### WHITECOURT GETS MORE AFFORDABLE CHILD CARE SPACES

WHITECOURT - More families in Whitecourt will have access to affordable child care, thanks to a provincial funding announcement for 53 newly affordable spaces.

The Whitecourt Early Learning and Childcare Centre will now be able to offer 53 of its existing child-care spaces to parents at no more than \$25 per day.

Whitecourt-Ste. Anne MLA Oneil Carlier has advocated for more of these affordable spaces in this community, and is happy with the results.

"The newly affordable spaces at the Whitecourt Early Learning & Childcare Centre will help a lot of families in our rural community. By opening newly affordable spaces across Alberta we will make an incredible difference for working parents by providing high-quality child care at a price that helps families make ends meet, let's parents go back to work, and creates hundreds of jobs while creating a brighter future for Alberta." -Oneil Carlier, MLA for Whitecourt-Ste. This week Premier Rachel Notley and Children's Services Minister Danielle Larivee announced that 100 new Early Learning and Child Care Centres across the province would be added to the existing 22 centres that opened last year as part of a province-wide pilot project.

With a total of 7,300 spaces now across the province, this program is expected to create 450 child-care jobs, empower more than 1,400 parents to enter or re-enter the workforce, and put big smiles on thousands of little faces.





Albertans are encouraged to check with local municipalities for more information about Alberta Forest Week and Arbor Day activities in their area.






### Tips to Protect your Real Estate Investment Dollars

- \* Consult public real estate websites to review property listings in the community where the property is located. Compare features, size & locations to establish if the asking price seems reasonable.
- \* Get independent representation for your purchase. If the seller objects, consider it a red flag.
- \* Check to make sure your representative is a licensed real estate agent. Contact your local Real Estate Board or the Real Estate Council of Alberta. Using a licensed real estate agent does not cost anything from a purchaser's standpoint. Usually all commissions are paid by the seller. \*Beware of a real estate agent or mortgage broker who has a financial interest in the transaction.
- \* Ask your independent representative to provide you with a comparative market analysis of the property.
- \* Ask for a copy of the land title or go to a Registry office and ask them to do a historical title search.
- \* Insist on a home inspection to guard against buying a home that has been cosmetically renovated.
- \* When you make a deposit, ensure your money is protected by being held "in trust".



### Red Flags to Watch for Mortgage Fraud

- \* Someone offers you a fee to use your name and credit information to obtain a mortgage
- \*You are encouraged to include false information to a loan application
- \* You are asked to leave signature lines or other important areas on a loan application blank
- \* The loan amount on the mortgage is significantly higher than the value of the property
- \* The mortgage has been refinanced several times and each instance, the amount of the mortgage has increased
- \* The seller or investment advisor discourages you from seeing or inspecting the property you are offering to purchase

### RURAL CRIME AWARENESS

Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.

"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed.

Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800.

Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area.Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own.

## CHILDREN ON-LINE

#### SOME TIPS FOR CHILDREN ON THE NET

- 1. Do not use login names or nicknames that will reveal age or gender.
- 2. Never give out personal identification including friends, addresses, school activities, passwords or real names
- 3. Everyone is a stranger, Identities can be hijacked or passwords compromised so even your "best friend" online might not be who they say they are.
- 4. Everyone lies. While this might not be true, it is easier to assume that it is true and to act accordingly.
- The Internet is NOT secure. It is a shared resource. Email is about as secure as a postcard; Chat is about as private as having a phone call with your parents listening in on the other extension.
- 6. The people who would harm you have often had lots of time, experience and knowledge on how to trap you. You are an amateur compared to them. They will do everything they can to trick you into trusting them.
- 7. Do not agree to meet anyone offline.
- 8. If you are even a little bit suspicious, talk to your parents.

#### SELF DEFENCE

- 1. Computers used by children should be placed in a supervised area with the screen facing outwards.
- All computers that can connect to the Internet should have Anti-Virus Software installed and updated at least weekly, if not daily.
- All computers that have a dedicated connection (cable/dsl) should also have a firewall device or firewall software installed to block intruders.
- Never open attachments unless they have been scanned. If you do not know the sender, attachments should be deleted.
- Use passwords to secure your computer even if you are the only user. If the computer equipment is stolen, all your information could be compromised. Change your password regularly.
- 6. Disconnect your network connection or turn off your computer when you are not using it.

