## HOMELESSNESS ACROSS CANADA

On March 12, Employment and Social Development Canada announced the launch of Everyone Counts: the second nationally-coordinated Point-in-Time (PiT) Count of homelessness. Between March 1 and April 30, 2018, communities in every province and territory across Canada will conduct a PiT count.

"Even though there aren't any large cities in Yellowhead, we are not immune to homelessness. Every community, large and small, has people in need. This data will help develop effective strategies that respond to homelessness at the local level," stated MP Eglinski.

The PiT counts will provide vital information to participating communities about individuals experiencing homelessness, helping to identify their needs and plan community resources accordingly. The information collected will also contribute to a national portrait of homelessness and support the Government of Canada's work in preventing and reducing homelessness.

Communities can also choose to implement a joint PiT count and registry week, which helps the community to create a byname list of individuals experiencing homelessness. This list can be used to link individuals to housing supports as part of the 20,000 Homes Campaign of the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness

"All Canadians should have access to safe and affordable housing. Through initiatives such as this, we can help address homelessness at the community level," concluded MP Eglinski.

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## **KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING**

#### **April 4, 2018**

- Trustees approved funding to a maximum up to \$1,500 per year for a maximum total of \$4,500 over the next three years in support of the partnership with Yellowhead County in the installation of commemorative signs at one-room schoolhouse locations throughout the division. Over the last three years, GYPSD and the County have installed 23 signs through this initiative.
- · Information on the division's Program Unit Funding (PUF) for the current school year was provided to the board. Funding is provided to school authorities for Early Childhood Services (ECS) children with severe disabilities/ delays who require additional supports beyond those offered in a regular ECS program. Eligible children between the ages of 2.5

and 6 (by September 1) can access the funding for up to three years. As of February 1, 2018, 75 children had applied for PUF in comparison to  $\hat{63}$  for the previous

- A review of transportation services' budget up to March 31, 2018, noted that expenditures to date are within targetted projections for the 2017-2018 school year.
- · Corey Halabi, Director of Transportation Services, noted that the division has twenty parent provided transportation contracts for the current school year. Provincial guidelines have provided school jurisdictions with options such as Parent Provided Transportation Contracts for the transport of eligible students when:
- ~ school bus service is not available, or in situations where hazardous conditions prevent the school bus from safely accessing travel to the student residence
- ~ students require additional

transportation supports, or

- ~ students who reside in areas not accessible by a school bus.
- · Superintendent Lewis discussed an update in regards to the recently released provincial Budget 2018, and how it relates to the 2018 Education Budget and its possible impacts on school jurisdictions.
- The board will be forwarding a letter to Honourable S. Anderson, Minister of Municipal Affairs,

requesting funding from the new Renewable Energy for School Program, for the installation of solar panels at Mary Bergeron Elementary School in Edson.

• The next Public Board Meeting is on Wednesday, April 18, 2018, at 10am and will be held in the library at Jasper Junior /Senior High School in Jasper. The public are welcome to attend.



#### March 21, 2018

• Trustees approved a new Board Policy Handbook, effective March 21, 2018. The board recently contracted the Alberta School Boards' Association (ASBA) to review all of the board's policies to ensure conformity and legality with current legislative guidelines and practices, as well as alignment

with the division's priorities. After the review with the ASBA consultant, all the current board policies were rescinded, and replaced with a new Board Policy Handbook that aligns with his recommendations. The ASBA consultant also reviewed the division's Administrative procedures which have also been revised and amended as per his recommendations. All new policies and administrative procedures will be posted on the divi-

sion's website.


- · Grande Yellowhead School Division recognizes the importance of student engagement and student voice, and the board is proud to sponsor high school students' participation in the Superintendent's Youth Council. The council is composed of five high students per high school, including the Learning Connection students in Hinton. Students were chosen from all GYPSD high schools who demonstrated a diverse range of interests, identities and perspectives, are passionate about and willing to share experience knowledge and skills, and demonstrated interest in leadership opportunities both at the division and school level. Trustees received information on the Council's various activities and initiatives to date and approved additional funding for students on the council to attend an upcoming meeting in Red Deer with the Public School Boards' Association in June.
- The board approved their Three-Year Capital Plan (2019-

2022) and Ten-Year Facilities Plan (2019-2028), subject to funding by Alberta Education being in place at the appropriate time. The board's top three priorities for a full modernization are Grand Trunk High School and Evansview School in Evansburg, and Wildwood School in Wildwood.

