# GRAIN FARMERS NEED TO BE PREPARED FOR AUGUST 1 WHEAT RECLASSIFICATION

Saskatoon (June 4, 2018) – The Saskatchewan Wheat Development Commission (Sask Wheat), the Alberta Wheat Commission (AWC) and the Manitoba Wheat and Barley Growers Association (MWBGA) are asking Prairie grain farmers to be prepared for the upcoming reclassification of 29 wheat varieties.

On August 1, 2018, 25 varieties of wheat currently classified as Canada Western Red Spring (CWRS) and four varieties currently classified as Canada Prairie Spring Red (CPSR) will be reclassified into the Canada Northern Hard Red (CNHR) class.

"We want farmers to have a plan to market any remaining wheat that is transitioning to a new class on August 1," says Sask Wheat Chair Laura Reiter. "It is important farmers know what they have in their bins and that they communicate with their local elevator or buyers soon to make sure they are able to maximize the return on these varieties." In February 2015, the Canadian Grain Commission (CGC) announced the Canadian wheat class modernization process. The process was undertaken to maintain the quality, enhance the consistency and support the marketability of Canadian wheat. In December 2015, the CGC announced the creation of the CNHR and Canada Western Special Purpose wheat classes.

Many producers have been preparing over the last two years by transitioning to varieties not designated for reclassification.

# Grain Farmers Need To Be Prepared For August 1 Wheat Reclassification



However, according to the CGC's 2017 Grain Varieties by Acreage Insured Report, 491,108 acres of wheat varieties which are designated for the CNHR class on August 1, including Harvest, Lillian and Unity, were still grown in Western Canada in 2017.

"The CGC is not allowing any

grace period for producers after the July 31st deadline," said Kevin Bender, AWC Chair. "We therefore think it's important that farmers negotiate the best possible terms for the varieties being reclassified and be aware that grain companies will have until December 31, 2018 to ship any remaining stocks from the system as CWRS and CPSR."

Producers who have a contract-



1-877-493-0977 Apply on-Line at <u>www.bridgetohomeownership.ca</u> Ask us about our referral program. ed delivery date after August 1 for a transitioning variety should contact their elevator or grain buyer as soon as possible to ensure their grain will be accepted as CWRS or CPSR. Wheat varieties classified as CNHR are expected to sell at a discount to the CWRS and CPSR classes.

"The MWBGA is happy to partner with our fellow wheat organizations in communicating to Western Canadian producers the importance of making a transition plan," says Fred Greig, MWBGA Chair. "Maintaining the quality of the CWRS class is important to Canada's reputation and will benefit farmers. While the reclassified varieties are still registered and can be grown, we strongly recommend that farmers arrange their marketing options for these varieties prior to future plantings."

# RCMP ARREST TWO SUSPECTS ATTEMPTING TO USE STOLEN CREDIT CARDS

On June 25, 2018 at 1:17 P.M. Spruce Grove RCMP responded to a complaint that a male and female were trying to use stolen credit cards at the local Reddi-Mart. As the RCMP member attempted to detain both suspects, the male pushed the female suspect at the officer. Both suspects fought the officer in an attempt to resist arrest. While the RCMP member was controlling the male suspect, the female suspect ran to the back of the store attempting to escape. The female suspect climbed a ladder in the back room into the ceiling panels to try and evade police. As other RCMP members arrived on scene, the female suspect fell through the ceiling, landing on some shelving in the store. She was taken into RCMP custody with no further incident.

The business owner provided valuable assistance to the responding RCMP member which was instrumental in helping with the apprehension of both suspects. Fortunately nobody involved received any significant injuries.

The male was identified as 28 year old Richard PARISEAU from Edmonton, Alberta. He was charged with 11 counts including:

• Resist arrest from someone aiding the police (store owner)

• Assault Police Officer • Attempting to disarm a police officer

• Mischief under \$5,000

• Fail to comply with recogni-

The female was identified as 29 year old Brittany BURKE from Edmonton, Alberta. She was charged with 3 counts including:


Obstruct Police Officer

Male #1: Spiky brown hair, Approximately 5'6, Eyes close togethMale #2: Tall, Caucasian





# FUNDING AGREEMENT TARGETS ALBERTA JOBS AND TRAINING

OTTAWA – Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents that Employment and Social Development Canada has announced funding agreements aimed to give Albertans better access to jobs and training.

