"We suggest people to think of it this way...any small appliance that produces heat, such as toasters, microwaves, countertop kettles and portable dishwashers, should always remain unplugged when they aren't in use," says Deputy Fire Chief Gerry Kelly, with Leduc Fire Services.

RCMP INVESTIGATE BREAK AND ENTER

LEDUC RCMP AND MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATIN

Update: RCMP have charged Hossein Ayaghchi (59) of Leduc County, with second degree murder and indignity to human remains in relation to the homicide of his son Mohammad Ayaghchi (32).

An autopsy conducted at the Chief Medical Examiner in Edmonton today determined that the manner of his son's death was homicide.

Hossein Ayaghchi was remanded into custody after a judicial hearing and will be appearing in Leduc Provincial Court on March 29, 2018.

Given that this matter is now before the courts, the RCMP will not be providing additional information in relation to the present charges. Should new details surface, they will be provided by means of an updated media release.

Background:

On March 15, 2018 at approximately 10:40 p.m., Leduc RCMP responded to a report that a male had been shot at a rural residence in Leduc County.

Members arrived on scene and found a deceased adult male outside of the home. The father of the victim was arrested and taken into custody.

THORSBY RCMP PREVENT BREAK AND ENTER IN PROGRESS

Leduc County, Alberta – On March 18, the Thorsby RCMP observed a suspicious vehicle parked in a driveway which ultimately led to arrests and the recovery of stolen property.

At approximately 7:00 p.m., while on patrol in the rural area,

Thorsby RCMP members spotted what appeared to be a suspicious vehicle parked on the driveway of a residence near Township 480 and Highway 778. The RCMP determined that the vehicle had a fake licence plate. A male and female were arrested outside the residence, and further investigation revealed a break and enter in progress within that residence.

42-year-old Kirk Kuske and 29-year-old Marcia Gold have both been charged with numerous offences including breaking and entering, possession of stolen property and other offences related to failing to comply with conditions of their prior releases. A search of the vehicle revealed other stolen property from other detachment areas.

Both Kuske and Gold remain in custody and are scheduled to appear in Provincial Court of Alberta in Leduc on March 22nd, 2018.

Partnerships with community members are important to the RCMP in ongoing crime prevention. If you see something or someone suspicious, report it to your local detachment.

"This also includes irons and hair styling tools, like hair dryers, curling irons, flattening irons, etc."

Leduc Fire offers a few helpful tips to keep in mind:

- If there is no power, it won't cause a fire. Keep items unplugged unless in use
- Always check for recalls on the product
- Inspect your small appliances, including the cords, for anything out of the ordinary
- Maintain and care for your appliances, this includes the cords
- Test ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) protection anywhere water and power are within six feet of each other
- Only use approved appliances. For example, items marked Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and Underwriters Laboratories Canada (ULC)
- Follow the instructions on your small appliances
- Extension cords aren't to be used as permanent power sources
- Don't overload your electrical outlets

"Many people rely on appliances that have an automatic shut-off feature, however sometimes those don't always work and that appliance becomes a fire hazard," says Kelly.

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CENTRAL ALBERTA DISTRICT ICRU INTERRUPTS CRIMINAL ACTIVITY

While conducting patrols through areas of known criminal activity in Leduc, the Integrated Crime Reduction Unit (ICRU) located a stolen truck, and ultimately arrested the driver who was subject of a Conditional Sentence Order.

On February 14 in the early afternoon, the ICRU team located a truck which had been stolen out of Leduc on February 9. Just before 6:00 p.m., 25-year-old Jesse Beaudry of Leduc was arrested, without incident, for possession of stolen property.

As a result of this arrest, Beaudry is facing new charges of possession of stolen property as well

Breach of Undertaking charges and Breach of Conditional Sentence Order (x 6). He remains in custody with a scheduled court date of February 22 in the Provincial Court of Alberta in Leduc.

The truck will be returned to its rightful owner.

"The strategy of the ICRU is to gather intelligence on crime hotspots and repeat offenders" says Corporal Pete MacMillan of the ICRU. "From our inception, our ongoing goal has been to proactively intervene in criminal activity, thereby reducing calls for service on the frontline members."

Citizens are encouraged to be aware of their surroundings and to report suspicious activity in your neighbourhood.

