We are so sorry for the loss of the members of the team. We also wish the surviving members a strong recovery over the coming days, weeks and months.

April 24, 2018 MP EGLINSKI CONGRATULATES LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS APPROVED FOR FUNDING UNDER THE NEW HORIZONS FOR SENIORS PROGRAM

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to announce a total of \$144,674 in funding for Yellowhead organizations through the New Horizons for Seniors Program.

Since 2004, the Employment and Social Development Canada program has helped to ensure seniors benefit from, and contribute to, the quality of life in their communities through active living and participation in social activities. The selected projects are either led or inspired by seniors.

The projects include:

The Town of Mayerthorpe will receive \$8,600 for their community garden to build raised planter beds, a sun shelter, and a cement pad for seniors with disabilities so that they can continue to harvest and distribute produce.

The Thorsby Seniors Citizen Club will receive \$23,500 to upgrade their activity center. This will include purchasing a greenhouse for gardening, leather working tools for leather working, and kitchen equipment for cooking classes.

The Edson and District Recycling Society will receive \$25,000 for their Senior Mentorship Program's community garden. Seniors involved with the organization will mentor youth and community members through workshops on garden maintenance, pruning and harvesting.

The Warburg Cultural Society will receive \$25,000 to make improvements to their Cultural Centre. This will include renovating the kitchen and craft area to allow seniors to participate in activities such as quilting and cooking classes.

The Cadomin Legion Branch 124 will receive \$24,054 to repair their damaged roof to allow seniors to continue participate in activities such as darts, foosball and air hockey.

The Alberta Beach and District Active 50+ Club will receive \$25,000 to purchase and install outdoor exercise equipment and benches to allow seniors to participate in exercise and have a place to socialize.

The Evansburg Senior Citizens Society will receive \$13,520 to purchase curling equipment, chairs and a vacuum cleaner to allow seniors to continue floor curling, card games and socializing in a comfortable, well-kept facility.

"As a member of the Parliamentary All-Party Seniors Caucus and being a senior myself, I am convinced that a high quality of life for seniors requires helping them stay active, engaged and informed. I am pleased to see these outstanding projects in our communities receive funding," concluded MP Eglinski.

This week, we covered topics including Budget 2018 and the ongoing Trans Mountain Expansion Project crisis.

The following was debated in the House:

• Bill C-25 – An Act to amend the Canada Business Corporations Act, the Canada Cooperatives Act, the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act, and the Competition Act (Consideration of messages between the Senate and the House of Commons)

• Bill C-74 – Budget Implementation Act, 2018, No. 1 (Second Reading) • Bill C-330 – An Act to amend the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (landlord consent) (Second Reading)

• Bill C-395 – Opportunity for Workers with Disabilities Act (Second Reading)

• Bill C-396 – An Act to amend the Department of Industry Act (financial assistance) (Second Reading)

• Bill S-210 – An Act to amend An Act to amend the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act, the Civil Marriage Act and the Criminal Code and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Second Reading)

• Emergency Debate – Trans Mountain Expansion Project On Monday, I had the pleasure of meeting with Avery Pelz, a young constituent and student from Edson. She was visiting Ottawa as a participant of Encounters with Canada.

On Tuesday, in the House of Commons, I had the opportunity to recognize a local constituent. Ciera Knight, a 24 year-old from Edson, is currently at the base camp of Mount Everest and will attempt to summit the mountain between May 20 and 26. In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we continued our study on cultural hubs and cultural districts in Canada. We also continued our study on the state of Canadian museums. This week, I attended seven meetings four events. I will return to the riding on Thursday to attend an event in the riding. HOW TO AVOID ELECTRICAL MISHAPS AROUND THE HOUSE

Replace any items that pose a threat and stop using these items immediately.

• Avoid DIY electrical work. Many homeowners are handy with hammers and other tools, but professionals are better trusted to perform electrical work on a home. The risk of accident or injury when working with wiring and other electrical components is simply too great for untrained homeowners to do on their own.

• Unplug appliances before flipping a fuse. Fuses blow from time to time. Some may be knocked out by especially powerful storms, while others may blow because they're overloaded. Regardless of why fuses blow, homeowners should turn off appliances on blown fuses before flipping those fuses back on. Leaving appliances running when flipping a fuse can increase the risk of fire or accident. Turn off appliances, unplug them and then turn them back on one by one after the fuse has been flipped.

• Be especially cautious if anyone smells gas. Gas leaks are often detected by the aroma of the gas in the air. When such leaks are detected, homeowners should not touch or turn any electrical switches. Doing so may create a spark that can react with the gas in the air, leading to fire. If a gas leak is detected, go outside and contact a local emergency service.

Many home electrical mishaps can be prevented if homeowners exercise caution and hire certified electrical contractors to handle wiring and other electrical tasks around their homes.
