



FCC OFFERS ASSISTANCE TO CUSTOMERS IMPACTED BY GRAIN MOVEMENT DELAYS

Regina, Saskatchewan, March 7, 2018 – Farm Credit Canada (FCC) is offering support to customers across western Canada facing potential cash flow problems due to delays in grain movement to inter-

national markets.

"We have been monitoring the grain movement situation for the past number of weeks and are aware it could have an impact on our customers' short-term cash flow through the busy spring season," said Michael Hoffort, FCC president and CEO. "We feel it is important that we be proactive and ensure our

customers know that we are here to support them and have tools available to reduce the impact on their business from these unforeseen challenges that are beyond their control."

FCC is available to support all its grain and oilseed customers potentially impacted by delays in grain delivery in the three Prairie provinces and British Columbia's Peace region, and to explore options to address their individual needs.

"We will support customers as needed, and continue to ensure they have the financial means to get their crops in the ground this spring," Hoffort said, noting FCC rolled out a similar program in 2014.

Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, said FCC is a strong and stable partner in the agriculture sector which is there to provide support for farmers.


"I am pleased that Farm Credit Canada will help producers deal with the unfortunate financial challenges caused by the delay in grain transportation," MacAulay said. "Working with FCC, we will closely monitor cash flow concerns and ensure producers potentially impacted by delays in grain delivery have the flexibility they need. I also encourage all affected producers to consider applying to the federal Advance Payments Program (APP), a financial loan guarantee program that gives producers easier access to credit through repayable cash advances."

The APP offers cash advances for stored or planted crop of up to \$400,000, the first \$100,000 interest-free. Under the APP, the federal government guarantees repayment of cash advances issued to farmers by producer organizations.

Customers are also encouraged to contact their FCC relationship manager or the FCC Customer Service Centre at 1-888-332-3301 as soon as possible to discuss their individual situation and options.



RE HVAC SYST

Before the weather starts to warm up too much, homeowners may want to evaluate their home cooling needs and ensure that all equipment is in good working order.

Spring air conditioning inspections and tuneups are essential steps in system performance. Homeowners should not take for granted that a system that performed optimally last year will do so this year when temperatures climb. Various factors, including weather damage, dust and grime, mechanical wear and tear, and even rodent or insect infestations, can compromise HVAC systems. Since HVAC systems have so many moving parts, a thorough inspection of such systems can save headaches and money down the road.

According to Heating Ontario, the extreme weather conditions that come along with fall and winter can be especially taxing on homes and the systems that keep them comfortable. SURVIVING A HOME RENOVATION

COMPLETE THESE HOME IMPROVEMENTS OVER THE WEEKEND

Home improvement projects ramp up when the weather warms up, as homeowners channel the rejuvenating feelings of spring and tackle their home to-do lists. Large-scale renovations can greatly affect a home, but smaller projects can yield impressive results and be completed over the course of a single weekend. If time is of the essence, these weekend or one-day projects may satisfy homeowners' desires to fix up their homes.


• Create an accent wall. Painting a focal wall in a home can create a serious impact. The bonus is it will not take as long or require as many materials as painting an entire room. Accent walls frequently feature a bold color, so decide on placement and tackle this project in less than a day.

• Install stair runners. Dress up hardwood stairs with decorative carpet runners. Runners come in elongated pieces of carpeting or individual pieces that can be placed on each step. If carpeting doesn't fit with the home's design, painting individual stair treads also can create visual appeal.

