Wildwood, Alberta – Two suspects are facing charges and one suspect remains at large after the Western Alberta District Crime Reduction Team located a stolen vehicle last Sunday evening.

On May 20, 2018 at approximately 9:00 p.m., CRU members were on patrol of a rural area when they spotted a wanted male in a stolen vehicle. RCMP attempted to make contact with the vehicle when it took off from police. The vehicle was located a short time later and two of the three occupants were arrested without incident. Police Dog Services attended in search of the third suspect but he was not located.

MAJOR CRIMES NORTH LAY CHARGES IN FATAL PEDESTRIAN HIT & RUN

Thorsby, Alberta – The RCMP Major Crimes Unit have made an arrest and laid charges against 27-year-old Mitchell Robert Sydlowski of Spruce Grove in the death of Ki Yun Jo.

On October 6, 2017 a hit and run occurred at the Fas Gas service station resulting in the death of 54-year-old Ki Yun Jo. A stolen white cube van was seen to flee the Fas Gas after not paying for gas. The owner of the service station, Ki Yun Jo, made efforts to stop the van and was fatally injured when he was struck by the van.

The RCMP Major Crimes Unit (North) took carriage of this investigation and have been diligently investigating, including following up on all possible leads. This incident was witnessed by several people and impacted the community. On May 25, Sydlowski was arrested by the RCMP at the Edmonton Remand Centre. He has been charged with: Second degree murder, fail to remain at the scene of an accident causing death, possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000 and theft under \$5,000. A bail hearing was held on May 26 and the matter has been set over to Tuesday, May 29 at the Provincial court in Wetaskiwin.

"An investigation into a homicide remains active until it's solved" says Sergeant Bryce Long of the RCMP Major Crimes Unit. "Our team has worked hard on this investigation, and seeing these charges laid brings a great sense of closure not only to the Major Crimes Unit, but to the community at large and particularly the family of Ki Yun Jo."





This past week, the Legislature has been on a break and I have spent my time in the constituency talking to constituents. I've been hearing from you about things that matter to you most such as Health Care, Education, Infrastructure and essential services.

The one issue I am hearing the most about, however, is pipelines. So, I would like to give you an update on that issue.

Premier Rachel Notley has been relentlessly fighting for Alberta, both in public and at the negotiating table, because Albertans deserve the best—and fairest—return on our resources.

With the B.C. government threatening endless delays to Trans-Mountain's construction, I and our entire caucus proudly passed Bill 12 in the Legislature, which gives us the power we need to restrict the export of natural gas, crude oil and refined fuels. But, regardless of his antics, Premier Notley has maintained a razor-focus, because the Trans Mountain expansion is our #1 priority. Unlike the UCP, we aren't flip-flopping on whether we support it, or how to get it built. That's why our government is the only one who can get this done.

Inside the locker, members found two rifles, ammunition, and a loaded high capacity magazine. As a result of the search warrant, a male was arrested and found to be in

possession of 5.8 grams of fentanyl, 16 tablets of counterfeit oxycodone (suspected to be fentanyl), cocaine, methamphetamine, drug trafficking paraphernalia and a large amount of Canadian currency.

Jeffrey RYAN a 31 one-year-old male from Parkland County, AB has been charged with multiple offences including:



PARLIAMENT UPDATE WEEK OF MAY 21, 2018

This week, we covered many topics including sustainable development, electoral reform, rural crime, and net neutrality. We will now be sitting until midnight every evening (except Fridays) as the House will only sit for four more weeks before the summer break.

The following was debated in

the House:

• Bill C-47 – An Act to amend the Export and Import Permits Act and the Criminal Code (amendments permitting the accession to the Arms Trade Treaty and other amendments) (Report Stage)

 Bill C-57 – An Act to amend the Federal Sustainable Development Act (Report Stage)
Bill C-75 – An Act to

amend the Criminal Code, the

Youth Criminal Justice Act and other Acts and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Second Reading)

• Bill C-76 – Elections Modernization Act (Second Reading)

• Bill C-330 – An Act to amend the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (landlord consent) (Second Reading)

• Motion No. 167 – Rural Crime in Canada



• Motion No. 168 – Net neutrality

• Committee of the Whole – Department of Finance - Main Estimates, 2018-19

• Committee of the Whole – Department of Citizenship and Immigration - Main Estimates, 2018-19

• Government Business No. 22 – Extension of sitting hours and conduct of extended proceedings

On Thursday, I participated in debate on Bill C-57, which was originally passed by our previous Conservative Government and aims to make decision-making related to sustainable development more transparent, more certain and subject to greater accountability. I stated:

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EXPERIMENT WITH GROWING EDIBLES INDOORS

Foodies find it hard to beat vine-ripened tomatoes plucked right out of a garden. Other edibles, such as fresh lettuce for a small luncheon salad or a handful of fresh parsley right out of a pot to add to a marinade, also add a lot to meals.