The governments of Canada and Alberta have signed agreements that will see the federal government provide the province with over \$1.7 billion over six years.

It is expected that these agreements will increase the jobs and skills training available to people in Alberta, including apprenticeship training, self-employment training, academic upgrading, English as a second language, and more.

The agreements are the new Workforce Development Agreement (WDA) and the Labour Market Development Agreement (LMDA). In the first two years, Alberta will receive approximately \$490 million—more than \$182 million through the WDA and nearly \$308 million through the LMDA.

The agreements also include a commitment to performance measurement. That means that Canada and Alberta will be able to measure how programs are increasing people's earnings, helping them get jobs that last, and breaking down barriers for under represented groups like Indigenous people, people with disabilities and women. The Government of Canada will be reporting to Canadians on the impacts of these programs, so that they are transparent and so that they can be continually improved.

The WDA will help Alberta deliver training and services, such as:

• The Canada-Alberta Job Grant, which allows new and existing employees to increase their knowledge and skills through training jointly funded by employers and government.

 Disability related employment supports, including funding for technologies like specialized computer software, tutors, and worksite modifications such as wheelchair ramps.

Academic upgrading.

• English as a Second Language training.

• Indigenous skills training programs, including the Aboriginal Training to Employment Program and First Nations Training to Employment Program.

Funding under the LMDA will support measures such as:

• Support for apprentices and jobs in construction.

• Transition to Employment Services, such as the Shuttle Program at Higher Landing, which gives unemployed Albertans individualized services in career management and job search skills to help them return to work as soon as possible.

• Women Building Futures, which provides exposure and training in non-traditional career options in the construction trades to women.

"The people of Alberta have worked

hard for generations, and the entire nation has benefitted from Alberta's economic strength. I am pleased to see investments being made into Alberta jobs, but we need the federal government to do more to protect local jobs against the threat of American protectionism and tariffs," concluded MP Eglinski.

# WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL U

### June 28, 2018

CN representatives were present at the June 25 Regular Meeting of Council to discuss how the company is working to minimize traffic disruptions by trains throughout Whitecourt. CN is working with its crews to change start times to avoid trains disrupting traffic flows during rush hour times, and is also working with industry to change loading/unloading times to minimize the frequency and duration of railway crossing blockages within Whitecourt. Residents are encouraged to contact the Town of Whitecourt at 780-778-2273 to report extended railway blockages (over 15 minutes) to help the municipality better track incidents within our community.

The Downtown Core Streetscape Vitalization Design has been approved. The detailed designs for downtown include an overhaul of the downtown area with new storm water management systems; rebuilding and redesigning of roads, sidewalks, and intersections; selection of street furniture, street lighting, and a comprehensive planting plan. The Plan was developed by the Ad Hoc Vitalization Committee, which includes members of the public, the Chamber of Commerce, and representatives from both the highway corridor and downtown business community. Due to the significant construction proposed, projects included in the Plan would be completed in stages. The Town of Whitecourt is awaiting final costs for the projects, and information will be brought back to Council for deliberation and inclusion in the 20 Year Capital Plan and future budgets.

The Town of Whitecourt will be hosting a community meeting to determine interest, and recruit volunteers to develop a Community Foundation. A community foundation is an independent charitable organization that works to build an endowment fund where interest earned is re-invested into the community over the long term. The concept was discussed in 2012 and 2013, however community interest was not high. It is hoped that recent expressions of interest in building a community foundation will help to grow interest and participation in the concept. Details on when the meeting will be held will be posted online and throughout the community.

The 2018 20-Year Capital Plan has been adopted. The Plan, which includes 131 projects, provides a vision for the long term development of Whitecourt's infrastructure; land development; parks and trails; and, building and recreational/cultural facilities to meet the needs of our growing community. The Plan incorporates projects and timelines identified through engineering studies, planning sessions, workshops, budget deliberations, and public engagement activities. The Plan is available for viewing online at www.whitecourt.ca.

