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ATTEMPT MURDER CHARGES LAID IN DEVON INCIDENT

Following a lengthy investigation into a shooting incident occurring in mid August, the Edmonton Serious Crimes Branch - General Investigation Section (GIS) have laid a charge of Attempted Murder against a 34-year-old male.

34-year-old George Daniel Siemens is currently in custody at the Edmonton Remand Centre, where the GIS Unit effected his arrest on January 17. Siemens has been in custody at Edmonton Remand Centre since an earlier, unrelated, arrest on October 30, 2017 in Barrhead.

Edmonton, AB - Investigators from the RCMP's "K" Division Historical Homicide Unit (HHU) are continuing to push forward with three separate investigations, each involving a woman who initially had been reported missing in Al-

berta but believed by police to have been victims of homicide.

The three cases, although not believed to be related, span a period of approximately 30 years; from 1983 to 2013. The victims in each case are women who vary in age from 16-years-old to 70 years-old and none of them have been found to date. All three cases remain unsolved, but it is the belief of S/Sgt.

Jason Zazulak, who heads up the "K" Division HHU, as well as of the investigators who comprise the unit, that each case can and will be solved.

The first case is that of Shelly Ann Bacsu who was 16 years of age when she was reported missing to Hinton RCMP on May 3, 1983 after she failed to return home from a friend's residence in Hinton; a walk

of seven kilometres which she had done many times before. Family members became concerned when Shelly Ann did not arrive home by 9:30 that evening and when their own search failed to locate the teen by 11:30 p.m., they reported her missing to the RCMP detachment in Hinton. Extensive searches by the RCMP of the Town of Hinton and the surrounding rural area did not locate Shelly Ann but police did find several of her belongings alongside the Athabasca River near the Town of Hinton. Investigators believe that Shelly Ann was killed and continue to seek her remains.

Stephanie Stewart (70) was working at the Athabasca Fire Lookout Tower near Hinton as an employee of Environment and Sustainable Resource Development in the summer of 2006. Colleagues became concerned about her well-being when she failed to call in on the morning of August 26, 2006. A visit to Stephanie's cabin revealed that all was not well and the RCMP was called in to investigate. Evidence at the scene led investigators to believe that Stewart had been murdered. Searches throughout the surrounding area and elsewhere failed to locate her.

It was on November 30, 2013 when 44-year-old Deanna MacNeil was reported missing to the Vegreville RCMP detachment by a friend after she had not been heard from within preceding 48 hours; something which the friend though very unusual as Deanna was in the habit of contacting her several times a day. The police investigation confirmed that Deanna had been seen in Mundare at the Servus Credit Union ATM, the Mundare Liquor Store and lastly at a friend's place around 12:30 p.m. on the morning of November 28, 2013. Police conduct several searches including two extensive ones of the Mundare townsite, but Deanna was not located. Friends and family have not had any contact from Deanna since she was reported missing. The RCMP believes that she was the victim of homicide.

S/Sgt. Jason Zazulak, NCO i/c "K" Division HHU believes that these investigations will be solved and that the key pieces of information which will allow HHU investigators to identify the persons responsible for the deaths of these women are known by members of the public. "In each of these three cases, we know that there are people out there who have knowledge of what happened to Shelly Ann, Deanna and Stephanie. We want to hear from those people, whether it be through Crime Stoppers, through their local detachment or through our own social media channels."

The rapid expansion and adoption of social media in many facets of the lives of Canadians has opened up the opportunity for the RCMP to receive new information about cases through the use of social media accounts held directly by the homicide investigators themselves. Cpl. Kerry Shima of HHU is the lead investigator for Stephanie Stewart's case. He has a Twitter account and will be tweeting about Stephanie's case as well as topics related to unsolved homicides. The Twitter account is @KerryShima RCMP.

The RCMP encourages anyone with information about any of these cases to contact their local detach-

The families of these three women deserve to know what happened, to bring their loved ones home, and see a resolution through an arrest of the person or persons responsible.



STEP 2018 HELPS EMPLOYERS HIRE STUDENTS

Alberta students will get a leg up in their careers through the Summer Temporary Employment Program (STEP).

