# AFSC ANNOUNCES REDUCED INSURANCE PREMIUM RATES FOR 2018 GROWING SEASON

Many of Alberta's crop producers will benefit from lower crop insurance premium rates when they insure their crops with AFSC this spring.

On average, 2018 premium rates for crops are 8 per cent lower than they were in 2017. The rate change for specific crops will vary depending on the actual loss experience for that crop as well as the

risk area.

The decrease in premium rates is a reflection of the generally good growing conditions over the past few years, which resulted in positive results for the crop insurance program. The recent experience has also translated into increased yield coverage for many producers in 2018.

# RCMP CHARGE 2 MALES FOR BREAK AND ENTER/THEFT AT COMMUNITY HALL

On March 20, 2018 Whitecourt RCMP were notified of a Break and Enter to a shed at a local community hall in Woodlands County. The break and enter/theft occurred at approximately 3:30 am. The suspects gained entry to the shed by breaking the lock and stealing a snow blower, 2 canopy tents and multiple tools. Through video surveillance a truck was identified at the scene and the registered owner was questioned. The owner of the truck admitted to doing the break in/theft along with a second male. Both of the males were arrested, charged and later released on a Promise to appear in Whitecourt Provincial Court on Tuesday May 8, 2018.

### AFSC Announces Reduced Insurance Premium Rates For 2018 Growing Season

Darryl Kay, Interim CEO, AFSC:

"We are pleased to be able to reduce AgriInsurance premium rates so producers can manage their risk and get the coverage they need. In addition to reducing rates, we have also made changes to the program itself and how it is delivered. "In response to the feedback received from producers, the following changes have been introduced:

- A 10 per cent claim deductible being introduced under the Spring Price Endorsement, which will reduce the premium rate charged to clients between 20 per cent and 30 per cent depending on the crop selected:
  - Aligning insurance coverage

for two new wheat classes after the Canadian Grain Commission reclassified a number of wheat varieties, moving them from Canadian Prairie Spring (CPS) and Canadian Western Red Spring (CWRS) to the new Canadian Northern Hard Red (CNHR) and Canadian Western Special Purpose (CWSP) classes;

- · Introducing AFSC Connect, just another way for AFSC clients to conduct their business. The new online platform provides producers with a number of online functionalities that include viewing and managing their account information, chatting online with Client Contact Centre staff, and conducting a number of transactions, including filing change requests to make adjustments to their crop insurance policy. The online platform was developed with the needs of AFSC clients in mind, and will continually be enhanced, and developed, to meet their changing needs;
- April 30 is the deadline to apply for, make changes to or cancel insurance

# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF MARCH 26, 2018

### Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP – Yellowhead

This week was cut short due to the Easter holiday. Debate was largely focused on the new firearms legislation, rural crime, and cultural heritage.

The following was debated in the House:

- Bill C-55 An Act to amend the Oceans Act and the Canada Petroleum Resources Act (Third Reading)
- Bill C-68 An Act to amend the Fisheries Act and other Acts in consequence (Second Reading)
- Bill C-71 An act to amend certain Acts and Regulations in relation to firearms (Second Reading)
- Bill C-232 Canadian Jewish Heritage Month Act (Third Reading)
- Bill C-374 An Act to amend the Historic Sites and Monuments Act (composition of the Board) (Report Stage)
- M-166 Postal banking system

- M-167 Rural crime in Canada
- M-168 Net neutrality

Last week, the Liberals introduced new firearms legislation, Bill C-71. I was scheduled to speak during the debate on Monday, but the Liberals stalled and used their majority to shut down debate before many Members, including myself, had the opportunity to represent our constituents' concerns. Justin Trudeau claims to listen to Canadians, but shoving legislation through the House without allowing for proper debate is the exact opposite of listening to Canadians.

Also on Monday, the Prime Minister exonerated six Tsilhqot'in chiefs who were unjustly hanged in British Columbia in 1864. The current chiefs of Tsilhqot'in First Nation were present on the floor of the House of Commons during the exoneration, and a drumming ceremony also took place.

On Wednesday evening, I had the pleasure of attending the screening of the film, Myth, and a reception at the Embassy of Ukraine.

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we began a study on cultural hubs and cultural districts in Canada. For more information on these meetings, visit the CHPC Committee website at www.ourcommons.ca/Committees/en/CHPC.

