UPDATE ON OFFICER-INVOLVED SHOOTING NEAR EVANSBURG

On March 29, 2018, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate an officer-involved shooting on Highway 16 near Evansburg.

On the same day at approximately 5:15 pm, a member of the RCMP driving a marked police unit identified a vehicle associated with an active Cal-

gary Police Service homicide investigation. The driver of the vehicle failed to stop for police, and a prolonged pursuit ensued. This pursuit involved additional police units, and the vehicle was eventually brought to a stop on the highway with the assistance of a spike belt. The lone occupant of that vehicle, a 21-year-old man, got out and immediately began firing a gun, striking and injuring an RCMP member. Officers returned fire, striking and fatally wounding the man in

the exchange of gunfire.

ASIRT's investigation continues and an autopsy is currently scheduled for Tuesday morning. With the investigation well underway, no further information will be released at this time.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

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EVANSBURG RCMP INVOLVED IN SHOOTING FOLLOWING VEHICLE PURSUIT

UPDATE

Evansburg, Alberta – Following a serious incident which was reported March 29, 2018 involving several RCMP Detachment members, the RCMP are now able to confirm the name of the member injured.

Sergeant Brian Topham, the Evansburg Detachment Commander, received injuries as a result of a gunshot on March 29, 2018.

Sgt. Topham remains in the hospital, but is recovering well and is in good spirits. He and his family are extremely appreciative of the support and concern that has been flooding in from colleagues and the public. The entire RCMP Division is standing behind him and wishing him a speedy recovery.

BACKGROUND:

Evansburg, Alberta – Evansburg RCMP can confirm that one of their members has been injured on March 29, 2018 following an exchange of gunshots. The member suffered non life-threatening injuries and has been transported to an Edmonton hospital.

Earlier this afternoon, an RCMP member in Evansburg located a male believed to be wanted on a Canada Wide Warrant out of Calgary. At approximately 5:15 p.m., efforts were made to stop the male suspect in the vehicle he was driving. The male failed to stop for police and a pursuit ensued.

The pursuit continued on Highway 16 between Evansburg and Entwistle, traveling eastbound and westbound multiple times. The suspect vehicle avoided tire deflation devices. RCMP members from Stony Plain, Spruce Grove, Edson, and Drayton Valley assisted Evansburg members in the pursuit.

While eastbound at Nojack, the deployment of a tire deflation device was successful.

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

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PARLIAMENT UPDATE **WEEK OF MARCH 26, 2018**

This week was cut short due to the Easter holiday. Debate was largely focused on the new firearms legislation, rural crime, and cultural heritage.

The following was debated in the House:

- Bill C-55 An Act to amend te Oceans Act and the Canada Petroleum Resources Act (Third Reading)
- Bill C-68 An Act to amend

the Fisheries Act and other Acts in consequence (Second Reading)

- Bill C-71 An act to amend certain Acts and Regulations in relation to firearms (Second Read-
- Bill C-232 Canadian Jewish Heritage Month Act (Third Read-
- Bill C-374 An Act to amend the Historic Sites and Monuments Act (composition of the Board) (Report Stage)
- M-166 Postal banking system
- M-167 Rural crime in Canada

• M-168 – Net neutrality

Last week, the Liberals introduced new firearms legislation, Bill C-71. I was scheduled to speak during the debate on Monday, but the Liberals stalled and used their majority to shut down debate before many Members, including myself, had the opportunity to represent our constituents' concerns. Justin Trudeau claims to listen to Canadians, but shoving legislation through the House without allowing for proper debate is the exact opposite of listening to Canadians.

Also on Monday, the Prime Minister exonerated six Tsilhqot'in chiefs who were unjustly hanged in British Columbia in 1864. The current chiefs of Tsilhqot'in First Nation were present on the floor of the House of Commons during the exoneration, and a drumming ceremony also took place.

On Wednesday evening, I had the pleasure of attending the screening of the film, Myth, and a reception at the Embassy of Ukraine.

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we began a study on cultural hubs and cultural districts in Canada. For more information on these meetings, visit the CHPC Committee website at www.ourcommons.ca/ Committees/en/CHPC.

