### YELLOWHEAD COUNTY MAYOR GERALD SOROKA RUNS FOR VACANT MP SEAT

Yellowhead County Mayor Gerald Soroka has entered the race for the Conservative MP nomination in the Yellowhead Riding. Soroka made the announcement amid a gathering of supporters at the Galloway Station Museum in Edson on April

With Conservative MP Jim Eglinski's announcement on January 9 that he won't be seeking re-election in 2019, the seat will become vacant. He will continue to serve until the next election is called. "After 52 years of public service it is time to retire,"

said Eglinski.

Gerald Soroka knows how important it is to have a strong voice for rural communities in Ottawa. He grew up on a family farm just north of Evansburg and has lived in the County all his life. "I still live on our original homestead from 1930."

Soroka has been representing constituents in the area for nearly 14 years and points to his proven track record. "I was a Yellowhead County Council member since 2004 and the Yellowhead County Mayor since 2007."

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# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF APRIL 16, 2018

This week, we covered topics including Budget 2018 and the ongoing Trans Mountain Expansion Project crisis.

The following was debated in the House:

- Bill C-25 An Act to amend the Canada Business Corporations Act, the Canada Cooperatives Act, the Canada Not-forprofit Corporations Act, and the Competition Act (Consideration of messages between the Senate and the House of Commons)
- Bill C-74 Budget Implementation Act, 2018, No. 1 (Second Reading)
- Bill C-330 An Act to amend the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (landlord consent) (Second Reading)
- Bill C-395 Opportunity for Workers with Disabilities Act (Second Reading)

• Bill C-396 – An Act to amend the Department of Industry Act (financial assistance) (Second Reading)

- Bill S-210 An Act to amend An Act to amend the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act, the Civil Marriage Act and the Criminal Code and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Second Reading)
- Emergency Debate Trans Mountain Expansion Project On Monday, I had the pleasure of meeting with Avery Pelz, a young constituent and student from Edson. She was visiting Ottawa as a participant of Encounters with Canada.

On Tuesday, in the House of Commons, I had the opportunity to recognize a local constituent. Ciera Knight, a 24 year-old from Edson, is currently at the base camp of Mount Everest and will attempt to summit the mountain between May 20 and 26. You can

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we continued our study on cultural hubs and cultural districts in Canada. We also continued our study on the state of Canadian museums. This week, I attended—seven meetings four events. I will return to the riding on Thursday to attend an event in the riding. 
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### LAKEWELL 4-H MULTI CLUB REPORT

"In the Fall I ran for Mayor and I had no intentions of going any further. If someone had said on January 1st you will be running for the next Conservative MP—I'd have told them no; I fully supported Jim. In fact I signed up to be on the nomination committee," said Soroka. "It took me several weeks to decide I really wanted to do this."

"I got into politics because I want to make our communities a better place to live, enhance our services and facilities, and the quality of life in our rural areas," said Soroka.

The first step to becoming the Conservative Member of Parliament is to become the Party Representative. "I may have a lot of people who support me but they can't vote for me unless they purchase a Canadian Conservative Party membership," said Soroka. Memberships are \$15 per year and anyone 14 years or older can buy a membership and vote.

A few of the current issues Soroka wants to tackle as MP include seeing the pipeline completed, coal and jobs, housing problems, finding a solution to the Caribou issue, the Mountain Pine

Beetle problem, and rural crime.

"The laws and the courts are almost making crime into a viable business where criminals have more rights on your property than anyone else," said Soroka. "It's become a catch and release program and before this becomes a vigilante system we need to strengthen our legal system."

"With the Pine Beetles and Caribou, you need to have someone that understands these issues and can fight for industry and the ecosystem," said Soroka. "The ecosystem is out of balance and if we don't continue managing it properly we are going to do more harm to the Caribou than just walking away."



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# KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

• Trustees revised Board Policy 01 – Division Foundational Statement with a new vision, mission and core values for the jurisdiction. Please visit the website to see the new policy in its entirety.

VISION - Our school division endeavours to provide each student with the opportunity to fulfill their potential and pursue their dreams.

• The board welcomed the division's new Secretary-Treasurer, Cindy Wang, who spoke to the board in regards to the 2018-19 Budget Allocation Model. Alberta Education's funding framework allocates funds to school boards to provide educational services to students for instruction, transportation, facility operations and maintenance.

- As part of its monthly review process, trustees discussed attendance at upcoming events and celebrations noted in the board's annual work plan.
- Superintendent Lewis provided a current overview of the results from the latest OurSchool Survey data. GYPSD has administered the Our School survey in all schools for students in Grades 4-12 for the past four years. In addition, the OurSchool survey was combined with the Alberta Education's Accountability

Pillar survey during the first three years. These surveys afford schools and the division a means to measure their success and challenges in meeting identified objectives, and assess their progress towards meeting their students' learning goals. OurSchool combined with the Alberta Education Accountability Survey questions through the lens of the following measures:

- social-emotional outcomes
- physical health outcomes
- academic outcomes
- drivers of student outcomes (quality instruction, school context, classroom context, and family context)
- The board received information on carbon tax levy expenses since January

2017. The province implemented a tax on carbon dioxide emissions from burning fossil fuels used for transportation and heating. The transportation department has tracked these expenditures as an additional \$30,000 cost to their budget to date.