This week, I attended— six meetings and two events, and I taped one video message. I will return to the riding on Thursday evening as the House will not sit on Friday due to the Easter holiday. I will remain in the riding over the weekend and the next two weeks while the House is on recess. My next update will be on my travels throughout our beautiful constituency of Yellowhead.

Implementing "Webs of Support" for each and every student is a significant strategy that both OJSH and OES are making a priority. Every student should have a positive and healthy support system and Derek Peterson's innovative webs concept is being put



into action within both schools as well as the wider community. Our colourful webbing journey began in May 2017 when several staff members attended the initial training work shop put on by Derek. Their excitement was contagious and in October of 2017, a joint PD day with OJSH and OES was held to introduce all staff members to Derek Peterson and his colours, his webs and his message of hope and support for every child.

Half a school year on, the message is growing and resonating for staff, students and the wider community.

On Thursday, March 15th OJSH and OES hosted Derek Peterson at the Onoway Heritage Centre. Several staff members from both schools and a large contingent of students from all grades along their invited anchors –in total 100 adults and 100 students - spent the day at the Heritage Center learning about and experiencing webbing up. This was a way for our students and their anchors to understand how very important it is for each child to have at least five adult supports in their life.

On Friday, March 16th, OJSH and OES held a combined professional development day for all staff members to gain more insights and a deeper understanding of Derek Peterson's webbing approach to supporting kids. As we learn, experience and practice webs as staff, as students, as a community, as we build webs of support, we can grow a rich developmental ecology that will support and encourage success in all of our kids as they mature into healthy, well-balanced individuals.

To reinforce what webs are all about and to keep the concepts of support alive in our minds, every month the OJSH Newsletter features a webs colour.







# HOW TO AVOID ELECTRICAL MISHAPS AROUND THE HOUSE

Accidents around the home happen. Some are minor and easily brushed off, while others can lead to serious injury or financial peril.

Many accidents, even those that are relatively minor, can be prevented. Such is often the case with electrical accidents, which may be more common than many people think. According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International, home electrical fires account for an estimated 51,000 fires each year, resulting in roughly 500 deaths and more than \$1 billion in property damage.

Homeowners who want to do all they can to reduce the likelihood of electrical mishaps at home can employ various strategies.

• Be mindful of cords and plugs. Cords and plugs can be found throughout the typical home. While few people may perceive cords and plugs as threats, they can serve as catalysts for accident and/or injury. Cords and plugs should always be kept clear of heat and water sources,

and cords should not be placed in areas where they can pose any tripping hazards. Even if residents grow accustomed to cord locations and know to maneuver around them, guests won't be as familiar. When pulling plugs from outlets, always pull the plug, and not the cord, to reduce injury risk.

• Periodically take inventory of electrical appliances and components. Some electrical appliances age well, while others may not. Periodic inspections of appliances and their components, such as their cords, can reveal wear and tear that can lead to fires or injuries. Replace any items that pose a threat and stop using these items immediately.

• Avoid DIY electrical work. Many homeowners are handy with hammers and other tools, but professionals are better trusted to perform electrical work on a home. The risk of accident or injury when working with wiring and other electrical components is simply too great for untrained homeowners to do on their

• Unplug appliances before flipping a fuse. Fuses blow from time to time. Some may be knocked out by especially powerful storms, while others may blow because they're overloaded. Regardless of why fuses blow, homeowners should turn off appliances on blown fuses before flipping those fuses back on. Leaving appliances running when flipping a fuse can increase the risk of fire or accident. Turn off appliances, unplug them and then turn them back on one by one after the fuse has been flipped.

• Be especially cautious if anyone smells gas. Gas leaks are often detected by the aroma of the gas in the air. When such leaks are detected, homeowners should not touch or turn any electrical switches. Doing so may create a spark that can react with the gas in the air, leading to fire. If a gas leak is detected, go outside and contact a local emergency service.

Many home electrical mishaps can be prevented if homeowners exercise caution and hire certified electrical contractors to handle wiring and other electrical tasks around their homes.

# POOLS AND LAWNS CAN GET ALONG

Homeowners interested in installing pools in their backyards need not worry about the potential impact of such decisions on surrounding landscapes.

According to the Association of Pool & Spa Professionals, there are 10.4 million residential and 309,000 public swimming pools in the United States. Although the average monthly temperatures in Canada are lower than those throughout much of the United States, many Canadian homeowners still have pools in their backyards. Quebec is home to the most pools per capita for Canada - with some estimates suggesting the province has more than 300,000 backyard pools, according to Pool and Spa

Marketing magazine.

