ALBERTA RCMP WELCOMES PROVINCIAL FUNDING TO HELP ADDRESS RURAL CRIME

On March 9, 2018, the Government of Alberta announced an investment of \$8 million that will enable Alberta RCMP to place more employees where they can make the most impact: on the streets and in communities across the province.

This investment demonstrates the province's confidence in the Alberta RCMP's systematic and evidence-led Crime Reduction Strategy – a collaborative policing approach designed to address the root causes of crime and breaking the cycle of criminal activity in a community.

In partnership with the province, Alberta RCMP has developed an action plan that will enable the Force to address rural crime by adding 39 new officer positions and 40 civilian employees in areas that will ultimately lead to more RCMP officers on the road.

The investment represents additional support for Crime Reduction Units in communities that need it the most, six new intelligence-focused officers, four additional crime analysts and more civilian staff to cut down on paperwork so that officers can focus on investigations, patrols, and engaging with their communities.

"Rural Crime Reduction Units are designed to act fast to target repeat offenders who commit the vast majority of crimes in an area," said Deputy Commissioner Todd Shean. "I can assure you, if you are committing crime in Alberta, we will identify you and we will stop you."

YELLOWHEAD COUNTY CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF 9-1-1

(March 14, 2018) – Did you know that this past February marks the 50th anniversary of 9-1-1 dispatching worldwide? Yellowhead Regional Emergency Communication Center (YRECC), is proud to be taking part in the prolific history of the "Thin Gold Line"—an apt moniker for the men and women who literally answer our community's call for help daily.

Here's a brief history of the evolution of emergency dispatching in North America:

• In 1957, the United States'

National Association of Fire Chiefs recommended that a single three-digit standard be used to report fires.

• In March of 1964, 28-yearold New Yorker Kitty Genovese was murdered before 38 witnesses. None reported the incident to emergency responders, though her tragic death spurred an interest in a simple and immediate emergency line: the 9-1-1 call system.

• In the late '60s, the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, the Federal Communications Commission, and AT&T would recommend the implementation of 9-1-1 nationwide.


• In 1973, the U.S. officially began promoting 9-1-1 as the nation-wide, standardized emergency number.

• In 1972, Canada adopted 9-1-1 as the official emergency number, though its first use would come in 1974, in London, Ontario.

Today, it's estimated that 98% of Canadians have access to this vital protective service. Undoubtedly, you or someone you know may have been affected by the dedication and professionalism of our YRECC dispatchers.



The RCMP is proud to be the rural police force of Alberta. With the cooperation and support of the Government of Alberta and other community partners, Albertans can be certain that the RCMP's crime reduction strategies in rural communities will be innovative, sophisticated and successful. Quick Facts:

• Each RCMP District is equipped with a Crime Reduction Team dedicated to targeting prolific offenders, particularly in the areas of break and enters, vehicle thefts and thefts of other property.

• District Crime Reduction Teams have arrested 219 people, have laid 469 Criminal and Drug charges and have arrested 170 wanted persons. • The Alberta RCMP Traffic Units (RTU), in addition to promoting highway safety through enforcement activities, are also targeting traveling criminals. In January 2018 alone, the RTU Traffic Units made 9 major seizures of drugs and contraband, totalling in excess of \$1.3 million. This resulted in 14 arrests and 19 new Criminal charges being laid.



Gravel Tender - Council award the 2018 Summer Gravel Program to Jones Trucking and Backhoe Service Ltd. in the amount of \$930.911.09 and the additional \$170,320.09 be added to the 2018 final budget. Jones Trucking provided the lowest bid for the contract and has done work for the County in the past.

New Landfill Bylaw Passed -Council passed the new Landfill and Composting (LC) District stipulates where and what type of landfill can be built in Yellowhead County. This new zoning type encourages these new landfills to be on Crown land away from residential settlements and will allow concerns from residents to be heard for any proposed landfills. Class 1A/1B waste removal sites were removed from the final bylaw based on input from County residents at the March 13, 2018 Public Hearing.

The next Council Meeting is March 27, 2018. The next Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting is April 17, 2018. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

Do one project at a time.

The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (brought to you by Yellowhead County's Family and Community Support Services) has volunteers registered with and vetted by the Canadian Revenue Agency ready to help you with your taxes!

If eligible, you can drop off your T4s, T5s, donations, medical expenses and the previous year's income tax return at the Yellowhead County Wildwood Office. You will be contacted at a later date to pick up your tax return. The program hours are as follows: 8:00 AM to 12:00 noon; then 1:00 PM to 4:30 PM, Monday to Friday.

Please note that you will be asked to complete a questionnaire and sign an authorization form to e-file your tax return by the volunteers. No records or documents will be kept by the volunteers.