- Public Board meeting dates for the 2018-2019 school year were established at today's meeting.
- The second quarter financial report noted that the division continues to be on track with revenues and expenses up to the period ending February 28, 2018
- Trustees congratulated Brittnay Sopko from Summitview School in Grande Cache as their nominee for this year's Edwin Parr Teacher Award. All school boards may nominate a first year teacher along with supporting evidence to demonstrate how the nominee meets the criteria set by the Alberta School Boards' Association.







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

### HOW TO PET-PROOF A HOME

Tens of millions of households throughout North America include pets. The American Veterinary Medical Foundation reports that more than 80 million households in the United States include companion animals, while the 2014 Canadian Pet Market Outlook reported that 57 percent of Canadian households owned pets.

Pets are a big responsibility, and responsible pet owners recognize that the work begins even before pets come home. Pet proofing a home protects pets from accidents and injuries as they grow acclimated to their surroundings.

• Install childproof latches. Much like children after they learn to crawl and then walk, young pets tend to be curious, and that curiosity can put them in precarious positions. Pet owners should install childproof latches on low drawers and cabinets, especially those beneath sinks where potentially harmful cleaning products are typically stored. Curious pet paws may be able to pry or pull open cabinets and drawers, but childproof latches can make that

considerably more difficult if not impossible.

- Close toilet lids. While images of puppies drinking from toilets may elicit some laughs, the nonprofit organization American Humane warns that chemicals in common toilet cleaners can be deadly to pets. In addition, small puppies or kittens can drown in toilets. Keep all toilet lids close when toilets are not in use.
- Keep potentially harmful items out of pets' reach. Household cleaners beneath the kitchen sink are not the only items around the house that can be harmful to pets. Medications should always be stored on high shelves where pets cannot reach them. In addition, make sure all laundry room items, including detergent and dryer sheets, are stored out of pets' reach. Discuss human foods that might be harmful to pets with a veterinarian and make sure such foods are not left out where pets can reach them when you are hosting friends or family members. If necessary, make sure all foods are served on dinner tables or kitchen counters that are inaccessible to pets.
- Conceal all wires. Today's homes are more connected than ever before, and that often translates to more wires around the house. Make sure all wires are bundled together and out of the reach and view of pets, who may be tempted to chew on them. Even wires that are out of reach may tempt pets if they can see them, so pet owners should make concerted efforts to conceal wires.
- Move or remove potentially poisonous plants. Plant lovers may not have worried if their plants were poisonous when they had no intention of welcoming pets into their homes. But prospective pet owners should research each plant in their homes to make sure they're not poisonous. Move potentially poisonous plants to places where pets cannot access them. Remove any poisonous floor plants from the home before purchasing or adopting a pet.

Pets, particularly puppies and kittens, tend to be curious. Pet parents can protect pets from their own curiosity by pet proofing their homes.

# HOW EMPTY-NESTERS CAN TRANSFORM THEIR HOMES

### REDUCE INJURIES DURING DIY PROJECTS

Accomplishing a do-it-yourself home repair or renovation can elicit feelings of pride. DIY projects can be cost-effective and completed on homeowners' unique time schedules. Although people can do many repairs themselves, using the wrong tools or equipment, or having insufficient knowledge of the task at hand can increase the risk of injury.

The home security resource A Secure Life says that more than 18,000 Americans die every year from injuries that take place in the home. Unintentional injuries can be traced to many factors, but making repairs around the house can contribute to accident risk. Falls, electrical shocks, broken glass, carpentry tools, and carrying overly heavy loads repeatedly result in injury,

says The Home Depot.

Recognizing these potential hazards and always employing safe tactics can help keep DI-Yers stay healthy.

- Ladder safety: A fall from even a few feet can cause severe injuries and even death. Ladders should always be put on a level, stable surface. Individuals should not climb higher than the second rung on a step ladder or the third rung on an extension ladder.
- Tools: Every tool has the potential to cause injury. This injury risk increases when tools are not used properly. Before a tool is used, it's important to read the instructions.
- Wear protective gloves. Gloves can help protect against burns, electrocution, slippery grip, and even deep cuts or

finger amputation when using sharp tools. Gloves also are essential when handling broken glass.

- Power tools: Power tools have momentum and torque behind them to make fast work of various jobs. If using power tools, DIYers should ensure they are the right tools for the job, not something that is handy or a quick fix. Power tools should only be used if a person can devote attention to the task and stay focused. That means never consuming alcohol, drugs or medications that can impair function when using power tools.
- Working with electricity: An electric shock occurs when a person is exposed to a source of electricity and the charge runs through the body. It can cause burns, cardiac arrest, changes to

heartbeat, and even neurological injuries, according to the Mayo Clinic. DIYers should take precautions anytime they are working with electricity, including turning off the supply of electricity to the outlet or fixture being worked on.

