IMPAIRED IS IMPAIRED SAYS ALBERTA RCMP TRAFFIC SERVICES

Alberta RCMP would like to remind all drivers in the province that impaired driving, whether by alcohol or drug, may cost you your life or the lives of others.

"There is a myth that it is okay to use drugs and drive because it affects you differently," says Supt. Gary Graham, Officer in Charge, Alberta Integrated Traffic Services. "It is important to remind everyone that impaired driving, whether by drugs or alcohol, is a serious offence that will lead to criminal charges."

"Impaired driving is a leading cause of death and injury on Alberta roads," says Rick Gardner, Superintendent, Alberta Sheriffs Traffic Operations. "We all have a part to play in keeping impaired drivers off our roads. It's not about getting caught at a Check-Stop, it's about the possibility of hurting yourself and others on the way home."

Quick Facts:

• Alcohol has a "multiplicative" effect on other drugs. That means having a drink after taking cannabis products results in far greater

impairments than taking either alone.

- Drug Recognition Experts can determine that you're under the influence of a drug and you can be charged with drug-impaired driving.
- In 2016, the presence of alcohol or drugs was a factor in 27.9% of fatal collisions that occurred in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction.
- In 2017, Alberta RCMP issued 4,290 impaired driving violations and 1,758 roadside suspensions.
- In the first two months of 2018, Alberta RCMP issued 538 impaired driving violations.

MAYERTHORPE OFFERS A NEW PROGRESSIVE DEVELOPMENT TAX INCENTIVE

Submitted by Town of Mayerthorpe

The Town of Mayerthorpe has a new progressive Development Tax Incentive Program, adopted by Council at their March 26, 2018 regular Council meeting. The Development Tax Incentive applies to construction of new structures applicable to homes, business, and industry. The Development Tax Incentive rebates are as follows:

- a. Supplemental Municipal Tax - 100%
- b. 1st Year Municipal Tax -
- c. 2nd Year Municipal Tax -50%
- d. 3rd Year Municipal Tax -25%

The Development Tax Incentive compliments existing tax incentive policies in Mayerthorpe; specifically, the:

 Infill Tax Rebate Policy which provides for two-year municipal tax rebates on properties where new homes are placed where an older home once existed in outlined neighborhoods;

- · Subdivision Tax Refund Program which provides developers a 1st year 75% municipal tax rebate on a subdivision producing 5+ lots;
- · Infrastructure Payment and Security Program where the Town will partner with developers on the cost of municipal infrastructure as part of a subdivision process.

"We're excited about it. We think it's perfect timing," said Mayor Kate Patrick "By adopting this set of incentives in Mayerthorpe, we will have a very competitive offering, particularly in this region. When combined with the efforts of our existing policies, these new incentives should give us a great mix of tools and resources to bring some significant, positive economic development to Mayerthorpe."

"This policy, along with the Town's Economic Development Strategic Plan, Workforce Capacity and Recruitment Study, Agricultural Sector Study, and roll out of the Local Business Training Series, will enable Mayerthorpe and area to be more proactive on a local, regional, provincial, and national level. These initiatives will enhance attraction of developers and make Mayerthorpe an area they want to invest in. We're putting the tools in place to be more successful."

Hon. Minister McKenna, Hon. Minister Carr and Parliamentary Secretary Wilkinson,

As you know, Alberta released its Draft Provincial Woodland Caribou Range Plan on December 19, 2017. Since the release of the draft plan, The Government of Alberta has hosted public open houses in Whitecourt, Edmonton, Cold Lake, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie and High Level. We have also held numerous stakeholder meetings attended by industry, municipalities, environmental non-governmental organizations and First Nations. The public meetings were attended by thousands

of Albertans who are concerned about the impact caribou range plans will have on their communities and on the industries that support those communities.

We take these concerns very seriously and have heard loud and clear from Albertans that more work and time is needed to understand the socio-economic impacts of caribou range planning on northern communities.

Alberta views caribou recovery as a shared responsibility between federal and provincial governments. In order to meet the federal government's targets and our shared goal of putting woodland caribou populations and habitat on a positive trajectory towards recovery, Alberta believes that the federal government needs to play greater role in supporting Alberta to understand the true impact of caribou rang plans in Albertan communities.

Albertans deserve a plan that protects their jobs and the economy. The investment required to fulfill the federal requirements is enormous and cannot be shouldered alone by the Government of Alberta, and by extension, all Albertans.