- Dress up the entryway. An entryway is a guest's first impression of a home. Many entryways can use a minor overhaul, both inside and outside. Paint the front door a different color so it pops from the curb. Install a new mailbox or decorative house numbers. A new welcome mat can change the look as well. Inside, consider laying a new floor. Resilient vinyl tiles come in many different patterns and can mimic the look of wood, travertine or marble. Installing a floor can take a day or two.
- Install a new faucet. Instantly improve a kitchen or a bathroom with new fixtures. New faucets can provide aesthetic appeal and low-flow faucets can help conserve water.
- Create a gallery on the staircase. Gather and arrange framed photos, artwork or wall accents so that they ascend the wall of a staircase. This creates a designer touch and can dress up an often barren area of wall space.
- Install a fresh light fixture. Improve drab spaces with a little illumination. Better Homes & Gardens suggests replacing an existing fixture with something new and vibrant. If hanging a new fixture is not within one's skill set, free-standing table or floor lamps also can cast a new glow on a space.
- Add molding. Molding can add instant aesthetic appeal to a room. Molding is appropriate near the floor, at the top of walls where they meet the ceiling, or even mid-wall as a chair rail. Some homeowners like to create framed molding on walls in formal living spaces.
- Update kitchen or bathroom hardware. Replacing hardware is a fast and easy project, but one that can have immediate impact. Swap out tired or outdated hardware for newer brushed metals and more impactful shapes and designs.

Home renovations do not need to take weeks or months. Many projects can be completed over the course of a weekend.

SIMPLE MAINTENANCE TIPS TO KEEP YOUR RIDE RUNNING STRONG

Motor vehicles are sizable investments that, for many people, trail only homes and educations in terms of the biggest expenses they will ever have. So it's in

drivers' best interests to take every step possible to protect their investments and keep their vehicles running smoothly as long as possible. While knowledgeable

mechanics can be invaluable resources, drivers can take several minor, simple steps to keep their cars running smoothly for years to come.

· Perform weekly visual inspections. Few drivers take the time to look at their vehicles once those vehicles lose their new car luster. But visual inspections can help drivers find problems that, though minor, may impact their vehicles' performance. For example, a routine examination of vehicle tires can indicate if those tires are properly inflated. Poorly inflated tires can decrease fuel efficiency and affect the overall safety of a vehicle. If tires appear flat, check their pressure and inflate them to the levels listed in

your owner's manual.

· Look for fluid leaks. Another telltale and easily identifiable sign that a vehicle needs some maintenance is the sight of fluids beneath the car. If you notice puddles or stains beneath where you normally park your car, your vehicle may be leaking fluids. Note the color and consistency of the fluid and then call your mechanic to determine which fluid is leaking and how to fix the problem.

Stick to manufacturer-recommended maintenance schedules. Whether your vehicle is brand new or has some tread on its tire, consult the owner's manual for manufacturer recommendations with regard to changing fluids

and replacing filters. Many recent models can now be driven roughly 5,000 miles before they need an oil change, but check your owner's manual for the guidelines established by your vehicle's manufacturer, and adhere to that schedule religiously. If you drive an older car, recognize that the vehicle may benefit from more frequent oil changes and tuneups.

In addition, read the manual for additional guidelines, such as how often to replace the air filter, headlight, turn signal and brake lamps, windshield wipers, and other vehicle parts that can wear down over time.

· Look under the hood as well. While many drivers feel that the

area beneath their vehicles' hoods is best left to the professionals, you can still lift up the hood every so often to see if there are any glaring problems that demand attention. Inspect rubber belts for signs of wear and tear, and know that such belts may need to be replaced every 50,000 miles or even more frequently depending on your driving habits. Lifting the hood is also necessary when checking fluid levels, which you should check periodically and before and after any long trips.

Drivers who notice or suspect damage when performing simple vehicle maintenance should bring these concerns to the attention of their mechanics as soon as possible.

RIDING UPDATE – WEEK OF MARCH 12, 2018

As stated at the end of my last update, I took a week off in lieu of a winter vacation. Upon my return to the riding, I got right back to work. Over the week, I met with several constituents throughout the riding, returned emails and phone calls, and participated in meetings. I spent Monday in my Edson of-

fice, where I answered emails and met with constituents concerning issues in the riding.

On Tuesday, I had a meeting in Edson regarding Kinder Morgan's Trans Mountain Pipeline Project. After my meeting, I drove to Jasper where I participated in the Jasper National Park Annual Forum, a public forum where the Park's yearly report is discussed. This year, it was also an opportunity to

ask Park staff about Jasper's wildfire preparedness and the spread of the mountain pine beetle.

