### FIRE RESTRICTION ISSUED FOR LEDUC COUNTY

All outdoor fires burning at the time of the restriction's issuance are to be immediately extinguished, and individuals must use extreme caution when using burn barrels or fire pits.

Leduc County fire officials will continue to monitor the situation, and will update the public when conditions improve.

• Since March 1, there have been 274 wildfires in Alberta's Forest Protection Area.

• Of those fires, 99 per cent were human-caused and entirely preventable.

• As of May 15, there were 88 fire bans and fire advisories across the province.

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### Page 4 Community Voice NEW UOFA PARTNERSHIP WORKS TO INCREASE SAFETY ALONG HIGHWAY 2 – REDUCING MOTORISTS SPEEDING IS A LIFE-SAVING PRIORITY IN LEDUC

The City of Leduc is investing \$31,000 into a partnership with the University of Alberta to conduct a study on traffic management along the 6 km stretch of Highway 2 within the city's boundaries. The Integrated Speed Management Program is currently underway, along with increased manned traffic enforcement, and will run for 12 months

"Safety along Highway 2 is everyone's responsibility; not just that of our emergency service professionals," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "We have a responsibility to our citizens, visitors and first responders to ensure people are getting to and from their destinations safely."

Emergency units responded to up to 317 incidents between 2012 and 2018. In the past five years alone, eight lives were lost and 195 persons were injured. In 2014, a member of Leduc Enforcement Services was struck by a vehicle while providing as-



sistance to another incident further along on Highway 2.

"The purpose of this program is to lower driving speeds and improve compliance with the ultimate goal of improving safety by reducing collisions," says Dr. Karim El-Basyouny, with the Faculty of Engineering with the University of Alberta. "We will be collecting data, developing and implementing a manned enforcement deployment schedule, conducting periodic adjustments to the schedule, and then evaluating the data for the overall effectiveness of the program."

Motorists are asked to respect the posted speed limit especially in the designated safety corridor between Airport Road and the Highway 2A overpass.

The enforcement will also address vehicles recklessly passing emergency vehicles. Along with the U of A, other partnering agencies include Alberta Transportation, Leduc RCMP, Leduc Enforcement Services, and Leduc Fire Services.

"We're very pleased to support this study as the issue of traffic safety is of the utmost importance for the public and for first responders," says Leduc RCMP Insp. Kevin Kunetzki. "Our first responders perform an important duty in the community and it is our responsibility to ensure that everyone arrives home safe and sound at the end of their shift."


"We're seeing higher traffic volumes and that means we're responding to more and more emergency calls along Highway 2 in our community," says Leduc Fire Chief George Clancy. "The ever-increasing danger to our emergency responders attending these incidents weighs significantly on our workforce."

Mayor and council have dedicated funds from the Community Safety Advisory Committee to support this study with the University of Alberta.

Wildfire prevention is about taking a broader approach by teaming up with industry professionals, citizens and visitors alike. March is officially Wildfire Awareness Month in Alberta and with seeing nearly 50,000 ha burned last year, it's important to take note in how to reduce the risks.

"We're officially in wildfire season in Alberta and we want the citizens of this region to be on alert and aware of how quickly things can go wrong when the proper precautions aren't followed," says Deputy Fire Chief Gerry Kelly with Leduc Fire Services.

Through the Alberta fire commissioner's office, here are a few actions that will help reduce the risk of wildfire:

• Dispose of yard debris and lawn clippings. They act as a fuel for any ground fire.

• Clear leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches and decks. This will prevent embers from igniting your home.

• Remove dead vegetation and other items from under your deck/porch and within 10 ft. of your home.

• Remove flammable materials

within 10 ft. (urban) or 30 ft. (rural) of your home's foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. Things like wood piles and propane tanks can catch fire and easily spread.

• Prune trees so the lowest branches are 6 - 10 ft. from the ground.

### May 22, 2018 **LEDUC COUNTY COUNCIL APPROVES** 2018 BUDGET, SETS TAX RATES

Leduc County council approved the final 2018 budget and set the 2018 tax rates at its regular council meeting this afternoon.

