BRAZEAU COUNTY AND SURROUNDING COUNTIES NAMED FINALIST FOR SMART CITIES CHALLENGE GRANT

Along with Parkland, Lac Ste. Anne, and Yellowhead Counties, Brazeau County has been named a top 10 finalist out of more than 200 submissions for the Government of Canada's Smart Cities Challenge based on their plan to revitalize agriculture through technology and innovation.

As finalists, the counties have

received a \$250,000 grant, which will be used to develop a final proposal that will outline all design, planning, and project management components of the plan. The counties are the only rural finalists in the Smart Cities \$10 million prize category. If selected as winners, the prize will be used to create more prosperous and safe rural communities.

The Brazeau-Parkland-Lac Ste. Anne-Yellowhead proposal seeks to enhance market and knowledge links with urban Canada and beyond. Data-driven discussions will bring farmers closer to people's kitchen tables and address misconceptions about how food is produced. The plan will improve safety and security in rural areas by reducing accidents between large machinery, and improve regional security through technology adoption.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON UPDATING LOCAL ELECTION LAWS

Albertans have the opportunity to provide feedback about how elections in municipalities, school boards, Metis Settlements and irrigation districts are conducted.

The Local Authorities Election Act establishes the framework for local elections in the province and is traditionally reviewed following each municipal election cycle.

"We're looking to Albertans to help us decide how local elections are run. We want to gauge Albertans' interest in bringing municipal campaign rules in line with the rules we put in place to take big money out of provincial politics. I encourage Albertans to visit our website and provide their input on how we can make municipal elections fairer and more transparent." - Shaye Anderson, Minister of Municipal Affairs

Government wants to hear from you!

Albertans are invited to complete an online survey and provide their comments by July 31.

Topics covered in the consultation include:

- campaign contributions and finances
- campaign expenses
- third-party advertising
- school board trustee elections
- voter identification
- advance votes
- residency requirements

In addition to the public survey, government will consult with key stakeholders, including municipalities, school boards, Metis Settlements and irrigation districts.

Based on the feedback, proposed changes may be introduced in a future session of the legislature.

PROACTIVE PATROLS CONDUCTED ON CANADA DAY LONG WEEKEND LEDUC COUNTY PEACE OFFICERS ISSUE 52 CHARGES, 27 WARNINGS

As people across the county celebrated Canada Day weekend, Leduc County peace officers conducted proactive patrols to keep residents and visitors safe.

Over the four-day period from June 29 to July 2, peace officers travelled 4,450 kilometres and issued a total of 52 charges and 27 warnings for speeding, liquor violations, improper passing and failing to stop at stop signs, among others.

"As our communities celebrated the Canada Day long weekend, our dedicated peace officers continued to patrol area road-

ways to ensure residents and visitors could get where they were going safely." - Clarence Nelson, director of Enforcement Services

A total of four motorists were charged with speeding at more than 40 kilometres per hour above the posted speed limit, including one driver who was caught travelling at 143-kilometres-per-hour in a 90-kilometre-per-hour zone on Township Road 502 near 9th Street in Nisku.

Other speed-related charges included a motorist travelling on Airport Road at 116-kilometres-per-hour in the 70-kilometre-per-hour speed zone and a second motorist travelling 142-kilometres-per-hour in the 100-kilometre-per-hour speed

zone on Highway 778 near Township Road 481.

Additional charges laid included a 33-year-old male who was stopped for speeding and subsequently charged by the Devon RCMP for impaired driving and driving without insurance. Two 24-hour suspensions were issued for impaired driving over the weekend; one for marijuana consumption and one for alcohol consumption.

In addition to patrolling the roads, Leduc County peace officers conducted a boat patrol at Wizard Lake on Canada Day and participated in the annual Canada Day Boat Parade.

In 2017, peace offices issued 81 charges and 19 warnings over the same four-day period.

CITY OF LEDUC'S POPULATION NEARLY DOUBLES IN SIZE SINCE 2006

Leduc Census 2018 concluded May 31 and the city is pleased to report a new population of 32,448, which is a 4.2 per cent growth over 2017 and 91.2 per cent growth since 2006 (*16,967).

"It's an extremely positive sign for this community as it shows that we've more than doubled our previous year's growth from 2 per cent in 2017 to 4.2 per cent in 2018," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "Our city is seeing the benefits of a powerful combination of location, amenities and quality of life; together it makes this community one of the strongest

in the metropolitan region."

The Edmonton Metropolitan Region Board population projection increase for Leduc, from 2014 – 2019, is 2.4 per cent (low scenario) and 3.9 per cent (high scenario).

CALL FOR CONCEPTS – EARLY LEARNING AND CHILD CARE

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that Employment and Social Development Canada has launched a call for concepts from organizations interested in receiving funding from the Social Development Partnerships Program. This program provides funding for innovative projects related to early learning and child care service delivery.