The province's economy is improving and the government wants to make sure all Albertans benefit from the recovery, including students and employers. STEP gives students the opportunity to develop important skills while helping employers hire the staff they need. Applications are now being accepted for STEP from employers who want to hire students for summer work between May and August. Eligible employers will get a \$7-per-hour wage subsidy.

"STEP has been a valuable program for students interested in gaining unique, first-hand work experience, and it helps employers hire knowledgeable, enthusiastic summer staff. As our economy is looking up, we want to continue helping students and employers alike. I encourage employers to apply and support our future generation of bright Albertans." - Christina Gray, Minister of Labour

Last summer, STEP helped about 3,000 students connect to valuable work experience with almost 1,400 employers across the province in a wide range of fields such as tourism, research, information technology, marketing and customer service.

More than 5,700 students have gained jobs through STEP since the program was restored in 2015 after being cut in March 2013 by the previous government.

STEP is available to small businesses, non-profit organizations, public libraries, school boards, publicly funded post-secondary institutions, municipalities, First Nations and Métis settlements.

At the time of his arrest in Barrhead, Siemens was wanted on warrants out of Fort Saskatchewan (7 charges), Westlock (5 charges), Whitecourt (4 charges), Camrose (6 charges), Vermillion (2 charges). These outstanding warrants were all in relation to break and enters, including theft and possession of stolen property incidents which occurred throughout Alberta in 2017. Those charges have not yet been dealt with in court, and he will remain in custody until all court proceedings have been concluded.

"A significant number of investigations have been solved by the arrest of Siemens" says Constable Mike Fulton of the Edmonton RCMP Serious Crimes Branch – GIS. "We continue to investigate several other unsolved crimes throughout the region and will determine if there is any evidence amongst the various reported offences to be linked to solved crimes. We strongly encourage the public to

contact us if they think they have a tip about an unsolved crime."

Edmonton, Alberta – The Alberta RCMP have charged a man with two counts of uttering threats after he had posted threatening messages on Twitter

targeting Prime Minster Justin Trudeau and Premier Rachel Notley.

Orion Rutley was arrested on January 19, 2018 and charged with two counts of uttering threats. He was released on his own recognizance with several conditions including no contact with Prime Minister Trudeau or Premier Notley, no use of social media, and not to possess weapons. Rutley is scheduled to appear in Provincial Court in Leduc on Thursday, February 8, 2018 at 10:00 a.m. The police investigation is continuing; however additional information is not available at this time. Should further details stem from the ongoing police investigation, an update will be provided to the media by way of an updated media release.

LEDUC RCMP DRUG UNIT MAKES SECOND DRUG BUST OF 2018

Leduc, Alberta – On January 11, 2018 Leduc RCMP's Drug Unit took down another drug trafficking operation in Leduc. As a result of a complex investigation the Drug Unit was able to execute a search warrant at a local residence which resulted in four individuals being arrested and charged.

18 year old Cory MELEN-

KA of Leduc, who was at the centre of the investigation, has been charged with 3 counts of trafficking methamphetamine (Commonly known as Crystal Meth), possession of property obtained by crime and unauthorized possession of a firearm. He is being held in custody while the matter of his bail is decided by the court.

37 year old David KOPPE-RUD and 34 year old Ashley HERZOG have both been charged with possession of cocaine, marihuana, and psylocibin (commonly known as magic mushrooms). They have both been released from custody while awaiting their court appearances.

A fourth individual was charged with firearm offences, but their identity is being withheld as they are a youth.

"Our Drug Unit is committed

to interrupting the dangerous criminal activities of people trafficking drugs" says Cst. Guillaume Lamoureux, the Acting NCO i/c of the Drug Unit. "As a continued measure of crime reduction within the Leduc community we will pro-actively target drug traffickers. This is one way of reducing the harm caused to a community by this illicit actively."



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AHS WARNS ABOUT CALLER ADVISING BREAST SELF-EXAM

BARRHEAD/SLAVE LAKE – Alberta Health Services (AHS) is working with the RCMP to warn women in northern Alberta to be aware of misleading telephone calls regarding breast cancer results.