- Heavy loads: It is important to exercise caution when moving around heavy loads. A friend or family member can help with the transfer of building materials or to relocate furniture.
- Distractions: Avoiding distractions is essential when doing home renovations. Keep pets and children away from work areas to focus entirely on the job at hand.

Injuries can derail home renovation projects if safety measures are ignored.

## **POOLS AND LAWNS CAN GET ALONG**

Homeowners interested in installing pools in their backyards need not worry about the potential impact of such decisions on surrounding landscapes.

According to the Association of Pool & Spa Professionals, there are 10.4 million residential and 309,000 public swimming pools in the United States. Although the average monthly temperatures in Canada are lower than those throughout much of the United States, many Canadian homeowners still have pools in their backyards. Quebec is home to the most pools per capita for Canada - with some estimates suggesting the province has more than 300,000 backyard pools, according to Pool and Spa Marketing magazine.

Many homeowners wonder if the chlorine and other chemicals

in pool water have any affect on the lawn, particularly if pool water robs lawns of vital nutrients they need to thrive. But the resource All About Lawns says most people needn't worry about errant drops or even higher levels of overflow. It all comes down to the selectivity of grass. Blades of grass are particular about which nutrients from the water they absorb and in what quantities. Lawns are largely unaffected by chlorine. Furthermore, soil can withstand chlorine when kept at applicable sanitary levels (which generally range between two to three parts per million), at high acid levels. That's much more than is usually contained in pool water.

Pool water is also maintained in the neutral range at a pH of 6.5 to 7.8, which is safe for plants. Should the pool water test at a higher acidity or alkalinity, it can adversely affect landscapes, particularly delicate plants.

Pool owners should be diligent about smart application and storage of pool chemicals. Powdered or liquid chlorine and other water chemistry products that spill onto grass or plants may cause damage.

In safe amounts, chlorine should not adversely affect lawns and other plants that surround pools.





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
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# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Opportunities for Primary Care Network - The McLeod River Primary Care Network (MRPCN) provides physical and mental health programs to residents referred to them by the local healthcare system. The organization currently runs their programming out of several local and regional facilities and is asking to be able to access the proposed new regional sports and recreation facility in Edson for classes for their clients.

Rural Municipalities of Alberta – Representatives from the Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) met with Council to discuss various topics, including rural crime, ambulance availability for rural residents, provincial budget and funding issues that directly impact municipalities, recreational and medical cannabis and its potential beneficial and negative impacts to rural communities. The RMA is a lobby organization that represents rural municipalities in Alberta.

Robb Force Main Replacement – The force main in Robb has had three breaks in the last five years, indicating that the main needs to be replaced. The contract Sanitary Force main replacement was awarded to Grayson Excavating Ltd for \$905,787.50.

Culvert Replacement – Council awarded a contract for a major culvert south of Evansburg off of Reno Road to Formula Alberta Ltd. for \$487,000. The culvert is 2.7 metres wide and 53 metres long and will replace the old culvert at that location. The work being done will include a stream bed realignment to increase longevity and functionality of the water course. The cost also includes provisions for fish capture.

YCFD Junior Firefighters – Yellowhead County will start a Junior Firefighter program that will encourage youth 16-18 to join the fire department as a full member. The program may allow Junior Firefighters to earn educational credits for volunteerism

and work experience and give them an opportunity to gain experience and training towards becoming a full YCFD member or a related profession once they turn eighteen. Junior Firefighters would attend development and training on a regular basis.

Student Experience Firefighter Program – Yellowhead County will introduce a student experience firefighter program for firefighters that have graduated from a recognized firefighter program. Successful candidates would become paid-on-call members and would work in the Casual Fire-fighters program in YCFD.

Municipal Reserve Designation – Council passed Bylaw 6.18 that removes the current municipal reserve designation for the new Brule Community Hall. This removal expands the land base available for the construction of a new community hall.

ASB Chair Re-appointed – Bob Mitchell was nominated by

the Agricultural Services Board (ASB) and appointed by Council to act as Yellowhead County's Agricultural Service Board (ASB) chair. The appointment of a chair is required under the provincial Agricultural Service Board Act.

The next Council Meetings are April 10 & 24, 2018. The next Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting is April 17, 2018. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.