This is the first step of a two-step

process. In this first step, applicants are invited to submit a proposal that describes an idea for an innovative project, including preliminary information on the objectives, the activities and the results of the innovative project.

In the second step, applicants whose initial proposal is retained will be invited to develop a full proposal. At that time, applicants will be asked to provide additional information about the proposed innovative project and submit additional supporting documents.

The call for concepts is open to organizations with a mandate that focuses on early learning and child care or applicants who have a partner for this project whose mandate focuses on early learning and child care.

This process seeks to:

- Identify and develop innovative approaches that respond to existing and emerging early learning and child care issues.
- Develop and share knowledge of existing and emerging early learning and child care issues.

• Foster partnerships and networks to address early learning and child care issues.

The deadline to submit a concept is July 20, 2018.

"I encourage any interested organizations in Yellowhead to submit a proposal to this call for concepts," concluded MP Eglinski.

PARLIAMENT UPDATE - WEEK OF JUNE 18, 2018

Before the House adjourned for the summer, several government bills were pushed through to the Senate.

The following was debated in the House:

- Bill C-45 Cannabis Act (Consideration of Senate Amendments)
- Bill S-210 An Act to amend An Act to amend the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act, the Civil Marriage Act and the Criminal Code and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Third Reading)
 - Bill C-69 An Act to enact the

Impact Assessment Act and the Canadian Energy Regulator Act, to amend the Navigation Protection Act and to make consequential amendments to other Acts (Third Reading)

- Bill C-59 An Act respecting national security matters (Third Reading)
- Bill C-64 Wrecked, Abandoned or Hazardous Vessels Act (Report Stage)
- Bill C-71 An Act to amend certain Acts and Regulations in relation to firearms (Time Allocation, Report Stage and Third Reading)

On Monday, I presented a petition from constituents regarding the Liberal Government's requirement

to sign an attestation in agreement with the Liberals' view on abortion when applying for student summer job funding. The petition called on the Prime Minister to defend freedom of conscience, thought, and belief, and to withdraw the attestation requirement.

Also on Monday, I made a statement in the House regarding the recent arson at our Edson Mosque that made national headlines. Êdson is an inclusive community and we have many different religious and cultural organizations that have always intermingled and respected each other. Religious beliefs and freedoms must be respected, and we should not tolerate any group or

individual who attacks the rights of religious groups in our community.

In the Standing Committee on Canadian Heritage (CHPC), we considered a draft report for our study on the state of Canadian museums, as well as a draft report for our study on cultural hubs. AHS NOTIFYING PATIENTS OF POTENTIAL DTAP VACCINE INEFFECTIVENESS

Alberta Health Services (AHS) will be notifying 298 patients who visited the emergency department at Leduc Community Hospital that the dTap vaccine provided to them as part of their treatment was potentially ineffective, due to incomplete temperature monitoring of a vaccine fridge.

During a routine audit on May 7, 2018, it was found that the temperature of the vaccine fridge at Leduc Community Hospital's emergency department had not been recorded properly.

The dTap vaccine prevents against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis. In the emergency department, the vaccine was being used to update immunizations for patients with possible tetanus prone wounds.

Although the risk of tetanus infection is very low, AHS is notifying the patients related to this monitoring error and recommends that those individuals get re-immunized. There are no adverse reaction risks of getting re-immunized, though patients may experience typical reactions such as a sore arm at the site of the injection.

Only those individuals contacted directly by AHS, are considered impacted by this issue. Though there is no impact on general public, we are informing the public of this case and our follow-up actions, as a matter of transparency.

AHS regrets that this issue has resulted in an impact to our patients and we have ensured that proper monitoring is in now in place.

To protect patient privacy and confidentiality, AHS will not be providing any further detail relating to the patients impacted.

LEDUC RCMP DRUG UNIT MAKES MULTIPLE ARRESTS

On July 4, 2018 the Leduc RCMP Drug Unit concluded several investigations into drug trafficking in the area of Leduc and Leduc County. In three separate busts officers were able to arrest and charge 4 individuals.

Police seized cocaine, methamphetamine, fentanyl, and GHB during the course of these investigations.

Manoharan PONNAMBAL-AM of Edmonton has been charged with trafficking cocaine;

Tauren ADAMS of Edmonton has been charged with trafficking

fentanyl, and cocaine;

Jarrod SCHENK and Abdul BHATTI, both of Edmonton, have been jointly charged with trafficking methamphetamine and possession of GHB.

"The drug trade with the associated violence and crime, is an ever present hazard to our communities. By utilizing a unit of highly specialized drug investigators we have been able to make a serious impact on drug trafficking in Leduc and Leduc County. This type of pro-active police work is very effective in our crime reduction strategy" says RCMP Cpl. Lyle RATTRAY.

FARM FAMILIES HONOURED IN NISKU

Since 1993, more than 1,750 families have received the Government of Alberta's Century Farm and Ranch awards.




