OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the finalists of Infrastructure Canada's Smart City Challenge have been announced. In November 2017, the federal government challenged communities across the country to develop bold and ambitious ideas to improve the lives of their residents using data and connected technology.

Over 200 communities, large and small, from across Cana-

da submitted their ideas to the Smart Cities Challenge. An independent panel of 13 jury members evaluated these submissions and has selected twenty finalists.

# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY FIRE ADVISORY LIFTED PERMITS STILL REQUIRED

(May 30, 2018) – Effective immediately, fire permits will again be issued as usual for any burning. Cooler temperatures and higher humidity drop the wildfire danger to LOW across the Yellowhead County Permit Zone.

Fire permits, and all safe burning practices and safety precautions are still mandatory.

What is allowed without a permit?

Recreational fires including campfires, portable propane fire pits and gas or propane stoves, and barbecues are allowed without a permit. Burn barrels require a fire permit in certain areas within Yellowhead County; please contact your local fire permit office for details.

# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

### May 22, 2018

Accurate Assessment Group Presentation – Accurate Assessment Group briefed council on the historic assessment growths and declines in Yellowhead County. In brief, Accurate Assessment Group predicts market changes leading to recovery and increased confidence in the future growth in the oil/gas sector.

Early Childhood Matters Coalition Presentation - Council received a presentation from the Early Childhood Matters Coalition regarding Early Development Instrument questionnaire data. In brief, the 2016 data demonstrated that Edson and Yellowhead County pre-school children are scoring lower than the provincial average in Physical Health and Wellbeing, Social Competence, and Emotional Maturity. However, Edson and Yellowhead County pre-school children are either on par or exceed the provincial average in Language and Cognitive Development and Communication

and General Knowledge. Moving forward, the coalition will focus on improving children's emotional maturity.

Yellowhead Agricultural Society Funding Request - On February 20, 2018 the Yellowhead Agricultural Society gave a presentation to council on a planned event center, which is estimated to cost \$3.8 million to construct. The society is requesting \$521,550 in funds from council. These funds are not currently approved in the 2018 Final Budget. Council will forward the request for funding to the 2019 Budget discussions for consideration at that time.

Entwistle Recreational Facility Cost Sharing Request - Parkland County is seeking a cost-sharing agreement with Yellowhead County for the proposed new Entwistle Recreational Facility. The new facility will contain an outdoor pool, retail common space, community space and a library. The requested capital cost share amounts to \$3,500,000 from Yellowhead County. Council directed Administration to open communications with Parkland County to discuss their request for

capital cost sharing.

First Reading of Bylaw 13.18 -Council gave first reading to Bylaw 13.18 for the closure of part of Mountain Street, Plan 1939RS that lies within the SE 15 and NE 10-50-27-W5M. The purpose of this closure is to close the undeveloped road plan and consolidate it with Lot B, Plan 1939RS, effectively consolidating both parcels. A Public Hearing will be held on June 26, 2018.

Information Technology Security Project - Earlier this year, administration undertook a third party review of the organization's technology practices. The report recommends numerous upgrades to further secure the organization's information technology. Council approved the addition of the Information Technology Security Project in 2018, at a cost of \$110,000 (to be funded from the Technology Reserve).



# Local **Counties** Announced as Finalists in Smart City Challenge

"I was excited to learn that four of our very own counties have been selected to move on to the next step of the challenge," stated MP Eglinski.

Parkland, Brazeau, Lac Ste Anne and Yellowhead Counties all teamed together to submit a proposal that would help their "agricultural community to revitalize and grow through the connection of people to the land and food while attracting citizens to share in its prosperous, innovative and resilient way of life."

The counties' submission is one of ten in the prize category for up to \$10 million that was open to communities with populations under 500,000 people. Out of the ten finalists in this category, two will be selected.

In the next and final stage, each applicant group will receive a \$250,000 grant to help develop its final proposal that outline all design, planning, privacy, data protection and project management components of their plans. The grant can be used for activities such as staffing, professional services, feasibility assessments, capacity building, pilot projects, community engagement and communications, data, and relevant training.

The winners are expected to be announced in the spring of 2019.