- A tentative schedule for the 2018 Education Week events and celebrations happening in schools throughout the division during the week of April 30 to May 4, 2018, was shared with trustees. A full schedule of events will be posted on the division's website at the end of April.
- There are currently nine full time Family School Liaison Counsellors (FSLC) working in all Grande Yellowhead schools who provide additional supports and resources for students and their families. FSLCs have many referrals coming in for support related to family difficulties (ie. domestic violence parent-child relational difficulties, poverty, parental mental health needs requiring hospitalization, divorce and separation), anxiety and depression and lagging social skills.
- Students in Grande Yellowhead are supported by three different Regional Collaborative Response Delivery Systems who enable effective collaboration between Children's Services, Community and Social Services, Education, school authorities, Health, Alberta Health Services, First Nations and community organizations at the local, regional and provincial levels. Funding is to support resources and services needed unique to each community including access to speech language and occupational therapy specialists.
- · Superintendent Lewis noted discussions around staffing changes for the upcoming school year are beginning. To support leadership development and succession planning, she is investigating a number of administrative position changes within the division. Schools that currently have principal vacancies are Wildwood School, Grand Trunk High School in Evansburg, and Sheldon Coates School in Grande Cache. in Hinton, Principal Kurt Scobie from Crescent Valley School has been reassigned to École Mountain View School i, and Principal Robin Hengel from Mountain View is reassigned to Crescent Valley as of September 2018, to share their expertise and expand their instructional leadership skills with each other's school communities. A new position for an Assistant Superintendent of Secondary Learning/ Programming was also recently posted for the division. "We have excellent leaders throughout our jurisdiction, but we need to continuously seek opportunities that support their development and instructional leadership skills," noted Superintendent Lewis when presenting to the board. "We have a number of leadership positions currently available, and dependent upon the successful applicants, we may have others open up for other aspiring leaders for the upcoming school year. Busy, but exciting times ahead for GYPSD."





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



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The entryway to a home is the first thing guests experience when coming inside. It also can be the first place residents drop their belongings after long days at school or work. As a result, entryways can quickly be consumed by clutter. Taming such messes takes a mixture of ingenuity and planning.

- Create a command center. Create a central location where items are neat, orderly and within reach. Use a bulletin board, dry-erase calendar or something that can house schedules and important notices. Hooks can hold keys, chargers and more.
- · Keep it covered. Covered bins can serve as a seating area and also a place to store shoes, hats and scarves.
- Create cabinet space. Store items in cabinets so they are organized but out of sight. This way belongings are not just left on an entryway ta-
- Create another drop zone. If the entryway is too small to serve its purpose, outfit another room or area that also can do the job. This can be

a laundry room or mudroom area. Install shelves, a bench, cabinets and hooks. Just be sure this space is close enough to the entryway to make it useful.

• Go vertical. An easy way to keep things neater is to remove items from the floor and embrace vertical

# CREATE A TEEN-FRIENDLY SPACE AT HOME

Teenagers are busier than ever before. But even the busiest teens need places to unwind and relax with friends. Many parents aspire to create that type of environment in their homes but don't know where to begin.

Having teens close by and in-

teracting with them on a regular basis can benefit families. Data from the National Center for Education Statistics notes that parental involvement correlates to higher grade point averages. Research from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says certain parenting styles, including those that set rules and monitor teens in supportive ways, develop kids who are more likely to wear seat belts while driving, while such support also lowers crash risk. Involved parents also may reduce the chances of teen drug use and promiscuous behavior.

Parents who want to keep teens nearby can create hangout spaces at home that make it easy for teens to feel comfortable with their friends. These "teen caves" can be private but permit supervision when necessary. With a few modifications, it's possible to transform a room in a home into a teen-friendly hangout space.

- Talk to your children. Involve teens in the process of renovating a home to create a spot in which they would like to congregate. Talk about elements they would like to see in the space, whether it be a particular design style, technology or activity.
- Establish a shared budget. Paint is inexpensive and

can transform just about any room in a single afternoon. If the room being renovated is the teen's own bedroom, allow him or her to choose the color palette and other accents. Even if it isn't to your taste, he or she will be proud of the results and may want to share it with friends.

• Have a snack station. Some teenagers always seem to be hungry, and hanging out with friends while enjoying food is a popular pastime. When renovating a room into a teen cave, find a way to make food a focus. Install a mini-refrigerator and non-alcoholic bar where kids can serve snacks to friends. Think about a space you would like as an adult and modify it to be more accommodating to

teenagers.

- Add more seating. Having friends over means having enough seating to handle a small crowd. Beanbags, cushioned benches, a daybed, modular seating, and more can ensure everyone has a place to sit.
- Make a private outdoor spot. Teen spaces do not need to be restricted to the indoors. Design advice site Houzz says an outdoor escape zone that includes comfortable seating in a private area - particularly a spot that can also be enjoyed into the evening - will be a coveted spot.
- Invest in "indestructible" materials. Teenagers are bound to make messes, and having other people over means

# WEATHERIZING TO SAVE MONEY AND ENERGY


• Home energy audit: The U.S. Department of Energy notes

Leakage: Homeowners may think leakage only poses a problem in winter, when cold air can creep in through cracks around doors and windows and make residents cold, forcing them to raise the temperature on the thermostat. But leaks can affect comfort levels and energy bills during the summer, too, forcing homeowners to adjust their air conditioners to ensure a home is cool on hot days. Choose a cool, windy day to inspect for drafts around doors and windows. The DOE notes that air leakage can adversely affect indoor air quality and contribute to moisture problems that can affect occupants' health.

Insulation: A poorly insulated home will cost more to heat in winter and more to keep cool in summer. The DOE notes that heat flows from warmer to cooler until there is no longer a temperature difference. So during winter, heat will flow from heated living spaces to unheated areas of the home, including attics and garages. In summer, heat will flow from the outdoors into the home. Properly insulating a home will decrease this flow of heat, ensuring homeowners aren't paying to heat rooms they don't use in winter or paying more to keep rooms cool in summer because heat is flowing in from the exterior of the

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
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
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
