Brazeau County has a new customizable mobile App available as a free download to offer residents and businesses a new way to access information and connect to their County.

The App, developed by SMP Apps, offers a number of features, including the ability to call a number of Brazeau County phone numbers, use the public webmap, access the iHunter App, report a road, bylaw, weed, or property problem, and view agendas and minutes. This is in addition to features allowing users to view County news, events, business directory, alerts, as well as Alberta Emergency Alerts. A customizable push notification system will give users real-time updates on County news events, and alerts.

The App is built on a scalable platform that will enable future updates and additional features to be added as they become available. It was developed by SMB Apps, an Alberta company that specializes in mobile apps for municipalities.

"We're pleased to offer another way for residents, businesses, and visitors to connect with the County," says Reeve Bart Guyon. "We are committed to both sharing information, and hearing from ratepayers. This App is another tool to help us do both."

DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP ARREST THREE SUSPECTS AFTER BREAK AND ENTER TO RESIDENCE

On March 9, 2018 at approximately 3:51 A.M., Drayton Valley RCMP received a report of an intrusion alarm at a residence on Range Road 85. Drayton Valley RCMP members responded and located a suspect vehicle leaving the immediate area, north bound on Range Road 85. A traffic stop was conducted with the vehicle, which was occupied by a 33 year old female, a 51 year old male and a 46 year old male. All individuals are known to police, and both males involved have extensive Criminal Records including multiple property related offence convictions.

Ricky David LABINE, 51 yrs, formerly of Lodgepole, AB and

believed to have been recently residing in the Edmonton area, is charged with Break, Enter and theft to a dwelling house, and Possession of Break in tools.

Leo McINTYRE, 46 yrs, of No Fixed Address, believed to be currently from the Edmonton area, was recently released from custody on a prior offence and is charged with Break, Enter and theft to a dwelling house, Possession of Break in tools and Possession of Methamphetamine.

McINTYRE has been remanded in custody. LABINE has been released by a Justice of the Peace on a recognizance, and the 33 year old female involved was released on a Promise to Appear in Court on 3 charges awaiting to be sworn; Break and Enter, Possession of Break In Tools and Possession of Methamphetamine.

All three accused are set to appear in Provincial Court in Drayton Valley on May 1, 2018.

"Property Crime is a continuous and ongoing priority not only for this Detachment, but the Province as a whole for the Police," says Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo of the Drayton Valley RCMP. "Due to the swift and professional action of the Drayton Valley RCMP members involved in this incident, we are able to catch and identify three individuals involved in property crime in this area. We are committed to helping reduce property crime and bring criminals before the courts."

I spent most of the week travelling through the south and east end of the riding. I had meetings with students, business leaders, and members of municipal and provincial governments. I also attended another rural crime town hall.

On Monday, I spent the day at my Rocky Mountain House office.

I spent Wednesday and Thursday in Drayton Valley where I met with MLA Mark Smith, Mayor Michael Doerksen, and Mr. Manny Deol of the community's Clean Energy Technology Centre.

On Thursday afternoon, I visited St. Anthony Catholic School in Drayton Valley. There, I met with grade six students to talk about the role of an MP and answer their questions on how the federal government

I was one of the responding RCMP officers when Atwal attempted to murder an Indian Minister in 1986. I want to know how this convicted criminal was invited to a state dinner.

In 2018, Leduc Enforcement Services will be focusing on increasing public awareness relating to various topics in the community which affect the quality of life of Leduc residents.

"Keeping sidewalks clear of

snow and ice is about public safety," says Leduc Enforcement Services Sgt. Michael Stadnyk. "This winter, we kindly ask that residents lend a helping hand to your neighbour who might need assistance in clearing their walkways."

According to the city's Community Standards Bylaw (https://www.leduc.ca/enforcement-services/community-standards), property owners must clear snow and ice from any sidewalks adjacent to their property within 48 hours of accumulation.

"We actually recommend that property owners remove snow and ice as quickly as possible before it has a chance to harden," says Stadnyk. "It's physically easier on the person shovelling, and takes less time than if with mobility challenges and other health concerns."

According to Alberta Health Services, falls create a significant strain on Alberta's health care system, seeing, on average, a senior hospitalized every 10 minutes due to a fall. Statistically, more than 90 per cent of hip and wrist fractures in seniors, as well as 60 per cent of head injuries, are due to falls.

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SOME TELLTALE SIGNS OF ENGINE TROUBLES

Engine troubles are many drivers' worst nightmares. Whether they occur out on the road or they prevent drivers from leaving their driveways in the morning, engine troubles can quickly derail plans and cost drivers substantial amounts of money.

Thankfully, engine troubles are often noticeable long before cars break down. Drivers who learn to recognize the signs that suggest engines might be in need of work can avoid being stranded on the road or at home.