To be eligible, your Tax Returns must be simple (no business or farm income, no capital gains, no depreciation and not a death return). You must also be a resident of Yellowhead or Parkland County, and have a low income, wherein a single Income is \$30,000 or less, couples income is \$45,000 or less, and a single adult with dependent income is \$35,000 or less. As well,

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note that a current tax return is required for federal benefits to continue without disruption.




PROTECT VEHICLE PAINT FINISH

Perhaps nothing ages a car or truck more than a lackluster exterior finish. Even if vehicles are only a few years old, failure to maintain the paint, tires and chrome accents can make them look worn beyond their years, potentially affecting resale

The environment can be a vehicle's worst enemy. Protecting a car means being mindful of substances and habits that can compromise the exterior finish. Seek shade



Over time, the sun can damage a vehicle's paint job through oxidation and premature fading. People who live in areas with especially warm climates may see the paint on their vehicles suffer considerable damage thanks to the sun.

One of the easiest ways to protect a vehicle from the sun is to use sheltered parking or park in the shade whenever possible. This can help protect the paint, headlights and trim. Drivers should store their cars in their garages overnight and during daylight hours when they are home. Wash and dry

It's important to routinely wash vehicles to protect their exterior finish. Use a mild cleanser designed for automobiles and a clean rag or sponge so as not to cause scratches that can cause further damage. Because minerals in tap water can be left behind through evaporation and may oxidize and damage the paint, it's best to wipe away as much residual moisture as possible with a chamois. Paint protection

Waxing can prevent bird droppings, berries, splattered bugs, and more from sticking to the paint and wearing down the finish. Waxes come in paste, liquid and spray. Each type has a different reapplication schedule, so drivers should consult the product instructions.

Vehicle owners also can invest in spray films to further protect painted surfaces. Do-it-yourself products are applied like a spray and then dry to an invisible, durable film. This helps protect against insects, gravel, sand, winter salt, and even road grime. Different manufacturers offer protection films.

It is important to safeguard the exterior of a vehicle to help it look newer longer, protecting the value of the car or truck while also protecting it against the elements.





WHAT TO DO WHEN A TIRE BLOWS OUT WHILE DRIVING

Many frightening scenarios can unfold while driving. Inclement weather can affect visibility and the safety of roads, while distracted driving can put anyone on the road in harm's way.

One situation that can suddenly turn a Sunday drive into something scary is a blown out tire. No drivers or vehicles are immune to blown out tires. But savvy drivers who know what to do in such situations can greatly reduce their risk of a blown out tire turning into something far worse.

Recognizing a blown out tire

The movies might make blown out tires seem as though drivers suddenly find themselves in wholly uncontrollable situations. But blown out tires won't immediately send cars into the nearest roadside ditch. When a tire blows, the vehicle will immediately slow down and then begin pulling to the right or left, depending on which side of the car suffered the blowout. The automotive retailer Pep Boys notes that, if a front tire blows out, drivers will feel the force in their steering wheels, while a rear tire blowout will be felt more in the seat and/or body of the vehicle.

Driving through a blowout

Plenty of drivers have safely navigated their way through tire blowouts. When such a situation arises, drivers should avoid slamming on their brakes, instead allowing their vehicles to gradually decelerate, making sure to turn on their emergency flashing lights once they are certain they have control of the vehicle. As the vehicle slows down, pull to the side of the road, calling for help if necessary.

When on the side of the road Drivers who do not have a spare tire or cannot change the tire themselves should wait patiently for assistance to arrive after they have called for help. Drivers who can change their tires should place reflective cones or triangles behind their vehicles before they begin working. Such devices warn oncoming drivers of stranded vehicles. If replacing the tire with a donut, remember that such replacement tires are not designed to travel long distances and will need to be replaced shortly after they are put on the vehicle.

Edson, Alberta - As a result of pro-active police enforcement, RCMP have removed a large amount of suspected cocaine from the streets following a traffic stop on Highway 16.

On March 2nd, 2018 Police

conducted a traffic stop with a vehicle on Highway 16 near the Town of Edson, Alberta. As a result of the traffic stop, the officer entered in to a drug investigation which resulted in 1.25 kilograms of suspected cocaine, a small amount of cannabis marihuana, and a large sum of Canadian currency being seized from the vehicle.

"The RCMP across Alberta are engaged in strategies to reduce crime by utilizing a targeted, evidence based approach to policing," states S/Sgt John Spaans of RCMP K-Division. "Part of this strategy includes conducting targeted enforcement on known drug trafficking in an effort to remove these dangerous substances from the streets".

Two adults and a youth were located inside the vehicle. The adults were arrested and the investigation is continuing at this time. Police will not be naming the adults as to protect the identity of the youth.