LEDUC RCMP CHARGE MAN WITH CHILD ABANDONMENT

Leduc, Alberta - On March 16th, 2018 shortly after 1030pm, Leduc RCMP were called to a complaint of a possible impaired driver in Calmar. A witness found the driver who appeared intoxicated, pulled over on the side of the road near a Calmar bar. The driver left his vehicle parked, abandoning his child who was not dressed for the weather, while he went into the bar.

After being in the bar for a period of time, the driver disclosed that he had a child with him. A concerned citizen went out to his car and found the two-month old child alone, cold, and in distress. The child was cared for by some concerned citizens until police arrived and was taken via ambulance to the Leduc Hospital.

Leduc RCMP partnered with Child and Family Services (CFS) and were able to identify the child's mother who came to the hospital. The child did not suffer any adverse affects from this incident. The male left the bar and drove away before police arrived.

The child's father, a 33-year-old man from Drayton Valley was located, arrested and charged with:

- One count of abandoning a child
- One count of causing a child to be in need of intervention
- One count of impaired operation of a motor vehicle
- One count of impaired opera-

tion over 80mg%


- One count of breach of a Recognizance

The accused was released on his own Recognizance and is scheduled to appear in Leduc Provincial Court on Thursday March 22, 2018.

The quick thinking of and care provide by concern citizens helped bring this incident to the attention of the Leduc RCMP. As this matter is now before the courts no further information is available.

COMPLETE THESE HOME IMPROVEMENTS OVER THE WEEKEND

Home improvement projects ramp up when the weather warms up, as homeowners channel the rejuvenating feelings of spring and tackle their home to-do lists. mimic the look of wood, travertine or marble. Installing a floor can take a day or two.

- Install a new faucet. Instantly improve a kitchen or a bathroom with new fixtures. New faucets can provide aesthetic appeal and low-flow faucets can help conserve water.
- Create a gallery on the staircase. Gather and arrange framed photos, artwork or wall accents so that they ascend the wall of a staircase. This creates a designer touch and can dress up an often barren area of wall space.
- Install a fresh light fixture. Improve drab spaces with a little illumination. Better Homes & Gardens suggests replacing an existing fixture with something new and vibrant. If hanging a new fixture is not

IS IT TIME TO UPDATE YOUR HOME'S ELECTRICAL SYSTEM?

The invisible systems in a home often are taken for granted. When such systems are working as expected, daily life moves along smoothly. However, when a system goes awry, it can negatively impact routines and may create a dangerous home environment. This is especially true when something goes wrong with a home's electrical system.

Faulty wiring is a leading cause of residential fires. Many homeowners, particularly those who live in older homes, might be living in properties that have outdated electrical systems. The experts at Lowes ProServices state that having old wiring and/or insufficient amperage in a house can endanger residents. It

also may damage appliances and make it difficult to sell a property in the future.

It can be difficult to gauge exactly when to overhaul an electrical system. Unless circuits routinely trip or lights often dim, homeowners may put off the work. But degrading wires or overextended circuitry can pose a fire risk, so it is best to address electrical systems promptly.

Home inspections may uncover electrical problems. Some homeowners may discover potential trouble while making renovations that require opening up walls or tearing them down, exposing the wires. Still other homeowners learn about electrical systems when they're adding new, large appliances or other gadgets that consume more power than existing items. These devices may continually cause power outages in the house, such as tripping the circuit breaker or popping a fuse.

When it comes time to update the electrical system, it is always best to work with licensed and bonded electricians who have the expertise to work with electrical wiring without getting injured. This is not a do-it-yourself type of job since it requires specialized training.

Electricians likely will recommend upgrading the electrical panel to bring more power from the utility poles into the home. This can include replacing the existing meter and circuit breaker box to allow it to handle more power or replacing items that are obsolete or dangerous.

Many older homes are only



capable of handling a minimum number of amps, utilizing just a few circuits. But nowadays, when homeowners have far more electronics in their homes than they once did, increased demand on electricity can overload a circuit (all of the outlets linked on one wire). Tripping a circuit breaker is a safety measure to prevent the wire from becoming overheated and causing a fire. However, in some old systems, the circuit breaker will not trip, and this can be problematic.