Many homeowners wonder if the chlorine and other chemicals in pool water have any affect on the lawn, particularly if pool water robs lawns of vital nutrients they need to thrive. But the resource All About Lawns says most people needn't worry about errant drops or even higher levels of overflow. It all comes down to the selectivity of grass. Blades of grass are particular about which nutrients from the water they absorb and in what quantities. Lawns are largely unaffected by chlorine. Furthermore, soil can withstand chlorine when kept at applicable sanitary levels (which generally range between two to three parts

per million), at high acid levels. That's much more than is usually contained in pool water.

Pool water is also maintained in the neutral range at a pH of 6.5 to 7.8, which is safe for plants. Should the pool water test at a higher acidity or alkalinity, it can adversely affect landscapes, particularly delicate plants.

Pool owners should be diligent about smart application and storage of pool chemicals. Powdered or liquid chlorine and other water chemistry products that spill onto grass or plants may cause damage.

In safe amounts, chlorine should not adversely affect lawns and other plants that surround pools.

Install locking cabinets


Locking cabinets can keep medications, household chemicals, home improvement paints and solvents, and other potential poisons out of reach.

### **HOW TO CLEAR A CLOGGED DRAIN**

Home plumbing systems are designed to handle heavy usage. When everything is working as it should, toilets flush, showers drain properly, and sink basins empty of water in a snap. But when a clog is present in a system, water can quickly back up.

There are various techniques to clear clogged drains. Minor clogs may be cleared without the help of a plumber or even any tools. More significant blockages will require more elbow grease.

The first step to clearing a clog is to locate the problem. Drainage issues that affect a particular sink or toilet may be isolated to that fixture. 

# UPDATE ON OFFICER-INVOLVED SHOOTING NEAR EVANSBURG

Submitted by Jason van Rassel (acting), Alberta Serious Incident Response Team

On March 29, 2018, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate an officer-involved shooting on Highway 16 near Evansburg.

On the same day at approximately 5:15 pm, a member of the

RCMP driving a marked police unit identified a vehicle associated with an active Calgary Police Service homicide investigation. The driver of the vehicle failed to stop for police, and a prolonged pursuit ensued. This pursuit involved additional police units, and the vehicle was eventually brought to a stop on the highway with the assistance of

a spike belt. The lone occupant of that vehicle, a 21-year-old man, got out and immediately began firing a gun, striking and injuring an RCMP member. Officers returned fire, striking and fatally wounding the man in the exchange of gunfire.

ASIRT's investigation continues and an autopsy is currently scheduled for Tuesday morning.

With the investigation well underway, no further information will be released at this time.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

# EVANSBURG RCMP INVOLVED IN SHOOTING FOLLOWING VEHICLE PURSUIT

UPDATE – The RCMP are now able to confirm the name of the member injured.

Sergeant Brian Topham, the Evansburg Detachment Commander, received injuries as a result of a gunshot on March 29, 2018.

Sgt. Topham remains in the hospital, but is recovering well and is in good spirits. He and his family are extremely appreciative of the

support and concern that has been flooding in from colleagues and the public. The entire RCMP Division is standing behind him and wishing him a speedy recovery.

BACKGROUND:

Evansburg RCMP can confirm that one of their members has been injured on March 29, 2018 following an exchange of gunshots. The member suffered non life-threatening injuries and has been transported to an Edmonton hospital.

Earlier this afternoon, an RCMP

member in Evansburg located a male believed to be wanted on a Canada Wide Warrant out of Calgary. At approximately 5:15 p.m., efforts were made to stop the male suspect in the vehicle he was driving. The male failed to stop for police and a pursuit ensued.

The pursuit continued on Highway 16 between Evansburg and Entwistle, traveling eastbound and westbound multiple times. The suspect vehicle avoided tire deflation devices. RCMP members from Stony Plain, Spruce Grove,

Edson, and Drayton Valley assisted Evansburg members in the pursuit.

While eastbound at Nojack, the deployment of a tire deflation device was successful. The suspect continued eastbound until the vehicle came to a stop at Highways 16 and 22 North.

A confrontation occurred between the RCMP members and the suspect male, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle. The male was injured fatally and the RCMP member suffered minor injuries.