7. Your computer needs regular maintenance, upkeep and periodic upgrades to keep it functioning well.

8. Always back up your data. Keep the data stored securely and separately from the computer. Drivers who are impaired by fatigue, drugs, alcohol or other distractions such as cell phones, are a danger not only to themselves, but also to the innocent drivers around them. If you witness any of the behaviors below, call 911 and tell the operator that you are calling to report an impaired driver. Be prepared to describe the make, model, color and license plate number of the vehicle, and provide its exact location.

Signs of impaired driving include:

• Failure to turn on headlights at night. • Illegal or sudden turning. • Turning within an unusually wide radius. • Nearly striking other cars or objects. • Sudden or erratic braking. • Drifting, swerving or weaving. • Driving with the face close to the windshield. • Drinking alcohol in the vehicle. • Driving much slower than the posted speed limit. • Rapidly accelerating. • Tailgating. • Driving in the middle of the road, or with the left tires on the center line. • Responding slowly to traffic signals

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.




7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.




### IOW TO FIX TH

Nearly everyone has experienced a sticking door that just will not close properly. This problem may become more noticeable when temperatures rise and humidity contributes to the swelling of wood doors and frames.

According to The Family Handyman, a home improvement resource, the standard remedy for alleviating a sticking door is to remove the door and pare down the edges that are rubbing so that the door will once again swing freely. While this can solve the problem, it can be a hassle, as it requires refinishing the pareddown edge and rehanging the door. Try these shortcuts first before creating more work than might be necessary.

- · Identify the problem area and rub it with a dry bar of soap. This should reduce friction and allow the door to close more easily.
- · Remove humidity with a dehumidifier or by running an air conditioning unit.
- Check for loose hinges or sagging around the hinge. Tighten the fasteners to sure up the door and create better alignment.
- Spray the hinges with lubricant if you suspect sticking is originating because of squeaky hinges.
- Look for obstructions at the bottom of the door. Is the door dragging on carpeting or being caught on something on the floor? It may be a matter of simply clearing away the obstruction.

### BRING MORE NATUR

Maximizing natural light in a home is a smart and sometimes low-cost renovation. Homes that are dark and drab can drain energy levels and reduce productivity. In addition, dark rooms may not be inviting places to gather as a family or when entertaining.

Certain factors contribute to a dark home. Houses that face north or east may not get the same level of sunlight as those that primarily face south and west. Geographic location also plays a role in the amount of natural sunlight. Mountains, buildings and even latitude can affect the amount of natural light that enters a home.

The style of a home and its attributes also may create dark conditions. Deep house eaves as well as small windows or too few windows also can contribute to a deficit of light indoors. A major remodel certainly can remedy the situation. However, there also are other less-extensive strategies to improve natural light.

- Assess the situation before renovating. Walk around the house and determine which rooms get the most light and which conditions may be contributing to the problem in other areas. Dark floors and walls may be absorbing natural light and compounding the situation. You may find that only one or two rooms need attention, saving you the cost and effort associated with a major home overhaul.
- Lighten up window treatments. Heavy drapes or thick blinds can be replaced with

translucent alternatives. Translucent shades will allow light into the room without compromising privacy, say the experts at HGTV.

Use mirrors strategically. A mirror placed opposite a window will reflect light all around the room. This can make a small room seem larger and a dark space instantly brighter.

• Install new windows and doors. If the budget allows, installing larger windows in a home will allow more natural light in. French doors or sliding doors also may make a home's interior more bright. Think about adding windows to a side of the house that has none, or increase the size of the windows on the side of the house that gets the most light.