As of January 25, AHS received reports of a man calling two women, one in Barrhead and one in Slave Lake, claiming to be from a medical imaging facility. The caller relayed breast exam results and implied that routine follow-up required the women to immediately perform a breast self-exam while on the phone. The caller also asked for personal information.

AHS and RCMP were informed of similar calls of this nature, in the summer of 2017. AHS issued a PSA at that time and no further incidents were reported until one phone call on January 21, 2018 and a second on January 25, 2018.

Although AHS representatives may call to discuss mammography details, they will never ask a patient to conduct a breast self-exam over the phone.

If you receive a phone call of this nature, please hang up, note the time and any other call details and do the following:



• Immediately after you hang up with the caller, pick up the phone again, wait for the dial tone, then press "*" then "5" then "7".

• Wait for a voice recording to tell you that the call has been traced then hang up. "*57" will create a trace of the previous call that the police or RCMP can access later.

• After completing the above *57 steps, hang up again, and immediately contact local police or RCMP on their non-emergency line. Be sure to inform them you dialed *57 after the call of concern.

If you are uncomfortable with calling police directly or are uncertain whether the call is legitimate, you can call AHS' Screening Program Client Support Line at 1-866-727-3926.

An AHS privacy investigation is underway. As it is an active and ongoing investigation we cannot comment further.



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CALL FOR PROPOSALS – SMART GRID SYSTEMS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform constituents that National Resources Canada has announced a \$100-million call for proposals to fund smart grid systems.

The funding will support the deployment of proven smart grid in-

tegrated systems, which will better utilize existing electricity assets while fostering innovation and creating jobs.

Eligible recipients include legal entities formed in Canada, such as electricity and gas utilities, electricity system operators, and distribution companies. Indigenous and municipal governments can also submit proposals. To help interested stakeholders find information on federal programming that can help develop smart grids in Canada, a new website has been established, which includes a comprehensive guide to funding for eligible projects (www. nrcan.gc.ca/energy/science/programs-funding/19793).

The deadline is March 4, 2018.

"It is good to see the Government of

Canada encouraging innovation and market-driven mechanisms to grow our economy and protect our environment through clean energy projects. However, given that we have experienced recent closures of coal-fired power plants in our riding, it is critical that the government also work with those who will have to transition from the coal industry into these new jobs," concluded MP Eglinski.

CANADA SUMMER JOBS 2018 NOW OPEN

• Organizations that provide services and/or supports the LGBTQ2 community; and

• Organizations that provide opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics

(STEM) and Information and Communications Technology (ICT), particularly for women.

"Canada Summer Jobs helps employers create summer job opportunities for students in their communities," said Eglinski. "It is designed to focus on local priorities, while achieving tangible results for both students and our communities."

"This is a worthwhile investment into our local businesses, as well as our students and I know it will benefit many," concluded MP Eglinski.




Fun By The Numbers

PUBLIC CONSULTATION ON LEADERS' DEBATES

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to invite constituents to participate in a public consultation on political party leaders' debates. The information gathered during these consultations will be used to help inform policy decisions, with the goal of having an independent commission or commissioner in place in advance of the next federal election campaign.

"A well-informed, engaged electorate is fundamental to the health and well-being of our democracy," stated MP Eglinski.

In every federal election since 1984, leaders' debates of one kind or another have been held. Traditionally, a consortium of Canada's major broadcasters has organized the events. In 2015, there were a total of five leaders' debates, but they were not broadcast to a wide audience nor attended by every political leader.

"The Liberals are proposing to set up an independent commission to organize leaders' debates in future federal elections," stated MP Eglinski. "But it is a

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proposal that comes with many complications and questions. Who would be on this commission? How would the debates be organized? Who would be invited to participate and who would be left out?"

The Honourable Karina Gould, Minister of Democratic Institutions, is conducting roundtable discussions at academic institutions across Canada, as well as accepting feedback from members of the public. The Parliamentary Committee on Procedure and House Affairs (PROC) also began a related study in November 2017.

"I invite all constituents who have an interest in democratic practices to provide feedback through the consultation or to write Minister Gould with their thoughts," concluded MP Eglinski.
