government. He added that it would cost less than the amount to support Canada's injured soldiers, whose benefits were recently cut by the Liberal Government.

"It is the responsibility of the government to ensure that all of

Canada's security and intelligence services have the tools they need to do their jobs . . . [Bill C-59] is the result of an election promise. I do not think there is any room or place in Canada's security to be worrying about an election promise versus the security of Canadians," concluded MP Eglinski.