Rewiring a home is another step. Wire insulation can deteriorate over time, and new wires may be needed. This can be messy and time-consuming, but it's a small price to pay for safety. When rewiring an electrician also may suggest new outlets. Many home building codes now require outlets with ground fault interruptors, or GFIs, in kitchens, bathrooms and other rooms exposed to moisture. Some older homes may not even have threepronged outlets, so this will necessitate an update as well.

Electrical systems are the heart of a home, delivering power where it is needed. It is essential to keep such systems up-to-date so they can handle the power demands of everyday life.







PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF MARCH 19, 2018

This week, debate was largely focused on Budget 2018. We also covered topics including distracted driving, Latin American heritage, and the invitation of an attempted assassin to a state dinner with the Prime Minister.

The following was debated in the House:

- Budget 2018
- Bill C-373, an act respecting a federal framework on distracted driving (Second Reading)
- Bill S-218, an act respecting Latin American heritage month (Second Reading)
- Opposition Motion— National Security Advisor to the Prime Minister

On Tuesday, I participated in debate on Bill C-373, which would implement a national framework on distracted driving. You can read all debates in the House on the corresponding day's Hansard at www.ourcommons.ca/en.

Also on Tuesday, the Liberals introduced new firearms legislation, Bill C-71. I believe that the safety of Canadians should be the number one priority of any government. This issue is especially important to our riding due to the increase in rural crime in the region. Unfortunately, this legislation has no new measures to combat escalating crime rates in our rural communities, or to reduce gang violence in Surrey and Toronto. Bill C-71 will be debated next week and I expect to speak on the legislation on Tuesday.

I was unable to attend two events in the riding this weekend as we had a marathon voting session that began on Thursday evening and continued well into Friday. The Liberals were given the choice to be transparent with Canadians and allow the National Security Advisor to brief Parliamentarians about the Prime Minister's trip to India, or face up to 40 hours of voting in the House of Commons.

The Prime Minister failed to be honest with Canadians about the Atwal affair. He embarrassingly continues to support a conspiracy theory that the Indian Government tried to sabotage his trip.

It is imperative that the National Security Advisor provide

Members of Parliament with the same information provided to journalists on February 23, 2018. This will help Canadians understand if the Prime Minister is telling the truth.

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we continued our study on the state of Canadian museums. For more information on these meetings, visit the CHPC Committee website at www.ourcommons.ca/Committees/en/CHPC.

This week, I attended—nine meetings, three events, and taped one video message. Next week, the House will sit from Monday through Thursday before the Easter holiday. Look for my next update on Thursday on the happenings of Parliament.



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Auto TUNE-UP

PROTECT VEHICLE PAINT FINISH

Perhaps nothing ages a car or truck more than a lackluster exterior finish. Even if vehicles are only a few years old, failure to maintain the paint, tires and chrome accents can make them look worn beyond their years, potentially affecting resale value. The environment can be a vehicle's worst enemy. Protecting a car means being mindful of substances and habits that can compromise the exterior finish.

Seek shade

Over time, the sun can damage a vehicle's paint job through oxida-

tion and premature fading. People who live in areas with especially warm climates may see the paint on their vehicles suffer considerable damage thanks to the sun.

One of the easiest ways to protect a vehicle from the sun is to use sheltered parking or park in the shade whenever possible. This can help protect the paint, headlights and trim. Drivers should store their cars in their garages overnight and during daylight hours when they are home.

Wash and dry

It's important to routinely wash vehicles to protect their exterior finish. Use a mild cleanser designed for automobiles and a clean rag or sponge so as not to cause scratches that can cause further damage. Because minerals in tap water can be left behind through evaporation and may oxidize and damage the paint, it's best to wipe

away as much residual moisture as possible with a chamois.

Paint protection

Waxing can prevent bird droppings, berries, splattered bugs, and more from sticking to the paint and wearing down the finish. Waxes come in paste, liquid and spray. Each type has a different reapplication schedule, so drivers should consult the product instructions.

Vehicle owners also can invest in spray films to further protect painted surfaces. Do-it-yourself products are applied like a spray and then dry to an invisible, durable film. This helps protect against insects, gravel, sand, winter salt, and even road grime. Different manufacturers offer protection films.

It is important to safeguard the exterior of a vehicle to help it look newer longer, protecting the value of the car or truck while also protecting it against the elements.

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












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