Council approved an \$86 million operating budget and \$33.3 million capital budget, which represents a 1.16 per cent tax increase over 2017.

"The 2018 budget solidifies Leduc County's commitment to efficient, effective services in the region and allows us to support new initiatives that will enhance these services and give us the flexibility to make de-

The 2018 capital budget includes \$7 million for the annual road surfacing program, \$1.1 million for a fire station expansion in the New Sarepta fire district, \$920,000 for capital equipment and vehicle purchases for protective services, \$2.2 million for bridge rehabilitation and \$335,000 for parks and recreation purposes. The 2018 operating budget includes major projects of \$2.2 million for parks and recreation; with a \$1.5 million portion going towards the Warburg arena upgrade. 2018 tax rates

The 1.16 per cent tax increase results in minimal tax increases for most land owners. Approximately 82 per cent of Leduc County property owners can expect a property tax increase of less than \$100 over 2017. Twelve per cent of property owners can expect an increase between \$101 and \$250 and the remaining six per cent can expect an increase of more than \$250.

Property taxes are comprised of

municipal taxes, other requisitions, local improvement tax and the provincial education tax. Leduc County is obligated to collect the provincial education tax, as set by the Government of Alberta, as part of its property taxes. Leduc County's total 2018 education property tax is \$24.9 million, which represents an approximate 3.36 per cent, or \$800,000, increase over 2017.

Tax notices will be mailed to residents no later than the last week of May 2018. Taxes are due by June 30, 2018.



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### EXPERIMENT WITH GROWING EDIBLES INDOORS

Foodies find it hard to beat vine-ripened tomatoes plucked right out of a garden. Other edibles, such as fresh lettuce for a small luncheon salad or a handful of fresh parsley right out of a pot to add to a marinade, also add a lot to meals.

The convenience and flavor of freshly grown edibles propels many home gardeners to grow produce and herb gardens in their yards. But those short on outdoor space may be happy to learn that many edibles grow equally as well indoors as outdoors.

Many people maintain comfortable temperatures between 70 and 75 F in their homes all year long, which can be the ideal condition for growing an array of edibles no matter the season. For those with homes

that receive ample sunlight (or if homeowners are willing to supplement with artifical light), growing conditions can be even stronger. An indoor garden can comprise as much space as a homeowner is willing to devote. Shelving can maximize vertical areas and enable gardeners to include even more planting room.

Keep these tips in mind when cultivating indoor edible gardens.

Tomatoes: Tomatoes should be reserved for the sunniest spot in a home or one where additional UV light can be used. Tomatoes will need pots or containers that are roughly six inches deep with ample drainage. Keep in mind that tomatoes grown indoors will be smaller than outside fruits, and you may want to consider plum or cherry

tomato varieties.

Cucumbers: For those ٠ fresh salad mixes, cucumbers can be grown indoors in large pots so they can have space to develop. Be sure to put a climbing structure in the pot so that vines can grow vertically, and place cucumbers in a sunny, warm location.

Carrots: Natural Living Ideas says that if you have between four and five hours of bright sunlight per day and deep pots with loose, well-draining soil, you can cultivate carrots indoors. Carrots prefer cooler spots for sweet yields. Plus, carrot greens can make for attractive indoor decorations.

Microgreens: Swiss chard, basil, dill, kale, and other greens can provide nutrient-dense additions to any meals.

These plants do not require a lot of depth to a container and can thrive on a sunny windowsill in a room that's between 60 and 70 F.

. Scallions: These plants of the onion family add flavor to many recipes. When scallions are grown at home, gardeners can snip off the greens as needed. Choose deep pots so the scallions can establish strong root systems.

. Turnips: Large, deep pots are needed to grow turnips, says Loyal Gardener. You can grow them from seeds and be harvesting turnips in about two months.

Homeowners or apartment dwellers can experiment with different types of edibles indoors. The result can be fresh foods no matter the season.