This week, I attended six meetings and two events, and I taped one video message. I will return to the riding on Thursday evening as the House will not sit on Friday due to the Easter holiday. I will remain in the riding over the weekend and the next two weeks while the House is on recess. My next update will be on my travels throughout our beautiful constituency of Yellowhead.

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

The suspect continued eastbound until the vehicle came to a stop at Highways 16 and 22 North.

A confrontation occurred between the RCMP members and the suspect male, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle. The male was injured fatally and the RCMP member suffered minor injuries.

The incident has been referred to Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) which is mandated to investigate incidents involving serious injury or death that may have resulted from the actions of a police officer.

Further information will not be made available by the RCMP.

The Alberta government has laid two charges against a Drayton Valley used oil storage and recycling facility and its directors for failing to comply with provincial environmental legis-

lation.

Incident details:

Jonah and Cathy Tryon and Tryon's Auto Body Ltd. have each been charged with two counts under the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act. The charges relate to a continuing set of events that occurred between July 7, 2016 and Aug. 30, 2016.


The charges consist of two separate counts of:

• Interfering with an inspector or investigator exercising or carrying out duties or attempting to do so, an offence contrary to section 227(j) of the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act

The first court appearance is set for April 17 in Drayton Valley Provincial Court.

LAUNDRY ROOM RENOVATION IDEAS

To former apartment dwellers or those who have never enjoyed the benefit of a dedicated laundry area, even the smallest washer and dryer space can seem like a luxury.

The benefits of dedicated laundry rooms abound. However, disorganized laundry rooms can nullify such benefits. Depending on the needs and preferences of

Employ vertical space

Utilize a tension rod

A rod installed between two cabinets or across a narrow width of space in the laundry room is a handy spot to hang shirts or pants to prevent wrinkling. Repurposing a ladder and suspending it from the ceiling also creates a spot to hang clothes.

Consider laundry room flooring

It's important to select flooring materials that will not be damaged by contact with moisture or spills. Vinyl, tile and some composite products often make good laundry room floor materials. Resilient flooring that mimics the look of hardwood may add a classy touch, and give the appearance of wood without having to worry about damage. To alleviate fatigue while spending long moments in the laundry room, invest in a memory foam mat that can be placed underfoot.

Keep lighting in mind

Lighting can be important in the laundry room. Rely on task lighting, under-cabinet strip lighting and overhead lights as needed for efficiency.

HOW TO AVOID ELECTRICAL MISHAPS AROUND THE HOUSE

Accidents around the home happen. Some are minor and easily brushed off, while others can lead to serious injury or financial peril.

Many accidents, even those that are relatively minor, can be prevented. Such is often the case with electrical accidents, which may be more common than many people think. According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International, home electrical fires account for an estimated 51,000 fires each year, resulting in roughly 500 deaths and more than \$1 billion in property damage.

Homeowners who want to do all they can to reduce the likelihood of electrical mishaps at home can employ various strategies.

• Be mindful of cords and plugs. Cords and plugs can be found throughout the typical home. While few people may perceive cords and plugs as threats, they can serve as catalysts for accident and/or injury. Cords and plugs should always be kept clear of heat and water sources, and cords should not be placed in areas where they can pose any tripping hazards. Even if residents grow accustomed to cord locations and know to maneuver around them, guests won't be as familiar. When pulling plugs from outlets, always pull the plug, and not the cord, to reduce injury risk.

• Periodically take inventory of electrical appliances and components. Some electrical appliances age well, while others may not. Periodic inspections of appliances and their components, such as their cords, can reveal wear and tear that can lead to fires or injuries. Replace

any items that pose a threat and stop using these items immediately.

- Avoid DIY electrical work. Many homeowners are handy with hammers and other tools, but professionals are better trusted to perform electrical work on a home. The risk of accident or injury when working with wiring and other electrical components is simply too great for untrained homeowners to do on their own.
- Unplug appliances before flipping a fuse. Fuses blow from time to time. Some may be knocked out by especially powerful storms, while others may blow because they're overloaded. Regardless of why fuses blow, homeowners should turn off appliances on blown fuses before flipping those fuses back on. Leaving appliances running when flip-

ping a fuse can increase the risk of fire or accident. Turn off appliances, unplug them and then turn them back on one by one after the fuse has been flipped.