• Vehicle shaking: One telltale sign of engine trouble is when a vehicle shakes while it's moving. Drivers of old cars and trucks may not expect the smoothest of rides, but cars that shake, sometimes violently, could be experiencing problems. Sometimes a car might shake if its spark plugs need replacing. That's an easy, inexpensive fix that drivers can do on their own in a matter of minutes. A more serious cause of the vehicle shaking could be problems with its timing belt or fuel intake system. Drivers who inspect and/or replace their spark plugs but notice their vehicles are still shaking should take their cars into their mechanics immediately.

• Sudden gas mileage reduction: Drivers who notice they're not getting as much bang for their gas bucks as they used to might have engine troubles to blame. According to Pep Boys, a dropoff in gas mileage might be indicative of an issue in the compression stroke of the engine. Such an issue can typically be fixed by having the fuel system serviced, which will clean the fuel system and can help restore the vehicle's performance and reduce emissions.

• Noises: If driving has become as noisy as a rock concert, drivers should take heed that this could be indicative of engine trouble. Pep Boys notes that noises typically indicate abnormalities in the combustion flow. Such noises may include knocking, hissing and popping. Vehicles making these noises should be taken to a mechanic immediately.

• Stalling: Vehicles that jerk or stall also may be experiencing engine troubles. While old spark plugs might be the culprit, stalling or jerking may indicate clogged fuel lines or fuel filters. Such issues may also be traced to issues with the vehicle's computer system. Bring such issues to the attention of a mechanic, and reduce their frequency with regular oil changes.



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HOW TO AVOID AND REPAIR FLAT TIRES

Nothing can delay road trips more suddenly than flat tires. Unfortunately, because tires are the only part of the vehicle constantly in contact with the road, wear and tear is to be expected.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that flat tires and blowouts are a leading cause of highway traffic accidents. Even though flats cannot be prevented, there are ways to make tires less vulnerable and make vehicles safer along the way.

Flat tire avoidance

Routine inspection and tire maintenance is essential to their performance. In addition, paying attention to road hazards and avoiding them when possible can prolong the life of tires.

• Tire pressure: Tires should be maintained at the correct air pressure indicated on

the sidewall or as advised by the manufacturer. Tires with too much air can be damaged by bumpy roads and potholes. Tires that are not inflated enough may increase friction on the roadway, resulting in a blowout. Check tire pressure routinely, and do so when the tires have rested for three hours. Many vehicles now monitor tire pressure automatically and alert drivers through a signal on the dashboard.

• Tire wear: The advisors at Select Auto Imports say that inspecting tires for uneven wear should be a routine part of maintenance. If tires show uneven wear, they may be more susceptible to flats or blowouts. Tire rotations can help alleviate uneven wear. The NHTSA recommends tires be rotated every 5,000 miles.

Tire treads: The All-

state Insurance company says to look for worn tire treads. Check for wear bar indicator marks located between the tread pattern of the tires. If the wear bar is level with the treads, it's time for new tires. Otherwise, place a quarter between the grooves of the tire. If the tread doesn't extend beyond the top of Washington's head, it's a good idea to replace the tires.

• Construction sites: Drivers should try to avoid areas under construction. Rocks, nails, metal shards, glass, and divots in the roads can cause punctures and eventually flats.

Flat tire repair

When flats occur, having the right tools and understanding the procedure for fixing the flat is key.

Drivers will need an inflated spare tire, a jack, a lug wrench, bracing material (to keep the vehicle from rolling, such as a brick or piece of wood), and the vehicle's owner's manual. Goodyear says it is essential to fix the flat in a safe area away from traffic and on a flat surface.

• Use the owner's manual to find the correct position to place the jack to lift the car.

• Remove hubcaps or center covers to access the lug nuts. With the lug wrench, loosen lug nuts in a counterclockwise direction.

• Take off the tire and put on the spare. Replace and tighten the lug nuts. Replace hubcaps or covers.

• Slowly lower the vehicle and drive cautiously to ensure the spare is in working order.

• Purchase a new tire or have a hole plugged or repaired at a tire center.

At approximately 10:10 a.m. today, a male who pointed a knife at a pharmacist, made off with an undisclosed amount of prescription drugs and fled the area. RCMP were unable to locate him.

He is believed to be the same suspect who robbed the Healthcheck Pharmacy on February 26. Attached is a composite sketch created after the incident at this Pharmacy.

Previously, on February 10 at 10:54 an unknown male went behind the counter at the Co-Op Food Store Pharmacy and took five bottles of narcotics. This male did not produce, nor threaten anyone with a weapon. Attached is a video still from this occurrence as the RCMP now believe that the three incidents are related.

"The actions of this individual are escalating" says Constable Mark Bovaird of the Leduc GIS Unit. "We are seeking the public's assistance in identifying this male in order for us to put a stop to these incidents, for everyone's safety."

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FCC OFFERS ASSISTANCE TO CUSTOMERS IMPACTED BY GRAIN MOVEMENT DELAYS

Regina, Saskatchewan, March 7, 2018 – Farm Credit Canada (FCC) is offering support to customers across western Canada facing potential cash flow problems due to delays in grain movement to international markets.