The Community Business Beautification Grant Program assists businesses/organizations to make permanent landscaping enhancements to properties to contribute to the beautification of Whitecourt. The following have been approved for funding in 2018:

• St. Patrick Anglican Church -\$5,734.48 to construct a labyrinth meditation path;

• Community Lunchbox Society -\$824.68 to add plantings, stones and rain barrels;

• Associate Medical Clinic -\$2,987.50 to complete boulevard landscaping.

Whitecourt will be entering into development agreements with the following organizations:

• Millview Development Corporation - for the provision of cash-in-lieu of parking stalls;

• The Friends of Whitecourt Society

- for the construction of the alleyway and 47 Street approach.



Whitecourt Town Council has adopted Code of Conduct Bylaw 1540. The purpose of the bylaw is to establish standards of conduct for both Council and Council Committee Members in their duties as representatives of the municipality. The Town of Whitecourt had a policy in place that established such guidelines, however recent changes to the Municipal Government Act requires all municipalities to have a bylaw in place. The bylaw also includes procedures for the investigation and enforcement of those standards. The Bylaw will be available for viewing on www.whitecourt.ca.

Council has approved the cancellation of a portion of the 2018 property taxes for four properties that suffered loss from fires. The tax reduction reflects the portion of the year that the home is uninhabitable.

Administration completed a review of Off-Site Levies, and based on the review rates will be changing as of January 1, 2019. Off-Site Levies are a cost recovery tool that helps municipalities pay for infrastructure projects that allow the community to grow, including roads, and water and sewage treatment, to name a few. # **CHILD AND YOUTH ADVOCATE RELEASES INVESTIGATIVE REVIEW INVOLVING DEATHS OF 12 YOUNG PEOPLE**

The Office of the Child and Youth Advocate (OCYA) has completed an Investigative Review and is publicly releasing the results of the review as outlined under the Child and Youth Advocate Act.

The Advocate learned of the deaths of 12 young people, including two brothers, who died from opioid poisoning between October 2015 and September 2017. Each one of them were receiving child intervention services when they passed away, or had received services with-

in two years of their death.

"Although this report is about 12 young people collectively, it is important to remember them as individuals and that their deaths were a loss to their families and communities," said Del Graff, Provincial Child and Youth Advocate. "It is imperative that the Government of Alberta take quick action on the recommendations contained within this report so that fewer lives are lost."

While the Government of Alberta and community agencies are working to reduce harm and the number of deaths related to opioid use, the experiences of these 12 young people brings attention to the critical need for a youth-specific response to the opioid issue. Current strate-

gies and initiatives do not address the unique needs of young people.

The intent of an Investigative Review is not to find fault with specific individuals, but to identify and advocate for system improvements that will help enhance the overall safety and well-being of children and youth who are receiving designated services.

Demographic Information on our 12 Young People:

Of the 12 young people in this report five were female, seven were male

Eight were Caucasian, . one was First Nation, two were Métis, one of mixed race

Ten of these young people were hospitalized for drug-related overdose or psychosis

Nine of these young people had co-occurring mental health and/or cognitive disabilities

Six young people were confined in a protective safe house

Residential treatment was not significantly used by these young people, three accessed residential treatment services (one young person did not complete the program)

Eleven young people had involvement under the Youth Criminal Justice Act; six spent time in jail Provincial Stats:

Between January to March 2018, young people 24 years and under account for 16 of the 158 or 10% reported fentanyl-related deaths in Alberta (Source: Alberta Health, Analytics and Performance Reporting Branch, email, June 11, 2018)

In 2017, 733 people died from an apparent accidental opioid overdose

Approximately 76 were under the age of 24 (AHS Quarterly Report - 2017 Q4)

On average, 2 individuals in Alberta die every day as a result of an apparent accidental opioid overdose - Source: AHS Quarterly Report May 2018

Since 2015, 229 young people 24 years and under died from accidental opioid poisoning. The 229 deaths make up 12% of all accidental opioid poisoning deaths in the same period (Source: Alberta Health, Analytics and Performance Reporting Branch, email, June 11, 2018)

In Alberta, young people age 15 to 24 are among the highest and fastest-growing rates of Emergency Department visits for opioid poisoning (tripling over the past 5 years with majority of the increase over the past 3 years) - Source: Opioid-Related Harms in Canada Chartbook (2017)