• Be especially cautious if anyone smells gas. Gas leaks are often detected by the aroma of the gas in the air. When such leaks are detected, homeowners should not touch or turn any electrical switches. Doing so may create a spark that can react with the gas in the air, leading to fire. If a gas leak is detected, go outside and contact a local emergency service.

Many home electrical mishaps can be prevented if homeowners exercise caution and hire certified electrical contractors to handle wiring and other electrical tasks around their homes.

CHOOSE THE GREENEST BUILDER AVAILABLE

(MS) - As building codes enforce tightened minimum standards for eco-responsibility, the more progressive builders are illustrating their own accountability by using and producing materials that are even more efficient than mandates demand. Building code revisions worldwide are ushering a whole new generation of structures that are between 35 and 40 percent more environmentally responsible. The improved practices in construction are showcasing advancements in wall building, windows, insulation and air-infiltration.

"Switching from wood-framing to concrete walls, for example, has so many spin-off benefits," explains Natalie Rodgers of Nudura, the manufacturer of an advanced building method called the insulated concrete form (ICF). "Solid, air-tight concrete walls would initially lower your energy bills. You'll live in a stronger, more comfortable home while the investment grows in resale value. As importantly, your home would create far lower demand on natural resources."

Designed like Lego, the interlocking Nudura forms are designed with monolithic concrete sandwiched between two continuous layers of expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam.

"The foam material isolates the concrete and significantly reduces the flow of heat through the wall," says Rodgers. "It stabilizes the internal temperature from day to night fluctuations and provides a largely self-regulating environment. This faster method of construction creates one solid concrete wall."

As a result, you will need less energy for mechanical heating and cooling, delivering cost savings through-

out the year. A home built with this concrete system is stronger, provides greater safety, offers greater sound and fire resistance, and would be far less prone to mold, cold spots and drafts.

"Benefits are plentiful to builders, too," says Rodgers. "The patented

hinged web allows the forms to fold flat, requiring smaller shipping space and less manpower than other methods."

If you want your builder to use insulated concrete forms, be sure to make the request well before construction gets underway.

When asked what brings him back to his home in Yellowhead County, Sasky doesn't hesitate to say that he loves it here: "Being migratory, I feel a need to come back to my place of birth. But beyond that, I can see why my parents chose here, as there's a little bit of everything. I can go from prairie to the mountains and always find somewhere to have quiet and solitude."

Does his love of solitude make it harder to visit as the County grows? "Times are changing, yes. There is still peace to be found in Yellowhead County's natural areas, but there are always people having fun, or industry work going on not far away," says Sasky. But he's found a new calling with the influx of people and work going on in the county.

"Since I spend so much of my time outdoors—you know, setting the example for how to be a true wilderness aficionado—I've decided to be even more useful to our residents and tourists.


Sasky's doing more than just collecting trash, though. He's created a whole campaign about enjoying the wilderness responsibly. You can check out his tips on his website: www.WelcomeToOurBackyard.com. And he says that setting an example has been a big help: "I mean maybe people are a bit shaky when they first see me, but when I point the finger at the mess they made, they get the picture. I don't want to scare them—I just want to remind them. Let's keep it clean."

You'd think he would have more trouble out in the bush being a Sasquatch, but coming across more people means teaching others to take care of the wilderness. And if you want to show that you've done your part, or if you've got a sighting of a cleaning Sasquatch, you can reach out to Sasky on Facebook at #LeaveItPristine.

"Mostly, I keep coming back here because I'm proud of how people are learning to treat the environment. Everyone does their part to make sure Yellowhead County stays spotless. Sometimes I feel like I don't even need to be around to remind anyone to do their part!"

Keep an eye out for our elusive Sasky—and for any litter you might find! Remember: Be like Sasky, don't leave a trace!

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
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