The province has already invested \$9.2 million to date on caribou recovery but we know the cost of restoration alone over the next 40 years is estimated to be over \$1 billion, and that rearing facilities in our protection plan will cost in the neighbourhood of \$75 million.


On Tuesday, I worked in the office for a few hours before heading out to Peers to attend a public BBQ in the afternoon.



Caribou recovery cannot occur without an infusion of federal funds to restore habitat necessary to ensure population growth.

At this stage in the caribou range planning process Alberta is suspending consideration of conservation lands recommended in the Caribou Task Force Report pending further review and the outcome of the socio-economic impact study. Further to this, Alberta will redouble its efforts to work with industry to develop solutions that avoid the imposition of an Environmental Protection Order being imposed on Alberta by Ottawa. A meeting with industry representatives will happen in the coming weeks.

We have many willing Alberta participants in Caribou recovery actions. They include the oil and gas industry, the forestry sector, environmental groups, municipalities and small business. They all need more time to get this strategy right and fully conclusive.

Alberta understands the pressure the Federal Government is under with respect to the federal Species at Risk Act and the need to take action on Caribou recovery. We also know you understand the economic imperative across the country and in particular in northern Alberta. While we need more time and partnership from the federal government on this matter, we also need your support in not prematurely implementing federal protection orders that will not have effective outcomes for Canadians and Albertans.

Alberta's economy is recovering from the largest economic downturn in the history of the province. Alberta strongly believes that now is not the time to impede that recovery by implementing policies before the economic impacts are understood by government and all Albertans.

Albertans appreciate and understand the value of maintaining caribou on the landscape but remain deeply concerned about potential job losses and impacts to local economies resulting from caribou range planning. Alberta's approach to protecting caribou populations and fulfilling the requirements under federal law cannot and will not come at the expense of our economy. Our commitment is to ensuring these communities continue to grow

and prosper into the future.

We believe it is essential that the political leadership in Ottawa has an opportunity to hear firsthand from Albertans regarding their concerns. Over the coming days we will assemble a delegation of representatives from northern Alberta to go to Ottawa to make Alberta's case with regard to the challenges, concerns and opportunities present in Alberta's range planning process. We will also be sending a delegation of officials to Ottawa to begin to work

together on a plan to analyze and mitigate the costs of this enormous undertaking to fulfill federal law.

We look forward to further discussions about how the federal government can partner with Alberta and industry to develop the right solutions that protect our wildlife and our economy.



PET-PROOF A HOME HOW TO

Tens of millions of households throughout North America include pets. The American Veterinary Medical Foundation reports that more than 80 million households in the United States include companion animals, while the 2014 Canadian Pet Market Outlook reported that 57 percent of Canadian households owned pets.

Pets are a big responsibility, and responsible pet owners recognize that the work begins even before pets come home. Pet proofing a home protects pets from accidents and injuries as they grow acclimated to their surroundings.

- · Install childproof latches. Much like children after they learn to crawl and then walk, young pets tend to be curious, and that curiosity can put them in precarious positions. Pet owners should install childproof latches on low drawers and cabinets, especially those beneath sinks where potentially harmful cleaning products are typically stored. Curious pet paws may be able to pry or pull open cabinets and drawers, but childproof latches can make that considerably more difficult if not impossible.
- · Close toilet lids. While images of puppies drinking from toilets may elicit some laughs, the nonprofit organization American Humane warns that chemicals in common toilet cleaners can be deadly to pets. In addition, small puppies or kittens can drown in toilets. Keep all toilet lids close when toilets are not in use.
- · Keep potentially harmful items out of pets' reach. Household cleaners beneath the kitchen sink are not the only items around the house that can be harmful to pets. Medications should always be stored on high shelves where pets cannot reach them. In addition, make sure all laundry room items, including detergent and dryer sheets, are stored out of pets' reach. Discuss human foods that might be harmful to pets with a veterinarian and make sure such foods are not left out where pets can reach them when you are hosting friends or family members. If necessary, make sure all foods are served on dinner tables or kitch-

en counters that are inaccessible to

· Conceal all wires. Today's homes are more connected than ever before, and that often translates to more wires around the house. Make sure all wires are bundled together and out of the reach and view of pets, who may be tempted to chew on them. Even wires that are out of

reach may tempt pets if they can see them, so pet owners should make concerted efforts to conceal wires.