"Congratulations to our counties on their grant and the best of luck in this final stage of the challenge!" concluded MP Eglinski.

# SPRING/SUMMER NEWSLETTER FROM TRI-LAKES SEPTIC LTD

### Hello again

Its time for an update to our valued customers, suppliers, and future clients. Tri-Lakes has been undergoing a series of dramatic changes in the last couple of years, with much to be accomplished going forward.

We are pleased to announce our entry into the potable water delivery service. We had held off on this decision until now, but that decision has been made because we won a contract to supply potable water and septic removal on a Backwoods Energy contract in the oilfield. We purchased two potable trucks with the intent that one would be for the new contract, and the second for residential service and backup to the new contract.

Further to that, the new contract required us to commit to full COR certification; a safety, maintenance, and government compliance program. Again, this was a decision we had been close to making, and the new contracts pushed us over that decision threshold. As with any change, implementation and acceptance come slowly, but we believe we are on the right track going forward.

Our office and most of our equipment is now at our new location at 52510- RR61. This is a portion of a quarter section redistricted to allow for ongoing commercial operations, a big step from the home based business model. Please feel free to stop in. We plan to have a grand opening as soon as we receive final occupancy permits.

We wish to thank our customers for sticking with us through these changes, and the higher costs that are implicit with a more comprehensive business approach. We believe in sustainability, and that these changes help to bring sustainability.

On the service side, you may be aware of our decision to schedule drivers and office staff seven days a week through the summer months. Tanks do not just fill (or cisterns empty) on week days, so we wanted to be there reliably for you. That being said, after hours calls will be dealt with the next day. On occasion we may be able to serve after regular hours, but we do not commit to do so.

To continue with the potable water discussion- we were reluctant to enter this market because it has been very competitive. It does not have the stigma of septic, so more people are willing to provide this service. As a result, margins are thin. We do not intend to win your business by undercutting your current supplier. Prices are where they are because of the cost of water, and all the costs associated with trucking that volume to your door. We hope to win your business through the convenience of one stop shopping for septic and potable water supply, enhanced billing and payment options,

reliable and timely service, and charges being tied to quantity of water delivered.

The last point needs further explanation. We have purchased an induction flow meter that measures the water delivered. From the customers perspective, this means you do not have to let your tank run empty, with all the associated inconveniences, in order to achieve cost effective water delivery. If you choose to use our service, you will pay for what we put in, so we encourage people to call at 75% capacity, or go on a schedule for refilling. This enables us to work cost effectively by servicing more than one customer in an area, something that has worked very well on the septic side of the business. Economies of scale, along with our billing and support structure already being in place, will allow us to make a reasonable return at prevailing market prices. Thank you for considering this new service.



# PARLIAMENT UPDATE - WEEK OF MAY 25, 2018

This week, we covered many topics including national security, sustainable development, the justice system, and the rights of Indigenous Peoples.

The following was debated in the House:

• Bill C-47 – An Act to amend the Export and Import Permits Act and the Criminal Code (amendments permitting the accession to the Arms Trade Treaty and other amendments) (Time Allocation and Report Stage)

• Bill C-57 – An Act to amend the Federal Sustainable Development Act (Time Allocation and Third Reading)

• Bill C-59 – An Act respecting national security matters (Report Stage)

• Bill C-74 – Budget Implementation Act, 2018, No. 1 (Time Allocation and Report Stage)

• Bill C-75 – An Act to amend the Criminal Code, the Youth Criminal Justice Act and other Acts and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Time Allocation)

• Bill C-262 – United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (Third Reading)

• Bill C-281 – National Local Food Day Act (Second Reading)

• Bill C-391 – Aboriginal Cultural Property Repatriation Act (Second Reading)

• Government Motion No. 22 – Extension of Sitting Hours

• Bill C-395 – Opportunity for Workers with Disabilities Act (Second Reading)

• Bill C-396 – An Act to amend the Department of Industry Act (financial assistance) (Second Reading)

On Tuesday, I made a statement in the House calling on the Federal Government to increase their efforts to bring Widlene Alexis Earl home to Canada so she can be with her adoptive parents, grandparents, and friends. I also encouraged my colleagues to give lots of hugs on May 31, in honour of an initiative started by Niton School's grade one class. On Thursday evening, I asked a question during the debate on Bill C-47, which attempts to bring Canada into line with the UN Arms Trade Treaty, also known as the ATT. Canada already has a responsible internal system to monitor and control the export of military and security equipment that meets or exceeds the UN Treaty. We do not need more red tape on firearms. Instead, the federal government should be focusing on how to address the issue of rural crime.