"We have been monitoring the grain movement situation for the past number of weeks and are aware it could have an impact on our customers' short-term cash flow through the busy spring season," said Michael Hoffort, FCC president and CEO. "We feel it is important that we be proactive and ensure our customers know that we are here to support them and have tools available to reduce the impact on their business from these unforeseen challenges that are beyond their control."

FCC is available to support all its grain and oilseed customers potentially impacted by delays in grain delivery in the three Prairie provinces and British Columbia's Peace region, and to explore options to address their individual needs.

"We will support customers as needed, and continue to ensure they have the financial means to get their crops in the ground this spring," Hoffort said, noting FCC rolled out a similar program in 2014.

Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, said FCC is a strong and stable partner in the agriculture sector which is there to provide support for farmers.

"I am pleased that Farm Credit Canada will help producers deal with the unfortunate financial challenges caused by the delay in grain transportation," MacAulay said. "Working with FCC, we will closely monitor cash flow concerns and ensure producers potentially impacted by delays in grain delivery have the flexibility they need. I also encourage all affected producers to consider applying to the federal Advance Payments Program (APP), a financial loan guarantee program that gives producers easier access to credit through repayable cash advances."

The APP offers cash advances for stored or planted crop of up to \$400,000, the first \$100,000 interest-free. Under the APP, the federal government guarantees repayment of cash advances issued to farmers by producer organizations. Customers are also encouraged to contact their FCC relationship manager or the FCC Customer Service Centre at 1-888-332-3301 as soon as possible to discuss their individual situation and options.

On March 8, 2018 at approximately 4:13 A.M., An urgent call of a Carjacking with a firearm on Highway 620 in Brazeau County was received by Drayton Valley RCMP. A local cab driver had their vehicle stolen by suspects who hired the cab for a ride, and en route pointed a firearm at the driver and ordered the driver to leave. The victim departed and was not injured. Assistance was dispatched from Rocky Mountain House Detachment who made contact with the stolen vehicle. A second suspect involved with another stolen vehicle attempted to block Police from stopping the stolen cab. Police were able to get by the second stolen vehicle and were able to successfully disable the stolen cab with a spikebelt. Several gunshots were discharged by the suspect into the air. After a short standoff the suspect was taken into custody without further incident. The second stolen vehicle was also successfully stopped by Police after it had broken down and the driver was taken into custody.

Avery Goodrunning, 23 years of age, from the Rocky Mountain

House area is charged with 13 Criminal Code offences including Robbery with a firearm, Pointing a firearm, Flight from Police, Theft and several related charges.

Kelly Goodrunning, 26 years of age, from the Rocky Mountain House area is charged with 9 Criminal Code offences including Robbery with a firearm, Pointing a firearm, Flight from Police, Theft and several related charges.

"This matter was extremely serious in nature and the potential for grievous harm was present throughout this incident," says Staff Sergeant Malcolm Callihoo of the Drayton Valley RCMP. "This was a great example of committed teamwork between two Detachment areas, Drayton Valley and Rocky Mountain House Detachments, to locate, apprehend and resolve this incident with no injuries to the Public or Police, and both suspects are now held in custody."

Both male suspects have been remanded into custody are scheduled to appear in Drayton Valley Provincial Court on March 20, 2018.

As this matter is before the courts, no further information will be provided.

Update1: The Breton RCMP were alerted to a truck spotted on Highway 39, that had been reported stolen in an earlier armed robbery/ car jacking in Stony Plain. On February 16 just before 1:00 a.m., Stony Plain responded to an armed robbery/ car jacking that occurred on Highway 43, where a citizen had his truck stolen from him. Two Caucasian males demanded his wallet, cellphone, Ipad and his truck. The citizen complied and the suspects fled in both the truck they were initially driving and the stolen truck.

The male suspects were described as Caucasian in the age range of 20 - 30 years old. They were driving a 2000s model GMC crew cab with a tidy tank in the back.

Notification was sent to all surrounding detachments to be aware of this incident, and to monitor for both the stolen truck and the suspect truck.

At 8:30 a.m., Breton RCMP members received information that led them to locate the stolen truck on Highway 39. The driver failed to comply with demands of the RCMP and fled. A pursuit ensued which included assistance from the detachments of Rimbey, Rocky Mountain House, Drayton Valley and Thorsby.

23-year-old Christopher Jacob Burke was arrested in the stolen truck and taken to Drayton Valley RCMP Detachment. The truck was recovered by the RCMP for return to the owner. Burke is facing criminal charges as follows: Operation of MV while being pursed by police, Dangerous Operation of MV, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime over \$5000.00, and Mischief.

He has been remanded in custody and is scheduled for court on February 20 at the Provincial Court of Alberta in Drayton Valley.

The Stony Plain/Spruce Grove RCMP investigation into the initial armed robbery/ car jacking is ongoing. The Stony Plain GIS Unit is investigating.