• Move or remove potentially poisonous plants. Plant lovers may not have worried if their plants were poisonous when they had no intention of welcoming pets into their homes. But prospective pet owners should research each plant in their homes to make sure they're not poisonous. Move potentially poisonous plants to places where pets cannot access them. Remove any poisonous floor plants from the home before purchasing or adopting a pet.

Pets, particularly puppies and kittens, tend to be curious. Pet parents can protect pets from their own curiosity by pet proofing their homes.

HOW EMPTY-NESTERS CAN TRANSFORM THEIR HOMES

tions says inadequate housing conditions, such as poor ventilation, radon, urban pollution, and moisture issues, can contribute to many preventable diseases and injuries - especially respiratory problems, nervous system disorders, cardiovascular diseases, and cancer. Furthermore, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ranks indoor air quality as a top five environmental risk to public health. EPA studies have found that indoor air pollution levels were roughly two to five times greater than outdoor pollution

People interested in making their homes healthier can embrace these renovations and lifestyle changes. • Be aware of furniture materials. Toxic PBDEs, which are chemicals used as flame retardants on furniture fabrics produced prior to 2006, can send

toxins into the air. Some manufacturers may still use these flame retardants in new forms, but with similar risks.

Before purchasing furniture, ask if a product is treated, and select naturally fire-resistant materials like wool and cotton.

• Lighten up. Lighting is often underappreciated but can have a dramatic impact on whether a home feels inviting, warm and/ or uplifting. Experiment with different types of bulbs and lighting fixtures to turn drab and

dreary environments into brighter places. Lighting may improve mood and productivity.

- · Let the sun shine in. Modify window treatments to let more sunlight into the house. There is evidence that the sun, particularly UV light, is a potent bactericide. The Sunlight Institute advises that there's no harm in letting natural sunlight do its work, as bacteria within eight feet of low-intensity UV light can be killed in 10 minutes.
- Inspect and service wood-burning appliances. A study published in the American Journal of Respiratory Cell and Molecular Biology has found regular inhalation of wood smoke limits immune activity and function, and anyone who burns wood indoors should be

aware of these potential health risks. Ensuring proper ventilation of smoke and routinely cleaning the chimney can help cut down on particulate matter.

- Turn to nontoxic cleaning products, pesticides and insecticides. Always opt for nontoxic, natural products when cleaning in and around the house.
- Declutter the home. A cluttered, hectic space can affect emotions and mental state, never mind attracting dust and making a home harder to clean. Spending time in spaces that do not elicit stressful feelings is healthier and can help residents to rest and recharge.

Making a home healthier can be on the list of this year's renovation plans.

MINIMIZE DUST WHILE RENOVATING

Even though dust is ever-present both inside and outside of a home, when renovations are in full swing, dusty conditions are often exacerbated. Whether a home is new or old, numerous substances can be stirred up when removing walls, refinishing floors, removing tile, or expanding living spaces. These include silica from drywall, lead, asbestos, paint particles, and even waste from bugs or rodents.

Homeowners who want to remodel with minimal construction debris floating through the air - both for health purposes and general cleanliness - may find these proactive steps helpful.

• Prepare dust-containment plans. If a contractor is involved, it is often his or her responsibility to minimize dust. Do-it-yourselfers must make dust containment a priority. Protecting the floor and keeping the dust confined only to work areas

can be achieved with plastic sheeting and other barriers.

- Designate an entrance and exit. The experts at This Old House say it is best to choose one doorway as the only means in and out of a work area. Ideally, this doorway should lead to the outdoors. All other doorways should be sealed on both sides.
- Remove extraneous items. It's best to remove clutter from the room, including any furniture that can be taken out of the space. This helps items from becoming dirty and hazardous particles from settling into nooks and crannies.
- Close vents and registers. If forced air systems are part of the home, it's best to divert air away from the work area. Block vents and intake registers so that dust does not clog the system or transfer to other rooms.
- Cut items outside. Design advice

site Houzz says that some power tools have vacuum extractors to suck up dust at the point of contact, removing 90 percent of dust where it is generated. For those who do not have access to these tools, cutting and sanding can be done outdoors to keep dust outside.

- Open a window. If weather permits, an open window can provide ventilation. Another idea is to create an air vacuum in the work area. Picking a window at the far end of the work area and mounting a window fan blowing outward can suck dust out and away from other areas of the house.
- Clean up daily. By keeping on top of dust, including sweeping and vacuuming the work area frequently, dust will not accumulate and migrate elsewhere.

Dust is a common side effect of home renovation projects, but it can be minimized.