The convenience and flavor of freshly grown edibles propels many home gardeners to grow produce and herb gardens in their yards. But those short on outdoor space may be happy to learn that many edibles grow equally as well indoors as outdoors.

Many people maintain comfortable temperatures between 70 and 75 F in their homes all year long, which can be the ideal condition for growing an array of edibles no matter the season. For those with homes that receive ample sunlight (or if homeowners are willing to supplement with artifical light), growing conditions can be even stronger. An indoor garden can comprise as much space as a homeowner is willing to devote. Shelving can maximize vertical areas and enable gardeners to include even more planting room.

Keep these tips in mind when cultivating indoor edible gardens.

• Tomatoes: Tomatoes should be reserved for the sunniest spot in a home or one where additional UV light can be used. Tomatoes will need pots or containers that are roughly six inches deep with ample drainage. Keep in mind that tomatoes grown indoors will be smaller than outside fruits, and you may want to consider plum or cherry tomato varieties.

• Cucumbers: For those

fresh salad mixes, cucumbers can be grown indoors in large pots so they can have space to develop. Be sure to put a climbing structure in the pot so that vines can grow vertically, and place cucumbers in a sunny, warm location.

• Carrots: Natural Living Ideas says that if you have between four and five hours of bright sunlight per day and deep pots with loose, well-draining soil, you can cultivate carrots indoors. Carrots prefer cooler spots for sweet yields. Plus, carrot greens can make for attractive indoor decorations.

• Microgreens: Swiss chard, basil, dill, kale, and other greens can provide nutrient-dense additions to any meals. These plants do not require a lot of depth to a container and can thrive on a sunny windowsill in a room that's between 60 and 70 F.

• Scallions: These plants of the onion family add flavor to many recipes. When scallions are grown at home, gardeners can snip off the greens as needed. Choose deep pots so the scallions can establish strong root systems.

• Turnips: Large, deep pots are needed to grow turnips, says Loyal Gardener. You can grow them from seeds and be harvesting turnips in about two months.

Homeowners or apartment dwellers can experiment with different types of edibles indoors. The result can be fresh foods no matter the season.





THE BASICS OF MULCHING

Mulch is available in various forms. Like other land and garden products, mulch can go a long way toward helping plants thrive.

Mulch comprises just about any material that is spread over the surface of soil. Its purpose is primarily to help soil retain moisture. In addition, mulch can staunch weed growth, keep soil cool, improve the aesthetics of garden beds, and even improve soil nutrient composition. When the right mulch is chosen, it can reduce the amount of time homeowners spend watering and weeding their gardens and insulate plants from dramatic changes in weather.

Gardeners may not realize that mulch also can prevent garden soil from becoming overly compacted, according to HGTV. This can mean beneficial earth-

worms can move easily through the soil, creating channels for water and depositing their nutrient-rich waste products.

Gardeners can choose organic or inorganic mulch. Organic mulches are derived from natural materials that will decompose over time, lending organic matter as well as various nutrients to the soil. Organic mulches also may contain beneficial microorganisms that can fight against plant diseases. Inorganic mulches may be made of stones, landscape fabrics and plastic. Both types will need to be amended or replaced as they degrade. Those who want the most environmentally-friendly mulching materials can choose all-natural mulches instead of synthetic alternatives.

To work effectively, mulch should be applied in a two- to

three-inch layer of material, state the experts at Old World Garden Farms. This is the ideal amount to retain soil moisture and suppress weed growth without choking plants. Also, mulch that is too thick may make it impossible for water to penetrate, or it may prevent the soil from airing out, causing continuously wet conditions that lead to root and stem rot.

The University of Connecticut Home & Garden Education Center says mulch should not be placed directly against plant crowns or tree bases, as this can promote the development of disease. It may also serve as a habitat for bark- and stem-eating rodents. The center also suggests watering newly installed bark or wood mulches to prevent fungi from colonizing in dry mulch and causing problems like a

water-repellent surface on the mulch.

Home landscapers considering mulch types may find that compost, manure and grass clippings (from nonpesticide-treated lawns) can be inexpensive and versatile in garden beds. The home advice site The Spruce notes that newspaper may also be effective. Many newspapers have switched over to organic dyes, especially for their black and white sections. Newspapers are an inexpensive way to suppress weeds and act like organic mulch in beds. They can be covered with other organic mulch, like shredded bark, for more visual appeal.

Mulch can be a versatile asset when doing gardening projects around home landscapes. And the benefits are more than just aesthetic.