- Maximize sunlight from above. Skylights will bring light into a home as the sun passes overhead. Tubular skylights can bring natural sunlight into spaces where you may not expect skylights to be practical. According to Houzz, a design and architectural resource, tubular daylighting devices, or TDDs, can make a big difference. TDDs are reflective pipes installed between the roof and ceiling, with a clear plastic dome.
- Use reflective decor. Reflective surfaces, including glass and metal, can brighten up a room and diffuse light around a room. Glossy backsplashes,

pendant lighting and shiny metal that reflect light can increase the natural light, balancing out dark spaces.

- Prune trees regularly. Cut back branches and keep trees tidy to maximize sunlight. Avoid planting tall shrubbery in front of windows.
- Routinely clean windows and glass doors. Dirt and other grime can prevent light from getting through. Regularly give windows a thorough washing.

Natural light is an important commodity in a home. Sunlight can improve mood and go a long way toward keeping home occupants healthy and happy.

### HOW TO FIND THE RIGHT REPLACEMENT WINDOWS

Also, consider if certain window types, such as double-hung windows, casement windows, awning windows, or slider windows,

would be practical.

Keep home style in mind

A poor match between windows and the style of the home can produce unwanted changes in the appearance of the home. Replacement windows should match the style and appearance desired.

Expect minimal disruption

When homeowners hire professionals who are good at their craft, window replacement projects should not be a terrible inconvenience. According to American Window Products, Inc., seasoned professionals will be able to complete a replacement window upgrade in a short amount of time

depending on the size of the home and the number of windows being replaced.

Replacing windows can be a costly task, but one that will provide a more energy efficient home that can help homeowners save money in the long run.


Tips about Strangers

A stranger is anyone you don't know. There is no way to tell by the way a person looks if they are dangerous or not. A dangerous person does not always look mean or scary, so judging by the way people look is a mistake. It's not so easy to tell who is okay and who is not. Just because someone looks nasty doesn't mean that they would hurt you and just because someone looks nice, doesn't mean that they are a nice person.

There is only one person that is with you all the time and can be responsible for keeping you safe at all times. THAT PERSON IS YOU! Safety rules need to apply ALL THE TIME, not just when someone who looks bad or scary is around. One of the most common ways that kids get hurt by strangers is when being friendly and helpful to adults who pretend to need help. When you are without your parents or other adult you know, it is your job to protect yourself. It is not your job to offer help to any adults, even if they ask! A grownup who needs help should get help from another adult, not a child. So remember, looking out for yourself is your biggest job when you are not with your parents or another adult, so you have permission without your parents' permission. You should learn whose to ignore or refuse adult requests for help

### Stranger Tips:

- · Walk and play with others and use the buddy system. If you walk somewhere, walk with other children.
- · Adults do not usually ask children for directions or help, they should be asking other adults. If someone in a car should stop to ask for directions, you should not go near the car.
- Stay an arms reach or more away from strangers. Stand up, back up and run to someone who can help you if you feel afraid.
- · If someone is following you on foot or in a car, go to a place where there are other people--to a neighbor's home or into a store, a police station or even a library for instance--and ask for help.
- No one should ask you to look for lost items such as a "lost puppy" or tell you that either of your parents is in trouble and that he or she will take you to mom or dad. If someone tells you this, run the other way immediately and find help with an adult you know or run into a safe place you know.
- Never go near a car with someone in it or get into a car

### **ONOWAY COMMUNITY HALL 50TH** ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

The Onoway Community Hall will be celebrating 50 years during Onoway's Heritage Days.

The original hall was leased to the BPOElks. In 1966, the Centennial Committee was formed by the residents of the Community with the purpose of building a new Community Hall to serve the Onoway Community and surround-

ing area. Many will remember the beard competition and many events surrounding the 100th Anniversary of Canada. On completion of the project, the building was sold to the Village of Onoway for a nominal amount and continued to be leased to the Elks Lodge until 1997. Many projects were advanced in the community with the assistance of the Elks. Upon relinquishing the administration at that time, facilitators were brought

in to address the future of the Hall. The result was the formation of the Onoway Facility Enhancement Association. This organization has leased the Hall from the Town of Onoway since 1997. Originally the village received some funding from the Federal Government that was used to build the hall. In addition to that, funds were raised by selling the "blocks" that were used in the construction. These blocks were bought for \$5.00 each by members of the community. 