On Wednesday, I stopped in Nordegg to meet with a constituent while on my way to Rocky Mountain House, where I spent some time in the office. After meeting with residents the following day, I drove to Drayton Valley for more meetings with constituents and business leaders, and later returned

to Edson.

On Friday, I attended the Peers Play School Ukrainian Supper and Dessert Auction.

I will spend Saturday celebrating St. Patrick's Day with friends and family before heading back to Ottawa on Sunday. The House of Commons will sit for two weeks before the Easter holiday. Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.

WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Each year, representatives from local emergency service functions provide a report to Council on activities. At the February 26 Regular Meeting, Council received reports from the Whitecourt Fire Department and Municipal Bylaw Enforcement. Highlights from the reports include:

- Members of the Whitecourt Fire Department responded to 328 calls, training, and the volunteers logged over 12,500 hours of service to our community. The Department will continue to promote the FireSmart Program in 2018. For current information on the Department and its activities, follow the Department's Facebook page at WhitecourtFD.
- Municipal Bylaw Enforcement continues to assist departments throughout the organization, and will be restarting community and event bike patrols in the coming weeks.
- An overview of 2017 will be presented by the Whitecourt RCMP in the near future.

The Economic Development Committee also provided an update on activities and accomplishments. The Committee and staff continue to work with provincial and local partners to attract investment and retain businesses in our community. This year, the economic development team will be conducting an online survey of the business community that will help develop future programs and resources to help with expansion and improve operations. Watch for the survey this April.

As a result of a 2018 incident in Fernie, BC, Occupational Health and Safety has been conducting site visits and audits of arenas across Alberta. A successful audit of the Scott Safety Centre was conducted in January 2018. There were four areas identified for improvement during the visit, which is exceptional. The inspectors identified only one other facility with fewer areas for improvement. The four items have already been addressed and reviewed by the Provincial OH&S Inspector.

Council scheduled a Special Meeting for April 3, 2018 at 5:00 p.m. to discuss the 2018 Budget. The 2018 Interim Budget was passed in December 2017. The final budget will include updates for provincial and federal grants, and assessment values. The Town of Whitecourt held a 2018 Budget Open House on February 28 to inform residents of proposed projects for the year, and to hear comments

on priorities and where tax dollars are spent. Comments received from the event will be reviewed during final budget deliberations.

The Collision Report is prepared annually, and the 2017 report shows an overall decrease in collisions from the previous year. However, incidents along the Highway 43 corridor have increased despite decreasing traffic counts. The Town of Whitecourt will be sending a letter to Alberta Transportation, which is responsible for safety and maintenance of the highway, informing the department of the local findings.

Council approved the closure of a portion of 47 Avenue to allow for the consolidation and sale of several properties within the downtown south area.

The Community Services Department presented its 2017 Year End Report to Council at the March 12 meeting. The report is prepared annually to provide Council and the Community Services Advisory Board with an overview of programs and services offered, and records major projects and accomplishments achieved throughout the year. Highlights from the report include:

- 102,815 scanned visits at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre;
- 1,816 people participated in reg-

istered programs;

- 66,678 visits to the ASAP Heating & Well Servicing Fitness Centre and Rotary Running Track;
- 2,043 people participated in aquatics classes at the Alliance Pipeline Aquatic Centre;
- 1,489 people were assisted through the Whitecourt Food Bank;
- 1,606 children and 1,296 adults attended Parent Link & Early Childhood Development programs;
- 22,990 passengers were provided service on Public Transit double from 2016.
- A complete copy of the report can be viewed on www.whitecourt.

Alberta Infrastructure is proceeding with an addition to the front of the Courthouse at 5020 52 Avenue to allow for Sheriff transportation units to park within the building. The project is valued at approximately \$2 million and construction is scheduled to start this spring.

Rowen Camps-Daly and Alyia Dibben are this year's Mayor for a Day initiative winners! Both students will be shadowing Mayor Chichak and attending the next Regular Meeting of Council on March 26.

Council has changed the date for the Regular Meeting of Council in August to Tuesday, August 21.