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we continued our review of the Copyright Act, as well as unanimously passed Bill S-218, Latin American Heritage Month Act. For more information on these meetings, visit the CHPC Committee website at www.ourcommons.ca/Committees/en/CHPC.

This week, I attended  $\neg \neg 16$ meetings and  $\neg$ three events, as well as recorded two messages. I will return to Yellowhead over the weekend to attend events in the riding. I will fly back to Ottawa on Sunday as the House will continue to sit for three more weeks before the summer break. Look for my next update on the happenings of Parliament.

# DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of iniuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a stretch in the side of your back. 4. Hold for 15 seconds and re-

peat twice for each side. Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds. 3. Gently pull the club down

with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder and arm.

4. Hold for 15 seconds. 5. Reverse hand positions and repeat.

• Representatives from the Edson Early Childhood Matters' Coalition gave a presentation to the board on the 2016 community profile results collected from the Early Development Instrument, a tool used to assess children's levels of development in their pre-school years.

• Trustees were very pleased to hear about the recent student engagement activities and events that GYPSD youth participated in over the last school year. During the 2017-2018 school year, GYPSD began an initiative that specifically focused on 'student voice'. The initiative focused on three key pieces: Mini-Youth Symposiums held at GYPSD middle schools, a division-wide Youth Symposium, and the creation of a Superintendent's Youth Council, with student representatives from all five high schools and the division's outreach school, The Learning Connection.

• Each mini-symposium involved 30 students from the five middle schools who focused their efforts on developing ideas to improve their schools based on data from a student survey conducted earlier that this year. Student representatives from these mini-symposiums then attended a division-wide Youth Symposium on April 24, 2018, in Hinton. Students spent the day working with students on the Superintendent's Youth Council and School Health Champion facilitators, to determine and plan the specific actions that students will complete to improve their schools this year, and for the 2018 - 2019 school year. Many of the trustees were also present for the Youth Symposium and were excited to watch the high level of engagement and enthusiasm shown by the vouth.

• The highlight of this year's student engagement initiative was

Youth Council and the numerous activities that the group took on to develop their individual leadership skills, as well as the opportunities they each had to share their voice on issues around education. The Superintendent's Youth Council was comprised of 30 youth from Grades 9-12. In addition to working together on the various symposiums and meeting three times this school year to share their voice on their schools, a specific email address was also created to foster continued conversation and dialoguebetween the Superintendent's Youth Council members and Carolyn Lewis, Superintendent of Schools. Superintendent Lewis met with the Council first through a Google hang-out in the Fall, and then spent a valuable afternoon in March of 2018 with the Council in person. "I was thoroughly impressed with the level of engagement and passion our youth have when sharing their voice about education and how the division can help them meet their needs," she noted. "Their leadership and depth of insight was incredibly valuable, and I will continue to seek opportunities to ensure that our students have the ability to be heard."

· In addition to participating in many internal events, each of the Youth Council members were invited to put forward their names for interest in attending various external learning opportunities. These engagement sessions included attendance at a week-long conference, 'Encounters with Canada, and staying at the Terry Fox Youth Centre in Ottawa; being a "Mr. Speaker's MLA for a Day at the Alberta Legislature, and receiving a special invitation to attend the Fall and Spring Public School Boards' Association meetings in both Edmonton and Red Deer, with the GYPSD Board of Trustees. Carra Aschenmeier, Supervisor of Mentorship and Assessment, was the lead coordinator with the Student Engagement Initiative this year. "The Superintendent's Youth Council played a critical role in providing their voice and building positive working relationships within GYPSD. The Council Youth were supported in their leadership development as facilitators, and actively engaged with various education stakeholders this year. I was very fortunate to have worked with these inspirational youth and the sharing of their valuable perspectives."
